Grocery remodel and other building improvements opens business opportunities

Interior renovations to the Harrisville Harbor Grocery during the next few months will cause a temporary shutdown of the store, however, when it reopens in the spring shoppers can expect to see lower prices and more options for shopping locally.

According to Steven Arens, owner of Harrisville Harbor Grocery, the shutdown is effective Wednesday, Jan. 27 and the projected re-opening date is the first week in April. "If things go really smoothly with the project, it could be earlier," Arens said.

Renovation plans include completely replacing the flooring, new ceiling and all new refrigeration and freezer storage or "coolers" as they much more efficient for making sandwiches and preparing other lunch offerings as well," Arens said.

The addition of a full store generator to be able to service the community when the power goes out is also planned along with repaving the parking lot to the east of the store to provide more access and parking for trailered vehicles.

Arens and his wife, Sandy, purchased the former Mr. Ed's IGA in May 2015. After roughly five weeks of cleaning, minor remodeling and transfer of the liquor license, opened just before the Fourth of July weekend. "After seven months as a grocery owner we've learned enough on how to work with our venders to be able to give the best prices

are called in the grocery industry. An expanded floor plan (by roughly 10 percent), a remodeled handicap accessible restroom which will be open to the public, and the addition of air conditioning are also planned. "Literally, everything in that store is coming out... We are very excited to be adding a bunch of equipment for prepared foods - a hot case with smoked meats like barbecue ribs, prepared chickens and other items. We will also be

to our customers and will have substantially lower pricing once the remodel is completed," Arens said.

He explained that while the grocery store is temporarily shut down, most of his employees will not be without work. "It was surprising to me that none of my staff wanted to be laid off – they all wanted to work. So, many are going to help out with the construction process. We are going to try to keep them employed through this process."

In preparation for the reconstruction of the grocery store, Arens purchased the former Alcona Health Center building on Main Street in order to use it for storage. "The final goal is to get retail space in the lower level and rent out the apartment space upstairs," he said. "I will work with a business owner in a variety of different ways however I can - in order to help develop the downtown... It's in beautiful condition complete with upgraded electric and plumbing. It will be available in April.

Arens has also purchased three other buildings in town

International film festival hits the big screen in Alpena

The Friends of Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary are bringing the world of cinema to northeast Michigan. From Wednesday, Jan. 27 through Sunday, Jan. 31, residents and travelers to Alpena will be treated to some of the most impressive ocean and Great Lakes-inspired films from around the world.

According to Film Festival Coordinator Stephanie Gandulla, the five-day festival screens nearly 50 films, ranging in length from two minutes to feature-length.

Film screenings are complemented by social events, educational activities, and opportunities to meet filmmakers. "Through the powerful form of visual communication, the Thunder Bay International Film Festival offers both a means to communicate ocean and Great Lakes issues and brings new and different cultural events to northeast Michigan," Gandulla said.

She explained features of the event include films from the San Francisco International Ocean Film Festival, a long-running, acclaimed festival of ocean-themed films, largely unavailable to the general public. On Thursday, Jan. 28 take a bite out of Shark Night at the Thunder Bay Theatre, featuring the oceans' most misunderstood yet essential creatures. Friday and Saturday evening films also include receptions with local beers, wines, and hors d'oeuvres.

According to Mary Beth Stutzman, president of the Alpena Area Convention &

Visitors Bureau, "the Thunder Bay International Film Festival is an exciting event for northeast Michigan...a unique event that combines two of our favorite loves — our water resources and the film experience."

Tickets are \$30 for the Friday reception and films; \$20 for the reception and films on Saturday and \$6 for all other programs. A full festival "Thunder Pass" can be purchased for \$85 (\$11 savings), and includes all receptions, panels, and films.





