Storm wreaks havoc in Barton City

The severe thunderstorm that moved through northeast Michigan last Thursday afternoon caused quite a bit of damage in Barton City and the surrounding area.

According to Alcona County 911 Dispatch Director Jeff Brackett, calls started coming in on July 18 around 2 p.m. with reports of trees across roadways and electrical wires down causing power outages.

Brackett said the storm angled across the county in a northwest to southeast direction – "from the top left of the county to the bottom right. It came through Curran and Barton City, with the most damage in the Jewell Lake area."

Barton City Fire Chief Rodney Cordes said volunteer fire fighters worked primarily within the "city limits" of Barton City identifying power lines down for Consumers Energy and also checking on residents to make sure they were safe. "We went around door-todoor to make sure everyone was okay," Cordes said. "No one was injured – at least to my knowledge."

Cordes said the storm brought "excessive" wind and hail along with heavy rain. "I saw 50 cent piece-sized hail... and after an hour and a half it was still on the ground." The wind, Cordes said, was in a "straight line... trees were blown over, not twisted out of the ground" and therefore doesn't think it was a tor-

New forester available to help landowners

Landowners in Alcona and Iosco counties have a new forester available to answer any of their forestry related questions.

Andrew Beebe has been named the new Forestry Assistance Program (FAP) forester for Alcona and Iosco counties and he's looking forward to serving the community.

Beebe, who is filling a vacancy left by forester John St. Pierre, was appointed to the position through a grant provided by the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development. The grant is renewed annually, but since Beebe is filling the vacancy, he will serve out the months left by St. Pierre plus one year.

Beebe grew up in the Waterloo Recreation Area of Jackson County, Mich. and spent his days as a young boy camping with his dad and spending plenty of time running through the swamps and forests with his dogs. Little did he know then the joys he was experiencing would help prepare him for a career he loves.

When he graduated from high school he wasn't quite sure what to do. He thought about following in his father's footsteps and do something with computers, but as he started looking at different colleges and exploring areas of interest he ran across Michigan Technology's Forestry Resource and Environmental Science program.

"I thought that sounded a lot more interesting than working with computers, I really had no interest in computers," Beebe said.

Beebe graduated from Michigan Technological University with a dual degree, one in forestry and the other in wildlife ecology and management.

With only a week under his belt in the position, Beebe is still trying to get acclimated with the area and the job. His duties include being available to answer any questions the public may have regarding forestry or trees. The grant funding the FAP program also has a certain amount of information Beebe must provide public such as publishing helpful articles in newspaper and magazines or television or radio spots at least six times a year.

Beebe has to be available

to do site visits, walking property with land owners. "I'll be finding out what the landowner's vision is for their property and what their goals are, why they bought it and what they're interested in and see where it can go from there," Beebe said. He will be able to get property owners useful information such as putting them in touch with a consulting forester, help them find state and federal cost sharing programs and assist in writing management plans.

"There is a number of state and federal cost sharing programs, like wildlife enhancement programs which include planting food plots and native nut and fruit producing trees," Beebe said.

Beebe explained the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). Under this program landowners can apply for financial assistance to hire a qualified Technical Service Provider (TSP) to write a management plan for their property. Private forest landowners are a large priority for NRCS and if it accepts a property owner's application it will allot a payment which can be used to pay the TSP for their

How to find the best medical information online

Dear Savvy Senior,

What are the best websites for finding reliable health information on the Internet? I usually do a Google search on a symptom, drug or health condition when I want to research something, but with so much information out there I'm not sure what I can trust. **Untrusting Senior**

Dear Untrusting,

You're wise not to believe everything you read, especially when it comes to health and medical information on the World Wide Web. To help you sort through the online clutter and locate reliable, trustworthy medical information, here are a few tips to follow, along with some top-rated sites you can always turn to with confidence.

As a general rule, health and medical information websites sponsored by the U.S. government, not-for-profit health or medical organizations, and university medical centers are the most reliable resources on the Internet.

While sites supported by forprofit companies, such as drug or insurance companies who may be trying to sell you their products, are usually not your best option.

To find out who's sponsoring a site and where the information came from, click on the "About Us" tab on the site's home page.

Also look for the red and blue "HONcode" seal at the bottom of each page, which means the site has credible information and is certified by the Health On the Net Foundation. However, government sponsored health sites don't have the seal.

Also be aware that good health and medical information changes all the time so check the date that information was published to make sure it's current. And, if you're doing research online before seeing a doctor, print your findings out on paper, including the site you got your information from, so you can review it together.

