Center helps keep children safe after possible abuse

The goal to provide privacy and protection during a medical evaluation and treatment of a child who may have been abused has been realized thanks to the generosity of community members.

On June 9 the Child Maltreatment Evaluation Center, located in the Alcona Health Center on Barlow Road in Lincoln, was introduced to the public during an open house.

Complete with an examination room that has a child sized examination table and fairies, blue birds and rainbows on the wall, the Child Maltreatment Evaluation Center is geared toward the needs of children. "This is a safe room in which (a child) can be examined," explained

She explained that in the past, children who have been victims of abuse have been taken to emergency rooms for evaluations and/or examinations. "This can be a scary place for children," Fitzgerald said because it is often very busy, doesn't af-

ford much privacy and it can take several hours to complete the examination. Also, the staff of an emergency room may not be trained to look for "clues" that may help in an investigation.

"Children who have been sexually abused don't belong in an emergency room unless their injuries need to be stabilized," Fitzgerald said. "The center is a safe and quiet environment and one more piece in trying to keep children safe and protected. If it is determined that they need follow up visits with further medical treatment, counseling, et cetera, that will be arranged. And, when necessary, we will contact their primary care physician if they are not associated with our practice."

Senior center manager retires to farming duties

After 30 years as site manager of the Greenbush Senior Center, Delores Schlicker is retired in that "Alcona County kind of way."

That means that she's currently volunteering to help with haying and milking cows on a nearby dairy farm, volunteering at the center itself and driving a trailer into Harrisville on Monday to pick up government commodity foods for the center.

Schlicker was born in Lincoln to John and Helen Sharboneau. She grew up on the family farm, graduated from Alcona High School with the class of 1962 and when she married, moved about a mile down the road to her own small farm.

Working with the Alcona County Commission on Aging (ACCOA) was almost a legacy for Schlicker. Her mother, Helen Sharboneau, was instrumental in beginning the commission in the mid 1970s and served as the first ACCOA director. When Greenbush opened its site in 1980, Sharboneau asked Schlicker to serve as its site manager, and she's been there ever since.

The Greenbush Center serves congregate hot meals at 5 p.m., Monday through Thursday to 30-35 individuals 55 and older. Schlicker remembers Tillie Kowalski, Earl Williams and Josie Boyer as being the driving forces to open the satellite location.

"It's a good meal," Schlicker said, "meat, potatoes, a vegetable, salad, dessert, bread and butter and milk for \$2.50. You can't go to McDonald's and eat any cheaper than you can at the Senior Center."

While the population accessing the center's meal program has gotten smaller, Schlicker remembered days when she served as many as 120 clients. She attributes the reduction to the increase in age of the clients, leading them to use more home-delivered meals from the Lincoln Senior Center and the economy.

In addition to her volunteer activities, Schlicker operates what she calls a "mini farm" where she is raising a heifer calf, three sheep, two pigs, two chickens and two cats as well as a vegetable garden. What she loves most, she said, is helping out at the dairy farm, where she operates huge tractors to help with the haying, helps to milk the 230-240 milking cows, helps with calf delivery and "generally does whatever needs doing."

"I've wanted to farm all my life," she said, "That's my life. I just love it. Taking care of the animals is always something I loved to do." She's very impressed not only with the size of the tractors she operates, but with the ameni-

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

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

The Child Maltreatment Evaluation Center has the trained staff and the location to accomplish a two part evaluation - a forensic interviewer, support staff and a doctor who can collect the medical history and data "that can help in determining if something has happened to a child. A basic pediatric examination is given where we reassure the child that they are okay and look for injuries, infections, or anything else that might help in making a determination, Fitzgerald said.

Fitzgerald explained the center is designed to work with law enforcement and child protective services. "It's a team approach," she said. "Everyone has to do their work - if one piece is missing it doesn't work."

The Child Maltreatment Evaluation Center was created in response to need expressed by the Alcona Child Protection Team, a multidisciplinary team led by Alcona County Prosecutor Thomas J. Weichel, charged with ensuring maximum protection

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of abused children in Alcona County.

Fitzgerald explained the team realized a lack of facilities in the community for providing medical evaluation and treatment of these children. Alcona Health Center was undergoing renovation at the time (2009), which allowed allocation of space for both forensic interview and the clinical component.

Once word reached the community, people's hearts were moved to raise money for the equipment and outfitting of the center. Betty Mayo, of the Spruce Eagles Auxiliary, spearheaded a fund raising drive entitled "Project Yellow Brick Road," which, in the course of several months of dinners, auctions and other efforts, raised over \$8,700. That money was used to buy a special exam table and medical supplies and children's furniture for the interviews.

A grant from Northeast Michigan Community Service

Agency (NEMCSA) allowed the purchase of the technical equipment for the forensic interviews and diagnostic equipment. Further support came from the Knights of Columbus in Spruce and the Exchange Club of Alpena. Other individuals have made cash contributions or have sewn small lap blankets for use by the children.

