Three defendants in the Department of Natural Resources and Environment (DNRE) case are negotiating plea agreements with Alcona **County Prosecutor Thomas** J. Weichel.

# Methodone causes Glennie man's death

A Glennie woman has been charged with the death of a Glennie man, by way of delivering drugs he consumed.

Dawn Marie Like, 47, was arraigned in 81<sup>st</sup> District Court on January 28 on the charge of delivery of a controlled substance causing death.

Like allegedly delivered the controlled substance to John G. Barry Jr., 50, who died on November 4, 2009 in Curtis Township. According to an amended death certificate dated January 25, Barry's cause of death was "drug intoxication/drug overdose of methodone."

According to Alcona County Prosecuting Attorney Thomas J. Weichel, delivery of a controlled substance causing death is a felony and carries a penalty of life or any term of years in prison.

A preliminary hearing date is scheduled for March 10 at 11 a.m. Like has been re-

Sikorski, Robert S. Clayton, Thomas M. Armstrong and Amy L. Staniski - were arrested as a result of a threemonth undercover operation by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Special Investigations Unit and Commercial Fish Enforcement Unit. To date, five of the six arrested have waived their preliminary examinations. Four have already made plea agreements, three are awaiting sentencing and two have been sentenced.

On February 10 Robert S. Clayton, 47, of Harrisville waived his preliminary examination hearing and pleaded guilty to three misdemeanors – using marijuana (on November 15, 2009), general wildlife viola-- baiting deer in a no tion baiting area and carrying an

uncased firearm on an off nally charged with possesroad vehicle (ORV) on November 28, 2009.

He was originally charged with a total of seven counts, including three felony counts of aiding and abetting a felon in possession of a firearm and four misdemeanor charges including possession of marijuana; use of marijuana; carrying a loaded firearm on an ORV; and one count of general wildlife violation.

Clayton's bond has been continued until his sentencing on March 10 at 9 a.m. in 81<sup>st</sup> District Court.

Thomas M. Armstrong, 45, of Harrisville pleaded guilty to driving while license suspended, revoked, denied (on November 27, 2009) and to using marijuana (on November 15, 2009). He was origision of marijuana, use of marijuana and operating a motor vehicle while license is suspended. His bond has been continued and he will be sentenced on March 10 at 9 a.m.

**On February 3 Jeffery** Sikorski, 40, of Harrisville waived his preliminary examination. All of the charges - felony and misdemeanors

- were bound over to 23<sup>rd</sup> Circuit Court and he was arraigned in that court on February 9. He is charged with four felony counts of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and 56 misdemeanor counts including, one count of carrying a loaded firearm in a motor vehicle; one count of delivery of mariiuana: six counts of hunting without a license; four counts of hunting without hunter orange; nine counts of possession of marijuana; seven counts with use of marijuana; five counts of open intoxicants in a motor vehicle; four counts of general wildlife violations; 14 counts of taking fish with illegal devices; three counts of fishing in a closed trout stream; and two counts of illegal sale of fish.

Sikorski remains lodged in the Alcona County Jail. He is scheduled to appear in circuit court on March 9 at 10 a.m. He will appear in 81st District Court on March 10 for a status conference on any remaining misdemeanor charges.

A Caledonia Township official is facing a felony charge and is scheduled to appear in 81<sup>st</sup> District Court next week for a preliminary examination.

Caledonia Township Supervisor Roxanne Brown, 51, of Hubbard Lake has been charged with larceny by false pretenses over \$1,000 and less than \$20,000. She was arraigned in 81st District Court on February 10.

According to a press release from Alcona County Prosecutor Thomas J. Weichel, the investigation was conducted by Michigan State Trooper John Grimshaw. His investigation found that Brown allegedly made false statements or pretences to the township board in order to obtain a reimbursement of \$1,587 for appraisal classes and millage - which she was not entitled to. 'After trooper Grimshaw began his investigation, Ms. Brown refunded the money to the township," Weichel said. Larceny by false pretenses over \$1,000 and less than \$20,000 carries a penalty of up to five years and or \$10,000, or three times the value of the money involved, whichever is greater, Weichel said. Brown is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on February 24 at 11 a.m.

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Home-delivered meals are arriving on a new set of "wheels" in Alcona County, thanks to a new vehicle purchased by the Alcona County Commission on Aging.

The commission put a new 2010 Chevy Colorado with extended cab and four-wheel drive into service at the beginning of the year, according to Alcona County Commission on Aging (ACCOA) President Everett Leeseberg. The truck features an oven, which holds about 100 warm meals and a freezer unit, which holds about 200 frozen meals, he said.

