

Criminal charges pending in harbor fuel spill

A diesel fuel spill in Harrisville Harbor presented officials with a situation that they hadn't dealt with before, but everyone worked together to get it cleaned up.

According to Harrisville Fire Department Training Officer Jeff Susan, the fuel spill was noticed by a resident who called it in to Alcona County Central Dispatch on Thursday, Oct. 27 around 3 p.m. The fire de-

partment was initially dispatched.

When Susan arrived on the scene he observed a strong fuel odor and "oil coating docks, posts and shoreline rocks." Susan, Harrisville Fire Chief Randall Goodman and city employees requested assistance from Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Conservation Officer Warren MacNeill.

All other fire fighter assistance was cancelled and planning on how to address the situation began. Goodman and MacNeill stayed at the harbor while Susan went to central dispatch to "stage" the situation. With communication between Goodman, MacNeill, assistant harbormaster Steve Baksis and other resources, it was decided that clean-up was needed. Northern A-1, an environmental clean-up company from Kalkaska, Mich. was contacted and arrived at the harbor later that

afternoon.

The release of diesel fuel came, according to Susan who gained the information from other witnesses, from a boat that was docked in the harbor due to rough weather. The boater was using a generator that was malfunctioning and releasing fuel into the water. When the boater was informed of the problem, he stopped using the generator and the fuel release ceased.

MacNeill said an estimated three to five gallons of diesel fuel was spilled - which spread throughout the harbor. He explained a pollution control investigator from the U.S. Coast Guard and a representative from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality are looking into the situation. A criminal investigation is ongoing and criminal charges are pending.

Susan explained Northern A-1 representatives used "rag

sticks to collect the fuel - they look like rolled up socks, but the material is engineered to absorb the fuel which stays in the cloth despite being full of water," Susan said. "They started at one end of the harbor with them, went all the way through and started over again. They swept the harbor several times. They worked through the evening Thursday and continued on Friday."

"I don't think there will be any residual effects from this. I really think it will be fine," Susan said. MacNeill said observations following the clean-up haven't shown any damage to wildlife.

According to Susan, MacNeill and Harrisville Harbor Commission Chairman Arthur Laatz, this type of environmental situation has not occurred at the harbor before.

Laatz explained the harbor does have fuel tanks for dispensing fuel to boats and

has the necessary fuel spill kits if a spill occurred during that process.

Susan said the fire department didn't technically have jurisdiction over the incident, but since it was an unknown situation felt a responsibility to assist. "I'm proud of the emergency management committee and the fire chiefs association because they have good resource files that provided the necessary manuals for this type of situation," Susan said. "Because of our commitment to our community we wanted to make sure this was addressed and facilitated so it was handled properly."

According to Susan, Laatz and MacNeill - they will all be involved, with anyone else necessary, in developing the necessary action plan to handle any future fuel release situation at Harrisville Harbor.

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Oscoda Area Schools has new superintendent

After several months in his new position at Oscoda Area Schools, the new superintendent is still counting his blessings for a number of reasons.

Scott Moore took over the position July 1 as interim superintendent of Oscoda Area Schools following the resignation of former superintendent Christine Beardsley, who was hired as the superintendent of Eaton Intermediate School District in Charlotte, Mich.

Moore, a 1999 graduate of Oscoda High School, was the principal of Richardson Middle School (RMS) prior to being appointed interim superintendent. The Oscoda Area Schools Board of Education officially hired him for

the position in August.

"I was blessed they ended up sticking with me," Moore said. He is thankful for the mentoring relationships that he's had with the former principal of RMS, Charles Negro and with former superintendent Beardsley. "I've been blessed with teachers and board of education members who have been mentors from the beginning. It's been a great place for me to grow and be able to serve people," he said.

Moore was born in Livonia, Mich. and moved to Oscoda with his family when he was in fourth grade. His parents, Jeff and Gail Moore, still live in Oscoda. Moore received a Bachelor of Science degree in education with an emphasis in government,

economics and history, from Central Michigan University. Following graduation, he taught and coached football at Marine City High School for three years.

