Water level predictions illustrates Great Lakes' complexity

Recently released Great Lakes water level predictions have Superior, Michigan and Huron on the same page.

But lakes Erie and Ontario flow to the beat of a different drum.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers predict that the bigger lakes will drop below the level they were a year ago. Erie and Ontario are set to be higher than a year ago.

"Over the summer and early fall of this year, water supplies to Lake Superior and Michigan-Huron were near average or below average," said Lauren Fry, a civil engineer for the U.S. Army **Corps of Engineers Detroit** District. "Outflows, however, have been above average, due to higher than average water levels on both lakes.

The high levels of the upper lakes are the legacy of the last two winters, which were so cold and snowy that they set the stage for low evaporation and high spring runoff. Those levels mean that outflow, or discharge, to the St. Mary's River and to the St. Clair River and Detroit River system will be higher than typical.

With less water coming in than going out, lower water levels are expected for Superior and Michigan-Huron. This winter is also expected to be warmer, which may contribute to lower levels than last year. Lakes Erie and Ontario just have to be different. Both lakes can thank heavy June precipitation for higher levels than last year, Fry said. Lake Erie experienced precipitation 95 percent above the long-term average. Lake Ontario got 80 percent more. Both lakes rose rapidly throughout June and July. "Only very dry conditions would result in levels below last year's levels," Fry said. Because the Great Lakes have the largest surface area of any freshwater system on Earth, the lake surfaces, air and atmosphere interact in ways that uniquely impact

Day One program has brighter future

With the help of a large grant and a new component to help identify generational risk issues the Day One program of Alcona County is neading into the New Year with a much brighter future. The program, which provides services to at-risk pregnant mothers and families with children three years of age and younger, was in jeopardy of closing a few months ago when the Kellogg Foundation decided not to fund the program after the end of September. The foundation supplied grant monies in $20\dot{1}\dot{4}/201\dot{5}$ for many Day One programs throughout Michigan, Since then the Child & **Family Services of Northeast** Michigan, which oversees Day One in Alcona County, has been writing grants in order to find the necessary funds to keep the program going.

She explained the Episcopal grant came to fruition though the help of Rev. Joe Jenney from St. Andrew's going to break the cycle of Episcopal Church. The church partnered with Day One Alcona County to vide mentoring through their Samaritan program which offers financial education, nutrition on a budget, educational assistance helping parents acquire their GED and other assistance that a family needs. Nisbet has also applied for a Michigan Health Endowment Fund request and is still looking to write other grants to achieve the full amount needed to keep the service operational throughout 2016. According to Nisbet, the Day One program works with the family to make sure the children get the best start. She said it is different than any other program out there because it is able to be massaged for what best suits the

Nisbet explained the total needed to run the program for a whole year is \$90,000, however, the \$16,000 grant has given the program a much brighter future.

Another component which will help the program is the Near@Home training which will soon be given to key personnel who visit with families in Alcona County Brenda Forsythe, full time coordinator/home support specialist and Sue Lovelace, nurse visitor. "They will be trained in protocols for assessing parent Adverse Childhood **Éxperience** Scores (ACES), trauma and toxic stress," Nisbet said.

Day One Alcona County will be the first home service to include this component. Forsythe and Lovelace will be

Since the end of September the program has received many other smaller grants including the Comstock Grant from the First Congregational/United Church of Christ in Alpena for \$3,000; \$1,000 grant from St. Andrew's Episcopal Church; \$5,000 from Alcona County Catholic parishes; \$1,000 from Alcona County Knights of Columbus; \$1,000 from My Brother's Hope; \$500 from New Life Lutheran Church; and about \$2,000 from Alcona County residents.

Nisbet said these resources were contributed because of the recognition and impact of the Day One program and the program was making too much of a beneficial differ-



the system's water levels. Typically, the lake levels fluctuate on a seasonal cycle, rising in spring, peaking in summer and falling in autumn. They fluctuate year to year as well, rising and falling to certain ranges for years at a time. But a number of factors can cause them to depart from the cycle.

Right now, water levels for all the lakes are at or above their averages for this time of year, following a rapid rise that began in 2013.

Sydney Pierce, outside shooting from LaFave and strength under the basket from Brittany Decker and Alissa Terpstra to get back into the game.





How to make your kitchen safer and easier to use

Dear Savvy Senior,

What tips can you recommend for making a kitchen senior-friendly? My wife, who loves to cook, has had several kitchen-related accidents over the past year, which is why we would like to modify to make it safer and more practical.

Hungry Husband

Dear Hungry,

There are a number of simple modifications and inexpensive add-ons that can make a big difference in making your kitchen more agefriendly. Depending on your wife's needs, here are some tips for each aspect of the kitchen.

 Floors: If you have kitchen throw rugs, to reduce tripping or slipping, replace them with nonskid floor mats or consider gel mats, which are cushiony and more comfortable to stand on for long periods. GelPro.com and WellnessMats.com offer a nice selection.

• Lights: If the lighting in her kitchen is dim, replace the old overhead fixture with a bright new ceiling light, and add under-cabinet task lighting to brighten up her kitchen countertops.

• Cabinets and drawers: To reduce bending or reaching, organize your kitchen cabinets and drawers so that the items you most frequently use are within comfortable reach. You can also make your cabinets and pantry easier to access by installing pullout shelves or lazy susans.