"Our old van that served the east side of the county was so bad," Leeseberg said, "that when they would stop and deliver meals, it sometimes had to have a nudge to

was sentenced in 81<sup>st</sup> District court to six months probation for use of marijuana. However, if she successfully completes the terms of her probation the charge will be dismissed from her record.

Stanley J. Sikorski 44, of Harrisville is set for a preliminary hearing at 10 a.m. on February 17. He was charged with six felonies including maintaining a drug house, two counts of delivery/manufacture of marijuana and three counts of possession of marijuana, second offense. His misdemeanor charges include four counts of use of marijuana; carrying a loaded firearm on an off-road vehicle (ORV); operating an ORV on a public highway, operating an ORV while license is suspended and open intoxicants in a motor vehicle. He is out on bond.

George John Miller, 36, of Harrisville was sentenced on January 27 to \$1,145 in fines and court costs; \$870 in restitution and 58 days in jail, with credit for 58 days for time served for two counts of selling sport fish without a commercial license; three counts of using an illegal fishing device (gaff hook); and two counts of fishing a trout stream (Mill Creek) out of season.



In addition, Krey said, the center is looking for volunteers of any age to answer phones and help with other office activities. Interested individuals can call the number above.



# Seeking Social Security disability benefits

Dear Savvy Senior, What do I need to do to get Social Security disability? I'm 58 years old and have back problems that are keeping me from doing my job, but I've heard it's very difficult to actually get disability benefits. What tips can you offer?

**Disabled** Dave

#### Dear Dave,

The process of getting Social Security disability benefits can be tricky and timeconsuming, but you can help yourself by doing some homework and getting prepared.

Last year, around three million people applied for Social Security disability benefits, but two-thirds of them were denied. Why the high denial rate? Because most applicants fail to provide sufficient medical evidence that prove they're disabled and can't work.

While there are no magic tips to getting Social Security disability, there are several steps you can take to give

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yourself a better chance for a favorable decision.

Your first step is to know if your disability meets Uncle Sam's criteria. Social Security strictly requires that you must be physically or mentally unable to perform "any" substantial work and have a medical condition that's lasted or is expected to last at least a year or result in death. You must also have worked five out of the last 10 years and be under full retirement age.

For more details, see ssa.gov/dibplan/ dqualify4.htm and go through the five questions Social Security uses to decide if you're disabled.

If you think you qualify, vour next step is to learn all you can about how the program works. Your best resource is SocialSecurity.gov - click on "Disability." Or, if you don't have Internet access, Social Security offers lots of free publications that you can have mailed to you including "Disability Benefits" (publication No. 05-10029) which provides a good comprehensive overview. Call (800) 772-1213 to order publications.

After you bone up, your next step is to gather up your personal, financial and medical information so you can be prepared and organized for the application process. You'll need your Social Security number; birth certificate; names, addresses and phone numbers of the doctors, hospitals and clinics that took care of you and dates of your visits; names and dosage of all the medicine you take; medical records from your doctors, therapists, hospitals and clinics; lab and test results; documents stating your physician's objective view of your condition, restrictions and limitations; a summary of where you worked and the kind of work you did; and a copy of your most recent W-2 Form or, if you are self-employed, your federal tax return for the past year.

After you get your information together, you can ap-

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ply either online at ssa.gov/ applyfordisability, or call (800) 772-1213 to make an appointment to apply at your local Social Security office or to set up an appointment for someone to take your claim over the phone.

The whole process lasts about an hour. If you schedule an appointment, a "Disability Starter Kit" that will help you get ready for your interview will be mailed to you. If you apply online, the kit is available at ssa.gov/ disability.

It takes three to five months from the initial application to receive either an award or initial denial of disability benefits. The only exception is if you have a chronic illness that qualifies you for a "compassionate allowance," (see ssa.gov/compassionateallowances) which fast-tracks cases within 10 days.

If Social Security denies your application for disability, you can request a hearing to appeal the decision, and you'll be happy to know that roughly 55 percent of



cases that go through a round or two of appeals end with benefits being awarded. But the bad news is, with backlog of over 700,000 people currently waiting for a hearing, it will take a year or two for you to get one.

If you are having trouble getting your applications in order or need help with your appeal, consider getting an attorney or a Social Security disability claims services company to represent you. A representative can only charge you if they're successful in getting you benefits. If they do succeed, typical fees are 25 percent of past-due benefits or \$6,000, whichever is less.

