Local heart recipient takes first place in world horseshoe competition

At age 79 most people are winding down and taking life a bit slower, but a local Haynes Township man isn't about to let life pass him by.

His positive attitude and skill earned a first place trophy at a world horseshoe championship.

Chet Szuber's zeal for life came as a gift from a daughter to a father. Twenty-one years ago Szuber received the heart of his daughter, Patti, in the first transplant where a recipient received his own child's heart. Patti, a 22-yearold nurse, was in an auto accident and died from her injuries.

The story of Szuber having his daughter's heart has been told many times on television, in People magazine and in newspapers. He has traveled extensively as an evangelist for organ donation, always making sure people know Patti is the real hero.

"(On) August 24, 1994, I woke up feeling good for the first time in years and there really hasn't been a bad day since -- besides for a few normal colds. I'd much rather have this heart beating in her," Szuber said while choking back a few tears as he

spoke about his daughter.

Szuber suffered his first heart attack when Patti was just a year old. He continued to have heart issues -- two more attacks and three bypass surgeries -- by the time she was 20.

He said winning first place at a world horseshoe competition was the type of thing that would have made Patti happy. Szuber took the first place trophy and \$500 award in the elder division in Topeka, Kan. last month at the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association (NHPA) World Tournament. This tournament had about 1,200 players vying for first place in two divisions, elders, those older than 70, and those younger than 70.

Szuber explained the winner of the game is really determined by who chokes and who doesn't, as some people can't take the pressure of competition. "I went in with the mind set I wanted to win. I didn't care who I was pitching (shoes) against, I was really pitching against myself. I won 14 of 15 games, on the third day I lost game 13. The last two games that day were with the best two guys of my group and I was fortunate to

Health advisory: E. coli warning for Harrisville beaches

Editor Due to a breach in the storm sewer system and the release of raw sewage in the

storm water, a health warning has been issued for swimming and other activities along the shores of Lake Huron from the Harrisville Harbor and the Harrisville State

According to a joint announcement by the City of Harrisville and Health Department No. 2, raw sewage is being released on the beach at the south end of Huron Street near the wastewater pumping system. The issued warning stated, "This situation is considered a public health hazard and all persons are advised to avoid contact with the near shore waters of Lake Huron between Harrisville Harbor and Harrisville State Park. E.coli and microorganisms present in sewage may cause gastrointestinal illness or other infections."

Also noted in the warning and emphasized by city maintenance employee Louis Campbell - "The municipal drinking water system is not affected by this advisory or current situation."

"We want to stress that this does not affect the drinking water," Campbell said. "The city has two ground wells on the other side of town."

Campbell explained the city has been working to determine where the breach is since last week and has been coordinating with the health department regarding notification and testing and also with the Michigan Department of Environmental Qual-

As of Monday morning "we have no idea where it is coming from - we are dye testing


Mr Read was employed by Buick as a computer set up man. He retired after 32 years with the company.

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

several places and the results are consistent with what they should be... we will continue to dye test and are contacting residents to have access for testing," Campbell said. "There is no magic wand to say 'this is the one' unfortunately."

Campbell said once the source is found and the breach is stopped, the clean-up will begin.

Doug Getty, environmental health director with Health Department No. 2, explained the advisory for swimming and other water-related activities along the shoreline in the specified area will remain in place until the source is determined. Water samples will be taken continually and once the health threat is gone it will be lifted.

Once the breach is found and stopped from flowing into the lake "the lake will cleanse itself fairly rapidly," Getty said. "The sand is another story."

ringers they can throw. Players are classified with like players. Elders have the option to throw horseshoes anywhere between 30 and 40 feet, people younger than 70 pitch at 40 feet. Szuber said he pitches at 32 feet because that's where his shoe opens.

Szuber played horseshoes as a kid on the farm and then for many years didn't play at all. Now, he makes a point of playing the sport a lot and is on a few leagues, one in the fall in Berkley, Mich., and one in the winter at his retirement community in Florida.

According to Szuber, tournament horseshoes are different than playing for fun in a backyard. Championship horseshoes are played on damp clay not sand. "When the shoe hits damp clay it stays, it doesn't slide, wherever it hits is where it stops. You've got to have your shoe open at the pit or you're not going to score," Szuber said.