While there are dozens of

great websites that provide reliable, trustworthy, unbiased health and medical information, here are two of the best all-purpose sites that are easy to use.

· Medlineplus.gov: Sponsored by the National Institutes of Health and managed by the U.S. National Library of Medicine, MedlinePlus provides information on more than 900 diseases and conditions in their "Health Topics" section, and links to other trusted resources.

• It also provides a directory of hospitals, clinics and healthcare providers, a medical encyclopedia and medical dictionary, tutorials on common conditions, tests, and treatments, extensive information on prescription drugs, supplements and herbs, and links to thousands of clinical trials. It even offers a senior specific health (nihseniorhealth.gov) that

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

Thank you, Ms. Thomas

For those of us with a touch of ink in our veins, it's been a tough decade for heroes. In 2008 we lost Tim Russert; in 2009, Walter Cronkite and in 2011, Andy Rooney.

And now, Helen Thomas. I don't know that all reporters go to heaven, but they must go somewhere, and where ever it is, it's developing one heck of a press pool.

You may not have known this, but Helen Thomas, who passed away this week at the age of 92, grew up in Detroit, Mich. Her first work was for the (then) Eastern High School newspaper. She earned a degree in English from Wayne State University. Her parents were Lebanese immigrants and while her father could neither read nor write English, he strongly encouraged his 10 children to attend college. All of them did.

As a kid unusually exposed to the news, I first discovered Thomas when I was in fourth grade and she began covering the Kennedy White House for United Press International (UPI). At a time when Barbara Walters, Diane Sawyer and other female journalists were largely reporting on Mamie Eisenhower's mayonnaise recipe, Thomas – who started her career with UPI as a copy girl for \$17.50 a week -- was covering politics.


For most of my lifetime, she perched in the front row of the White House briefing room, looking more and more like a small great horned owl.

She was part of a small group of women who led me to an early conclusion about

Mr. President," at the end.
In the second term of the second Bush administration, the first question was transferred to the Public Broadcasting Corporation, perhaps because Thomas characterized George W. Bush in print as "the worst president we've ever had."

A better reporter than writer, Thomas was absolutely fearless when it came to the tough question. She understood the concept of the adversarial relationship better than most and once said, "I respect the office of the presidency but I never worship at the shrines of our public servants. They owe us the truth." Asked in an interview what the difference was between a tough question and a rude question, she said, "I don't think there are any rude questions.'

Many politicians seemed to agree. Toward the end of her career when Thomas posed a particularly pointed question to Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, Clinton laughed and said, "Oh Helen, I've missed you." President Barack Obama brought cupcakes to the briefing room to celebrate her 89th birthday.

Thomas broke a number of glass ceilings on behalf of women. She was the first woman assigned to the White House, the first female UPI bureau chief, the first female member of the Gridiron Club, the first female member of the Washington Press Association and its first female president.

She was the only female print reporter to accompany President Richard Nixon on his 1972 trip to China. Beyond that, she had a strong commitment to the sisterhood of the press. Sawyer, CNN's Candy Crowley and many other women in journalism spoke this weekend of the welcome and support she gave them.

"I was in my 20s when I was assigned to the (White House) beat," Crowley said. "Helen was one of the first to reach out. No one was nicer or more helpful," despite the fact that the two women were technically in competition for stories. "She was not about being the first woman to do this or that," Crowley said. "She was about making sure she was not the last woman to do this or that."

A strong liberal "from birth," as she described it,

Thomas believed in backing up her convictions. She resigned her position with UPI one day after the news agency was purchased by News World Communications, owned by Sun Myung Moon and the Unification Church in 1976, stating that while she wished the new owner well, she did not wish to work with or for him. Within weeks, she was writing for the Hearst Syndicate.

A longtime single woman, Thomas married fellow Associated Press reporter Douglas Cornell who predeceased her in 1982. On the subject of marriage, she said, "Who ever plans on falling in love? I certainly didn't have a two-track mind back then when I first started covering the White House. I didn't think it was possible to do the kind of work I loved to do and still be a wife... How wrong -- and how lucky -- I was."

In 2010, Thomas broke the paramount rule of reporting. For the length of a single sentence, she lost her objectivity in a public venue. Like several excellent reporters before her, that single sentence brought her to the end of a lifetime career. Speaking to a rabbi making a video, Thomas said that Israelis should "get the hell out of Palestine..." She apologized for her remarks a day later and resigned her position.