In keeping with the "Yellow Brick Road" theme, children's literature artist, Peggy Trabalka, and her daughters, Sandy Rayes and Pam Trabalka painted the exam room with a calming mural of rainbow, bluebirds, Emerald City and fairies.

Fitzgerald said the Child Maltreatment Evaluation Center "is widely available to other counties – Iosco, Montmorency, Alpena and Presque Isle...We would like to recruit a physician to be trained in Iosco County. Alpena County is working on a similar project through a Kellogg grant."

How to pick a nursing home

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you give me some tips on picking a good nursing home for my 82-year-old father? He had a stroke last year and has been receiving care at home but it's become too much to handle.

Overwhelmed Daughter

Dear Overwhelmed,

Choosing a nursing home for a loved one that provides quality care is an important and difficult decision that requires some homework. Here are some steps that can help you find a good nursing home and avoid a bad one.

 Make a List: Start by contacting your Area Agency on Aging for a list of local nursing home facilities. Ideally, the facilities should be close to family members and friends who can visit often. Residents with frequent visitors usually get better care. The national Eldercare Locator (800) 677-1116 or www.eldercare.gov) can direct you to your local aging agency.

• Do some research: Every year, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services collect data on more than 15,000 nursing homes throughout the country. Health inspection data, staffing and quality measures are combined to come up with an overall ranking system of one to five stars. To research the nursing homes in your area, go to medicare.gov and click on "Facilities and Doctors," then on "Compare Nursing Homes."

• Call your ombudsman: This is a government official who investigates nursing home complaints and advocates for residents and their families. This person can help you find the latest health inspection reports, which are public information, on specific nursing homes, and can tell you which ones have had complaints or other problems. To find your local ombudsman, call your area aging agency or see ltcombudsman.org.

• Call the facilities: Once you've narrowed your search, call the nursing homes you're interested in to find out if they have any vacancies, what they charge, and if they accept Medicaid - most do.

• Visit your top choices: Be sure to visit more than once and at different times of the day and different days of the week. While you're there, notice the cleanness and smell of the facility. Is it homey and inviting? Does the staff seem responsive and kind to its residents? Also be sure to taste the food, and talk to the residents and their family members, if available.

Upon arrival, ask for the nursing home administrator or other person of authority to give you a tour. Find out about staff screening (do they do background checks) and training procedures and what percentage of their staff leaves each year. Less than 30 percent annually is considered good. More than 50 percent is a red flag.

To help you rate your visit, Medicare offers a handy checklist at medicare.gov/ nursing/checklist.pdf.

With nursing home costs now averaging nearly \$230 per day nationally, paying for long-term care is another area you may have questions about or need assistance with. Medicare only helps pay up to 100 days of "medically necessary" nursing home care, which must occur after a hospital stay. Most nursing home residents pay from personal money, long-term care insurance policies or, if they qualify, through Medicaid. Your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) is a good resource for long-term care financial counseling. To find a local SHIP counselor visit shiptalk.org, or call (800) 677-

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has been trying to help us eat healthier for a very long time.

Back in 1943, we had "The Basic Seven" — seven categories of food we needed to eat on a daily basis. Serving sizes weren't included.

In 1956, the USDA switched to "The Basic Four," and in 1979 to the "Hassle-Free Guide to a Better Diet." It added a new food category with fats, sweets and alcohol. In 1984, we got the "Food Wheel: A Pattern for Daily Food Choices." This one included serving sizes.

Eight years later, in 1992, the "Food Guide Pyramid" came along with those tiny pictures of food. In 2005 we got the MyPyramid Food Guidance System, which was supposed to be a simplified pyramid.

Now, in an effort to keep us all eating correctly, we have "MyPlate." The icon is cute: a plate divided into four unequal sections, with a fork on the left and a circle above the plate for "Dairy."

All this work, and I still

didn't know how much the USDA intends for me to eat.

On the website (www.choosemyplate.gov) I clicked on the Get a Personalized Plan link and entered my age, weight, height and level of exercise. It came back with a diet plan for me, including information such as "Make at least half your grains whole grains," "Vary your veggies" and "Focus on fruit" with specific tips on how to do that.

While the "Plate" is a bit silly, as was the Pyramid, the information behind it is solid. Check the USDA website and see what it has to say.

You know, of course. that an entrepreneur somewhere is busily creating MyPlate plates with the appropriate sections all outlined for us.

