Kirtland's warbler continues to exceed recovery goal

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has released annual survey information showing the state's population of the endangered Kirtland's warbler remains steady.

Biologists, researchers and volunteers in Michigan observed 1,805 singing males during the official 2011 survey period — 1,747 males were observed in 2010. The population has not increased or decreased by more than five percent since 2007. The lowest numbers were recorded in 1974 and 1987, when only 167 singing males were found.

The Kirtland's warbler survey is conducted each year during the second and third weeks of June when the birds are defending their nesting territories. Warblers are detected by listening for their songs. The songs can be heard at distances up to onequarter mile, providing an excellent way to detect the birds with minimum disturbance. Only the males sing, so estimates of breeding population size are obtained by doubling the number of singing males recorded, based on the assumption that each male has a mate in its territory.

The 2011 survey was a joint effort by the DNR, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Michigan Department of Veterans and Military Affairs, Michigan Audubon Society and citizen volunteers.

This year, singing males (numbers in parentheses) were found in 11 northern Lower Peninsula counties: Alcona (221), Clare (84), Crawford (315), Iosco (134), Kalkaska (53), Montmorency (32), Ogemaw (569), Oscoda (261), Otsego (31), Presque Isle (5) and Roscommon (65). Surveyors identified 35 singing males in seven Upper

Twenty-three additional singing males were observed outside Michigan in Wisconsin (21) and Ontario (2).


As the amount of nesting habitat has stabilized, the population of warblers has also stabilized in the core of the range: Northern Michigan's jack pine barrens ecosystem. The warblers nest on the ground and typically select nesting sites in stands of jack pine between four and 20 years old. Historically, these stands of young jack pine were created by natural wildfires that frequently swept through northern Michigan.

Modern fire suppression programs altered this natural process, reducing Kirtland's warbler habitat. The result was that the population of Kirtland's warblers declined to the point that they were listed as endangered.

To mimic the effects of wildfire and ensure the future of this species, the DNR, U.S. Forest Service, and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service manage the forests through a combination of clearcutting, burning, seeding and replanting to promote habitat for many species, including snowshoe hare, other warbler species and rare plants. Because large prescribed fires are neither safe nor economical in northern Michigan, approximately 3,000 acres of jack pine trees are harvested and replanted annually on state and federal lands. This use of public lands provides habitat for Kirtland's warblers and other species, and brings to northern Michigan birders and hunters from across the state and around the world.

"From tourism to festivals to forest products, this endangered species directly or indirectly contributes to the economic activity of rural northern Michigan," said DNR Endangered Species Coordinator Chris Hoving. "The Kirtland's warbler habitat program is successful because there are many benefits," said Keith Kintigh, DNR wildlife ecologist. "Not only are we providing habitat for an endangered species, we are also providing wood products and great hunting opportunities for snowshoe hare, deer and turkey, to name a few."

Child Passenger Safety Week ends with Seat Check Saturday

Two children are involved hour. In the time it takes to in a car crash - one child walks away frightened and bruised and the other is taken ward into the front passenger to the hospital with life-threatening injuries. The difference? into the seat experiencing se-A properly installed car seat.

A new crash test video, produced by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute (UMTRI) and featuring child-size dummies, illustrates that scenario and shows exactly what can happen if a child is not properly secured in a car seat. The video is available www.youtube.com/ohsp and on the UMTRI website www.umtri.umich.edu.

During the test, two 33pound crash test dummies representing three-year-old children were placed in the rear seat of a vehicle, one in a forward facing car seat and one completely unrestrained.

The dummies were then subjected to a lab test simulating a moderate-to-severe crash at about 30 miles per blink an eye, the unrestrained dummy was launched forseat and then thrown back vere nead and neck impact while the dummy in the car seat was restrained and pulled back by the harness and seat belt.

This test illustrates the significant difference between the two experiences. The restrained child would likely walk away with minor bruises and scrapes while the unrestrained child would likely be killed or seriously injured, said Miriam Manary, UMTRI Senior Engineering Research Associate.

The tests bring to light the importance of using a properly fitted car seat as Child Passenger Safety (CPS) Week begins Sunday and concludes on Sept. 24, with Seat Check Saturday.

