Student count down by 60 students at Alcona schools

Alcona Community Schools had 62 fewer students on October 5 than it had in the fall of 2010, according to results of the State's October Count Day.

And that follows a drop of 125 students between Count Days 2010 and 2009.

Count Day is a state-man-

dated day on which fall enrollment is determined in order to establish state aid to the district.

While Alcona's numbers represent a significant drop in its budgeting process, school officials had projected the head count at 783, just 10 students above the actual 773 counted. The school has projected 720 students for

next year

In earlier interviews in September of this year, both Alcona Community Schools Superintendent Shawn Thornton and business manager Alan Shillair said the drop in enrollment was expected. In addition to families leaving the area to seek employment elsewhere, Thornton said, an overall de-

crease in population of children within the county is having an effect.

The district has had much smaller kindergartens than in the past and is graduating higher-enrollment classes, school officials said. That trend is expected to continue for another four or five years.

In the meantime, changes to the state's handling of stu-

dent enrollment will do little to offset the reduction. The number of students counted during the fall count day, moved from the fourth Wednesday in September to the first Wednesday in October this year, will be worth 90 percent of state aid, rather than 75 percent as in past years. A winter count in February will be worth 10 percent instead of 25 percent.

The Detroit News has estimated that overall, Michigan's public schools could receive \$12.6 million less in school aid this year because of the change. Under the new formula, districts with falling enrollment stand to lose money, while those adding students each school year will get more funding.

Previously, 75 percent of the fall count was added to 25 percent of the count from the previous February to come up with a "blended" student count figure that is multiplied by the district's per-pupil foundation grant from the state. Three-year averaging formulas developed by the state also apply.

Early reports in surrounding counties indicate that while Tawas, Whittemore and Posen schools showed increases in enrollment, Oscoda, Alpena, Rogers City Hillman and Onaway all showed losses in population.

Supreme Court denies Katona case application

Slightly more than four years after former Alcona County Treasurer Tom Katona pleaded guilty to embezzling \$1.2 from county funds, two cases which could afford cash recovery remain before the Michigan Court of Appeals.

On September 28 the Michigan Supreme Court denied an application for review of a March 10 Appeals Court opinion. That opinion reversed an October 17, 2008 trial court ruling that the

Inside the Review

 Michigan Municipal League Liability and Property Pool (Pool) was liable for the full \$100,000 on each of three treasurer bonds for years 2004, 2005 and 2006.

In the March 10 Appeals Court opinion, authored by Justices William B. Murphy, Jane M. Beckering and Michael J. Kelly, the Appeals Court wrote that the award was reversed because Alcona County officials were aware of prior fraud committed by Katona, thus making the bonds issued by the Pool invalid.

Katona was elected as county treasurer in March of 1993 and maintained his private independent accounting business at that time. In July of 1998 Katona was arrested and charged with two counts of forgery and two counts of uttering and publishing a false, forged, altered or counterfeit document. The charges stemmed from Katona's filing of one or more altered documents with the state of Michigan, representing them to be accurate on behalf of a client in his private accounting business.

In November of 1998, Katona pleaded guilty to one count of uttering and publishing and one count of forgery, in exchange for which the remaining charges were dropped and Katona was given a conditional delay of sentence. He was required to pay fees, perform community service, return all business records to the victim, report to his probation officer and refrain from any criminal activity for one year.

At the end of that time, having successfully completed the requirements of the sentence, the charges were dropped and Katona was left without criminal record. During this period and thereafter, Katona was returned to office as county treasurer in the county's general election.

In 2006, when investigation into county financial irregularities began, the Alcona County Board of Commissioners directed Katona to report in writing regarding certain transactions and to provide a bond in the amount of \$7,000,000 to secure his faithful performance of duties as county treasurer. Upon failure to do so, the county board removed him from office.

In January 2007, Katona was arrested and charged with nine counts of embezzlement by a public officer and two counts of forgery resulting in a \$1.2 million loss to the county. In May 2007, he pleaded guilty to the charges

and was sentenced to serve 112 to 168 months in prison. At present, he is incarcerated in the Macomb Correctional Facility until at least May 13, 2016.

