Beautification members are Lincoln Citizens of the Year

Not one, not two, but 11 residents, including a very surprised village president, were named Citizens of the Year in Lincoln.

For the past four years individual residents of the Village of Lincoln have been recognized by a nominating panel for their kindness and caring of their community. Words such as generous, kindhearted, observant and hard working describe these individuals who go above and beyond as a good neighbor.

This year was no exception; only instead of an individual, a group of individuals known as the beautification committee first came to the mind of Phil Jordan, president of the Village of Lincoln.


Little did Jordan know a secret committee to name him Citizen of the Year had already been convened and unanimously agreed upon. "It came as a total surprise to me, I'm on the panel that picks the citizen and had no idea," Jordan said.

According to Jordan, the beautification committee deserves the accolade. "They are a hard working group which has stuck together through thick and thin. Each one cares immensely for this community, making them very worthy."

The beautification committee consists of 10 members: Eric J. Monnier, Sharon Walker, Kathy and Bill Putsky, Joan Toombs, Deb Shaneour, Edna Byce, Jessy and Patricia Scott and Evelyn Good.

The committee formed about a decade ago when a few would go around and plant flowers along the main roads in town. A few of the members would also walk the streets daily and pick up litter.

Joan Toombs and Kathy Putsky recalled the early days of their committee, "We were called bag ladies because we carried grocery bags with us to pick up trash as we walked," Putsky said as she showed off her pink Lincoln beautification committee

sweatshirt that has a picture of a trash can with a flower growing out of it.

The beautification committee also puts up many of the village's Christmas decorations, waters flowers during the summer, plants trees and shrubs and keeps an eye on the village's appearance.

"It's not just a few days a year; it's every week of the year with hours and hours of work each week. Anything they see needing to get done gets done because of the beautification committee. They are amazing people and more than deserve to be Citizens of the Year for all they do," Jordan said. He added that the group has some of the best volunteers he's ever known who were fun people to be with.

Jordan was surprised with his own plaque for Citizen of the Year. He said that he was honored and humbled by the award. And he didn't make the town what it was by himself, he had a great team of people to work with. He also thought the nominating panel was pretty darn sneaky.

Jordan moved to Lincoln from Davison, Mich. in 2001

after visiting the area quite a bit with a friend. He said the more he looked at the town the more he liked it. He took office as the Village of Lincoln President in 2006.

According to Bonny Gauthier, a village trustee, the nominating panel chose Jordan secretly over the phone. "We wanted Phil to be recognized as well as the beautification committee. A lot of people don't comprehend the hours he works traveling at his own expense looking at other towns and cities to help make Lincoln the best village it possibly could be," Gauthier said.

She explained a great deal

She explained a great deal of Jordan's time is consumed by working with grant writers. He is working on a sewer grant application which would fix the aging system in place with no funds necessary coming from village pockets.

"He hasn't lived here all that long, but he could see the possibility of it the moment he arrived. He saw the potential and the village has become his vision. It's because of him we have momentum to continue to improve," Gauthier said.

Goodfellows' Christmas tradition continues

Christmas is a time of traditions handed down from generation to generation and a time of giving to others. Not many groups understand this sense of generational giving more than the Goodfellows of Alcona County.

The Harrisville Goodfellows and Mikado Goodfellows have been busy this season, as they have for decades past, carrying on their long standing cause of "No child without a Christmas." Mikado's group celebrated its tradition with a gift giving Christmas party complete with a visit from Santa at the township hall. Harrisville's group is still gathering goodies for its tradition of sending Santa to children's homes with bags of candy on Christmas Eve and delivering fruit to senior citizens.

Each group has its own stories of how they began and territory they cover, but their common goal never changes - bringing the joy of the season

to families. Neither belongs to a national organization nor do they pay annual dues, but each knows their assignments well and delivers year after year after year.

Their name depicts who they are -- good fellows -- and while not all may be fellows in the gender sense, they all are fellows of goodness to their community.

Mikado's Goodfellows first began during World War II when a group of businessmen wanted to do something special for the children during war time. When their effort first began, each child got an orange and a bag of peanuts. Through the years the group gradually faded, but was reorganized in the 1970s and has been going ever since.

Kay Lovelace has been a Mikado Goodfellow for 20 years and said it's always been very rewarding. This group of about 27 active members meets monthly throughout the year to help in their community.

"We give every year to the three churches in Mikado as well as My Brother's Hope, St. Vincent DePaul, Salvation Army and the Red Cross. We give four scholarships every year to Alcona and Oscoda High School graduates and we prepare funeral dinners at the township hall or the American Legion in Mikado at no cost to the family," Lovelace said.

She explained they also help members of the community who are hospitalized or going through cancer treatments. "It's not a lot, just a little cash to help with traveling expenses to get back and forth and to help with lodging if the family needs it," she said.

Mikado Goodfellows territory covers from M-72 to King's Corner Road, east to Poor Farm Road and west to the county line. The bulk of the funds come from bingo which is held every Monday

I am writing to encourage all northeast Michigan residents to watch, or record for later viewing, the broadcast on WCMU television of the Yellow Jug For Old Drugs documentary. The show will be on our local PBS stations on December 19 at 7:30 p.m. and rebroadcast on December 21 at 5 p.m.

The Yellow Jug program is a wonderful example of what citizens can do to protect our health and environment. The old practice of flushing pharmaceuticals down the toilet and into the water system has been determined to be dangerous for all living things that need pure water to survive. The non profit group was started by local Alcona County citizens and is called, the Great Lakes Clean Water Organization. It is now also operating in Illinois and Wisconsin and to date have collected and disposed of 42 million gallons of unused and unwanted drugs.