Steiner's buzzer-beater lifts

Alcona over Oscoda in nail biter

After suffering some heartbreaking close setbacks this season, the Alcona boys varsity basketball team finally got one to roll its way Friday

The Tigers, playing at Oscoda in a North Star League contest, notched a 55-53 last-second win, with sophomore Jordan Steiner sinking the game-winning lay-up as time ran out.

"It was kind of a crazy sequence at the end, but we came out on top," Alcona head coach Toby Suttle said. "I'm proud of the boys for pulling this one off."

The Owls had the ball with just over 10 seconds left, but Steiner, defending Oscoda star player Kyle Charters, swiped the ball away near the end line and raced down the court the other way. Steiner outran two would-be Owl defenders along the way, calmly soaring in for the game winning bucket as the buzzer sounded.

"It was a really exciting game and that was just a great play at the end by Jordan," Suttle said.

For as back-and-forth as the game was, it seemed evident early on that the team with the ball last would win the game.

An early three-pointer by Steiner and mid-range jumper by Devon Mills gave the Tigers a quick 7-3 lead, but Oscoda swung back to take a 10-7 lead. Alcona did get a pair of jumpers by Alec Link in the late moments of the quarter, but the Owls held on to a 14-13 advantage after

Tim Hutchinson sank a second quarter three that put Alcona back up at 19-18, but another Owl run put them up

The Tigers got a basket by Alex Stephenson to close that gap to 23-21. Alcona was still trailing 28-26 late in the half, but another three by Hutchinson gave the Tigers a 29-28 lead at the break.

'Steiner and Hutchinson came up huge for us," Suttle said. "Steiner facilitated well and Hutchinson hit some big shots for us. I was happy with his defense too."

with the goal to improve them and develop the space for retail businesses. He purchased the former clothing store located at 402 Main Street in December. It also has three apartments upstairs. "This building needs work in some areas and has room for one larger retail business or two smaller businesses," Arens said. "We (Harrisville) have very few stores with windows for displays like this one and it has parking. It has a lot of nice features." He plans to remodel the exterior of the

building and replace the roof. Last October Arens purchased the laundromat with Mark Kovachevich, Victor Kahn and Tony Borcsani all are equal owners in the business. As a result it has been re-named the Harrisville Harbor Laundromat and renovations are underway to improve that business. A new pitched roof has been added along with a new furnace and water heater. Improvements to the front façade, complete with new windows and doors, are planned as well as the addition of new equipment, remodeling the public restroom, new lighting and upgrading the interior of the business. The work will be ongoing throughout the winter with plans to be complete by summer.

The last project planned by Arens is renovating the 450 square-foot building located between the laundromat and Larry's Electric. He purchased that building from Milford and Sheila Fowler, who also owned the laundromat. Arens plans to improve that building with the goal of having a retail business go in there as well.

"I'd be happy to sell things off when they are done," Arens said. "I don't want to keep all of this. I just want to bring businesses to town. Someone has to start it. My goal is to refurbish buildings in an effort to revitalize the town. That takes participants. I'd like to find local people to go into business here. I want local people to be invested and work to improve the community. "I've been coming up here my whole life. I love this town and it's a really nice community with nice people. People make the community."

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
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Lady Tigers topple Oscoda in league matchup

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Could you have COPD?

Dear Savvy Senior,

I have struggled with some shortness of breath for the past five years or so. I just thought I was getting older and out of shape, but a friend recently mentioned I may have COPD. What can you tell me about this?

Breathless Bob

Dear Bob,

COPD, or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, is a serious lung disease that, over time, makes it hard to breathe. What's more, an estimated 24 million people have COPD today, but about half of them don't know it.

Many people mistake shortness of breath as a normal part of aging, or a result of being out of shape, but that's not necessarily the case. COPD - a term used to describe a variety of lung diseases including emphysema and chronic bronchitis - develops slowly, so symptoms may not be obvious until damage has occurred.

Common symptoms include: An ongoing cough or a cough that produces a lot of mucus; shortness of breath, especially during physical activity; wheezing; and chest tightness.