In 1997, Alcona County became a member of the (MML) Pool and began to purchase comprehensive general liability insurance and bonds from the Pool on an annual basis. At issue within the parent case were two sets of fidelity bonds from the Pool in the amount of \$100,000 each, issued in fiscal years 2003 through 2007 to ensure the faithful performance of the county treasurer and the finance officer or director.

Following Katona's arrest and sentencing, the county sought payment under both series of bonds for the years 2003 through 2006, asserting that Katona was serving both as treasurer and financial director and that the county had suffered loss from his misdeeds in each bond year. The Pool paid the county \$100,000 for the 2006 Treasurer bond, but denied that any additional moneys were due the county. When the Pool did not pay on the bonds, the 23rd Circuit Court action was filed seeking to recover on all eight remaining bonds. In response, the Pool filed a

counterclaim seeking a judgment that no further monies were owed under the bond contracts.

The trial court ultimately ruled that the Pool was liable for the full \$100,000 on each of three treasurer bonds for years 2004, 2005 and 2006 but that the pool was not required to pay the county on the finance director bonds. The trial court's ruling was based on the premise that Katona was not serving as financial director at the time his misdeeds took place.


With the supreme court's decision not to review the appeal, the appeals court opinion stands.

The two cases remaining before the appeals court stem from a June 2010, 23rd Circuit Court jury trial which determined that Robson Accounting, Inc., a division of Robson-Rehmann Accounting, was negligent, and a "proximate cause" of the loss to the county. The firm, based in Saginaw, Mich., was responsible for auditing financial records during the time that funds were embezzled by Katona. The same jury awarded Alcona County \$1 million in damages.

In December of 2010, the Robson Group and Rehmann

Accounting each filed applications for leave to appeal. In August, a request to combine the two cases was approved by the court.

Those two cases, and the circuit court award of \$1 million, represent the only remaining opportunity to recoup funds on the \$1.2 million loss suffered by the county. At this time, the combined cases are not docketed for a specific date for review.

To the Editor,

A series of events the last 18 months involving our Alcona County library system have resulted in community involvement and scrutiny of the status quo in library operations. Due to a coalition of friends and users of the library, positive changes have occurred in personnel policies, computer filtering issues, employee-management relations and of particular significance, changes to the methods by which board members are appointed to fill vacancies created by resignations and term expiration.

Previously, appointments

were made with little public notice. Consequently, hand picked appointments maintained a balance that largely insured rubber stamping library management's method of operations.

Persistent community interaction at library board meetings brought numerous issues to the fore, including publishing notice in the Review soliciting applicants for board vacancies and an interview selection process, including board members seeking reappointment. While that notice states, "The board is most interested in persons with prior community involvement," that shouldn't discourage anyone from submitting an application and resume. I trust the board has the wisdom to reject any notion that "prior community involvement" as a determining factor.

There's a lot of untapped talent in Alcona County with the potential to bring a fresh perspective to operations of this valuable library resource. While our library offers a variety of services, there's much yet to be addressed and resolved to bring those services more in line with the community's 21st century needs. The status quo and unilateral decision making are neither acceptable nor in the best interests of the taxpayer community. We need and deserve a library board that performs as an oversight body that is open, friendly, responsive and accountable to the community it serves.





Residents and visitors may bring medications for disposal to the sheriff's department at 214 W. Main Street, Harrisville. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

According to Alcona County Sheriff Douglas Atchison, this initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. "Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse," Atchison said. "Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. In addition, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards."

Alcona Great Start parent group seeks volunteers

A new volunteer opportunity in Alcona County will help parents of young children who are dealing with difficult situations. Through the leadership of the Great Start Collaborative and its Alcona Parent Group, volunteer parents and other interested residents will be trained as parent navigators.