Car seats save the lives of children every day, and while

most parents are using seats for babies and young children, children need continue to use seats until they are eight years old or 49 inches tall, said Office of Highway Safety Planning Director Michael L. Prince. It is also important that parents use the correct seat for their child, and visiting a trained, certified CPS technician is the best way to be sure car seats are properly fitted and installed.

CPS Week is a national initiative to raise awareness for car seat use and encourage parents to have their children's car seats installed and inspected by a certified CPS technician.

CPS technicians will be out in force during Seat Check Saturday participating in seat checks around the state. For a list of seat checks in the area visit www.nhtsa.gov.

The "lady" respectfully objects

Re: "You go girl - a defense of womanhood."

Universal accessibility priority for DNR

No one doubts that Michigan offers outstanding outdoor recreational opportunities, from groomed trails to large blocks of undeveloped forests. But accessing those recreational opportunities is not the same for everyone; people with physical disabilities often find themselves unable to get to the good stuff.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has made accessibility a major priority. Efforts began in 2002 as department staffers began developing a Strategic Plan for Accessibility.

"We really cranked up the program in 2005," said Kelly Grumelot, the DNR's accessibility coordinator and chairperson on the department's Accessibility Team (A-Team). "We resolved that accessibility isn't a separate issue. It should be part of everything we do."

The strategic plan is a constantly evolving document that includes a number of major components, including assessing the accessibility of all existing department programs; developing a plan to correct existing accessibility deficiencies; developing inclusion for all new facilities, programs and services; and involving public disability

bility and inclusion consultant with Access Recreation Group, is the chairperson of the AAC.

'Are we getting anywhere?" Burkhour asked. "We're 100 percent getting somewhere. The AAC is having a great impact on the DNRE on helping to shape not only policies and procedures that affect participation by people with disabilities, but also in changing the culture to being proactive on issues of accessibil-

"We've been able to shift the focus from complying with the minimum to really embracing the ideas of universal design and inclusion."

The DNR recently rededicated its efforts by issuing a resolution on the 20th anniversary of the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act asking for help with Access Michigan Outdoors and resolving to become a leader in accessibility to outdoor recreation.

'There are ways people with disabilities can hunt and fish and hike and whatever," Burkhour said. "I think the DNR's awareness that this is important and helps people understand that if you leave out people with disabilities, you not only leave out the 20

that's real progress."

But many challenges remain.

"We're looking at questions such as: What kind of trail surface makes it accessible but is still in harmony for the environment?" Grumelot said. "How do you do it without destroying the very thing you're providing access to? In sensitive ecosystems where even foot traffic is restricted - it's a difficult issue."

The DNR has recently added an elevated hunting blind at its Rifle River State Recreation Area that allows hunters with limited access to enter the blind at ground level, and then raise it with remote controls inside the blind. The blind is a big hit.

The Wildlife Division has made a number of accommodations for hunters with disabilities at its game and wild-

At Maple River State Game Area there's an accessible waterfowl blind on the marsh and a crushed limestone trail and accessible blind for upland hunters. There's an asphalt trail at the Sanilac State Game Area that offers access to mobility challenged hunters. And the division is currently identifying additional

advocacy groups in the planning process.

The DNR created an Accessibility Advisory Council (AAC) comprised of individuals and groups with expertise and experience – as well as more mainstream conservation and recreation groups — to help move the program forward.

The council is made up of representatives of many of the DNR's divisions as well as non-government organizations. The AAC includes representatives of such groups as the Brain Injury Association of Michigan, Michigan Sports Unlimited, Disability Network/Michigan, Michigan Paralyzed Veterans of America, as well as the Michigan Association of Recreational Vehicles and Campgrounds, Michigan United Conservation Clubs and the Michigan Association of Gamebird Breeders and **Hunting Preserves.**

Cindy Burkhour of Jenison, Mich., an accessipercent of the people with disabilities, you leave out their families, too.