StarWatch By Gary Becker - ISS-Endeavor Deliver

The website www.heavens-above.com/ is widely respected among astronomers for its accuracy in predicting satellite flyovers. Several weeks ago, I was looking for an opportunity to photograph the Endeavor tagging alongside the International Space Station. When I imputed the data for my location, a chart appeared listing about a dozen ISS/Endeavor passes and the second one, only 10 hours into the future, was about as favorable as any can get. At 3:38 a.m. the ISS was going to burst into visibility near the zenith and as bright as the planet Venus. I decided to pull an all-nighter. At 3 a.m., when I took my tele-

scope and camera gear outside into the humid morning air to set up, the sky almost on cue became partly cloudy. With the stars going in and out, it was difficult to know precisely where I was pointing the camera as well obtaining a critical focus. I made a couple of educated guesses and numerous readjustments and waited. Two minutes before the appearance, the sky was almost completely overcast and I was lamenting the wasted hours of preparation and the lousy way I was going to feel the next day. Watching my atomic clock which keeps precise time from Fort Collins, CO, I started my exposure about 15 seconds ahead of the event, carefully placed the electronic cable release on the ground and looked up. A hole in the clouds was widening in the area that my camera was pointing. Right on cue, to the second of the prediction, the ISS appeared and glided silently with the invisible Endeavor across the sky. Did it go though my field? Did I capture the much fainter Endeavor? I had to wait an excruciating 90 seconds while the camera processed the image, but the answer was yes. A bright streak, a much fainter streak, and stars in good focus were seen. I looked up to the heavens to say a silent "Thank you," and noticed it had become cloudy once again. See the photo at www.astronomy.org





MOMENTS IN TIME

The History Channel

- On July 8, 1776, a 2,000pound copper-and-tin bell now known as the "Liberty Bell" rings out from the tower of the Pennsylvania State House (now Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, summoning citizens to the first public reading of the Declaration of Independence. As the British advanced toward Philadelphia in the fall of 1777, the bell was removed from the city and hidden in Allentown to save it from being melted down by the British and used to make cannons.
- On July 4, 1826, the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, the second and third presidents of the United States, respectively, die. Both men had been central in the drafting of the historic docu-
- On July 5, 1865, in London, revivalist preacher William Booth and his wife Catherine establish the Christian Mission, later known as the Salvation Army, to wage war against the evils of poverty and religious indifference.
- On July 7, 1930, construction of the Hoover Dam begins. Over the next five years, a total of 21,000 men would produce what would be the largest dam of its time. Today, the Hoover Dam generates enough energy each year to serve more than a million people.
- On July 9, 1947, in a ceremony held at the Pentagon in Arlington, Va., Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower appoints Florence Blanchfield to be a lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army, making her the first woman in U.S. history to hold permanent military rank. Blanchfield had served as superintendent of the Army Nurse Corps during World War II.
- On July 6, 1957, Liverpool teenagers John Lennon and Paul McCartney meet for the first time. Lennon was a member of the Quarry Men, scheduled to play at a public event. Two weeks later, Lennon invited McCartney to join the Quarry Men.

Local radio operators participate in national event

Alcona County's hams will join with thousands of amateur radio operators who will be showing off their emergency capabilities during the last weekend in June.

Over the past year, the news has been full of reports of ham radio operators providing critical communications during unexpected emergencies in towns across America including the California wildfires, winter storms, tornadoes and other events worldwide.

During Hurricane Katrina, amateur radio -- often called Ham radio -- was often the only way people could communicate and hundreds of volunteer hams traveled south to save lives and property. When trouble is brewing, amateur radio people are often the first to provide rescuers with critical information and communications.

On the weekend of June 25-26, the public will have a chance to meet and talk with Alcona County ham radio operators and see for themselves what the Amateur Radio Service is about. Showing the newest digital and satellite capabilities, voice communications and even historical Morse code, hams from across the USA will be holding public demonstrations of emergency communications abilities.

This annual event, called Field Day is the climax of the week long Amateur Radio Week sponsored by the ARRL, the national association for Amateur Radio. Using only emergency power supplies, ham operators will construct emergency stations in parks, shopping malls, schools and backyards around the country.

The slogan, "When All Else Fails, Ham Radio Works" is more than just words to the hams as they prove they can send messages in many forms without the use of phone systems, Internet or any other infrastructure that can be compromised in a crisis. More than 35,000 amateur radio operators across the country participated in last year's event.

"We hope that people will come and see for themselves, this is not your grandfather's radio anymore," said Allen Pitts, of the ARRL. "The communications that ham radio people can quickly create have saved may lives when other systems failed or were overloaded. And besides that-

it's fun!" In Alcona County, the Alcona County Amateur Radio Group will be demonstrating amateur radio at the ARA (fairgrounds) site in Lincoln on from 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 25 to approximately noon on Sunday, June 26. They invite the public to come and see ham radio's new capabilities and learn how to get their own FCC radio license before the next disaster strikes.

There are over 685,000 Amateur Radio licensees in the US, and more than 2.5 million around the world. Through the ARRL's Amateur Radio Emergency Services program, ham volunteers provide both emergency communications for thousands of state and local emergency response agencies and non-emergency community services too, all for free. Supervisor Murnock and clerk Cross