He has a master's degree in public administration from the University of Michigan and received an educational specialist degree in educational leadership from Grand Valley State University. Moore has seven classes and a dissertation to finish before he will receive a doctoral degree in leadership through Eastern Michigan University.

Moore enjoyed teaching very much - in fact, considered it the best job in the world. However, he decided to get into administration to ensure teachers gave their very best to students. "One of the guys I was teaching and coaching with didn't take his job seriously. That's what motivated me to get into administration...I thought I was making a good impact with teaching, but decided I wanted to try to impact a district...I wanted to help people be better.

"Teaching is a great job...a privilege. Kids have to be there... The least we can do is put people in front of kids that want to be there," he said.

Moore was the assistant principal at RMS prior to becoming the principal and received experience working in the central office participating with budgeting issues and other administrative planning - which was invaluable when he took over as principal and now, as superintendent.

As he settles into his position, he is looking at continuing goals of the previous administration. "Academic ac-

countability is huge right now," Moore said. "We need to improve our graduation rate for students. Our kids need to understand that when they leave here they need to be college ready or trade school ready. We are trying to work with community colleges like Alpena Community College to expose kids to more of a college experience while they are still in high school."

Another goal is for the district to remain financially viable. He explained three years down the road, if things continue as they have been with the state, Oscoda Area Schools will receive less state funding and there will be less students attending school in the district. "We are competitive with other school districts," Moore said. "But we want Alcona and Tawas to survive too. It's important for our communities to stay viable."

One of the aspects of his job that Moore really enjoys is the chance to meet with members of the community.

I am a member of the Alcona County Parks and Recreation Commission. We have received quite a few complaints about off road vehicle riding illegal this year. I would like to take some time to inform the riders of the rules. Alcona County roads are open to ride on. But, you must ride

the far right side and in the direction of traffic but not to exceed 25 miles per hour.
A two mile stretch of Barlow Road by the school is closed. On U.S. Forest Service and Michigan Department of Natural Resource lands, all roads and trails are closed -- unless posted to ride on.

The Alcona County Parks and Recreation Board, U.S. Forest Service and Department of Natural Resources have worked on this project for over five years. The new off road vehicle trails open this summer. We were asked by the public to get them a place to ride, and we did. Now we have visitor area and locals (some of the locals are the ones that asked us to put in a trail) illegally riding forest roads and trails not open to off road vehicles.

Please respect our hard work by staying on the posted trails. I am sure the people of Lincoln and Harrisville would be upset if someone drove all over their new scenic streets.

"I enjoy the opportunity to share ideas and meet with a lot of different people. It is exciting and encouraging that they offer suggestions. The last blessing that Moore is counting is the feeling of acceptance from the community in which he was raised. "I wish everyone had a chance to feel the way I was embraced," he said. "It is wonderful. I wish I could bottle it."

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City election has one contested race

There is only one contested race on the ballot in the City of Harrisville this November – in fact, there's only one contested race in the entire county.

On November 8, Harrisville's third ward (all of the city south of Main Street) will be choosing between incumbent City Councilwoman Barbara Pierce and contender Michael Baird.

In addition to gathering some basic information about

each candidate, the Review asked each candidate to address two questions: Why are you seeking re-election? and "Do you have any particular platform or issues you want to address in the office?"

Barbara Pierce is seeking re-election to her second four-year term on city council on the Democratic side of the ballot. A retired elementary special education teacher, Pierce and her husband, Dean, moved to Harrisville in 2004 from Superior Township, near Ann Arbor, Mich. The couple have two children and three grandchildren.

Asked why she is seeking re-election, Pierce said, "I've really learned so much in the first four years about the decision-making process, budgets, millages, grants and how the city works. I'd like to continue applying what I've learned and see what else happens."

"I represent the city on the planning commission. It's working on the new zoning ordinances. They were last updated in 1985. I'd like to be part of that process and bring it to city council as a finished product."