As a kid his horseshoes were real, right off of a horse and no shoes were the same weight; but in tournaments horseshoes are examined by officials to make sure they are the right size and weight. During the play officials measure the shoes again to make sure no one is cheating by switching to illegal shoes during the game.

Szuber plays with two pound, seven ounce shoes by Ted Allen (who has won 10 world championships). He explained each player throws about 200 shoes a day plus warm up. By game four or five fatigue sets in.

"The thing that would get me in years past was I would let how tired I was get to me. This year I said, 'I don't care how tired I am, I'm going to concentrate on horseshoes and horseshoes only' and it worked. Granted when it was over they almost had to carry me back to the hotel, but I didn't worry about how tired I was when I was pitching," Szuber said.

Szuber's biggest health problem now is lymphedema which occurred after the removal of his saphenous veins in his legs for the bypass surgeries he had prior to his heart transplant.

According to the Mayo Clinic website lymphedema results from a blockage of the lymphatic system which is playing. He plans to en world tournament againg year and, hopefully, home another trophy.

part of the immune system. The blockage prevents lymph fluid from draining well and the fluid build up leads to swelling. Szuber's swelling during the world championships was severe and he said his legs felt and looked like large "tree stumps" leaving it hard for him to flex.

Despite that, Szuber has played in four world tournaments, placing in three. He came in fourth place his first year, didn't place at all the following year and last year he came in third place.

Szuber doesn't just play horseshoes. He owns and operates the Huron View Tree and Berry Farm, with help from his son, Bob, who is general manager of the farm, and Carol Cantor who is supervisor. He likes to buzz around the farm on rough terrain vehicles and having fun with his 11 grandchildren. He also golfs and fishes.

Szuber said he wouldn't be here to enjoy these things had it not been for his daughter's gift to him 21 years ago, "I believe when Patti looks down from heaven she has to be the happiest little angel. There is nothing worse than losing a child but there is a silver lining. She left a legacy to many (by) donating her kidneys, liver, corneas, heart and over 50 bone and tissue samples so others could enjoy a normal life.

"I live with the fact she may be gone but to us and a lot of others she's not dead because she's alive in so many," Szuber said.

Szuber's wife, Jean, passed away in 2013 and since then he just wants to stay busy all the time. "I want to wake up to some sort of aggravation every day. Some widowers just sit on the couch and watch television all day. They have no reason to keep living. You've got to keep moving.

"I miss my wife dearly but there are people here at the farm, I've got employees, I've got customers, I talk to people all the time -- that helps pass the day and makes life interesting," Szuber said.

Szuber says playing horseshoes is a lot of fun and he has made some great friends playing. He plans to enter the world tournament again next year and, hopefully, take home another trophy



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SENIOR ZIFESTYLESUnderstanding the responsibilities of an executor

An old family friend recently asked me to be the executor of his will when he dies. I feel flattered that he asked, but I'm not sure what exactly the job entails. What can you tell

Concerned Friend

Dear Concerned,

Serving as the executor of your friend's estate may seem like an honor, but it can also be a huge chore. Here's what you should know to help you prepare.

As the executor of your friend's will, you're essentially responsible for winding up his affairs after he dies. While this may sound simple enough, you need to be aware that the job can be tedious, time consuming and difficult depending on the complexity of his financial and family situation.

Some of the duties required include:

• Filing court papers to start the probate process (this is generally required by law to determine the will's validity).

- Taking an inventory of everything in his estate.
- Úsing his estate's funds to pay bills, including taxes, funeral costs, et cetera.
- Handling details like terminating his credit cards, and notifying banks and government agencies like Social Security and the post office of his
- Preparing and filing his final income tax returns.
- Distributing assets to the beneficiaries named in his will.

Be aware that each state has specific laws and timetables on an executor's responsibilities. Your state or local bar association may have an online law library that details the rules and requirements. The American Bar Association website also offers guidance on how to settle an estate. Go to americanbar.org and type in "guidelines for individual executors and trustees" to find it.

If you agree to take on the responsibility as executor of your friend's estate, your first step is to make sure he has an updated will, and find out where all his important documents and financial information is located. Being able to quickly put your hands on deeds, brokerage statements and insurance policies after he dies will save you a lot of time and hassle.

If he has a complex estate, you may want to hire an attorney or tax accountant to guide you through the process, with the estate picking up the cost. If you need help locating a pro, the National Association of **Estate Planners and Councils** (naepc.org) and the National Academy of Elder Law Attorneys (naela.-org) are great resources that provide directories on their websites to help you find someone.

