Mobile command center aids sheriff's department in off site investigations

Working outside in the elements of northern Michigan to coordinate law enforcement personnel during investigations at crime scenes is now a thing of the past for the Alcona County Sheriff's Department.

Thanks to a Homeland Security grant and a local volunteer group that planned and provided the labor, the sheriff's department now has a mobile command center.

According to Alcona County Sheriff Douglas Atchison, the command center will be used "when we are going to be on scene for an extended period of time - anything from a fatal accident where there is a lengthy investigation with accident recreation to preliminary scene investigations involving arson, homicide or a barricaded gunman. It will be utilized by our agency as well as any others we might be working with - state police, DNRE, fire departments, the forest service - depending on the situation.'


The 16 foot by six foot trailer is fully equipped for lengthy outings, according to Alcona County Sheriff's Deputy Nathanael Leeseberg. It has lights, heat, air conditioning, battery power and a generator, refrigerator, radio communications, cell phone booster and an area for storage of supplies and equipment. The center can seat three individuals and has enough space for seven or so individuals.

"It's literally an office away from our office – we can do anything here that we can do at the office," Leeseberg said. "The Alcona County Amateur Radio Group did everything from the schematics to putting it all together. They did a phenomenal job. The attention to detail is incredible." Leeseberg worked as a liaison between the radio group and the sheriff's department.

Atchison explained that up to the completion of the mobile command center, many of the off-site investigations and coordinated responses were "conducted on the trunk of a patrol car" and sensitive interviews were sometimes held in the backseat of a car.

"The radio group went above and beyond (on this project)," Atchison said. "Members literally put in

The Lincoln Downtown Development Authority (DDA) received a \$128,000 grant from the Michigan Economic Development Commission for the demolition, asbestos removal, site clearing and seeding. As stipulated in the grant, the space will be "green" for a year, then may be sold. The DDA provided \$40,000 in matching funds for the project. The contractor is Beirlien out of Midland, Mich. "They have done a fabulous job clearing those sites; very professional," Jordan said. "The project should be wrapped up by Friday, Nov. 5."





A one-time monetary donation was presented by Alcona Motors to the region on October 23 by Kruttlin. The league will also have the opportunity to raise additional funds for their use as a part of a Chevrolet Youth Soccer Fundraiser.

hundreds of man hours toward the completion of this project and we certainly appreciate it."

This project did take some time to come together. Atchison explained the Homeland Security grant of \$3,000 was awarded in 2004. It was enough to purchase the trailer and outfit it with the generator, heater, air conditioning, et cetera. Before it was finished, the grant money ran out.


Atchison said the remaining funds used to complete the command center — \$2,867 - came from non general fund dollars. "This money came from miscellaneous sources - not from the tax base," Atchison said. He explained funds came from a variety of sources accumulated over the last several years including drug forfeitures and fees jail inmates pay to use the telephone, et cetera.

In addition to the mobile command center, the sheriff's department and 911 central dispatch has received three other Homeland Security grants totaling \$126,000 during the last few years.

According to Atchison, the two departments received \$24,000 for new handheld portable 800 megahertz radios to enhance communication for law enforcement.

This fall a new 120 foot communication antenna was installed for 911 central dispatch communications with a \$62,000 Homeland Security grant. And, a new generator that will power the entire building – sheriff's department, jail and kitchen, 911 dispatch, and 82 District Court – is in the process of being installed. The Homeland Security grant for this project is \$40,000.

Changes coming to Medicare Part D

Dear Savvy Senior,

Should I consider changing my Medicare (Part D) prescription drug plan during open enrollment season? My pharmacist told me that with all the changes coming next year, it would be a good time to shop and compare plans because I could probably find a better deal. What do you

Dear Rita,

Reviewing your Medicare Part D options during the open enrollment season (November 15 - December 31) is actually a smart thing to do every year, but it's particularly important this year because of all the costs, coverage and plan changes that are coming in 2011.

One of the biggest changes to Medicare Part D next year is the shrinking of the "donut hole" coverage gap.