Please tune in to see our local people who have filmed this important documentary. It includes footage with the Cedarbrook Trout farm owners and local, retired educa-

tor, Robert Kennedy teaching a couple of young boys to fish. The interviews with the Barton City organizers of the Yellow Jug program describe how the collection of pharmaceuticals works.



Elks Scholarships

These students have also advanced to the district level where their applications will be judged with the scholarship winners from the other Elks lodges in northeast Michigan to determine the state finalists for the northeast district. At the state level, these students could win \$1,000 scholarships from the Michigan Elks Association. If their applications score high enough at the state level, they will advance to the national level where they could win a scholarship of \$4,000 to \$50,000.

Special Scholarship

The Northeast Sunrise Charter Chapter of the American Business Women's Association (ABWA) is funding a special scholarship through the Stephen Bufton Memorial Educational Fund (SBMEF). The field of study is not specified and the scholarship will be awarded in the amount of \$2,000. In order to be eligible for scholarship consideration, candidates must be women who: Are citizens of the United States and Michigan residents of AuSable, East Tawas, Glennie, Greenbush, Hale, Harrisville, Lincoln, Mikado, National City, Oscoda or Tawas City; will be college freshman, sophomore, junior, senior or graduate level in August 2014; are attending or have been accepted at an accredited college or university authorized to confer degrees at least at the baccalaureate level or higher; and have achieved a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better on a 4.0 scale.

To receive an application, interested parties should send an e-mail with valid return e-mail address to: BelleFlora@charter.net; Belle Flora, development chairperson, Northeast Sunrise Charter Chapter ABWA. Trustees of SBMEF serve as the selection board for this scholarship. Applications and all supporting documents are handled online and must be completed by March 31, 2014. The winner will be notified in May. Each onetime scholarship is not renewable. A check will be issued jointly to the educational institution and the recipient. Funds are limited to tuition, books and fees.

Snowmobile trail use advisory for Alcona and Iosco counties

Four snowmobile trail segments in Alcona and Iosco counties will have increased travel times because of construction equipment traffic during weekdays, starting Dec. 16 and continuing through March, because of utility work. While the trails will not be closed, visitors will need to travel with caution on the segments affected during this timeframe.

As of December 16 the Michigan Electric Transmission Company (METC) will be rebuilding a transmission line that will affect approximately 3.5 miles of Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) snowmobile trail No. 96/Forest Road 4771 in Alcona County, and about two miles of DNR snowmobile trail No. 665/Five Channels Dam to Loud Dam Service Road in Iosco County.

Also starting December 16 a timber cutting company will be utilizing Forest roads 2068, 4422 and 4103 between Esmond and Monument Roads as part of a timber hauling route. A .75 mile portion of DNR snowmobile trail No. 645 is located on these roads.

evening in Mikado and from donations. Lovelace said that while they do not charge families for the funeral dinners, most families will give a donation, if they can.

She also explained some years it's difficult to find the monies needed but they manage what they can. "Bingo helps but it is up and down constantly," Lovelace said.

This year Mikado Goodfellows gave out 160 bags of candy and every child attending the Christmas party received a new toy. Lovelace said it is the kids at Christmas that really touches her heart and keeps her involved in the group every year.

The Harrisville Goodfellows continue its 70 year tradition of meeting at the fire hall from October to Christmas Eve to ensure every child one to 10 years of age in Harrisville, Harrisville Township and the southern half of Haynes Township receives a visit from Santa Claus with a bag of candy for each child in the family.

They also try hard to make sure every senior citizen is honored and acknowledged by a Goodfellow delivering a fruit package or, in some cases, a meal.

"You can't join the Good-fellows and you can't quit the Goodfellows. We have no formal meetings, no officers, no bylaws, no dues and no speeches. If you want to help you just show up at the fire hall. We are a do-good organization where work is shared by everyone and we have a good time helping out," said Ron Skiba, a Harrisville Goodfellow for about 10 years.

Hazen "KiKi" Cuyler, Harrisville's most famous son, along with other notable community members such as Muskrat Elmer, Bub Chappelle, Doc Marshall, Red Foster, George Killmaster and many other kindhearted gentlemen started the Harrisville Goodfellows in the 1930s. In those days baskets of food were delivered to people who had fallen on hard times and Santa hung out on the corner of US-23 and M-72 passing out bags of candy to any car containing a child. Today the group, in addition to Santa's candy visits and honoring senior citizens, helps with unexpected crisis or disasters throughout the year. The group also puts up, takes down and cares for the nativity crèche located on the north side of M-72 and US-23 as well as the Christmas tree lights on a large evergreen located on the south side of M-72 and US-23.

"We got the lights looking good on the tree this year. We don't use a ladder, just a long pole. That's a big tree to string with lights like that," Skiba said.

The Harrisville group is funded pretty much the same way it was 70 years ago -- by donation. "As I understand it, when the group formed KiKi would go up to everyone and say, 'Give me a buck.' That's why the donation pledges are still called buck cards which you can find at local merchants to help the cause," said Harrisville Goodfellow Scott French.

French knew he had to be a part of this group when he first moved to the area and was quite surprised when Santa showed up at his home, unannounced to greet his two young boys with candy.

The fellow's reminisced about dozens of stories of Santa greeting the children. Most of whom gave Santa cookies, but one young boy gave Santa some wrapped wood thinking Santa's house must get cold too.

They talked about children who run outside without shoes or coats to hug Santa as he comes up their walk; or witnessing a senior cry when fruit was delivered because no one else had given her a gift that year.

Both Goodfellows agreed the hardest part of the job is figuring out what homes to go to. "Not all seniors understand what the fruit is for, they think it is charity, but it isn't... it's just our way of saying we appreciate them and we're glad they are here in our community. It's not charity, it's tradition," French said.