Parents with children ages birth to five years "neighbors" will be able to meet with a parent navigator to explore and select a responsible course of action that will meet the family's immediate need and set the course for realizing safer, stable and more productive circumstances. The relationship is informal and voluntary and may be ongoing or carry through related episodes toward a single

How does this volunteer program work? The neighbor sets the course; the navigator is there to help them access systems to get their needs met. This help is given via phone, e-mail or face-toface. Parent navigators will share their experience, networks and community relationships to help neighbors move through a crisis or beyond a crossroads to their goals. This could be as simple as providing a phone number to attending an appoint-

Trained and equipped with a "toolbox" of local resources and parenting information, parent navigators are prepared to stand next to neighbors on a journey of discovery and help them unravel


some of the complexities that can block success. The Great Start Parent Coalition in Alcona County will host activities where parent navigators and neighbors get acquainted and exchange contact information should they decide to proceed with a match.

Navigator-neighbor experience in other communities shows that the connection creates positive outcomes for individuals and families.

Alcona County is part of Region 2 Voices for Action (V4A) Network, a statewide poverty reduction initiative begun in 2008. Area counties are in various stages of organizing local efforts through the county human services collaborative. The Alcona Human Services Council oversaw a truancy prevention effort with V4A funding last year. For 2011-12, the focus will be on developing a community-wide team and training navigators, beginning with the parent

The first training takes place October 27 from 5:30 to 8 p.m. at the Harrisville branch of the Alcona County Library. Advance registration is requested but not required by calling Great Start Parent Liaison Angela Forsythe at (989) 884-4276 by October

Navigator training will be provided through Partners In Prevention, where individuals can direct questions about V4A, the community-wide team, or the navigator-neighbor process by calling (800) 354-2880 or (989) 356-2880.

Take with a liberal dose of laughter

My big brother Ben -- who taught me a great deal about the newspaper business – used to tell me with regard to writing a column, "If you don't make somebody mad every other week or so, you're not doing your job."

That was his way of saying that if you're going to dabble in opinion, you'd better grow a pretty thick skin.

I think I have. And despite Ben's caveat, I take the occasional letters to the editor this column generates pretty seriously. Not the positive ones, so much – although I treasure them – but the sometimes grumpy missives from folks who disagree with me, in particular or in general.

I try to evaluate these comments objectively, to look over the pertinent column to see if their comments are valid. After all, if someone took the time and effort to sit down and actually state his or her objections in writing and mail or e-mail it to the Review, they must have felt strongly.

And some letters stay with me. In particular, one that began "You're the kind of person who gives cats a bad name." So it's odd for me to report that while reading last week's letters to the editor, one regarding a recent issue in this column made me laugh out loud.

It said, in part, this: "...I'd like to thank Mr. Gagnier for saying what I've been thinking, and meaning to write for years. There is no question that Kay lets her liberal bias shine in her musings. Thank you for stating that so well, sir." Two points for Jim (Gagnier, a frequent contributor of columns). Well, good.

That wasn't what made me laugh. Turning to Art, I said, "Well, I've been outed. Mr. Ferguson, of Harrisville and Tennessee, has determined that I'm a liberal."

That's probably only funny if you regularly read this column. (Actually, it may only be funny if you're me). Because in addition to writing from a liberal viewpoint virtually all the time, I've often stated that I am a liberal – a flaming liberal, in fact.

Sigh... You know, the only thing that makes me unhappy about the whole discussion is this. Arguing politics used

to be fun. In my house, at least, it was a major Olympic event. Honing my skills in order to debate my father (who may have had GOP tattooed on his chest) and my brother Mike taught me to put my theories in (somewhat) rational order and to think on my feet. The holes they loved to poke in my sometimes shaky premises taught me something, too.

In these days of economic distress, bitterness, "taking back" the country from one another and putting politics before policy, such debate has become a dead serious, angry sport. And that's just sad.

Nonetheless, I will say right here in black and white that I remain a liberal, and proud to be one. And that, despite a concerted effort since the 1980s to suggest that being a liberal is somehow a very bad thing, it really isn't.