Find out if there are any conflicts between the beneficiaries of your friend's estate. If there are some potential



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problems, you can make your job as executor much easier if everyone knows in advance who's getting what, and why. So ask your friend to tell his beneficiaries what they can expect. This includes the personal items too, because wills often leave it up to the executor to dole out heirlooms. If there's no distribution plan for personal property, suggest he make one and put it in

As the executor, you're entitled to a fee paid by the estate. In most states executors are entitled to take a percentage of the estate's value, which

usually ranges anywhere from one to five percent depending on the size of the estate. But, if you're a beneficiary, it may make sense for you to forgo the fee. That's because fees are taxable, but Uncle Sam in most states don't tax inheritances.



Using big bait to lure largemouth bass

Largemouth bass are known to be opportunistic eaters - so don't be afraid to use larger baits and lures when targeting them.

If you like to target largemouths while fly fishing you may want to consider using your bulkier flies to appeal to their hungry appetite. Focus your cast on areas close to drop-offs or where great cover is provided. You just might be surprised by the reaction you get.

Northeast **Lower Peninsula**

August 20

• Cheboygan River: Those fishing near the Foot Bridge caught a good number of smallmouth bass, walleye and pike but most were sublegal. Anglers were using crawlers and wax worms off multiple fishing piers.

• Rogers City: Continues to produce a mixed bag of Chinook, steelhead and lake trout. The Chinook are here but in low numbers. Some are getting a few while others struggle to find them especially south towards Swan Bay and Adams Point in 40 to 90 feet. Try 20 to 25 feet down with spoons or J-plugs and attractors with flies or squid. Good colors were green, blue, black and white or glow.

• East and West Twin Lakes: The fishing was slow on East Twin. Anglers were trolling and jigging with artificial and natural baits for walleye but they had no luck. Perch fishing was slow. Surface water temperature was between 70 and 74 degrees and the weeds are starting to come up around the island. Try six to eight feet for smallmouth.

Walleye fishing on West Twin was moderate but most of the fish caught were sublegal. Anglers are trolling in six to 18 feet with both artificial and natural baits. The lake provides easy fishing for rock bass but most are caught in the perch holes and off Eagle Point. Perch fishing was moderate in four to six feet.

- Alpena: It seemed like the walleye left the bay because those targeting them came in with one fish. Lake trout are still being caught off the "humps" and the deeper water off of Thunder Bay Island and the Nordmere
- Thunder Bay River: Had very little to report with only a few smaller panfish caught.
- Harrisville: Walleye were being caught in good numbers. Evening and very early morning was best but some did report the occasional midday catch. Body baits worked best but also try wobble glos, spin-glos and small spoons in 12 to 15 feet. Lake trout moved in slightly. Try fishing throughout the water column in 80 to 120 feet with spoons, spin-glos and wobble glos behind dodgers.
- Oscoda: Pier fishing seems to be getting better as anglers were catching walleye, channel cats and smallmouth bass. Catfish are being caught on crawlers and

minnows throughout the night. Walleye are hitting throughout the day but evening may be a touch better when drifting crawlers or casting body baits. Lake trout are out deep in 150 to 180 feet and hitting on spoons, body baits, spin-glos and wobble glos. The fish were suspended about 20 feet from the bottom.

• AuSable River: Spinners and body baits are being used to catch bass.

• Higgins Lake: Those looking for perch are using minnows and wax worms. Rock bass are everywhere and provide a great fishery for young anglers. Those trolling for lake trout are fishing along the bottom in waters 80 feet and deeper. Those fishing higher in the water column may find a couple brown trout or rainbow trout. Try black and gold, black and silver or perch colored body baits.

• Houghton Lake: Walleye fishing has been tough but a few were caught early morning or evening in about nine feet. Some are using purple or chartreuse harnesses but those trolling small crank baits have caught some nice bluegill and crappie.

Large and smallmouth bass fishing was good but the

pike fishing was slow. Those fishing the canals caught crappie. Pike, bass and bluegills were caught on the upper side of the Reedsburg

- Lake St. Helen: Had good fishing. Largemouth bass were hitting soft plastics on the bottom during the day and top water lures in early morning or late evening. Panfish including bluegills, sunfish and rock bass were caught by those drifting a piece of crawler. No walleye or crappie to report.
- Tawas: Walleye fishing was slow.
- AuGres: Walleye fishing was slow. Some fish were caught in 60 feet or more along the weed beds off the Pine River but the action was not hot by any means. Most anglers were working extremely had to get one or two fish per boat.