Skiba explained in the past they would get lists of where children lived from the school but now they ask adults to call them to let them know where Santa should visit. The fellows said they are prepared to deliver about 270 bags of candy this year.

Skiba said it is a lot of territory to cover, too much for just one Santa so they enlist four to do all the candy giving. However, it is a lot of getting in and out of the car, about 70 to 80 times per Santa. The Harrisville Goodfellows ask that parents leave the porch light on for Santa and to make sure dogs are fully restrained.

Both the Mikado Goodfellows and the Harrisville Goodfellows are looking for new members to join in their efforts, especially younger members and both could always use additional help with donations.

Boys basketball has rocky start

Graduation of key players, a new coach, blending incoming juniors and beginning the basketball season with three road games in one week are all ingredients for a difficult beginning. That is what the Alcona varsity boys basketball team faced last week as they lost two of three games to begin the season.

On Monday, Dec. 9 the Tigers made a trip to Atlanta for opening night. The Huskies are not a great team but they have been together for a couple of years, are physical and know how to execute the pick-and-roll to perfection. They beat the Tigers 56-47.

The first half was close with Alcona holding a 12-11 lead after one quarter. Trent LaVergne and Carson Jamieson accounted for all the points, each hitting for six. Alcona committed eight turnovers and allowed Atlanta to score on layups time after time.

The second period was more of the same with the Huskies scoring all their points on lay-ups or free throws. LaVergne kept Alcona in the game scoring nine of their 12 points. The game was tied 24-24 at halftime.

The Huskies took a 34-28 lead heading into the final period as Alcona could only muster four points in the third

quarter. Both teams came alive offensively in the final period. Alcona scored 19 points but had no defense and allowed 22 points by Atlanta. At one point the Tigers were behind 50-34. A rally at the end made the final score a little closer but the it was too little too late.

LaVergne led Alcona with 23 points and eight rebounds. Jamieson added 12 points and seven rebounds.

The junior varsity team faired much better, easily winning 62-19. Isaac Dubuque had 14 points. Nate Swinson had 10 and Alec Link scored 11.

On Wednesday, Dec. 11 the Tigers travelled to AuGres for a game against the Wolverines and came home with a hard fought 50-38 victory. They led after one period 14-7 with balanced scoring from four players. They continued to put pressure on AuGres and led 27-13 at halftime.

It appeared an easy victory was in the bag, but the Wolverines had other ideas. They scored 17 consecutive points to start the third quarter and actually took a 30-27 lead over Alcona. The Tigers couldn't hit a bucket while AuGres hit everything in sight

The game was tied three times to finish the period and, after a field goal by Brandon Smigelski, Alcona had a 34-32 lead heading into the final period. They poured it on in the final quarter to win 50-28

LaVergne led Alcona with 21 points and nine rebounds. Jamieson added 17 and pulled down nine rebounds. Smigelski helped with six points.

The junior varsity team dominated AuGres by a score of 48-17. Link led with 12 points and Hunter Sullivan adding 11.

The final trip of the week saw Alcona travelling to Tawas to face the Braves, and the results were not pretty. Tawas thumped Alcona 63-37.

Tawas was not big but executed very patiently on offense and were aggressive on defense. Alcona fell behind quickly in the first quarter, managing only four points and trailed 14-4. The offense warmed up in the second period scoring 15 points but the defense gave up 18 and Tawas was ahead 32-19 at halftime.

Again the Tigers could not get their offense going in the third quarter and were outscored 16-5, trailing 48-24 heading into the fourth. Even though they hit for 20 points in the final period they allowed 28.

LaVergne led Alcona with 11 points. Jason Steiner added seven, Dustin Yokom scored six points and Smigelski added five.

Alcona starts the season 1-2 with two more home games before the holiday break.

How Medicare covers Alzheimer's disease

Dear Savvy Senior,

What all does Medicare cover when it comes to Alzheimer's disease? My wife was recently diagnosed with early stage Alzheimer's and I would like to find out what's covered and what's not.

Researching Spouse

Dear Spouse,

Most medical costs to treat beneficiaries with Alzheimer's disease are covered by Medicare, but unfortunately long-term custodial care costs that most patients eventually need are not. Here's a breakdown of what Medicare does and doesn't cover when it comes to Alzheimer's disease, along with some tips that can help you plan ahead.

 Medical care: For the most part, ongoing medical care to diagnose and treat Alzheimer's disease is covered by Medicare Part B, including visits to primary care doctors and specialists, lab tests, speech and occupational therapy, home health

care and outpatient counseling services. Medicare pays 80 percent of these costs, and you will be responsible for the remaining 20 percent after you've met your annual \$147 Part B deductible.

Inpatient hospital care is also covered under Medicare Part A with a \$1,216 deductible and coinsurance. And, as part of health care reform, Medicare is also covering 100 percent of annual wellness visits, which includes testing for cognitive impairment.

 Medications: Most Alzheimer's medications are covered under Medicare's Part D prescription drug plans, but plans vary on copayments. If you have a Part D plan, use the Medicare Plan Finder tool at medicare.gov/find-a-plan to compare your plan's total drug costs against other plans to be sure you're getting the best coverage.

The Alzheimer's Association offers a chart on coverage for common Alzheimer's drugs - go to alz.org and type "drug chart" in the search field to find it.

• Long-term custodial care: Many seniors are surprised to learn that Medicare does not cover long-term custodial care. This includes nursing home care, the costs of assisted living facilities and adult day care. Medicare does, however, pay for some shorter-term nursing home care, but only up to 100 days following a three-day inpatient hospital stay.