Let me quote no less a hero of mine than the late Walter Cronkite, at one time "the most trusted man in America" on the subject. "I think being a liberal, in the true sense, is nondoctrinaire, nondog-matic, non-committed to a cause -- but examining each case on its merits. Being left of center is another thing; it's a political position... I think most newspapermen by definition have to be liberal; if they're not liberal, by my definition of it, then they can hardly be good newspapermen. If they're preordained dogmatists for a cause, then they can't be very good journalists; that is, if they carry it into their jour-

I agree, and at this point, we need to clarify the difference between this column and news-reporting. To quote Mr. Cronkite one more time, "Objective journalism and an opinion column are about as similar as the Bible and Playboy magazine."

He's right, of course. While this space, which runs under my name as "columnist" is totally my opinion, the news stories I free lance to the Review are a horse of a totally different color. My brother Ben used to tell me something about that, too. He said, at least a hundred times, "The only thing you have in the business is your integrity and your press card. That, and a quarter, will buy you a cup of

coffee." Since the Review doesn't issue press cards, when it comes down to reporting, I guess I've only got my integrity.

I think, over my almost 30 years with the Review, I've done a pretty decent job of being objective in my reporting. I've long contended that it's much harder to do so in a small town, where you know everyone, where many of the subjects are friends or people you like -- regardless of the position they've taken on a given issue -- and where you can't stop to fill up your tank without getting the unofficial back story on virtually everything newsworthy that's going on

My friends will tell you that I'm something of a noodge about it. In addition to reminding them from time to time that anything they do or say is fair game for the column, I have on many occasions told them "Please don't tell me (this particular information). I'm covering this story, and while I can put you on background, I can't necessarily erase the information from my head." I don't know how well I've done, overall, but I do know that while I've made some factual mistakes here and there in news stories (always corrected) I've rarely been accused of being less than fair in my report-

As I said, the column is another story. There, I have freer rein to state my opinions (because it is an opinion piece) and most often, they're on the liberal side of things. I guess I'd also like to say that that's not a knee-jerk decision. It's not even really a political position. I try hard to listen to both sides of an issue. Thanks to Mike and Daddy, I sometimes find that I concur with some of the things that more conservative voices say.

Recently, I read the results of an interesting study that found that individuals with more liberal viewpoints had a totally different set of priorities than their more conservative counterparts. I think that's probably true. I suspect I'm more sympathetic to the liberal point of view on the basis of birth, my own experiences and my personal philosophies of life.

My mom used to say that a liberal is a conservative who's been arrested while a conservative is a liberal who's been mugged. That's probably true. And I suppose it's entirely possible that something could come along, even in my golden years, that would change my own leanings. I doubt it though. I suspect no matter what, I'll always just like people more than things and champion the underdog.

And that's okay. Out me if you'd like, from Harrisville to Tennessee and beyond. While



Weather class helps residents prepare for winter

With one of the most active winter weather seasons in the United States, residents of northern Michigan have to be prepared for changeable and sometimes severe winter

Michigan is one of the few states in the country which experience lake effect snow. Lake effect snow occurs when cold air crosses the still relatively warm waters of the Great Lakes. With the lakes unfrozen for much of the winter, the lake effect snow machine creates staggering snowfall totals of more than 15 feet in some locations. Northern Michigan is a unique and challenging location for winter weather, for both residents and weather forecasters.

Anyone interested in learning more about winter weather and snow reporting, they are encouraged to attend an upcoming winter talk by the National Weather Service. These classes are free. open to the public and last approximately 90 minutes. Attendees will also receive a laminated snowfall tips measuring card, as well as winter weather safety information. In addition, those in attendance will be eligible to put their name in a drawing for an official NWS rain gauge, snow measuring stick and snow measurement board.

- Relationship between water temperatures and lake effect snow.
- Making an accurate snow measurement.

Best foods for older diabetics

Dear Savvy Senior,

My 62-year-old husband was just diagnosed with type 2 diabetes. As the cook in the family, I'm interested in finding out the best diabetic foods that he should now be eating, and where I can put my hands on some good diabetic cookbooks. What can you tell me? Diabetic Caretaker

Dear Caretaker,

Eating healthy is important for everyone, but it's even more important for the nearly 26 million Americans who have diabetes - half of whom are over the age of 60.