Those most at risk are smokers or former smokers over age 40, and people who have had long-term exposure to other lung irritants like secondhand smoke, air pollution, chemical fumes and dust. There is also a rare genetic condition known as alpha-1-antitrypsin, or AAT deficiency that can increase the risks.

If you're experiencing any of the aforementioned symptoms, you need to get tested by your doctor. A simple breathing test called spirometry can tell if you have COPD, and if so, how severe it is. Early screening can also identify COPD before major loss of lung function occurs.

If you do indeed have COPD, you need to know that while there's no cure, there are things you can do to help manage symptoms and protect your lungs from further damage, including:

• Quit smoking: If you smoke, the best thing you can do to prevent more damage to your lungs is to quit. To get help, the National Cancer Institute offers a number of smoking cessation resources at smokefree.gov or call (800) QUIT-NOW. Or ask your doctor about prescription antismoking drugs that can help reduce nicotine cravings.

Avoid air pollutants: Stay away from things that could irritate your lungs like dust, allergens and strong fumes. Also, to help improve your air quality at home, remove dust-collecting clutter and keep carpets clean; run the exhaust fan when using smelly cleaning products, bug sprays or paint; ban smoking indoors; and keep windows closed when out-



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door air pollution is high (see airnow.gov for daily air-quality reports).

• Guard against flu: The flu can cause serious problems for people who have COPD, so get a flu shot every fall and wash and sanitize your hands frequently to avoid getting sick. Also, ask your doctor about getting the pneumococcal immunizations for protection against pneumonia.

 Take prescribed medications: Bronchodilators (taken with an inhaler) are commonly used for COPD. They help relax the airway muscles to make breathing easier. Depending on how severe your condition, you may need a short-acting version only for when symptoms occur, or a long-acting prescription for daily use. Inhaled steroids may also help reduce inflammation and mucus and prevent flare-ups.

Great Backyard Bird Count could bring surprises

It was a long lasting fall migratory season. season this year and winter took its time settling in. Some residents reported that well stocked bird feeders remained full while the normal "feeder birds" sought natural foods in the open forests and fields. Warmer-than-normal temperatures also kept most small and big water areas open late. Waterfowl enjoyed plenty of food sources and lingered beyond the normal

However, just as Christmas arrived, so did winter with a vengeance. Many species that extended their stay began departing in large groups. Some Iosco observers even saw flocks of Canada geese heading south as late as New Year's Day.

With food sources now covered with snow and many ponds and lakes beginning to freeze, many birds winged their way to warmer climates. Yet, some may have waited until it was too late and were stuck in northern regions where they will have to adapt or die. Some have resorted to yard feeders and there were reports of some rarities spot-

Bird researchers are interested in inding out where birds are located when they finally settle in at wintering grounds. The annual Christmas Bird Count helps accomplish this throughout Michigan and across the nation. The same 15 mile preestablished circles are surveyed and documented every year. However, observations are done during only one consecutive eight hour period. Dates are designated by local Audubon groups participating.

On the other hand, the upcoming Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) from February 12-15, aids scientists in finding out where different birds are now just prior to the spring migration. Many local observers contribute vital and

important "citizen scientist" data as they report their findings online to http/birdcount.org.

This four day project is open to anyone and is sponsored by Cornell Lab Of Ornithology, Audubon, and Bird Studies Canada. It is a worldwide effort to establish birds' whereabouts just before many depart from wintering grounds and head for summer breeding sites. This midwinter count also tabulates the health status and numbers of various species.

Participants are encouraged to count for at least 15 minutes on one or all four days. Observations may be done at backyard feeders, in neighborhoods, along river corridors, local fields, or even while riding in a car. If unsure of the name of a bird observed, online I.D. helps are available.