Hiring home help for bathing, toileting and dressing (this is known as custodial care) is not covered by Medicare either unless your wife is also receiving skilled-nursing care or physical or occupational therapy to help with the recovery from an illness or injury.

To help with these costs, you may want to consider a long-term care insurance policy. Or if your income and assets are very limited, you may qualify for Medicaid. See longtermcare.gov for a breakdown of long-term care planning options.

 Hospice: In the final stages of the disease, Medicare Part A covers nearly all aspects of hospice care, including doctor services, nursing care, drugs, medical equipment and supplies, physical and occupational therapy, homemaker services, counseling and respite care. To qualify, a doctor must certify that a patient has six months or less to live.

If you don't have a Medigap (Medicare supplemental insurance) policy, you should consider getting one. A Medigap plan will help pay for things that aren't covered by Medicare like copayments, coinsurance and deductibles.

To search for plans in your area, visit medicare.gov and click on "Supplements & Other Insurance" or call Medicare at 800-633-4227 and ask them to mail you a free copy of the "Choosing a Medigap Policy" publication 02110.

Or, if you're enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan (like an HMO or PPO), your plan

must give you at least the same coverage as original Medicare does, but make sure your doctors are in your insurer's network to avoid excess costs. Also find out whether you need a referral or prior authorization before getting care.

If you can't afford your Medicare out-of-pocket costs, or need help with medication expenses, there are government programs that can help. Go to benefitscheckup.org to search, or contact your Eldercare Locator (800-677-1116) who can refer you to local services to assist you.

Do you see what I see?

I put the nativity set out last week. It's a task I usually do early in the morning, on my own, since it requires a little more time and thought than just throwing some tinsel on the tree. It goes on top of the library cabinet, high enough to be visible but safe from little hands.

This year, given the presence of a CD player that takes up about half of that acreage, it's on two levels – the manger and its occupants atop said player, the crowd of shepherds, et cetera down below, gazing up adoringly.

The tableau doesn't require any special lighting – it's illuminated largely by the Christmas tree off to its right. That seems appropriate to me, the nativity being, after all, a nocturnal event. Once I'd moved the various pieces around to a point where they seemed right, I stood back and thought that – at least in the Kniep house – the manger scene features a fairly motley crew.

In part, that's because no matter how carefully I pack them away each January, by the time the holidays roll around again, the contents of the box have shifted. This year, for example, we seem to be missing a king, but we have two baby Jesus figures. I don't remember that ever being the case before. I opted to place the original holy infant in the manger and the second one on the sideboard in the dining room next to a candle. Who knows, maybe some higher power feels I need two Jesus's this year.

The other reason those assembled look a little motley is that over the years the collection has become somewhat... shall we say, eclectic. The holy family, one king, the donkey, one cow and a handful of the sheep are what remains of the original 1950s Fontanini set Mama ordered from Italy, along with one of my favorite figures – the man in the red cloak with a hatful of apples.

The boy with the bagpipes, two of the shepherds and several other sheep are less expensive resin Fontanini reproductions and the angel, one shepherd, the other cow and the rest of the sheep were picked up at thrift shops and garage sales along the way. The scale varies a bit here and there, close, but not exactly uniform.

And that, it always seems to me, is probably how it was. Those who came through the night to welcome the newborn king were probably a pretty eclectic group themselves. Shepherds and local folks who wondered at the light issuing from the star above the manger and came to stare at the kings and the camels (missing entirely this year from our vignette, it occurs to me). It's okay though. The camels are there, in my mind at least, along with a couple other figures only I've ever been able to see.

The first of my apocryphal characters is the lady with the loaf of bread. I don't know if Mama told me about her or I just invented her on my own, but I've always envisioned her, holding her freshly baked crusty goodsmelling gift wrapped in a length of cloth. She remains as real to me as any of the plaster or plastic folks.

The second is the inn-keeper, who I always imagine as off to the side, watching from the shadows. As the only "kid" in a largely adult household, who tended to think about things, I spent a lot of time in my early years considering the innkeeper.

Did he just say "There's no room at the inn," as the Bible story suggested and shut the door in their faces? Did he look at the tired, pregnant Mary and say, "I'm sorry, there's no room but there's clean straw in the stable?" Did his wife say, "For heaven's sake, look at that poor girl – can't you find them something?"

As a child, I viewed the innkeeper as a kind of bad guy in the story but as I've gotten older, I think he was just playing out the role he was given, as many of us do. The baby was intended to be born in the most humble of circumstances, surrounded by the poor (and probably smelly) shepherds, the wealthy, educated kings, the multitude of heavenly hosts

strumming their harps of gold and the folks who just brought what treasures they had

I've come to believe, too. that if we listen, everyone's nativity speaks to them in its own individual way. My manger scene speaks to me about those who were homeless, and maybe hungry. About a baby born to the whole darn motley assembled crew, not just to those who could buy their way into the warmth of the inn. Wrapped in rags and nestled into a pile of hay, attended by a gentle, loving mother and lifted by an earthly father with rough, carpenter's hands. Yours may say something entirely different to you.

My multitude of the heavenly host consists of one angel, this year. One angel who's wearing a particularly gaudy pink robe, at that. It's okay. Sometimes, one angel is all you need. I try to remind myself that she wore what she had on hand, as many of us do. I like to think that the other angels and the missing king took a look at the throng that had assembled to greet the new baby and went off to take their gifts of comfort and joy to someone who didn't have any, otherwise.

And I like to think that I have two baby Jesus figures this year to remind me of the simple abundance that fills my life every day – with love and happiness and memories and peace.

That's my Christmas wish for you this year, dear readers. That you have something in your life that reminds you of the many blessings you have. Or, if you feel you haven't many this year, that the lone king and the other angels are on their way to you. That somewhere, somehow, even in the darkest of years, you recognize that a star dances in the night. It will bring us goodness and light. Happy holidays.