And now, in the midst of a long season of dearth and sorrow, come a few minutes of pretend. Not pretend as in presenting something untrue. Pretend at its most delightful, most magical definition – as make believe.

Watching the opening ceremonies of the 2010 Vancouver Winter Olympics reminded me of nothing so much as opening a beautiful, complex pop-up book. Mountains cascaded from the ceiling, salmon and whales swam in the floor, a beautiful child flew above the crowd. A fiddler in a canoe played his song against the moon. While much of it involved elaborate technology, it came across more as the telling of a wonderful, warm folk tale.

As a Michiganian – and probably like most Americans living along the northern border -- I have a proprietary fondness for Canada. Kind of like the neighbors across the lake who you don't know all that well, but who always wave. Nice people. Probably nicer than you are. And that's the image the opening ceremonies brought as well, I thought.

Beyond that, I was absolutely delighted to find that the evening included poetry. Much of it was read by Canadian Donald Southerland, celebrating the work of Canadian poets from several eras. They have their share, Robert Service and Leonard Cohen among them.

Had you asked me, prior to Friday evening, about the role of poetry in our world, I might have told you I mourned its decline. Poetry, after all, tends to be something people either love or hate.

Those who love it have generally been captured early on by some piece that touched them, caught their imagination, elicited their admiration of its form or structure or the mathematics of the thing. Those who hate it usually view it as thick, obscure, boring – an anachronism.

I'm one of the people who love it. So it was nice to find there were still some other believers out there, hunkered down by the firelight with their tattered volumes of verse.

And then, as often happens in make believe, it got better.

Toward the end of the ceremony, slam-poet Shane Koyczan delivered his poem "We Are More." For some of us, there is nothing quite as amazing as discovering a new poet in this day and age.

Koyczan was born in Yellow Knife and raised in British Columbia. Round-faced, bespectacled and tubby, he describes himself in one piece as "the world's best overweight lover." Judging from his work, I'll bet he is. That's as close as I'll ever get to knowing, since I'm not into cougardom and he's only a year older than my own daughter.

But just looking at this young man, you can see the teenage angst that brought him to where he is today. Not that a poet has to be lonely, but he or she does – at least for a time – have to be alone. To think things through until you have the words right.

Koyczan has the words right. In "We Are More" he strings together "we are the lost-and-found for all those who might find themselves at a loss" and "we are the abandoned hesitation of all those who can't wait," two phrases that in and of themselves would make the poem worthwhile.

Slam poetry is a form of spoken word; dedicated in

part to the proposition that poetry should be heard, not read. Accordingly, Koyczan's delivery is sometimes smooth, sometimes staccato, larded with small sections of rhythmic rhyme. I don't necessarily support the "heard not read" thesis in its entirety, but in this case, hearing truly is better.

If you love poetry, or maybe just have some time on your hands, look his work up on YouTube. For some of the best, try "The Crickets Have Arthritis" if only for the line, "Louis loves like a man who lived in a time before God gave religion to man and left it to them to figure out what hate was." If you're one of the ones who hate poetry, this piece might change your mind. If you're one of those who love it, it will confirm your devotion.

And if you're one who has found yourself at a loss, you might just find -- for a few minutes anyway -- the lostand found.

In the midst of all of that, last Friday night, it seemed almost appropriate – poetic justice, if you will, that the one big technological part – the rising of the legs for the torch's cauldron – failed to function. I didn't think it marred the ceremony, I thought that somehow it only made it and its hosts more endearing.

Somehow, in a long season of dearth and sorrow, the whole thing just gives me a little more hope. It's astonishing, sometimes, what a little pretend time can do.

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# Cold weather tips to keep pets safe

• Keep pets inside as much as possible during the cold winter months. Exposure can result in frostbite, injury and death. Cats are especially vulnerable as they will sometimes sleep under car hoods to keep warm. Banging loudly on the car hood or honking your horn before starting your car might give a cat the chance to escape.

• Never let your dog off the leash on snow or ice, especially during a snowstorm, dogs can lose their scent and easily become lost. There are more dogs lost during winter than any other season. Make sure your pet always wears ID tags. ID tags can be purchased at the shelter.

• Thoroughly wipe off your dog's legs and stomach when he comes in out of freezing weather. He can ingest salt, antifreeze or other potentially dangerous chemicals while licking his paws and his paw pads may crack and bleed from encrusted snow and ice.

