

Halloween events and construction underway in Harrisville State Park

Anyone who wants to get their ghou on early and celebrate the upcoming ghostly season will have a chance this weekend at the Harrisville State Park.

Anyone who dares to venture into the park this weekend and through the month will have a chance to see some of the new additions being built there as well.

The park is hosting a Haunted Halloween Weekend beginning Friday, Oct. 11 with spooky tales at the camp host site at 8 p.m.

On Saturday, Oct. 12 the park will be busy all afternoon and into the evening as the activities – supported by many local businesses and individuals – get underway at the day use/picnic area of the park with kids games from 2 to 4 p.m. There will be pumpkin bowling, pumpkin decorating, Halloween crafts, spider ring toss, bean bag toss, fishing for goblins, ghouling golf and more. Prizes will be awarded to participating youth. Kids may trick or treat in the park from 5-6 p.m. and will see many campsites decorated for the in-park contest.

The spooky portion of the weekend will be held from 7:30 to 10 p.m. and feature a haunted trail ride which will feature the creative talents of park staff and local businesses as various areas of the park will be designed to scare anyone who dares to participate. The ride will begin and end at the day use/picnic area where a bon fire and snacks will be available for survivors who make it through.

“We have about six businesses that will have areas decorated along the ride,” explained park supervisor Eric Ostrander. “Last year we had a few more, but the winners from last year – Jack’s Garage and Mr. Ed’s IGA – are back again this year. It does take a lot of work to set up, but everyone is pretty creative... We do have room if

any more businesses want to get involved yet this week.

“This is what I call our ‘scamper week.’ We have a lot of things to complete this week... The park staff has been working on this project as well as the equipment building project for some time. Camp hosts Nancy and Jack Lindell will start the weekend with spooky tales and Saturday should be a lot of fun. This is open to anyone in the area – not just our campers,” he said.

Park employees have been constructing a 4,000 square foot cold storage building located near the park headquarters since mid-August. This week, according to Ostrander, the concrete will be poured for the floor.

“This building was really needed,” Ostrander said. “We took on a lot of heavy equipment when the Oscoda field office closed (in 2007) and because we’ve been short on space, per the norm, much of the equipment has been sitting outside in the weather since then.”

The second construction project is a new restroom and shower building that is expected to be completed by Memorial Day 2014. “This has been a plan for at least 10 years or more,” Ostrander said. “We’ve needed to have some new buildings in the park for years, but there hasn’t been funding available to see that happen... Part of the money to pay for the new construction is from the Recreation Passport program that was put into effect several years ago.

“Once the new bathroom building is completed we will be tearing down the two old bathroom buildings... The south toilet building was constructed in the 1930s and the north toilet building was built in the 1950s. We will be using some of the field stone from the south building by incorporating it into some landscaping around the new building to retain some of the history of the park and local masons who worked on the

Foot Dam open in time for fall enthusiasts

Consumers Energy's Foote Dam access site on the AuSable River has reopened.

The tailwater access site located near Oscoda had been closed since May for a construction project to upgrade the site, repair a sheet pile wall and improve safety for visitors. The site reopened October 3.

“Consumers Energy is pleased to report the access site is now open, and, more importantly, the project was completed safely,” said Richard Castle, the utility's natural resource manager for hydro generation. “Many anglers will welcome this opportunity to take advantage of the wonderful fall and winter fishery here still this season. Users of the tailwater

access have been patient throughout this project, and we're pleased to offer anglers a beautiful location to enjoy the picturesque AuSable River in a safe environment.”

Minor construction activity will continue, such as sign installation and cleanup, and site users are urged to exercise caution and maintain awareness of their surroundings while visiting the Foote Dam tailwater access.

The project design was developed in consultation with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and reviewed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses and regulates Consumers Energy hydro facilities.

The access site, operated under a lease agreement by the Michigan DNR, draws anglers from throughout Michigan's Lower Peninsula.

Foote Dam was completed in 1917 and has been operated as a run-of-river dam since it received a new 40-year FERC operating license in 1994. The powerhouse includes three turbine-generators capable of producing about 30 million kilowatt-hours of electricity annually.

Consumers Energy's 13 hydroelectric dams have the capacity to generate approximately 130 megawatts of renewable electricity at facilities on the AuSable, Manistee, Muskegon, Grand and Kalamazoo rivers. The reservoirs created by the dams provide recreational opportunities. Nearly 12,000 acres of Consumers Energy land adjacent to the dams and the reservoirs are open to the public.