Asked if she had a particular platform or issues she hoped to address, Pierce said, "On the city council under Mayor Dobis, he expects us to be very proactive. I helped to create and sit on the city Memorial Committee and the Harrisville City and Township Fire Department Advisory Committee. That committee recently helped to obtain the new Suburban EMS rig for the department."

"I'm also the city's Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA) representative and the representative to the Huron Shores Chamber of Commerce. So there are lots and lots of things I'm involved in that I'd like to continue," Pierce said.

Asked if there was anything she would like to add, Pierce said, "I just really enjoy the job. I like being proactive and so as far as all the committees that I have been able to start and serve on and serving on the planning commission, I would just really

like to continue so that some of the things that are in progress will get done."

Michael Baird, an Alcona County native, is seeking election to the council as a Republican. He and his wife, Kathy, have two children and five grandchildren. Baird is employed at Omni Metal Craft in Alpena as a draftsman and also operates his own construction business.

Baird previously served on the council for 12 years, from 1992 to 2004. He didn't seek re-election in 2004, because his schedule required him to miss at least four of the 2005 council meetings. "I didn't feel that missing one third of the year would be fair to the people I represented," he said.

In answer to why he is seeking the position, Baird said, "I've had many people ask me to get back into the politics of the community. I had many people ask me to run for mayor, but with my job and my own business, it didn't seem fair for the city to have a mayor who didn't get into the city until five o'clock each day."

"I think I can do a good job as a council member for the city."

Asked if he had a specific interest or platform, he said, "People vote for me to represent them and if there's a platform, it's to preserve and protect the small town atmosphere and the sense of community we have here in Harrisville. My goal is to represent the wants and needs of the people, not my wants and needs."

"In 1992, when I first ran for city council, I was asked why I wanted the job," he added. "My answer is still the same. I'm planning on being a long term resident of this community, and I want to be involved in the track the community is going to take. It's a small town community and I understand that concept very well."

Voters registered in the city's third ward will cast their ballots at the City Clerk's Office located on 5th Street. Absentee ballots are available by contacting City Clerk at (989) 724-6666.

Organization Notes

DAR - River Aux Sables Chapter

River Aux Sables Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) attended a joint meeting at the Midland Country Club hosted by the John Alden Chapter. Guest lecturer for the meeting was Floyd Andrick, well known authority and member of the Titanic Historical Society.

Andrick presented slides, memorabilia and artifacts of the ship, described the wreckage and the reasons why the Titanic sank. He related the stories of the 14 survivors he knew personally. The last survivor with actual memories of that night was Michigan's own Winifred Quick Van Tongerlo, who passed away July 4, 2002 in Warren, Mich. at 98.

Ninety years earlier, Winifred, her two year old sister, Phyllis, and their mother, Jennie, left Southampton, England to join her father, Fred Quick, who had emigrated to Detroit, Mich. in 1909. The Titanic struck the iceberg on April 14, 1912 at 11:40 p.m. Jennie had been awakened in her stateroom by a neighbor about midnight, and was already preparing to go on deck, when a steward came running through the hallway shouting not to worry about dressing the children, but to grab life jackets and abandon ship as it was already sinking. When Jennie and her girls reached the deck, they were quickly helped into life belts and settled into life-boat No. 11 and lowered into the 28 degree seas. They were among the 705 survivors rescued by the Carpathia who had veered some 58 miles north to answer the last S.O.S. call from the unsinkable Titanic.

Andrick served as an advisor to James Cameron's 1997 movie, and stated that it was made as close as possible to the actual layout and opulence of the Titanic and the events of that night, according to eye witness accounts and artifacts that have been recovered. All were accurate,

except for the main characters, who were added to weave the true story around. They were never part of the 2,228 people who were aboard the Titanic the night it sank.

If dry, shred the leaves and reuse right away as a fine mulch to spread around and over wintering foliage (unshredded, wet leaves will mat together and form a dense layer that won't allow water to pass through). If leaves are wet, combine with other garden waste into a compost bin to enrich your soil during future growing seasons.