As we come down from a very busy northern Michigan fall, we have time to take a little breath before Christmas. For the outdoor folks this time can be a letdown as most wish it could have been longer. For the game warden, there is a sigh of relief and a time for recovery. Sometimes I am just happy I survived. During this recovery time I reflect on what has changed over the years. I have some concerns about what the future of hunting and fishing will bring and the future of northeast Michigan and our state. It is human nature to place blame on all of the changes that are going on around us. It is a little more difficult to place credit.

I reflect on people who have made a difference, as I see it. One person that comes to mind and deserves credit is the late George Byelich, former Michigan State University Extension agent for Alcona County. He is one of the true heroes of Alcona County. George worked tirelessly to promote our area and its people. I have been to many functions where George led a program or gave amazing speeches. There is one thing he said that has stuck with me. It was not part of a meeting, but simply an off-the-cuff remark he made while leaving a breakfast meeting. He turned around, pointed at me and said, "Never pass up the opportunity to stop at a kid's lemonade stand."

That simple statement hit me like a punch and has made a profound mark on my very soul.

The future of everything we know lies in the hands of our youth. At times we choose to say some pretty harsh things about our future leaders, yet our youth is our creation, what they do is what we teach them. "We" means all of us. The child with the lemonade stand, given the right encouragement, could be our next successful business owner. This child ignored and discouraged may end up a societal burden. The child who makes the hard choice to do what is right instead of what looks popular could be our president someday. For me, the young person I contact in the field could be the next generation's wildlife or resource manager.

This deer season I had two contacts with youths that impacted me. One such contact started last year during deer season, when I was working with my lieutenant. At a blind, I ran into a grandfather and grandson deer hunting. The grandson didn't bring his hunter's orange with him; he knew it was his responsibility and was feeling pretty bad. Grandpa had let him wear his hunter's orange hat out to the blind, but after a short time he needed it back to keep his head warm. There were a couple of ways I could have handled

Just then I remembered the hunter's education program had given us a handful of youth-size orange vests to hand out if needed. I remember thinking, when they gave them to me, "another waste of money and my time." Like the two old guys in the theater from The Muppets, "grumble, grumble." My lieutenant had on one of these vests. He took it off and gave it to the youth, and we left them with a reminder to bring their safety equipment. This year I ran into the same hunters and I was reminded of the prior year's contact. I was told that the vest that we gave him is now an important part of his hunting gear. I was also told that this youth is now the hunter's orange enforcer.

The second youth contact came at a very inopportune time for me. It was the opening day of deer season and I was just leaving an "issue"

that was not very pleasant for all involved. I was there two hours longer than I planned and I had a lot to do before noon. I had the state wildlife epidemiologist, Dr. O'Brien, out of Lansing riding with me and we had plans for additional research and data collection. In our haste to leave the area we ran into a very proud father of a 14year-old that just shot a very nice eight-point buck. The father asked us if we would do the honor of congratulating the boy. My chest fell as I let all of the air out of my lungs, thinking of all the things I had to do — taking the time to walk to the back side of a property was not one of them.

Then, in my head I heard George say, "Never pass up the opportunity to stop at a kid's lemonade stand." I regrouped and said to the dad. "I would be honored to." After our contact with the boy I apologized to Dr. O'Brien. He looked at me and said, "That was the most important thing we had to do at that moment." I found out later the 14-year-old boy and his dad thought that our contact was a pretty big deal. I also found out that the 14-year-old is the descendant of Alcona County's first game warden. For me, that was a very big deal. It would have been a shame to have missed that.

We go through our everyday lives thinking that the big things we do are so important. We go through our lives with so much noise in our heads that we fail to hear and see what is important to those who are going to run our world someday. I think back when I was a child and the defining moments and imprinted memories. Very few of them involve something big. I remember bobber fishing from the end of a dock. I remember back yard camping. I remember my first rabbit hunt where I could carry the BB gun. I remember when the local game warden shook my hand and called me by my name simple, easy and free.

I think back about people like George. He understood that it's the simple interactions we have that can make the biggest impact. He knew that an hour spent ice fishing with a child can be huge in that child's life and a real memory maker. Time spent with them snowshoeing or sledding down a hill, or sitting around a simple backyard winter campfire can create years of fond reminiscing. Nothing big, nothing fancy, just time spent with our future leaders. Thank you, George, for pointing out "the lemonade stand" to me.

Getting anxious for thick enough ice to head out fishing? Consider using the following tips when targeting four species popular with anglers in the winter.

Walleye

Early-ice walleyes are known to be active and aggressive. Use tip-ups at varying depths around the lake (anywhere from 15 to 35 feet deep) to appeal to this species. Regardless of the depth, always set the live minnow under the tip-up to swim 12 to 15 inches off the bottom.

Crappie

Consider using plastic bait, rather than live bait, when fishing for crappie. Focus on weed lines to find them. A lot of times crappie will hang out in the middle of the water column, halfway between the ice and bottom.

Northern Pike

You'll find these aggressive fish near offshore structures and weed lines, so try

Getting anxious for thick these types of spots on your ough ice to head out fish-favorite pike lakes first.

Yellow Perch

Attract bigger perch by using tip-ups with minnows, that's what they're primarily eating this time of year. Sticking a minnow on an ice fishing rod is also very productive

- Higgins Lake: Ice is trying to form but windy conditions keep blowing the ice out.
- Houghton Lake: Is making ice however, there are no shanties on the lake yet. Anglers are starting to fish off the north end of the East Bay.
- Lake Margrethe: Has ice and rumors of anglers out fishing.
- Rifle River: Is iced over but no safe ice yet.