Consumers Energy, Michigan's largest utility, is the principal subsidiary of CMS Energy (NYSE: CMS), providing natural gas and electricity to 6.6 million of the state's 10 million residents in all 68 Lower Peninsula counties.

come, be within 200 percent of the poverty guidelines and/or be TANF eligible.

The program requires 10 hours of financial skills education and four to six hours of asset-specific training to help prepare participants for their asset purchases. Account holders save for their chosen asset and the program matches their savings on a 3:1 (home ownership) and 2:1 (education and business) ratio. Maximum savings amount to be matched is \$1,000. Help for seniors who are drowning in clutter

Dear Savvy Senior,
My 67-year-old mother's house has become a cluttered mess. Since my father died a few years ago, her house is so disorganized and messy with stuff that it's becoming a hazard. I think she has a hoarding problem. What can I do?

Worried Daughter

Dear Worried,
Compulsive cluttering is a problem that effects up to five percent of Americans – many of whom are seniors – with problems ranging anywhere from mild messiness to hoarding so severe it may be related to a mental health disorder like obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD). Here's what you should know, along with some tips and resources that can help your mom.

The reasons most people hoard are because they have an extreme sentimental attachment to their posses-

sions, or they believe they might need their items at a later date. Hoarding may also be a sign that an older person is depressed, or showing early symptoms of dementia.

Common problems for seniors who live in excessive clutter are tripping, falling and breaking a bone; overlooking bills and missing medications that are hidden in the clutter; and suffering from the environmental effects of mold, mildew and dust, and even living among insects and rodents.

To get a handle on your mom's problem, the Institute for Challenging Disorganization offers a free "Clutter Hoarding Scale" that you can download off their website at challengingdisorganization.org.

If you find that your mom has only a mild cluttering problem, there are a number of things you can do to help.

Start by having a talk with her, respectfully expressing

your concern for her health and safety, and offering your assistance to help her declutter.

If she takes you up on it, most professional organizers recommend decluttering in small steps. Take one room at a time or even a portion of a room at a time. This will help prevent your mom from getting overwhelmed.

Before you start, designate three piles or boxes for your mom's stuff – one pile is for items she wants to keep-and-put-away, another is the donate pile and the last is the throwaway pile.

You and your mom will need to determine which pile her things belong in as you work. If your mom struggles with sentimental items that she doesn't use, like her husband's old tools or mother's china for example, suggest she keep only one item for memory sake and donate the rest to family members who will use them.

You will also need to help her set up a system for organizing the kept items and new possessions.

If you need some help with the decluttering and organizing, consider hiring a professional organizer who can come to your mom's home to help you prioritize, organize and remove the clutter. The nonprofit group National Association of Professional Organizers has a directory on the website at napo.net to help you locate an expert in your area.

If she has a bigger, more serious hoarding problem (if her daily functioning is impaired, or if she is having financial difficulties, health problems, or other issues because of her hoarding) you'll need to seek professional help. Antidepressants and/or talk therapy can help address control issues, anxiety, depression, and other feelings that may underline hoarding tendencies, and

make it easier for her to confront her disorder.

To learn more and find professional help see the OCD Foundation (ocfoundation.org/hoarding) which provides a hoarding center on their website that offers information, resources, treatments, self-help groups, and more. Also see hoardingcleanup.com, a site that has a national database of qualified resources including cleaning companies and therapists that can help.

building," Ostrander said. He explained the Recreation Passport program allows anyone who owns a motor vehicle to purchase an annual pass that allows them to enter and use any of the state park facilities across Michigan. The Recreation Passport can be purchased at any state park or, as Ostrander advised, at any Secretary of State Office. "There is a perks program that goes along with the Recreation Passport - where over 1,200 businesses across the state give discounts to people who have the passport... we have a list in the office of the businesses in the surrounding counties who offer discounts. More can be found on the state website," Ostrander said.

All of the Halloween events at the park are free and open to anyone, however, a Recreation Passport or entry fee is required to access the park. 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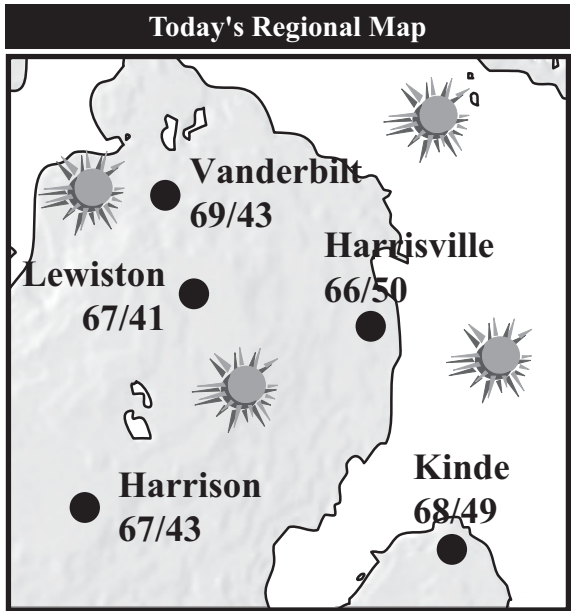