In 2010, seniors fall into the coverage gap when their prescription drug expenses total \$2,830 for the year. At that point, you generally have to pay all of your drug bills yourself until the total cost of your drugs for the year reaches \$6,440. After that, your insurer picks up most of the bill.

But starting in 2011, seniors that hit the donut hole will get a 50 percent discount on brand name drugs and a seven percent discount on generic drugs. So if you've been paying extra for coverage in the donut hole, now is

a good time to review your options. You may be able to switch to a more basic, less expensive plan and still end up with similar coverage because of these new discounts.

Rising premiums, the elimination of some popular drug plans, and the addition of some new low-cost plans are the other changes you need to be aware of.

While the average Part D premiums will increase by just \$1 in 2011, to \$30 per month, several of the more popular drug plans that millions of retirees are enrolled in are increasing by an average of 10 percent. Another change that wealthier beneficiaries need to take note of is the addition of a highincome surcharge next year. If your income is more than \$85,000 (or \$170,000 per couple) your Part D monthly premiums will be higher than those with lower incomes.

Also new in 2011, Medicare is requiring insurers to cut back or consolidate the duplicate drug plans they offer to help make the selection process easier. This reduction, however, means that several popular plans like United Healthcare's AARP Medicare Saver plan and Universal America's Pres-cribaRX Bronze plan will be discontinued. Seniors in these plans will automatically be switched into different plans by the same com-

If you're in a plan that's

being dropped and you're being moved over to another plan, or if your premiums are rising sharply, you definitely need to reassess your options. Another Medicare drug plan may provide better coverage at a lower price.

You also need to know that several new low-cost drug plans are entering the market next year. The Humana Wal-Mart-Preferred Rx plan is the cheapest at only \$14.80 per month, but be aware that your out-of-pocket costs for this plan will vary greatly depending on where you purchase your medications.

When comparing drug plans be sure to consider the whole pricing package including premiums, deductibles and co-pays. Low-premium plans could cost you more if you have to pay high co-payments for your medications. Also, be sure the plan you choose covers all of the drugs you take with no restrictions.

To compare plans, use Medicare's online Plan Finder Tool (www.medicare.gov/ find-a-plan) where you type in your zip code, drugs and dosages, and select the pharmacies you use and you'll get

- Ask your doctor for generics on every prescription you have, and buy them at Walmart or other stores offering \$4 prescriptions, if possible.

Remember: We can be tough if we have to be, and we can do this. All it takes is an attitude adjustment, right?

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
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
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And we're not going to take it anymore...

So what is it, then, that we're supposed to be so angry about? Well, a good many of those discussing it con-

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tend that this is "post September 11 anger." Okay. Almost a decade ago, our country was attacked. Buildings were destroyed. People died. Please understand that in no way am I diminishing the horror of that day in our national history. But there's a lady in my church who lived through the London Blitz as a child. Seventy-six straight nights of consistent bombing, 43,000 dead, more than a million buildings destroyed or damaged. And the Brits did what they may do better than anyone else. They persevered.

Which wouldn't be so much of a concern if anger weren't so darn contagious. But it seems to me that this alleged national anger is beginning to seep into my own little world of Alcona County.

Here in the heartland, where we've never had much

Anger is a corrosive emotion. Physically, it raises the adrenaline level and the blood pressure. Emotionally, it leads to isolation and depression. Nationally – or so it seems to me – it manifests itself in polarization, bullying and sometimes even violence.

It's not, you should understand, that I never get mad. Trust me, I do. I'm of Irish heritage, after all and as spoiled as anybody else, if not more so. I live with a chronic condition day to day, the primary symptoms of which are fatigue, pain and muscle weakness, none of which is particularly good for the temper.

Catch me sometime when my right arm has just spasmed and I'm mopping up the Coke I spilled all over the table, the floor and my computer keyboard. Or on a morning when my legs just quietly, but adamantly, refuse to bring me to my feet. Or maybe, under those circumstances, you'd be better off to just stay out of my way. Which is not to say "poor me" so much as it is to say, "Sure, I get ticked, too."