"It makes good moral and ethical sense, but it makes good economic sense, too improve accessibility and you increase the numbers of us-

Some of the progress has been relatively simple. The department's Parks and Recreation Division has changed its policy on trail use for instance, redefining personal assistive mobility devices (PAMDs) - such as batterypowered wheelchairs — as being different than motorized vehicles. That allows people who use PAMDs to access trails that had previously been limited to foot ac-

Similarly, the division has adopted a design for vault toilets at its facilities that is universally accessible.

"It's a good design," Grumelot said. "If you're getting everybody to use the same consistent design -

opportunities to improve access at other areas.

In addition, the Wildlife Division has partnered with other groups to provide barrier-free access for turkey and deer hunts at Fort Custer.

The DNR is not only making changes – in both policy and facilities - at its own properties, it now hosts Demonstration Days at various sites that bring manufacturers of adaptive devices and organizations that promote disability awareness to a central location. The first was held largely for DNR employees to familiarize them with the issues and availability of adaptive equipment. The events are open to the public and have drawn good attendance from members of the disabilities community.

"Sometimes you don't need to do anything to the land, just provide the equipment that makes it accessible," Grumelot said. "And some-

Cormorant numbers decreasing in Great Lakes

The number of cormorant nests in Michigan has been decreasing since population reduction actions were implemented in 2004, according to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

Cormorants, which were increasing in numbers throughout the 1980s and 1990s, have been blamed for declining sport fisheries in a number of areas. The breeding population in Michigan stabilized in the late 1990s and early 2000s at around 30,000 nests.

Since 2004, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Wildlife Services Division has been oiling eggs at nesting sites and removing adults from the population to meet goals set by the DNR.

Additional management activities have also been performed by Tribal natural resource agencies to address concerns related to cormorant impacts to commercial and sport fisheries, as well as alleviating potential conflicts with other species of nesting birds and reduce damage to native plants.

Comprehensive statewide counts from 2007 and 2009 document a 38 percent decrease in breeding cormorants in Michigan, a drop from 29,509 nests in 2007 to 18,200 nests in 2009. The scheduled 2011 breeding cormorant count is underway, and a final count will be available in the fall.

Dr. Francesca Cuthbert of the University of Minnesota, who coordinates the count throughout the U.S. Great Lakes Region, has noted further decreases on breeding

colonies in Michigan.

"Preliminary indications are that the final estimate for 2011 will be lower than that for 2009. This trend has been reported by other Michigan researchers and staff from USDA - Wildlife Services," Cuthbert said.

This mirrors the trend seen at breeding sites where USDA - Wildlife Services conducts population reduction activities; from 2007 through 2010, the nest count at these sites decreased by 37 percent, from 23,345 nests in 2007 to 14,685 nests in 2010.

Population control methods have not been the only contributor to declining cormorant numbers. Food web changes including reductions in alewives and the invasion of the round goby have altered the food supply for cormorants. Declines in aquaculture farms and conversion to dry-land operations in the southern United States have removed valuable wintering habitat, and cormorant culling operations at southern aquaculture facilities reduced the number of birds surviving the winter to return to Michigan.

The cumulative effect has been to drive cormorant numbers down to the point where the statewide management goal of 5,000-12,500 nests may soon be reached.

"The DNR's management goal seeks to balance the desires of stakeholders with the department's responsibility to manage for healthy populations of fish and wildlife. We don't want to designate the double-crested cormorant as an endangered species due to declining numbers, but we also want to ensure that recreational fishing opportunities are protected," said Russ Mason, DNR Wildlife Division

Dear Curious,

There sure is! Funding Roth IRAs for your grandkids when they're young is a smart move and an incredible gift to their financial future. And you don't have to be rich to do it, either.

The Roth IRA is a fabulous savings tool for your grandkids. A Roth can literally turn a few hundred dollars a year now, into tens of thousands of tax-free dollars for your grandkids when they retire by using the powerful combination of time and compounding.

But in order for you to open and fund a Roth IRA for a grandchild, one primary requirement will need to be met. The child will need to have earned income from some type of work - allowances don't count. So, if your grandkid made a few bucks this year mowing lawns, babysitting, delivering newspapers or working an afterschool or weekend job, he or she qualifies. Just be sure you keep good records including a log of the dates and hours worked and amounts paid, as well as any W-2 forms from employers or 1099s.