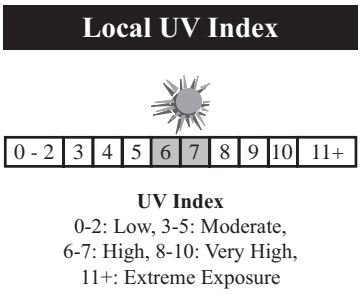

StarWatch By Gary Becker - StarWatch By Gary Becker - Venus and the Moon Together Again

In astronomy it can be honestly said that what goes around almost always comes back around. The sky is full of repeating patterns, and early sky watchers mastered these designs and brought order to the heavens as well as to the Earth in the form of calendars and other timekeeping devices. They regulated agriculture, government, and religion. On October 8 a configuration repeats a September 8 design that was well observed around the world. Both the moon and Venus will again share the spotlight in the darkening evening sky. The moon revolves eastward around the Earth in a period of 27.3 days. While that is happening, the Earth continues trekking around the sun, causing the sun and Venus to move in an eastward direction among the background stars. When the moon finally completes its orbit around the Earth, it has a little catching up to do, not quite three days' worth, in order for the configuration to repeat itself. This time, when the moon passes Venus on October 8, it will be positioned above the Goddess of Love because the moon's track is tilted about eight degrees to the orbital path of Venus. The conjunction of Venus and the moon on the 8th will not be nearly as close as it was last month, but it will still be a very beautiful apparition. Be at your observing location with a good SW horizon about 30 minutes after sundown. The 18 percent lit, waxing crescent moon should be an easy target. Look underneath the moon and ever so slightly to its right to find starlike Venus. Binoculars will always make the viewing experience more enjoyable, but they will not be a necessary requirement for this super bright pair to be seen. Check the sky on October 7, and you'll see Luna approaching Venus. On November 6, December 5, and January 2, about 30 minutes after sundown, the cycle repeats itself, but Venus and the moon will be slightly farther apart. Next week, a lunar eclipse comes to the East Coast. www.astronomy.org

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MOMENTS IN TIME The History Channel

- On Oct. 26, 1825, the Erie Canal opens, connecting the Great Lakes with the Atlantic Ocean via the Hudson River. Built in only two years, 83 canal locks accommodated the 500-foot rise in elevation. The canal was 363 miles long, 40 feet wide and 4 feet deep. In nine years, tolls had paid back the cost of construction.

- On Oct. 25, 1861, the keel of the Union ironclad Monitor is laid at Greenpoint, N.Y. The vessel -- 172 feet long and 41 feet wide -- had a low profile, rising only 18 inches above the water. The ship had a draft of less than 11 feet so it could operate in the shallow harbors and rivers of the South.

- On Oct. 27, 1904, the New York City subway opens. The first line, operated by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company (IRT), traveled 9.1 miles through 28 stations. That evening, the subway opened to the general public, and more than 100,000 people paid a nickel each to take their first ride under Manhattan.

- On Oct. 24, 1945, the United Nations Charter, which was adopted and signed on June 26, takes effect and is ready to be enforced. Representatives of 50 nations attended the first conference.

- On Oct. 21, 1959, on New York City's Fifth Avenue, thousands of people line up outside a bizarrely shaped white concrete building that resembled a giant upside-down cupcake. It was opening day at the new Guggenheim Museum, home to one of the world's top collections of contemporary art.

- On Oct. 22, 1962, President John F. Kennedy announces that the Soviet Union has placed nuclear weapons in Cuba and that the United States will establish military blockade to prevent any other offensive weapons from entering the island nation just 90 miles from the Florida Keys.

- On Oct. 23, 1989, a series of explosions sparked by an ethylene gas leak at a plastics factory in Pasadena, Texas, kills 23 people. Approximately 85,000 pounds of highly flammable ethylene-isobutane gas were released into the plant. Within two minutes, the large gas cloud ignited with the power of two-and-a-half tons of dynamite.