A public information session on the upcoming 2016 GBBC will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 3, from 1-3 p.m. at the Robert J. Parks Library on Skeel Ave. in Oscoda. Presenter Peggy Ridgway, from AuSable Valley Audubon, will walk participants through the online reporting process, plus give instruction on basic bird I.D. and special behaviors to watch for.

Participants are encouraged to bring their personal bird field guides and binoculars to the meeting.

I started for the table when Bobbi advised me that the 1600, (4 p.m.) start meant 1600; I needed to move to the firing line. For two hours we shot with that big, white box containing my new boots sitting with the gun cleaning supplies. These boots were calling me, distracting me; Bobbi should have let me at least look at them.

Dinner break came and I took my new boots to the tailgate of my truck. With a halfmoon of chums behind me, I opened the box. I swear that there was a glow of light that came from the unveiling of the boots -- Schnee's pack boots, rubber Air Bob traction bottom with leather uppers, 16 inch lace-to-the-knee. This is the holy grail of game warden boots.

I could hear a gasp from behind me as I pulled the right boot out of the box. I slipped my foot in and it made a thunking sound that only a perfectly fitted boot will make. I looked around at my friends' faces which showed an understanding of the significance of that sound.

As I laced them to the knee, I felt what could only be described as a surge of test-osterone. There are commercials that address "Low T" and medications that deal with it. Sixteen inch, lace-to-the-knee Schnee pack boots with Air Bob soles, in my bias opinion, gives instant results.

Just then Bobbi walked by with purpose like she was setting up for the evening or something equally important

to her. I shouted to her, "Hey Bobbi, how do you like my new boots?" Her answer was much as I expected, "they make your butt look big." Why does she do that?

Refusing to let this ruin the moment, I brushed off her obvious jealousy and passed the left boot around so the guys could try it on. They all wanted to see how it looked on them. Everyone who put it on had a far away look as they imagined stepping out of their truck with their 16 inch lace-to-the-knee Schnee boots. I know they were imagining all sorts of situations where this boot would look so cool — court house, dispatch, gas stations... Not to mention actually working in them.

After much effort getting my left boot back and refusing to give up the right boot, I put them back in their box and safely secured them in my truck so we could go to dinner.

When I got home the first thing I did was put on sweat pant shorts and my new boots, laced right to the top. My wife walked into the living room and with the same tone that Bobbi used she said, "Really, another pair of boots?"

A little defensively I asked her what she meant by that. She pointed out that I have a closet in the basement that contained no less than 50 pairs of boots. She suggested that I should go down and throw some of them away. I pointed out that boots are like friends, you don't just throw them away. That's just not going to happen.

A closet full of boots is like a photo album of a guy's life. I have boots that are at least 40 years old, boots that remind me of early hunting trips, and boots that tell stories of hiking/camping trips when I was young. I have boots that if I attempted to pull on they would fall apart in my hands. Being fragile doesn't take their memories and stories away.

I would think my wife would understand this, but

more than once I have had to dumpster dive to rescue an old friend. Now my mother. on the other hand, is one who understands. When I came home from the military I kept my old jungle boots in a place where I could get them if I should ever need them. For a while I thought I lost them and my heart was broken. A lot of memories were in those boots and more than a couple of blood brothers walked next to those boots. On Christmas morning that year I opened a package from my mother containing my bronzed combat boots. Try to top that one.

This last Christmas I watched my son open presents. Everything was a polite "thank you" until it came to the boots from his sister. Nice boots are a true game changer. As he held them there was a faraway look in his eyes as he imagined where he would wear them. I would bet more husbands got boots from their wives than wives got shoes from their husbands.

I know there are some who remember Imelda Marcos, the widow of former Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos, notable for her collection of shoes. 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Increasing STEM literacy in Alcona County

The community is encouraged to learn about some of the diverse engineering fields, explore hands-on the engineering process and share the excitement of discovering how the world works during Family Engineering Night.