Preliminary reports show fiream season had its challenges

Michigan's 2013 firearm deer season has wrapped up and challenging conditions and lower deer numbers in some areas have likely led to fewer deer being taken this year, according to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

Firearm season deer check-station activity declined in all regions of the state compared to 2012.

Each year the DNR generates preliminary estimates of the firearm deer harvest shortly after the season closes on November 30. Those estimates are replaced by a rigorous assessment of harvest and participation over all deer seasons using an annual hunter mail survey.

The 2013 firearm deer season harvest appears to have decreased in all regions this year, but particularly in the Upper Peninsula and southern Lower Peninsula. Experiences can differ widely within regions; DNR biologists estimate the harvest (compared to 2012) was down perhaps 15 to 20 percent across the Upper Peninsula, decreased only slightly in the northern Lower Peninsula, and declined perhaps 10 percent in the southern Lower Penin-

"Deer populations in the Upper Peninsula are feeling the effects of late and heavy snowfall last winter, and in some areas of southern Michigan are still recovering from an extensive outbreak of epizootic hemorrhagic disease two summers ago," said Brent Rudolph, DNR Wildlife Division Deer and Elk Program leader.

"A new antler point restriction in 12 counties of the northern Lower Peninsula has added protection for young bucks," said Ashley Autenrieth, Wildlife Division deer biologist for the northern regions, "so we expected buck harvest in that region to be lower for at least a year."

Severe weather conditions, warmer-than-average temperatures and concentrations of standing corn that provide secure cover for deer also contributed to adverse hunting conditions in some locations. A recent national survey highlighted that persistence pays off, particularly when conditions are not ideal.

Rudolph stressed the importance of cooperation with Michigan's hunter harvest survey, which he called "a vital tool for Michigan's deer program, and an important way in which data provided by hunters contributes to our information base."

Hunters that do not receive a survey in the mail but wish to provide their hunting and harvest information may visit www.michigan.gov/deer and select the Deer Harvest Reporting Form link. Hunters should only provide this information once they have completed all of their 2013 hunting activities, including seasons open through as late as January 1, 2014.

Michigan motorcycle helmet use drops to 73 percent

Nearly three-quarters of motorcycle riders in Michigan wear helmets, down from 99.4 percent in 2006 when the last statewide observation survey was conducted.

The most recent survey was conducted throughout the summer by the Wayne State University Transportation Research Group.

This rate closely mirrors the 74.7 percent helmet use rate among crash-involved motorcyclists.

"While Michigan's helmet law has been modified, riders are strongly encouraged to always wear safety gear and be seen by wearing high-visibility gear or clothing," said Michael L. Prince, director of the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning.

Helmet use was highest for those riding sport bikes at 94.5 percent. It was lowest for riders of choppers and custom bikes at 33.3 percent. Women were more likely to wear a helmet at 59.6 percent, compared to men at 55.2 percent. Riders 60 and older had the highest helmet use rate at 70 percent, while riders 30 to 59 years old had the lowest use rate at 50.8 percent.

Michigan's mandatory helmet law was modified in the spring of 2012. To legally ride without a helmet, a motorcycle operator must meet all the following criteria:

- Be at least 21 years old.
- Have at least \$20,000 in first-party medical benefits.
- Have held a motorcycle endorsement for at least two years or have passed an approved motorcycle safety

The law also allows motorcycle passengers to ride without a helmet as long as they meet all the following criteria:


- Are at least 21 years old.
- Have at least \$20,000 in first-party medical benefits insurance in addition to the insurance that is required of the motorcycle operator.

A person younger than 21 years old still must wear a helmet approved by the U.S. Department of Transportation when operating or riding on a motorcycle.

Even though the mall was immense, I had seen them periodically here and there, happily participating in the pre-holiday shopping experience. It was difficult not to overhear bits and pieces of their conversation as they talked about the various bargains they got, items they purchased for people on their lists and establishing a strategy for the rest of the afternoon.

I remember that feeling. I remember reveling in the excitement of purchasing gifts and keeping secrets to be revealed on Christmas day. I remember the enjoyment of decorating, planning special meals and looking forward to writing personal messages in Christmas cards. I remember the pleasure of celebrating Christmas and looking forward to a New Year filled with hope and a thrill of the unknown.

That was before.

Advancing through life we experience defining moments that mark passage onto the next phase of our lives – some are positive events like graduating from high school, getting married, becoming a parent, buying a house. Some of these moments aren't as positive and, as a result, we are forced to look at life in a completely different capacity.

The death of someone you are extremely close to – a child, a spouse, a parent, a sibling, even a dear friend – has a way of plunging you into a murky, all-encompassing feeling of emptiness. Anyone who has experienced this type of loss and resulting grief knows it is like being sucked

Eventually, the pain of breaking through ebbs and is overshadowed by memories some so strong they take your breath away; some are bittersweet that make you smile through tears.

I have not found that time heals. But, as time passes, the acute feeling of loss, sadness and loneliness does fade into a dull ache. Because of this experience, I have realized that my view of life - in all of its many facets - is forever changed. It is difficult to reclaim some things feelings primarily - and finding joy and peace during the holidays is very difficult. Every once in a while I'll feel a familiar spark, but even though I try, I can't seem to fan it enough to ignite more than a wisp of smoke reminiscent of something wonderful.

As I watched the ladies finish their lunch and happily traipse back into the crush of commercialism on steroids, I couldn't help but

feel envious of their enjoyment and, at the same time, sorrow for what may lay ahead in their path through life.