Funeral planning on a budget

Dear Savvy Senior,
I just turned 75 and have been thinking about getting my funeral and burial arrangements taken care of so my kids won't have to. What funeral preplanning tips can you offer a senior with little money?
Not Dead Yet

Dear Not,
Planning your funeral in advance is a wise move. Not only does it give you time to make a thoughtful decision on the type of service you want, it also allows you to shop around to find a good funeral provider, and it will spare your kids the stress of making these decisions at an emotional time.

Choosing a quality funeral home is your first step and most important decision in preplanning your funeral. No matter what type of funeral or memorial service you envision for yourself, it's wise to talk with several funeral homes because prices and services can vary. Websites like funeraldecisions.com and funeralpricefinder.com can help you compare.

When comparing, be sure you take advantage of the "funeral rule." This is a federal law that requires funeral home directors to provide you with an itemized price list of their products and services so you can choose exactly what you want. Be sure to ask for it.

With the average cost of a "full-service" funeral running around \$10,000, there are ways to save that few people know about. For example, if a

traditional funeral and burial is what you're interested in, you can save big - at least 50 percent - by purchasing your casket from a store versus the funeral home, and your funeral provider must accept it. Two good casket shopping resources that may surprise you are Walmart (visit walmart.com and type in "casket" in their search engine) and Costco (costco.com) who offers its members a large variety of caskets and urns at discounted prices.

Another way to cut your funeral bill is to request a "direct burial" or "direct cremation." With these options your body would be buried or cremated shortly after death which skips the embalming and viewing. If your family wants a memorial service they can have it at the graveside or at later without the body. These services usually cost between \$1,000 and \$2,000, not counting cemetery charges.

Be aware that preplanning your funeral doesn't mean you have to prepay too. But if you are considering paying in advance, be cautious. Prepaid plans are not regulated by federal law and state regulation is uneven. Before you sign anything, here are some areas you need to be very clear on:

- Be sure you know exactly what you're paying for before committing.
- Are the prices locked in or will an additional payment be required at the time of death?
- What happens if you move



to a different area or die while away from home? Some prepaid funeral plans can be transferred, but often at an added cost.

• Are you protected if the funeral home goes out of business or if it's bought out by another company?

• Can you cancel the contract and get a full refund if you change your mind?

• If you do decide to prepay, get all the details of the agreement in writing, have the funeral director sign it, and give copies to your family so they know what's expected.

There are other ways to set aside money for your funeral, rather than giving it to a funeral home. You can set up a payable-on-death, or POD account at your bank, naming the person you want to handle your arrangements as the beneficiary. With this type of account, you maintain control of your money, so if you need funds for medical expenses or something else, you can withdraw it at any time. This type of fund is also available immediately at the time of your death without the delay of probate.

Do we really need to take vitamins?

Recent studies show that in some cases, vitamins actually can be detrimental to our health instead of the other way around. One reason is that so many vitamins already are put in our food and drinks, it's easy to get too much.

The difficulty is sorting through the research results. Here are some samples:

- Vitamin E, when taken in large doses, has been shown to cause a slightly higher risk of prostate cancer, but can lower the risk for Alzheimer's disease.
- Low vitamin D is often seen in cancer patients.
- Senior women might have a slightly higher risk of dying if they take certain vitamins and supplements. Iron can increase mortality, while calcium can reduce it.

• Vitamin B-12 might help with memory problems. Unfortunately, vitamins and supplements don't have to pass scrutiny in testing, so you might not be getting what the bottle says. It could be more, or less, or the contents could be contaminated.

Don't self-diagnose. If you

take vitamins and supplements, or are considering it, the first step is to talk to your doctor.

If you really need to know what's in your supplements, Consumer Lab (consumerlab.com) does testing and issues reports. It costs \$33 per year for a subscription (call 888-502-5100 instead of putting your credit-card number on the purchase page). There's also a free e-mail newsletter that will tell you about warnings, recalls and reviews.