• Antifreeze is lethal poison for dogs and cats, be sure to wipe up any spills. Consider using products that contain propylene glycol rather than ethylene glycol.

 Consider the age and breed of your dog. Limit puppies and older dog's time outside as well as short hair breeds that don't tolerate cold weather. You may want to purchase a well fitting coat or sweater for your dog to fight off the winter chill.

• Keep in mind that your pets still need exercise during winter months. Keep lots of entertaining and safe pet toys around and play with your animals. Many dog breeds love winter weather and will enjoy a walk with you outside. It will keep your dog happy and healthy and keep you fit as well.

 Make sure your companion animal has a warm place to sleep inside, off the floor and away from all drafts. A cozy dog or cat bed with a warm blanket or pillow is perfect.

 Increase protein for dogs that spend a lot of time engaged in outdoor activities to keep him and his fur in tiptop shape.

 Leaving your pets alone in a car during cold weather is deadly. The car can act as a refrigerator holding in the cold causing an animal to freeze to death.



# Hounds, bear and grouse: On the road with a DNRE conservation officer

It's opening morning for bear hound hunting and the clock is just striking 4 a.m. when conservation officer Grant Emery climbs into his truck, ready for what will be a 17-hour shift in the field.

Emery's Gogebic County territory marks the epicenter for hound hunting in the Upper Peninsula and he is prepared for a busy morning of checking bear hunters evidenced by the bag of dog treats on his dashboard.

"Bear hounds, for the most part, are the friendliest dogs you'll ever meet," Emery said. "But when they have their head in the hunt, it doesn't hurt to have a treat to distract them, so I can quickly check their tags and their owner's hunting license."

Emery's game plan this morning is to head out into the woods before dawn to set up near some bait sites that he scouted and marked with his GPS in advance. All is quiet, as he listens for the sound of hunters who may be out running their dogs before official hunting hours have opened.

"Ninety percent of the interactions I have with hunters are positive, but it tends to be on opening days when we see more violations," Emery explained. "This isn't just the hound opener today, it's also the second of three bear openers for bait hunters and it's the small game season opener. That's why all of us officers will be working much longer shifts than normal and will be out in greater force than normal.'

From his pickup truck, Emery can stay in contact with other conservation officers who are teaming up with him to work the opener. Although he is the only conservation officer assigned to Gogebic County, officers from Iron County and Ontonagon County are nearby, working the general area where the three counties border each other.

With specialized computer equipment installed in every conservation officer's vehicle, known as an Automated Vehicle Locator System or AVL, it is possible for Emery to view a map showing where the other officers are at any time, plus exchange text mes-

ficer I can be, I need to also take part in these sports," Emery said. "I have bear hunted for years, and that makes me more prepared when I encounter hunters in the field. since I know immediately what to look for, what common mistakes hunters can innocently make and which parts of the law are maybe tempting to knowingly break."

Approaching hunters not only as a conservation officer (CO), but also as a fellow hunter, gives Emery the ability to use his intuition and decide when a simple teaching moment may need to move to the next level, he explained.

As he drives a woods road, following a truck with bear hounds in the back kennel, Emery tells the story of how his lifelong dream to be a conservation officer was sparked by an encounter he had with a DNR officer while fishing as a teenager with his father. The duo was approached while on the water and Emery's dad couldn't find his fishing license in his wallet. Though the officer wrote a ticket, he included the stipulation that if the elder Emery could show proof before a certain date that he had been licensed to fish, the ticket would be waived.

"That showed me right then that being a CO is more than writing tickets," Emery said. "You need to be a people person and assess whether the situation would be better served by making it a teaching moment or if giving a violation is the best answer. There are some things I will always write a violation for not wearing blaze orange, not having enough life preservers in a boat, driving with a loaded gun, things that could be life-and-death situations. "In other instances," he continued, "I use my own judgment on a case-by-case

basis, and honestly, a lot of it comes down to the attitude of the person I have approached. I learned that from the CO who stopped my dad and me so many years ago."

As Emery pulls up to the bear hunters he has followed into the woods, he gets out of the truck and greets the group with a genuine smile, asking how the hunting has been. The party is made up of hunters from South Carolina who come to the Upper Peninsula each fall to hunt bear. Emery recognizes several members and proceeds to make small talk and scratch the kenneled hounds behind the ears before moving on to business.