If your grandkids meet the earned income requirement, there's nothing in the rules

that says the child's own money has to go into the Roth. It's perfectly legal if your grandkids keep the money they earned and you make the contributions for them. The key is that you can't contribute more than your grandchild earned in any given tax year, up to the limit of \$5,000.

And to give you an idea of how these early contributions can add up, consider this. Let's say, for example, that you contribute \$500 a year to your grandchild's Roth for nine years from the ages of 10 to 18 (a total of \$4,500). If that money grew an annual rate of seven percent, that \$4,500 would accumulate to around \$144,000 by the time he or she reaches age 65.

And with a Roth IRA, the full amount will be tax-free when it's withdrawn in retirement.

It's also doubtful that your grandkids would be on the hook for income taxes. Children who work as employees generally don't need to file a tax return unless their income exceeds the standard deduction amount, which was \$5,700 for the 2010 tax year. They should, however, file if they're due a refund for any withholdings. But a child who has net earnings of \$400 or more from self-employment is required to file. For information on IRS filing requirements for children, visit www.irs.gov and search for the page titled "Taxable Income for Students."

Savvy Senior

You also need to know that opening a Roth for your grandkids doesn't automatically lock up the money for decades. Like it or not, your grandkids, at age 18, can withdraw the principle contributions (but not earnings) any time, tax free and penalty free.

Roth IRAs also offer special withdrawal rules for higher education expenses. So if your grandkid needs money for college, contributions can be withdrawn tax and penalty free, while the earnings can also be dipped into without penalty, but they will owe taxes on it. And when it comes time to buy a first home, your grandson or granddaughter can withdraw up to \$10,000 (contributions and earnings) tax and penalty free.

A 2010 report by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety says that, "Contrary to expectations, senior drivers aren't causing more crashes than they used to." Rates of crashes in drivers 70 and older have actually declined.

The catch, however, is that we must know when to stop or limit our driving. Once we start making driving mistakes, the results can range from merely annoying (having our driving restricted) to catastrophic (a serious crash or death).

Ask yourself: Are other drivers honking at you more lately? Have you hit a curb or mailbox? Do you have a hard time backing up, possibly because it's difficult to turn around in the seat? Do you wonder which way to go at exit ramps? These might be signs that you need to think about whether to continue driving.





StarWatch By Gary Becker - Follow the Moon



The waning moon this week provides a beacon of light to assist in finding other bright luminaries and a planet in the dawn sky. Since the moon is well past full and will be at last quarter on Tuesday—half on, half off—the light to the left, Luna will be visible to early risers who normally watch the sky brighten through kitchen windows as they are having breakfast. They will only have to pop outside and find the moon which will help to identify the other bright celestial bodies nearby. Start right away on Sunday morning with the moon only six of its diameters south of the sparkling blue Pleiades. Use binoculars to

"scope" out the brightest stars of the finest open cluster in the heavens just above the moon. Both the moon and the Pleiades will fit in the same field of view. Monday morning finds the moon above and to the left of the bright star, Aldebaran, the orangey eye of Taurus, the Bull. Wide field binocular will again show both objects in the same field of view. Over the next three nights the moon silently glides towards a near rendezvous (Sept. 22) with Gemini's brightest luminaries, Caster and Pollux (above and slightly left), red Mars (left and slightly below) and Procyon of Canis Minor the Little Dog (below and slightly right). All of this takes place mid-sky in the ESE. Orion, the Hunter, and Sirius, the brightest star of the night, gleam to the moon's right. Don't forget the autumnal equinox on Friday, September 23 at 5:06 a.m. when it's goodbye to summer and hello to the cooler days of fall. At that moment the sun will be crossing the Earth's equator and heading into the Southern Hemisphere. Down Under, it will be spring. The moon on that morning will have slid below Mars as a thinning crescent and again present a lovely view to the unaided eye or through low power binoculars. By Sunday Luna is below Regulus in Leo, near the horizon at 6:00 a.m. Good celestial hunting. www.astronomy.org

• On Oct. 9, 1635, religious dissident Roger Williams is banished from the Massachusetts Bay Colony by the General Court after speaking out against the right of civil authorities to punish religious dissension. Williams established a settlement called "Providence" in Rhode Island, open to those seeking freedom of conscience.