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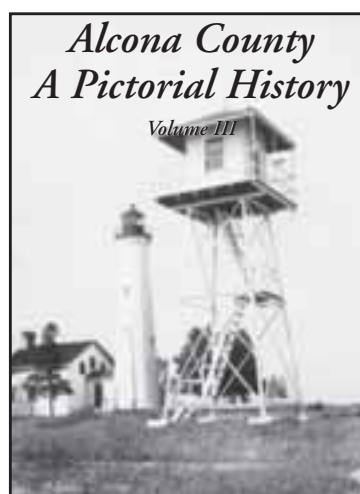





StarWatch By Gary Becker - Christmas and Telescopes



Telescopes and Christmas—they go together like ham and cheese, but most people buying a scope for under the tree will make the wrong decisions. All telescopes are a compromise in one way or another, but all experts agree that scopes are not built strictly for magnification. If a manufacturer hypes the power that a telescope can attain as the chief reason for purchasing the scope, stay away from that item like the plague. The most important aspect of a telescope is its ability to gather light and to bring that light to a sharp focus in as comfortable a manner as possible. The eye, acting as the receptor of the photons being gathered by the lens or mirror, is essentially enlarged to the diameter of the light-gathering element of the telescope. Telescopes also need to produce crisp, vivid images of what the viewer is observing. This requires optics that meet criteria for producing astronomically acceptable images. I'm sorry to say that K-Mart specials or scopes sold at Wal-Mart stores are a joke. Telescopes need to produce quality images so the observer can actually see detail on the moon, planets, and other objects in the sky. They also need to produce acceptable fields of view, so that the object under scrutiny can be seen in its entirety. A telescope must also be attached to a sturdy mounting system to dampen unwanted vibrations when moved around to find sky objects or to hold steady if the wind kicks up a little. When all of these criteria are met, then the topic of magnification can be discussed; but there are still limits. A good telescope will not tolerate more than 50-power per inch of aperture. A quality, reflecting telescope with a 4-inch mirror should not be pushed beyond 200-power. Where can you find a first-rate, fairly priced instrument? I would first suggest Orion Telescopes which produce economical scopes that meet astronomical criteria. Go to www.telescopes.com. www.astronomy.org

