## Alcona resident receives drug court hero award

For the second year in a row the 23<sup>rd</sup> Circuit/81<sup>st</sup> District Drug Sobriety Court has received a drug court hero

This year's recipient was Alcona resident and drug court coordinator, Gena Yockey.

The Michigan Association of Drug Court Professionals (MADCP) gives out the awards once a year to drug court professionals in the state who are nominated by their peers.

Judge Laura A. Frawley received the award in 2013.

Yockey was nominated because of her dedication and compassion to help people overcome addictions to drugs and successfully move their lives forward to be contributing members of society.

"It's a tremendous honor. It's very rare the same court is recognized two years in a row. I think it's a real testament to how well our drug court operates to get that kind of recognition. Gena truly deserves this award. She has done a phenomenal job. She works very hard and goes way above and beyond the call of duty," Frawley said.

Yockey came into the position of drug court coordinator while the Alcona drug sobriety court was still expanding to include Iosco and Oscoda counties after receiving a grant to do so. Her work load tripled during her first year, plus she managed and coordinated the grant funds.

Prior to becoming drug court coordinator Yockey worked as a compliance officer going out at night to randomly drug test participants in their home. Frawley said it was a good fit sliding her into the coordinator position because she already knew the participants, had been to their homes, had good

"The heroin and meth problem here is astronomical. People don't realize just what a big problem it is and it's eating at our youth. An addiction is an illness, like any illness it must be treated. It's not fixed by just going to prison. The treatment takes a lot of hard work."

relationships with them and they knew she had a sincere interest in their sobriety.

The award was given in conjunction with the drug court receiving positive statistics on a national level. The National Association of **Drug Court Professionals** keeps track of all drug courts in the nation and compares them by size. Rural is considered to be 50,000 people. Frawley and Yockey stated Alcona, Iosco and Oscoda counties are "ultra" rural.

Frawley said the 23<sup>rd</sup> Circuit/81st District Drug Sobriety Court's recidivism rate is now at nine percent, which is the lowest rate in the nation and dropped from last year's 14 percent. The recidivism rate measures how many participants will appear in court again on criminal charges.

The court also has one of the highest employment rates in the nation with 85 percent of its participants employed. It has one of the highest education rates in terms of people who receive either a high school diploma or complete their GED and is in the top three in the nation in regard to participants who start and finish the entire drug court

The drug sobriety court has been able to save over 45 years in jail bed days since its inception almost 10 years ago, Frawley said. She explained the cost of incarceration is about \$30 to \$35 dollars a day. According to MADCP, for every one dollar spent in drug court it saves \$27 tax dollars.

The drug court is not only a proven budget solution but it also actually works. "It's a rare thing to have something work and save money at the same time. The whole point of drug court is to intervene with people who are continuously coming through the system over and over again. In regular court you are look-

As an American, I celebrate U.S. District Judge Bernard Friedman's decision on March 21 that declared the marriage amendment in Michigan's constitution at odds with the Constitution of the United States. The court basically said that Michigan's 2004 ban on same sex marriage was unconstitutional.

#### **Fuelwood Permits Available**

With the 2014 fuelwood season beginning April 1, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has streamlined its system to make it more convenient for residents to purchase personal-use fuelwood permits in person and by mail. The season runs through December 31. The mail-in order forms are available online at the DNR website www.michigan.gov/fuelwood.

"Folks are encouraged to save gas and time by ordering this year's fuelwood permit through the mail," said Bill O'Neill, chief of the DNR Forest Resources Division. 'We wanted to give people a couple of options for purchasing their permits to make the process easier and more convenient."

Permits cost \$20 and are for use on designated state forest land in the northern two-thirds of the state and allow for collection of up to five standard cords of wood per household. Fuelwood collected with the permit can be used for personal use only and cannot be resold or traded. The permits are good for 90 days. ing at between 78 and 82 percent recidivism rate," Frawley said.

Yockey pointed out many participants, who didn't have a job while they were addicts, now have great jobs and can support their families. The drug court has also had three people graduate from college. "That's saving a lot of money." They are not on welfare, they are not on disability. They are also breaking the chain of addiction which travels from one generation to another; they are setting a good example for their children," Yockey said.

"We've had four drug free babies born and we've had five people get custody of their children back. We can't calculate the cost of that, but these kids were in foster care at tax payer's expense and now they are back with their families. Seeing families restored tells us we are doing something right," Frawley said.

Yockey agreed and felt the team's motivation came from seeing families together again.

Frawley said drug court is not a get out of jail free card. It is a very tough program. Participants are tested every day and must see a case manager three times a week.

They have individual and group counseling. They have curfews and are constantly being watched and checked on to make sure they are doing what they are supposed to be doing. Frawley said she has a lot of respect for drug court participants because they have chosen to face massive issues in their life -- which takes courage.

The drug court coordinator's duties cover a myriad of responsibilities. Yockey is also a case manager for the court, which means she typically begins her day by drug testing individuals who are waiting at her office door before she arrives to work. She does case management spending many hours talking with participants. She gets all notes ready for staffing, all dockets ready for drug court and inputs all the case notes including all drug test results, participant counseling notes and drug court reviews into a computer program which is how the grant funders keep track of the court's progress. She also helps write new grants.

Yockey is the person who receives the referrals for drug court participants and follows through to get copies of plea agreements from three county courts and assess-

ment paperwork from Catholic Human Services.