I suppose she may have misspoke. I also sincerely doubt it. She knew the rules of a lifetime, and she knew the kind of response the remark would receive. I suspect she stood in her truth and said what she believed, as she always had. And to paraphrase Voltaire, while I disagree with her statement, I will fight to the death for her right to make it.

But most of all, I hope Thomas will be remembered not just for that single sentence, but for her amazing body of work. For the inspiration she provided a lot of us would-be journalists and the trails she blazed for women working in what was originally a man's world.

Even after she asked the toughest of questions, even after she'd held one President or another's feet to the fire, Thomas never failed to say "Thank you, Mr. President."

Thank you, Ms. Thomas. To this wordsmith, anyway, you remain a hero.

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

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

Successful spring fish stocking season creates opportunities for anglers

The Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Fisheries Division stocked a total of 19,130,659 fish that weighed 664,338 pounds and consisted of eight different species and one hybrid.

To complete this task, it took 394 stocking trips to 729 stocking sites, with drivers travelling 106,235 miles in 2,648 hours using 17 specialized stocking trucks.

"It was another outstanding spring stocking season that will bring significant benefits and fishing opportuni-ties to Michigan," said DNR Fish Production Manager Gary Whelan. "Thanks to the hard work of our staff, we had minimal losses with this

year's fish and reached all of our target numbers."

The number and type of fish stocked varies by hatchery, as each location's ability to rear fish varies because of water supplies and temperature. In Michigan there are six state and two cooperative hatcheries that work together to produce the species, strain and size of fish needed by fisheries managers. These fish must then be delivered at a specific time and location for stocking to ensure their success. Each hatchery stocked the following fish this

• The Marquette State Fish Hatchery (near Marquette, Mich.) stocked 652,384 yearling lake trout, brook trout and splake (a cross of lake trout and brook trout) that in total weighed 66,791 pounds. This hatchery stocked a total of 118 inland and Great Lakes sites using 75 trips that required driving 22,924 miles

• The Thompson State Fish Hatchery (near Manistique, Mich.) stocked 4,463,232 fish that included walleye fry, yearling steelhead and brown trout, and spring fingerling Chinook salmon. These fish weighed 110,337 pounds in total. This hatchery stocked

over 541 hours.

88 sites (the majority on the Great Lakes) using 64 trips that required driving 17,808 miles over 488 hours.

• The Oden State Fish Hatchery (near Petoskey, Mich.) stocked 695,406 yearling brown trout and rainbow trout that in total weighed 102,312 pounds. This hatchery stocked 169 inland and Great Lakes sites using 74 trips that required driving 21,591 miles over 578 hours.

• The Harrietta State Fish Hatchery (in Harrietta, Mich.) stocked 1,109,046 yearling brown trout and rainbow trout that in total weighed 113,492 pounds. This hatchery stocked 280 sites (the majority were inland) using 98 trips that required driving 23,643 miles over 595 hours.

• The Platte River State Fish Hatchery (near Honor, Mich.) stocked 2,851486 that included walleye fry, yearling Atlantic salmon and coho salmon, and spring fingerling Chinook salmon that in total weighed 121,993 pounds. This hatchery stocked 37 sites (the majority on the Great Lakes) using 19 trips that required driving 7,412 miles over 183 hours.

 The Wolf Lake State Fish Hatchery (near Kalamazoo, that included walleye fry, yearling steelhead, and spring fingerling Chinook salmon that in total weighed 138,017 pounds. This hatchery stocked 54 sites (the majority on the Great Lakes) using 45 trips that required driving 1,857 miles over 304 hours.

 The cooperative teaching hatchery at Lake Superior State University (in Sault Saint Marie, Mich.) stocked 35,000 Atlantic salmon weighing 6,023 pounds into the St. Marys River.

"It requires a huge amount of coordination, expertise and hard work to plan, rear and stock fish in Michigan waters," said Fisheries Division Chief Jim Dexter. "We are very fortunate to have a remarkable group of people who work very hard every year to deliver exceptionally highquality fish. Their efforts help pump between \$1.6 billion and \$4.2 billion into the state's economy through the sportfishing industry.

Fish are reared in Michigan's state fish hatcheries anywhere from one month to one and a half years before they are stocked.

It should be noted that some hatcheries will provide Mich.) stocked 9,323,605 fish fish for a few additional stockings to be made this fall consisting of brook trout, Atlantic salmon, lake sturgeon and muskellunge. The lake sturgeon will come from the DNR's cooperative hatchery in Tower that is operated with Michigan State University.

As of January 1, 2000, Section 578 of Public Law 106-65 of the National Defense Authorization Act mandates that the United States Armed Forces shall provide the rendering of honors in a military funeral for any eligible veteran if requested by his or her family.