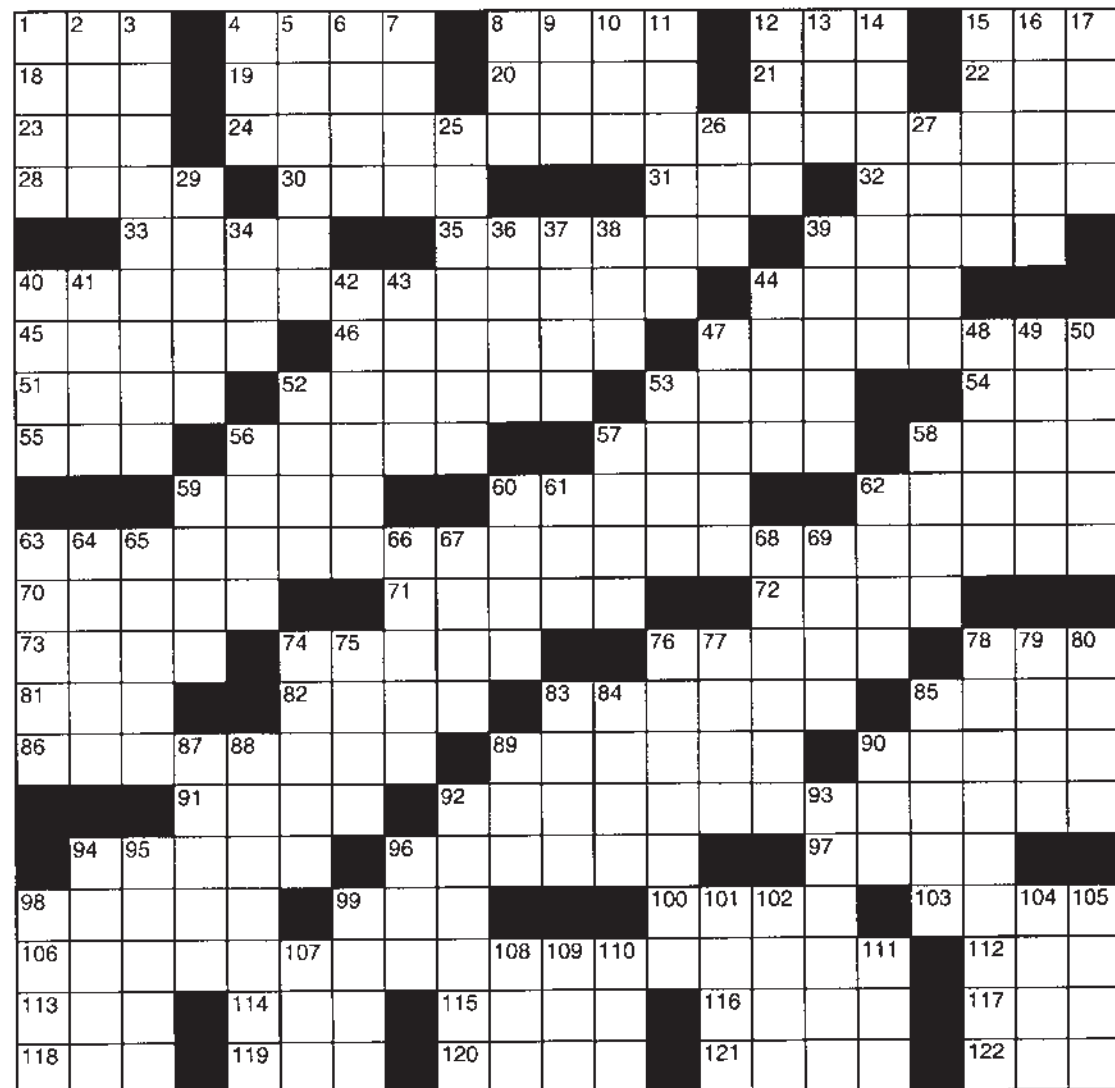

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MOMENTS IN TIME
The History Channel

- On Nov. 17, 1421, a storm in the North Sea batters the European coastline. Over the next several days, approximately 10,000 people in what is now the Netherlands die in the resulting floods. Fatal floods struck in 1287, 1338, 1374, 1394 and 1396. After each, residents fixed the dikes and moved right back in.
- On Nov. 14, 1851, "Moby-Dick," a novel by Herman Melville about the voyage of the whaling ship Pequod, is published. "Moby-Dick" is now considered a classic of American literature and contains one of the most famous opening lines in fiction: "Call me Ishmael."
- On Nov. 15, 1867, the first stock ticker is unveiled in New York City. The advent of the ticker revolutionized the stock market by making up-to-the-minute prices available to investors around the country. Prior to this, information from the New York Stock Exchange traveled by mail or messenger.
- On Nov. 20, 1923, the U.S. Patent Office grants Patent No. 1,475,074 to 46-year-old inventor and newspaperman Garrett Morgan for his three-position T-shape pole traffic signal. By having a position other than just "Stop" and "Go," it regulated crossing vehicles more safely than earlier signals had.
- On Nov. 16, 1959, "The Sound of Music" premieres on Broadway. While the real-life Maria did marry Count Georg von Trapp and become stepmother to his children, she never did the other things shown in the musical, such as run singing through the Salzburg, Austria, mountains.
- On Nov. 19, 1969, Brazilian soccer great Pele scores his 1,000th professional goal. Under Pele's leadership, Brazil won the World Cup in 1958, 1962 and 1970. During his career, Pele scored 1,282 goals in 1,363 games.
- On Nov. 18, 1978, People's Temple leader Jim Jones leads hundreds of his followers in a mass murder-suicide at their commune in Guyana. Cult members who refused to take the cyanide-laced fruit-flavored drink were forced to do so at gunpoint or shot. The death toll was 913, including a U.S. congressman who was investigating the commune.