And D-shaped pullhandles for the cabinets and drawers are also recommended because they're more comfortable for arthritic

hands to grasp than knobs. • Faucet: If you have a twist-handle kitchen faucet, replace it with an ADA compliant single handle faucet. They're easier to use, especially for seniors with arthritis or limited hand strength. There are also kitchen faucets on the market today (like the Delta Touch20 faucet and Moen MotionSense) that will turn themselves on and off by simply touching the base or moving your hand over a motion sensor. And, for safety purposes, set your hot water tank at 120 degrees to prevent possible water burns.

• Microwave and stove: If your microwave is mounted above the stove, consider moving it to a countertop. This makes it safer and easier to reach. And if you're concerned about your wife remembering to turn the stove off, there are automatic stove shut-off devices you can purchase and install to prevent a fire. See cookstop.com, stoveguardintl.com and pioneeringtech.com for some different options.

If you're looking to upgrade some of your appliances too, here are some different senior-friendly features you should look for when shopping.

• Refrigerator and freezer: Side-by-side doors work well for seniors because the frequently used items (refrigerated and frozen) can be placed at mid-shelf range for easy access. Pullout adjustable



height shelves and a water/ ice dispenser on the outside of door are also very convenient.

• Stove or cooktop: Look for one with controls in the front so you won't have to reach over hot burners to turn it off, and make sure the controls are easy to see. Flat surface electric or induction burners, or continuous grates on gas stoves are also great for sliding heavy pots and pans from one burner to the next. And ask about automatic shut off burners.

 Oven: Self-cleaning ovens are a plus, and consider a side-swing door model. They're easier to get into because you don't have to lean

over a hot swing-down door. Also consider a wall-mounted oven, installed at your wife's preferred height to eliminate bending.

• Dishwasher: Consider a dishwasher drawer that slides in and out, and is installed on a six to 10-inch raised platform. These require less bending to load and unload.

• Washer and dryer: Frontload washers and dryers with pedestals that raise the height 10 to 15 inches are also backsavers and easy to access.

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

😋 · Sunday and Monday mornings, December 13-14, is when Geminid meteors should be peaking at their maximum rates. Geminid activity has been on the rise since the shower's discovery in 1862 because the orbit of the debris which produces its meteors has been shifting ever closer to Earth. Jupiter's strong gravitational pull is responsible. In 1877 rates of 17 meteors per hour were being witnessed, 27 meteors each hour by the nineteenth century's end. During the late twentieth century rates climbed to over 80 events per hour, and currently, they are about two meteors per minute, half from suburbia. When I was a teen growing up in the 60's beginning my astronomical journey, the Geminids were a major event, but they still paled in contrast to the August Perseids. Now they surpass Perseid activity, but are still less observed because of the cold and often cloudy conditions which prevail in mid-December. Geminids, however, are your best bet for observing meteor activity if the weather does cooperate. They are also the only shower related to an asteroid. In 1983, 3200 Phaethon was discovered, and its orbit was quickly connected to the annual Geminid event. This gave credence to the belief that many short period comets actually end their active days masquerading as small minor planets. For North America, meteor activity should remain constant Dec. 13 and 14, but brighter meteors are expected on the 14th. You can start observing as early as 10 p.m. Face east, but observe near the darker zenith. Geminids will be diverging upward from the east. By 2 a.m. face south, but continue to look towards the zenith where the sky is darkest. Geminids will appear to radiate from an area near the bright star, Castor. A map is included with this StarWatch. View a day earlier or later if weather conditions will be inclement on maximum nights, but expect to see fainter meteors before maximum and brighter meteors afterwards. Beyond the mornings of highest activity, rates decrease rapidly. www.astronomy.org

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

family while still following a curriculum and evidence based program.

"These families are often living in substandard housing, have no job, no car or are in need of a high school diploma. Day One helps find out what they need and then goes to work in the community to help make what they need a reality so they can become self-sufficient," Nisbet said.

Substandard housing is typical for many of the families in the Day One program and it may not be because the family cannot afford the monthly payment but cannot afford both the security deposit and first month's rent to get into something better. She said Day One scours the community organizations, churches and other sources to piece together the security deposit so the family can live in safer housing.

Through other organizations they are also able to provide furniture such as a safe crib, car seats and other items necessary to keep infants and toddlers safe. They also provide sleep safe training, and have helped with early child interventions through nurse assessments of autism, hearing issues, vision issues, motility/motor skill issues, developmental disabilities and more.

In one case the single mom could not get a job because she did not have her GED. Day One Alcona County was able to provide a hot spot so she could get her GED over the Internet at home which ran about \$30 a month. A small price to pay and now that mom has her GED, is working and becoming selfsufficient.

From 2006 to 2013 the number of Child Protective Service (CPS) investigations for child abuse and neglect just went through the roof all over the state including Alcona County. "Kids were being removed from homes and put into foster care. Since Day One started in Alcona County in 2014, not one family in the Day One program has had a child moved into foster care and none of the families have had a CPS investigation about child abuse or neglect," Nisbet said.

She explained Day One works because the families they service are getting education and support. Sometimes all people need to become self sufficient is to know they have someone available to give them the confidence to move forward. Funds are still coming in mostly because of the strong drive and desire for the county to keep the program. "People get it. They understand the importance of a program like this. This is how this county works, sometimes things come in really quietly, but they come in. That's what Alcona County is all about, stuff just happens here and it continues to happen. Sometimes we don't even know who these people are, the money just comes in. As long as we keep doing what we are called to do, God just makes it happen," she said.

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