- On Oct. 6, 1866, in Indiana, the Reno Gang carries out the first robbery of a moving train, making off with \$10,000. This new method of sticking up moving trains in remote locations low on law enforcement soon became popular in the American
- On Oct. 3, 1917, the U.S. Congress passes the War Revenue Act, increasing income taxes to raise money for the war effort. A graduated tax system was introduced, with rates starting at 1 percent and rising to 7 percent for taxpayers with income above \$500,000
- On Oct. 4, 1927, sculpting begins on the granite images of presidents Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and Roosevelt at Mount Rushmore in South Dakota. Jefferson's image was originally fashioned to the right of Washington. Within two years, the face was badly cracked and workers blasted the sculpture off the mountain. Sculpting began again with Jefferson on the left side of Washington.
- On Oct. 5, 1947, President Harry Truman makes the first televised presidential address, asking Americans to cut back on food to help starving Europeans. He requested that the public voluntarily forgo meat on Tuesdays, eggs and poultry on Thursdays and to save a slice of bread each

Savings are key part of debt-free living

DOLLARS AND SENSE BY David Uffington

The surprising results of a recent survey indicate that more consumers are opting to pay off debt rather than save money. An online survey by the National Foundation for Credit Counseling showed that 89 percent of respondents believe that right now it's more important to pay off debt than to save.

It wasn't always that way. Back in 1959, when such figures were first kept, consumers were averaging savings at a rate of 8.3 percent of income. At this point, the rate of saving is only at 5 percent of income, which is up from 1 percent a few years ago.

Gail Cunningham, with the NFCC, is quoted in the organization's latest newsletter as saying, OIn bad times, people save out of a fear of tomorrow, and in good times they spend as if there were no tomorrow.Ó We're not at either point right now, not saving out of fear nor spending everything we have. Consumers are paying off debt, but they aren't saving the money that's no longer going toward those monthly payments when a debt is paid off.

The problem with paying off debt to the exclusion of saving becomes apparent

when an emergency strikes and ready cash is needed. Not having money saved can put consumers in the expensive position of needing to take credit-card cash advances—if they can get them.

The availability of those cash advances has provided a cushion when times are lean. However, because of job loss, lowered incomes and more scrutiny of credit worthiness, fewer people have that credit-card cushion during an emergency.

Savings needs to become the new source of cash availability. If for no other reason, money that is saved will earn interest (although nowadays the percentage rate is pitiful), and it won't cost you the interest that a credit card will

Yes, pay off those debts, concentrating on the one with the highest interest rate first. But as soon as you pay one off, put that money into savings every month. Begin building a fund that will cover your future plans and emergencies.

Your goal should be not only to be debt-free, but to have savings.

GI bill changes

VETERANS POST by Freddy Groves

There have been a number of changes to the education benefits this year in the Post 9/11 GI Bill.

Earlier in 2011, the rules changed so that all public school in-state fees and tuition will be paid and private schools are paid to a maximum of \$17,500. A rate schedule was set for active-duty members pursuing a degree.

Fees for second and subsequent certifications or licenses will be reimbursed, as will tests for admission, such as the SAT. Funds will begin being paid every month instead of at the beginning of each term.

Housing allowances will be paid at the "rate of pursuit," rounded to the next tenth. An example: If you're attending school at one-quarter rate (as opposed to full time), your housing rate would be 25 percent rounded up to 30 percent.

Here's one to pay attention to with the coming semesterend holidays: There is no housing allowance paid for the period between semesters.

Still more changes take effect on Oct. 1:

• Flight schools' in-state tuition and fees will be paid up to \$10,000 per year.

• Apprenticeship and onthe-job training will be paid on a prorated basis determined by how much time is spent in the program. There's a set allowance for books and supplies.

 Active-duty military can receive a stipend for books and supplies.

• Correspondence school in-state tuition will be paid up to \$8,500 per year.

• Non-college degree programs at in-state schools will be paid for, up to \$17,500.

• If you're a student in a distance-learning program, a housing allowance will be paid.