At some point in our lives, we become members of a club that no one wants to be in – a club that only someone who has experienced the kind of loss that comes from losing a child, spouse, parent, sibling or dear friend knows what it's like. Members of these clubs manage to get through the holidays and other meaningful calendar dates that used to be special and cause for celebration.

For those who are fortunate not to be members of these clubs, please be patient and understanding and, as much as possible, empathic to anyone who isn't joining in the celebration of the season. If you look closely, you'll see the sadness that floats in and around the joy and exuberance. Be kind, thoughtful and gently try to make new traditions that will help fill the void felt by someone you love and care about.

As a new member to this club, I am attempting to make my way to firmer ground by trying to focus on the positive aspects of my life – the love and unwavering support of my husband and close friends, the goofiness and unwavering loyalty of our canine crew, the stability and challenge of a job I enjoy, and the comfort and enjoyment of living close to the ever changing wildness in northern Michigan.

I am praying for peace within and peace for the many family members, friends and people I know who are members of a club they don't want to be in.

The buckless you

Forester

In Michigan, deer hunting is more than a sport, it's an age-old tradition. Thousands of hunters hit the woods every fall with the hopes of harvesting the buck of their dreams, or a nice doe for the freezer.

While Michigan is one of the most deer populated states in the union, not everyone ends up seeing their dreams come true. We all know the tale of the buckless Yooper, but nobody wants to be in his shoes.

I cannot comment as to whether native American rituals will improve your hunt, but proper forest management is sure to better your odds.

What exactly is proper forest management and how can it translate into putting more deer in your freezer? Proper forest management begins with assessing your woods and your goals. In this case, while timber types may be different from landowner to landowner, your goal is to provide better habitat for deer on your land. The formula for what makes good wildlife habitat can be rather complex. For deer, however, the most important factors are food and cover. These habitat factors can play very conveniently to your hunt as well.

First, let's discuss the food factor. Deer are notorious generalists -- they eat all kinds of plant material, but it has to be accessible; and the more plentiful the better. This is where forest management comes into play.

Let's say you have a stand of oak trees. Oak trees produce acorns and deer love acorns so it's all good right? Truthfully, your oaks are attracting deer, but they could be attracting more deer. A forester can help design a timber harvest that will diversify the types of acorns on your property as well as increase the overall supply of acorns.

By observing your trees from year to year and noting which are your best producers, you can then choose to provide more growing space for these productive oaks by harvesting less productive oaks. In turn, the productive oaks will seed in young oaks with the same productive genes. Furthermore, harvesting nearly any hardwood trees species results in stump sprouting. These stump sprouts provide excellent food for deer.

You are probably thinking what about food plots? Food plots are great ways to attract deer, but they're expensive and time consuming. The way I see it, nature has been feeding deer long before humans planted rye and clover. Sure, you can plant traditional plots if you'd like, but there is another option.

Imagine a food plot that maintained itself. It is possible if you go native. Some of Michigan's most common native shrubs are also preferred deer browse. As a bonus most of these shrubs are also great for game birds and other wildlife -- talk about an all around property improvement

Aside from food, deer need dense cover for bedding and to escape predators. Providing areas of dense cover is a great way to get deer out in the open on the edge of this cover as well. Deer are much more comfortable feeding in the open when the safety of cover is near by.

Harvesting aspen timber types is a great way to create a dense thicket of trees since thousands of new stems pop right back out of the roots following a timber harvest. Just think of that big buck feeding along the edge of that dense timber line... aren't you glad you called a forester and made it all possible?

Using a method of felling trees known as a hinge cut, low value trees can be converted into great cover seemingly over night. The best part about this method is that the trees cut will actually grow into multiple new trees over the next few years. If you can't believe that, I guess




you really do need to call a forester to find out how the heck such a thing can be

The most important thing a forester can do for you, when it comes to improving your hunting, is help you design a diverse array of habitats on your property. You would be surprised at how much you can do with a little land and some motivation.

Here's to you my buckless friend, may your next hunt be more successful. Call your local conservation district to get completely free forest management advice and on site consultations.



Consumers Energy receives recertification for Wildlife at Work Program

Consumers Energy has been recognized for protecting endangered species and other wildlife at its 11 hydro generating facilities on the AuSable, Manistee and Muskegon rivers.

Tippy Dam on the Manistee River and other Consumers Energy hydro facilities, received recertification by the Michigan Wildlife Council. The Wildlife Habitat Council (WHC) awarded the maximum three-year Wildlife at Work recertification to the company for its wildlife enhancement projects.

Consumers Energy's Tippy Dam, which serves as the only-known bat hibernaculum in the Lower Peninsula and one of the largest in Michigan, received runnerup honors for the WHC Bat Conservation Award. The national award recognizes projects that actively manage bat habitat through restoration or protection projects that include public outreach and educational opportuni-

During the recertification process, WHC biologists rated Consumers Energy's facilities and employee efforts as exceptional. "There are more than 12,000 acres associated with our hydro dams, so we have significant potential to enhance natural resources along major Michigan rivers. Consumers Energy takes pride in being responsible environmental stewards as part of our promise to Michigan," said Rich Castle, Consumers Energy's natural resource administrator for hydro operations. "We're very appreciative of the recognition provided by the WHC recertification of our wildlife management efforts."

Federally-endangered wildlife species benefitting from the Consumers Energy projects are the Karner Blue butterfly, being managed on Muskegon River hydro properties, and the Indiana bat, which finds ideal hibernation

habitat in a spillway chamber at Tippy Dam on the Manistee River.

Other wildlife being helped by the projects recognized by the Wildlife at Work program include bluebirds, waterfowl, monarch butterflies, raptors and the eastern pipistelle, a bat species of special interest in Michigan.