A healthy diet, coupled with regular exercise and medication (if needed) are the keys to keeping your husband's blood sugar under control. To help meet your husband's new dietary needs, the American Diabetes Association (ADA) offers a list of top 10 super foods for type 1 and type 2 diabetics.

These are foods that contain nutrients that are vitally important to people with diabetes, such as calcium, potassium, magnesium and vitamins A, C and E. They're also high in fiber which will help your husband feel full longer and keep his glycemic index low so his blood sugar won't spike. And, they'll help keep his blood pressure and cholesterol in check, which are also critical for diabetics.

Here's what they recommend he eat plenty of.

 Beans: Kidney, pinto, navy, black and other types of

beans are rich in nutrients and high in soluble fiber, which will keep his blood sugar steady and can help lower his cholesterol.

- Dark green leafy vegetables: Spinach, collard greens, mustard greens, kale and other dark, leafy green veggies are nutrient-dense. low in calories and carbohydrates. Your husband can't eat too much of f these.
- Citrus fruits: Grapefruit, oranges and other citrus fruits are rich in vitamin C, which helps heart health. Stick to whole fruits instead of juice. Fiber in whole fruit slows sugar absorption so your husband will get the citrus fruit nutrients without sending his blood sugar soaring.
- Sweet potatoes: High in vitamin A and fiber and low in glycemic index, sweet potatoes won't raise your husband's blood sugar at the same level as a regular potato.
- Berries: Whole, unsweetened blueberries, strawberries and other berries are full of antioxidants, vitamins and fiber. Choose fresh or frozen berries for salads, smoothies or cereal.
- Tomatoes: Raw or cooked, this low-calorie super food offers vital nutrients like vitamin C, iron and vitamin E. Serve sliced, steamed, broiled or stewed, as a side dish, in salads, soups, casseroles or other dishes.
- Fish with omega-3 fatty acids: Salmon, mackerel, herring, lake trout, sardines and albacore tuna are high in

omega 3 fatty acids that help both heart health and diabetes. But stay away from the breaded and deep fat fried

- Whole grains: Pearled barley, oatmeal, breads and other whole-grain foods are high in fiber and contain nutrients such as magnesium, chromium, folate and omega 3 fatty acids.
- Nuts: An ounce of nuts can go a long way in providing your husband important "healthy fats" along with hunger management. They're also contain a nice dose of magnesium and fiber, but don't overdue it. Nuts are high in calories so a small handful each day is enough.
- Fat-free milk and yogurt: These dairy foods provide the calcium and vitamin D your husband needs, and they'll also help curb cravings and between-meal snacks.





StarWatch By Gary Becker - Christmas for Garradd

Christmas Day is the new target for C/2009 P1, Garradd's, closest approach to the sun, but the comet itself will be next to impossible to observe because it will be setting just about the same time that it will be dark enough to see it. It will be visible at dawn about two fists, held at arm's length, above the eastern horizon. Binoculars will always be needed to view Garradd, which at that time will be close to the star Delta Herculis. But wait, I'm getting ahead of myself. Garradd will be visible with binoculars in the west as soon as the bright light from the moon is gone, and that could be as early as Sunday when the

moon rises about 9:00 p.m. Beyond that time there will be nearly a three-week window in which the comet should be viewable right after darkness if weather conditions permit, and humongous trees are not hogging your western sky. The problem with Garradd is that it is bright as comets go, but just at the threshold of the average person's ability to spot it. Garradd is also located in a no man's zone of the sky where the stars are not very bright. On the positive, Garradd has been extremely well behaved as comets go, brightening almost exactly as predicted. If you manage to catch Garradd as a fuzzy, elongated object, you'll be looking at two components which make it shine. One is subsurface ice which warms from the absorbed energy of the sun, vaporizes, and cracks the comet's exterior. This gas jets into space and fluoresces (glows) from the ultraviolet light emitted by the sun. The gases absorb this invisible component of the sun's spectrum, and then reemit energy in wavelengths of light that we can see. The second part is the dust mixed with the ice. It is pushed into space by the jetting action of the gases. This dross reflects and scatters sunlight back in our direction, also making the comet shine. It's a very "cool" process. 