As mandated by federal law, an honor guard detail for the burial of an eligible

Anyone who served in the veteran shall consist of no less than two members of the Armed Forces. One member of the detail shall be a representative of the parent armed service of the deceased veteran. The honor guard detail will, at a minimum, perform a ceremony that includes the folding and presenting of the flag of the United States to the next of kin and the sounding of "taps."

one term of enlistment or period of initial obligated service in the Selected Reserve and departed under conditions other than dishonorable.

• Former military members discharged from the Selected Reserve due to a disability incurred or aggravated in the line of duty.

Verifying eligibility

The preferred method for verifying eligibility is the DD Form 214, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty. If the DD Form 214 is not available, any discharge document showing other than dishonorable service can be used.

Requesting Military Funeral Honors

Families of eligible veterans request funeral honors through their funeral director. The funeral director will contact the appropriate military service (Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force or Coast Guard) to arrange for the funeral honors detail.

Graveside military honors include the firing of three volleys each by seven service members. This commonly is confused with an entirely separate honor, the 21-gun salute. But the number of individual gun firings in both honors evolved the same way.

The three volleys came from an old battlefield custom. The two warring sides would cease hostilities to clear their dead from the battlefield, and the firing of three volleys meant that the dead had been properly cared for and the side was ready to resume the battle.

The 21-gun salute traces its roots to the Anglo-Saxon empire, when seven guns constituted a recognized naval salute, as most naval vessels had seven guns. Because gunpowder in those days could be more easily stored on land than at sea, guns on land could fire three rounds for every one that could be fired by a ship at sea.

Later, as gunpowder and storage methods improved, salutes at sea also began using 21 guns. The United States at first used one round for each state, attaining the 21-gun salute by 1818. The nation reduced its salute to 21 guns in 1841, and formally adopted the 21-gun salute at the suggestion of the British in 1875.

Arlington National Cemetery follows an "order of arms" protocol to determine the number of guns to be used in a salute. A president, ex-president or foreign head of state is saluted with 21 guns. A vice president, prime minister, secretary of defense or secretary of the Army receives a 19-gun salute. Flag officers receive salutes of 11 to 17 guns, depending on their rank. The rounds are fired one at a time.

The bugle call "taps" originated in the Civil War with the Army of the Potomac. Union Army Brig. Gen. Daniel Butterfield didn't like the bugle call that signaled soldiers in the camp to put out the lights and go to sleep, and worked out the melody of "taps" with his brigade bugler, Pvt. Oliver Wilcox Norton. The call later came into another use as a figurative call to the sleep of death for soldiers.





StarWatch By Gary Becker - Two Gems in Sagittarius

Two weeks ago, I spoke about Scorpius the Scorpion, with its reddish heart star, Antares, dominating the southern sky around 11 p.m. Far off to the right of Antares is Saturn in the SW. Follow the body of the Scorpion as it curves to the left to form the tail and stinger. To Scorpius' left lies Sagittarius the Archer. If you witness a centaur, resplendent with bow and arrow drawn to kill Scorpius, may I suggest therapy; however, if you see a really cool teapot complete with handle, lid, and spout, you'll be visualizing something which is considerably easier to see. A map is available at the URL below. One of my favorite open clusters of the heavens, M7, is located between the tail of the Scorpion and the spout of the teapot. If dark enough skies prevail, it is an easy naked eye target, especially if viewed with averted vision. The problem is its closeness to the horizon, only 15 degrees at its highest point (40 degrees N. latitude). View at 11 p.m. Often M7 goes unnoticed behind trees and buildings, or blends with pockets of horizon hugging light pollution and haze. Binoculars will reveal this gem with its stars splattered over a region nearly six times the area of the full moon. Its size is certainly a function of its closeness to the Earth, only 1000 light years distant. M7's age has been estimated to be about 220 million years. You cannot view M7 without taking in the beauty of its slightly fainter neighbor, M6, above and to the right. At a distance of 1500 light years, M6 is a more concentrated grouping of stars than M7. It is also about half of M7's age. Open clusters are sites where star generation has occurred. They differ from the older, larger globular clusters which formed in galaxies during the rough and tumble early days of the universe. Some astronomers believe that globulars were actually the first galaxies to form, and then were cannibalized into the larger galactic structures that we see today. www.astronomy.org



MOMENTS IN TIME The History Channel

- On Aug. 11, 1856, a hurricane hits Isle Derniere, a resort community on the Louisiana coast, killing more than 400 people. 