Oscoda Boy Scout Troop 913 constructed 12 bluebird nest boxes to replace damaged boxes at Consumers Energy's Mio, Alcona, Loud, Five Channels. Cooke and Foote dams.

'We work cooperatively with others interested in conservation to achieve a common goal of implementing projects that enhance wildlife populations. These groups include Boy Scouts, resource agencies and conservation advocates," Castle said. "We recognize and thank these organizations for their vital role in helping wildlife thrive near our hydro generating properties."



StarWatch By Gary Becker - Finger Angles: A "Handy" Device

The day or night sky that we see above our heads is called the celestial sphere, and as such, measurements made against it must be realized as angles—degrees, minutes, and seconds of arc. The sky at your local horizon is a circle which contains 360 degrees. The angular measure of an arc extended upward from the horizon and passing through the zenith to the opposite horizon equals 180 degrees. You can't say with any accuracy that the bright meteor which you have just seen was about "two feet in length" because there is no conversion between feet and degrees. Besides, who carries a ruler and flashlight with them in their hip pockets? However, with angular measurements, you are always carrying a "handy" pocket device which will allow for relatively accurate results. It is your fingers and fist held at arm's length that can do the trick. As an example, if you make your hand into a loose fist with your thumb on top, the angular distance that your fist will subtend at arm's length is about 10 degrees. Nine fists should make it from the horizon, the horizontal, to the zenith, the point directly over your head. You can stack one fist on top of the other, but just make sure that the fist that is being stacked upon does not "hammer down" the fist on the bottom. The lower fist must remain stationary, while the other fist is being put on top of it. In addition, you can spread you thumb and pinky finger into a wide "V" or rabbit ears with the three middle fingers folded down to obtain an angular measurement of 20 degrees, as wide as the hand can be stretched. Again, your fingers would be at arm's length. Hold your three middle fingers side by side to obtain an angular measurement of just five degrees. Finally, the pinky held at arm's length represents an angle of just one degree. Try measuring the angular size of that great big full moon in the sky with just your pinky finger, and I guarantee you'll be amazed by the result. www.astronomy.org

Safeguarding your documents

Dollars And Sense **By David Uffington**

What would happen to your family's photo memories if your home was damaged by tornado, hurricane, fire or flood? Answer: They could be gone forever, unless you've taken steps to safeguard the information.

Photos aren't the only thing that could be damaged. Marriage certificate, college diploma, mortgage loan documents and passports are among the household items most likely left in their paper form, for two reasons: We either want to see them frequently, or we want them nearby in case we need them.

If you have most of your important documents on paper, you're not alone. In a recent survey, 87 percent of participants say their documents are on paper. Damage or destruction isn't the only thing that can happen to paper documents; they can also

just disappear in the stacks of memorabilia of the average home, making them hard to

Our fascination with paper items comes from a desire to hold on to the past -- in its original form. While 50 percent of us see the benefits of converting our documents to digital forms, we don't believe that paper will completely disappear from our lives.

It takes a bit of work, but there are ways to ensure that favorite keepsakes and necessary documents don't vanish:

• Make color copies of documents and keep the original in a bank box. With tax records, store the originals in the bank box. (Sign up a trusted friend or family member who will keep the second key to the box.) Include a list of credit-card numbers and 800-numbers in case you have a loss. Don't

put the original of your will in a bank box, as the account may be frozen at your death.

• Scan your documents onto CD and store that in a bank box.

• Fireproof safe -- Look for one with at least an hour rating. Ideally it can be bolted to the floor in a closet.

• Cloud storage -- You scan and upload your documents to the "ether," somewhere out there on the Internet across multiple servers and locations. Consider whether you really want your Social Security number and other important information "out there." Better bet: Use cloud storage for photos only.

While you're sorting documents, consider whether it's time to invest in a shredder (confetti, not strip type) and get rid of old documents such as mortgage papers to homes you no longer own and very old tax documents.



MOMENTS IN TIME

The History Channel

• On Jan. 2, 1811, Timothy Pickering, a Federalist from Massachusetts, becomes the first U.S. senator to be censured when the Senate approves a motion against him. Pickering was accused of violating congressional law by publicly revealing secret documents.

On Dec. 30, 1862, the U.S.S. Monitor sinks in a storm off Cape Hatteras, N.C. Just nine months earlier, the ship had been part of a revolution in naval warfare when the ironclad dueled to a standstill with Virginia C.S.S. (Merrimack) -- the first time two ironclads faced each other in a naval engagement.

• On Jan. 5, 1920, the New York Yankees major-league baseball club announces its purchase of the heavy-hitting outfielder George Herman "Babe" Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for the sum of \$125,000. The deal paid off as Ruth went on to smash his own home run record in 1920, hitting 54 homers.

• On Jan. 1, 1946, on the island of Corregidor, in Manila Bay, 20 Japanese soldiers approach a lone soldier -- literally waving a white flag. The soldiers had been living in an underground tunnel and only discovered that the war was over by reading it in the

newspaper.

• On Jan. 3, 1967, Jack Ruby, the Dallas nightclub owner who killed the alleged assassin of President John F. Kennedy, dies of cancer in a Dallas hospital. The Texas Court of Appeals recently had overturned his death sentence for the murder of Lee Harvey Oswald and was scheduled to grant him a new trial.

• On Jan. 4, 1974, President Richard Nixon refuses to hand over tape recordings and documents that had been subpoenaed by the Senate Watergate Committee. Nixon would resign from office in disgrace eight months later.

• On Dec. 31, 1984, Bernhard Goetz, the white man dubbed the "subway vigilante" after he shot four young black men on a New York City subway train, turns himself in at a police station in Concord, N.H. Goetz claimed that the men, all of whom had criminal records, were trying to rob him and that he had acted in self-defense.