Check trees for Asian longhorned beetle

August is national Tree Check Month, which makes it a great time for Michiganders and travelers alike to be on the lookout for invasive, destructive pests threatening the state's forest land-

The Michigan departments of Agriculture and Rural Development, Environmental Quality and Natural Resources, along with the U.S Department of Agriculture, are asking people to take time this month to examine trees for signs of Asian longhorned beetle (ALB), a highly destructive invasive pest.

Take just 10 minutes this month to check trees around homes for Asian longhorned beetle or any signs of the damage it causes. Look for signs around the neighborhood, at local parks and favorite recreation spots. Early detection and response are vital to protecting Michigan's

Adult Asian longhorned beetles are distinctively large, ranging from three-quarters of an inch to one and onehalf inches in length, not including their long antennae. The beetles are shiny black, with random white blotches or spots, and their antennae

have alternating black and white segments. They have six legs that can be black or partly blue, with blue coloration sometimes extending to their feet.

The Asian longhorned beetle was first identified in the United States in 1996, likely transported from Asia in wood packing materials. Like the emerald ash borer, the Asian longhorned beetle spends most of its life cycle eating its way through the insides of trees.

What makes ALB much more dangerous is that it feeds on a wide variety of tree species. Its first choice is maple, but it also will infest birch, elm, willow, buckeye, horse chestnut and other hardwoods. The damage caused by Asian longhorned beetles will ultimately destroy an infested tree.

Adult beetles are active in late summer to early fall. During that brief window, beetles may be seen and some of the telltale signs of infestation may be more noticeable. Female beetles chew oval depressions in which they lay eggs. When larvae hatch, they burrow deep into the heartwood of the tree where insecticides can't reach, creating large chambers in the wood.

The next summer, fully formed adult beetles emerge from trees by boring perfectly round, three-eighths-inchdiameter exit holes. Sometimes a material resembling wood shavings can be seen at or below these holes or coming from cracks in an infested tree's bark. Once a tree is infested, it must be removed.

To date, there are no known infestations of Asian long-horned beetle in Michigan. However, the beetle has been found in areas of Ohio, Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Illinois and Ontario, Canada.

Anyone observing an actual beetle or a tree that appears to be damaged is asked to report it. If possible, capture the beetle in a jar, take photos, record the location, and report it as soon as possible through the USDA's Asian longhorned beetle website, www.asianlonghornedbeetle.com or call (800) 292-3939 or MDA-info@michigan.gov.

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



StarWatch By Gary Becker - Methane, It Stinks!

* We are all familiar with methane through metabolic processes, and it is certainly not the fragrance of choice on a first date. It can also be produced nonmetabolically through chemical processes, but those reactions require liquid water. Methane is also the most feared gas in humanity's race for self-extinction because, as atmospheric carbon dioxide levels increase via our ravenous consumption of carbon-based fuels, warming temperatures will release huge quantities of methane stored in the Arctic's melting permafrost layers. Methane is a much more effective greenhouse gas than CO2, and if this occurs, the global warming battle will simply be lost. Now for the happier side of methane... It has been discovered on Mars by the highly successful Curiosity rover which has been sniffing the air and probing the ground inside Gale Crater for the past three years. Why is this find such an important revelation? Any methane discovered on Mars is of very, very recent origin because the weaker gravitational pull of the Red Planet (38 percent of Earth's attraction) cannot hold it down. It escapes Mars in only 200-300 days, so any methane discovered is a real time sign that either life processes are ongoing near the Martian surface, or that chemical reactions induced by liquid water are occurring; and as all biologists know, where there is liquid water, there is life. What is even more intriguing is that Martian methane levels are not homogeneous. Curiosity has found that puffs of methane are being released from the Martian surface, indicating that methane is being produced near Curiosity's location. This is not to imply that Curiosity is trekking about in a Jurassic Park-like environment with dinosaurs being imaged in the background. Mars is much drier than any location on Earth, but methane will provide an intriguing component to the anticipated discoveries of the first human explorers when they finally traverse the Red Planet's surface.