Frawley described Yockey's job as "herding cats" to get the ton of paperwork coordinated in a timely manner. Yockey knows timeliness is important. The faster they can get participants in the more effective drug court is.

Yockey was excited the Michigan Association of Drug Court Professionals was noticing their tiny drug court. "It's an award which should go to the whole team. Without the team it just wouldn't work. We all really believe in drug court. It's about reuniting families and making the world a better place. When a person is addicted they lose the people who are important to them -- their family. Addictions tear families apart. Drug court brings them back together. I've seen it happen and it's wonderful," Yockey said.

"The heroin and meth problem here is astronomical. People don't realize just what a big problem it is and it's eating at our youth. An addiction is an illness, like any illness it must be treated. It's not fixed by just going to prison. The treatment takes a lot of hard work. Not all drug court participants are successes, but the ones which are make the hard work worth it. It's a tough field and job, but very rewarding. I'm just a very small part of a great team," she said.

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
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

### Personal sound amplification products can help seniors

Dear Savvy Senior,

What types of amplification products can you recommend to help people with hearing impairment? My 62year-old husband has some hearing issues, but doesn't think he needs a hearing aid, so I'm looking for some alternative devices that can help. **Shouting Spouse** 

Dear Shouting,

If your husband is reluctant to get a hearing aid, there are dozens of "personal sound amplification products" (PSAPs) that can help him hear better at a lower cost than most hearing aids, which can run up to \$3,000

PSAPs are over-thecounter electronic products (they are not FDA approved medical devices like hearing aids) that come in many different shapes and sizes that will give your husband the ability to adjust the volume and tone so he can hear better in different situations.

It's also important to know that PSAPs work best for people with mild to moderate hearing impairment, you don't need a prescription to buy them, and they usually aren't covered by insurance or Medicare.

Before you look into PSAPs, your husband should probably get tested by an audiologist who can rule out any medical issues that could be affecting his hearing like excessive ear wax, an infection, abnormal bone growth or inner-ear tumor. Audiologists are also familiar with the different PSAPs and can help your husband choose the best products to meet his needs, or let him know if a hearing aid would be a better option.

Here's a breakdown of some of the different PSAPs that can help.

• TV and Telephone Amplifiers: To hear the television better, there are a number of TV listening devices on the market that will let your husband increase the volume and

adjust the tone to meet his needs, without blasting out you or the rest of the family.

The best options available today are wireless infrared or radio frequency systems that come with standard or stethoset headphones. Sennheiser (sennheiser.com, (877) 736-6434) makes some of the best TV listening products sold today with prices running between \$250 and

• If hearing over the telephone is a problem, a handset or in-line amplifier can be added to your phone for a few dollars, or you can purchase an amplified telephone. Most amplified phones allow you to adjust the volume and tone for better clarity and they usually come with extra loud ringers and flashing ring indicators to alert you when a call is coming in.

and Serene Innovations (sereneinnovations.-com, (866) 376-9271), with prices ranging anywhere from \$30 up to around \$300. Or, see if your state has a specialized telecommunications equipment program (see tedpa.org), which provides amplified telephones for free.

· Personal sound amplifiers: For better hearing in noisy environments, your husband should get a personal sound amplifier that's designed to amplify hard to hear sounds (like voices), while reducing background noise. Able Planet (ableplanet.com, (877) 266-1979) offers two excellent products that fit the bill that are worn either in-ear or behind the ear, and run \$475 or \$500 for one, or \$850 or \$900 a

• To help improve hearing at home or in quieter settings, or if your husband has high-frequency hearing loss, check out the Bean Quiet Sound Amplifier by Etymoyic (qsabean.com, (888) 389-6684). This product, which is worn in the ear, provides amplification to high frequencies more than low ones, making speech easier to hear

### StarWatch By Gary Becker - Watching a Total Lunar Eclipse: Part One

April 15 holds the promise of a really impressive light show during the early morning hours of tax day as the full moon encounters the Earth's shadow and hides for awhile in its darkness. I have to admit that the scheduling of this event between 1:58 and 5:34 a.m. EDT is going to put a real crimp in my ability to be coherent for my Tuesday evening astronomy class, but hey, even that shall pass. Total lunar eclipses are the less spectacular of the two eclipse families. By far, total solar eclipses, where the moon hides the sun, are truthfully the crème de la crème of astronomical events. August 21, 2017 is the next total solar eclipse visible from the US, but most people will have to travel to see it. Day will literally change into night within 10 to 15 seconds. Sol, will look like a brilliant diamond ring just before totality, and then when totality begins, the wispy corona of the eclipsed sun will encircle the dark moon while planets and bright stars become visible right before your very eyes. However, the biggest perk of a total lunar eclipse is that more than half of the world gets to view it. About 30 minutes before first contact around 1:30 a.m., as the moon pushes deeper into Earth's secondary shadow, the area of the moon closest to the true shadow will start to become dusky in appearance. An astronaut stationed on the moon in this grayish area, with filters protecting his or her eyes, would watch the Earth slowly eclipsing the sun. As more and more of the Earth covered the sun, the sun's light in that region of the moon would have to be lessened, and it would appear from Earth to be diminished in brightness. These are merely the preliminary aspects to the beauty that lies ahead. At 1:58 a.m., EDT the limb of the moon closest to the umbra makes first contact with the shadow and within a minute, the human eye can detect it beginning to sweep across the lunar surface. More next week about the visual aspects of the April 15 total lunar eclipse. www.astronomy.org



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
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