Once it is time to check everyone's licenses and also check the hound registrations, most of the tension has melted and everyone is chatting and joking around. According to the hunters, they were tracking a bear that morning, but the dogs have lost the scent at the moment, a statement Emery is comfortable taking at face value, since he can't detect the sound of hounds baying in the distance and he doesn't hear any significant radio traffic between these hunters and the rest of their party.

Back on the road, Emery returns to where he saw another group of hunters earlier in the morning and proceeds to check their licenses. Noticeable is the use of Emery's technique of making simple small talk, using his knowledge of the sport to talk hunting details, before anyone is asked to produce a license. By the time wallets come out, the initial tension is once again diffused.

sages with them without creating additional radio traffic.

Shortly after hunting hours open, Emery is busy messaging the other officers, finding out who has seen hunters and where. By listening for the sound of hounds baying and watching the roads for hunting parties tracking their dogs with GPS and radios. the officers are able to get a good handle on where the action is taking place and where they should relocate to.

Once it is determined that a bear has likely been treed, the officers will coordinate to decide who will move in to check for licenses or possible violations, such as not wearing blaze orange or too many dogs running in a pack.

"I'm a big believer that to be the best conservation of-

tact," Emery said. "But for me, this is the way to do my job while letting hunters enjoy their time in the woods. I've been doing this for 10 years and was a cop for four years prior, so I've developed the intuition to know when to take things to the next level — and I do. I write more tickets than any other CO in this region. But when I do write them, I always want to be sure it is fair."

Once bear hunters have vacated the woods for the afternoon, Emery's attention turns to grouse hunters who are driving woods roads. Most checks are made on the road at the hunter's vehicle — all of whom stop voluntarily once they see Emery is a CO. The stops are quick, with Emery asking to see licenses, counting birds in the game bag, cracking open shotguns to make sure they aren't loaded while in the vehicle, then wishing the hunters well and sending them on their way.

Later that evening, Emery returns to the bear hunting scene, ready to approach bait hunters to issue citations for illegal baits that were placed too early or for having more than the legal number of baits. Once again, the AVL system in his truck will guide him back to the bait locations he marked days ago on his GPS.

By the time he has finished around 9 p.m., Emery has been on the road for 17 hours. He'll be out again early the next morning, but, he admits, he'll hardly be able to sleep when at home anyway.

"Hunting season for me is like Christmas morning. Even when I'm on the clock, I just love to be in the outdoors and can't wait to get out there every day. And when I have a day off, I'll be up just as early to get out to my stand to try for a bear," Emery said. "When you are a CO, your life and your job are one in the same, and I'm lucky enough to have it that way."

# DNRE asks for public help to detect presence of wolves in Lower Peninsula

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment will conduct a survey in the northern Lower Peninsula Feb. 16 through March 12 to detect the presence of gray wolves in this area of the state.

Survey teams will be searching areas where the public reports observing a wolf or wolf tracks during the of wolves where we have previously confirmed animals and to detect new occurrences in other areas," said DNRE Wildlife Biologist Jennifer Kleitch.

"Given the low probability of observing a wolf or tracks in the Lower Peninsula it's helpful to have as many eyes looking as possible. That's why public reports are im(989) 732-3541, ext. 5901. Observation reports can also be submitted online yearround at www.michigan.gov/ wolves. The Web site also contains identification information for wolves.

"It's imperative that observations are reported in a timely manner so we can work with fresh evidence. If the public finds what appear to be wolf tracks, they should preserve the physical evidence and disturb it as little as possible or take a photo of the tracks with a ruler," Kleitch said. "If someone has a photo or video of a wolf in the Lower Peninsula, we're interested in that as well." Wolves began naturally returning to Michigan's Upper Peninsula via Canada and Wisconsin in the early 1990s. Since that time populations have increased and continue to expand their range. Evidence of range expansion into the Lower Peninsula came when a gray wolf was accidentally killed in Presque Isle County in 2004. More recently, the DNRE verified two wolf observations in 2009 in the northern Lower Peninsula as a result of a video and trail camera photo.

# New 4-H project areas help youth succeed

As an organization that relies heavily on the kindness of individuals willing to give their time, resources and talent, Michigan State University (MSU) Extension knows the value of a volunteer. Or in this case, a team of volunteers -- all willing to make this investment in youth to help them succeed.

Alcona County MSU Extension and Alcona 4-H have formed five new project clubs ranging in focus from raising and marketing livestock to electronics and physical fitness. Youth of all ages with a variety of interests will ultimately benefit from the formation of these new clubs. New clubs are often borne out of need -- whether there exists an educational gap, an emerging issue, a need for service or a need linked to geography. A 4-H club is the most common, most recognizable and probably the most effective delivery vehicles for content.