Still, while I can't take any credit for it, God and Mother Nature must have realized that I'd have days when I felt like tossing my head around. Whatever the reason, recognizing that they probably couldn't keep me from getting mad, they made me constitutionally incapable of staying mad

staying mad. From where I stand – or more often, these days, sit –

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StarWatch By Gary Becker - It's about Time



The moment is almost upon us to change our clocks back to Standard Time. No, it won't happen on Halloween. It's Europe's turn this week on the morning of October 31. We officially move our clocks back the following Sunday, November 7, by repeating the hours of 1-2 a.m. twice. That change puts us more in harmony with the sun, meaning that the sun reaches its highest point in the heavens, due south, around noontime each day rather than at 1 p.m. as it has been occurring since Sunday, March 14 when clocks were adjusted ahead to begin Daylight Saving Time. Remember it this way; fall back and spring ahead.

We really don't lose or gain any daylight; we simply put time in better synchronization to accommodate our waking hours. If you normally rise and shine around 6 a.m. on workdays, you've noticed over the past several months that it has been getting darker and darker each morning. Sunrise for 40 degrees north latitude is now happening about 7:30 a.m. By the winter solstice, sunrise would be closer to 8:20 a.m. when most of us should be in a fully functioning mode. Starting on the morning of November 7, the sunrise at 40 degrees north will occur at 6:30 a.m., and by the winter solstice it will be pushed back to 7:20 a.m. If we gain an hour in the morning, than we must lose an hour at sunset. On Halloween the sun goes down at 6 p.m. On November 1, that falls back to 5 p.m. bringing us closer to sunset around the evening commute. One of the main reasons always cited for wanting to give us some extra light in the morning deals with school safety. Most districts start their day between 7-8 a.m. and for rural districts this can mean an hour or more commuting on a school bus. Pickups can occur as early as 6 a.m. which would in some cases be occurring 2-1/2 hours before sunrise. Get ready for that extra hour of catch up sleep next week. It only happens once each year. www.astronomy.org

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

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MOMENTS IN TIME

The History Channel

- On Nov. 19, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln delivers one of the most famous speeches in American history at the dedication of the military cemetery at Gettysburg, Pa. Using just 272 words, Lincoln brilliantly and movingly articulated the meaning of the conflict for a war-weary public. His address lasted just two min-
- On Nov. 18, 1883, American and Canadian railroads begin using four continental time zones to end the confusion of dealing with thousands of local times. However, it was not until 1918 that Congress officially adopted the railroad time zones and put them under the supervision of the Interstate Commerce Commis-
- On Nov. 21, 1927, Time magazine puts the Holland Tunnel on its cover. The tunnel, which runs under the Hudson River between New York City and Jersey City, N.J., had opened to traffic the week before, at the stroke of midnight on Nov. 13. The toll was 50 cents per car in both direc-
- On Nov. 16, 1945, the United States ships 88 German scientists to America to assist the nation in its production of rocket technology. Most of these "volunteers" had served under the Nazi regime. The voluntary nature of the scheme was somewhat undercut by the admission that the scientists were in "protective custody."
- On Nov. 20, 1955, Bo Diddley introduced himself and his namesake beat to the world with his television debut on "The Ed Sullivan Show." Sullivan was so furious with Diddley for not opening with Tennessee Ernie Ford's "Sixteen Tons" that Sullivan banned him from future appearances on his show.
- On Nov. 15, 1965, at the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah, 28-year-old Californian Craig Breedlove sets a new landspeed record — 600.601 mph. His car, the Spirit of America, cost \$250,000 and was powered by a surplus engine from a Navy jet.
- On Nov. 17, 1973, in the midst of the Watergate scandal that eventually ended his presidency, President Richard Nixon tells a group of newspaper editors that he is "not a crook." After a relentless federal investigation, Nixon resigned in August 1974.