One of the new clubs will focus on electrical projects, with retired engineer Stan Darmofal at the helm. Darmofal's ideas for the club include afterschool meetings working with "snap circuits" as well as a glimpse into HAM radio. Possible future projects also include mechanical engineering using Lego robotics kits.

Another new club will focus on learning about the game of golf with instructor Ruth Golm from the Greenbush Golf Course. She is a retired educator and former 4-H leader in Macomb County. Golm is excited for spring and the prospect of the next generation sharing her passion for the game of golf.

Regina Good, a new volunteer in Mikado, wanted to create a club where youth could learn about a variety of animals from steers to poultry. She decided to start the club so that her own kids would be able to attend fewer meetings, but get more useful information.

Jeanette Klein, a special education instructor with Alcona Schools, has recently developed an idea that she will turn into a new 4-H Drama Club -- a place for youth to learn and grow through theatre. The fact that studies have shown that more adults fear public speaking than death -- really demonstrates the need for this program.

Lastly, a variety club with a wide focus, seated in the Barton City area will touch on a variety of projects including livestock, gardening and cooking. Mirrored by her hobbies, club leader Sandy LaBeau has been meeting with youth and is excited for spring when more outdoor hands-on projects can get started. But even the cold temperatures won't slow her down."The kids had a blast...(at our last meeting)," Labeau said. "It was too cold outside so I put a tarp down in our kitchen and brought the turkey in for hands on learning.'

Each of these clubs were in the developmental stages this past fall and are either meeting or will be meeting this spring -- offering a vari-



ety of new project areas for youth to explore. An interest in projects is what draws a potential member to a club. But regardless of interest, the heart of the club is the same...caring adult volunteers guiding youth development. Volunteers mentor youth in an area of interest, all the while the youth themselves grow into a young adult, better prepared for the future.

MSU Extension's Dr. Julie Chapin sums it up, "according to the Tufts University 4-H Study of Positive Youth Development, compared to youth involved in other outof-school time activities, 4-H youth are more likely to see themselves going to college, 25 percent more likely to contribute to their communities, and 41percent less likely to engage in risky behaviors like drinking, smoking or doing drugs. The opportunities available to young people through 4-H helps them build life skills that will help them in whatever path they choose in life." Chapin, a senior program educator, is assigned to children, youth, families and communities where she coordinates the Michigan 4-H Youth Development Program.





#### StarWatch By Gary Becker - Asteroid, Planets, and Moon on Parade

If the weather cooperates, this week has two interesting venues which are examples of why astronomy is the most accessible of all of the sciences. The first is a close encounter between Venus and Jupiter on February 16. The other event happens on the 18 when the asteroid Vesta passes very close to the star Algieba in Leo the Lion. Venus and Jupiter, the third and fourth brightest objects of the heavens, meet for a brief encounter very low in the WSW on Tuesday. The difficulty in viewing the pair will be their close proximity to the horizon at sunset. Southwestern facing vistas will have to be nearly perfect which makes observations from high-rise apartments and hillcrests ideal. Spot Venus once the sun is fully set by scanning the horizon with binoculars immediately to the left of the sundown position. Above and to Venus's right, and separated by only one lunar diameter, will be Jupiter. Even higher, will be a thin, waxing crescent moon with plenty of earthshine to light its shadowed portions as darkness deepens. Observations on February 14 and 15 will the reveal the moon closer to the pair. On the 14 the slivery moon stands directly above the sun at sunset, while on the following evening, Luna positions herself about 10 degrees above Jupiter. All three twilights will present stunning views of the trio, but February 16 pits Venus closest to Jupiter. Two nights later, in the east at 10 p.m., the second most massive and brightest asteroid of the heavens, Vesta, passes within 1/5 of a lunar diameter from the naked eye star, Algieba, vesta, and 40 Leonis in a straight line with Vesta considerably closer to Algieba. Use binoculars to see Vesta. An online map is available in the web version of this article. Good observing! www.astronomy.org

#### **MOMENTS IN TIME** The History Channel

On March 6, 1475, Michelangelo Buonarroti, the greatest of the Italian Renaissance artists, is born. His most important early work was the Pieta (1498), a sculpture that showed the body of Christ in the lap of the Virgin Mary. Demonstrating masterful skill, Michelangelo extracted the two perfectly balanced figures of the Pieta from a single block of marble.