Hosted by Michigan State University Extension, 4-H and Alcona Elementary School, Family Engineering Night will be held on Wednesday, Feb. 3 from 5 to 7 p.m. and those attending will leap into Science, Engineering, Technology, and Mathematics (STEM).

Formation of the program came after Alcona County 4-H and Michigan State University Extension (MSUE) received a STEM grant from the Michigan STEM partnership for STEM enrichment in Alcona County. The grant funds are targeted to increase awareness and exposure to STEM in area youth. By working with Alcona Elementary, grant funds have been used to support the new Al-4-H STEM Club and purchasing over \$6,000 in VEX Robotics and KNEX construction kits which are on loan to the STEM classroom and available to both 4-H clubs and the school to enhance STEM learning.

Additional plans for the grant funds include the purchase of underwater Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) kits to be used to help start future underwater ROV clubs in Alcona County. The Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary, in partnership with the MSU Extension, will provide training in underwater ROV construction and piloting and will assist teams as needed to use the ROVs for stewardship projects and in participation in the Great Lakes Regional MATE Underwater ROV competition held each spring in Alpena.

Alcona County has one STEM 4-H club "the Student Stewards" which has used underwater ROVS to help monitor fish habitat structures in Hubbard Lake. The Stewards have also had the opportunity to work with biologists in their search for potential habitat for the threatened Hine's Emerald Dragonfly, and to identify potential vernal pools; collecting data for a statewide study.

Alcona County is rich with potential STEM stewardship opportunities - if families or community members are interested in learning about underwater ROVs and starting a ROV or STEM club, contact Les Thomas by email at thoma 322@msu.edu.

4-H has a long standing reputation of engaging youth in experiential, inquiry, hands-on activities. These activities enhance formal (public school) science education through their alignment to the eight Scientific and Engineering Practices. MSU Extension is excited to work with Alcona schools to provide professional development for area educators to

enhance their STEM knowledge and learn additional ways to engage youth in experiential, hands-on, inquiry, STEM activities.

While enriching STEM in the schools, this grant also brings new opportunities to area youth and their families. Area youth new to 4-H will be able to apply for a partial scholarship to 4-H Camp "Go Green!" a multicounty STEM overnight camp held in June each year. This year, youth will engage in recycling, reusing and renewable energy activities.

New 4-H STEM members will also have an opportunity to apply for a partial scholarMICHIGAN STATE | Extension

ship to the multi-day day camp at the Thunder Bay National Marine Sanctuary exploring STEM and shipwrecks. Information about both these opportunities will be sent out to eligible 4-H members in spring 2016.





StarWatch By Gary Becker - Challenger Plus 30

The classroom was packed with kids whose silent stare towards the tube told me that something horrific had happened. The video looped again to the blastoff, the ignition of the huge liquid fuel tank, the buildup of thrust as the Shuttle vibrated to life, swaying ever so gently; then at zero the ignition of the two solid fuel * boosters, and liftoff with a slight forward motion. Already commentators were circling a tiny orange flame coming from the right solid fuel booster, which at about * 70 seconds became noticeably brighter, and then... We can all see it in our minds. The puffs of white crystallized air created by the escaping and combusting liquid hydrogen and oxygen fuel, and the detached solid fuel boosters arching outwards like the petals of a flower. I knew instantly that there could be no survivors. So what happened? Because basic rules were not adhered to, the Challenger was launched in conditions too cold for the rubber O-rings to function properly. They kept exhaust from escaping between the various sections of the solid fuel boosters. One of the O-rings on the right booster had contracted to the point where it could no longer seal its section, and hot, escaping gasses began to burn through it. The flame severed a strut supporting the booster and penetrated the external liquid hydrogen tank of the main engine. Between the pivoting of the solid fuel booster and the 2.8 million pounds of thrust created by the crumbling hydrogen tank, Challenger lost stability. The oxygen tank became compromised, mixing the two elements, and the Challenger exploded. Space travel is still dangerous, and space is unforgiving when mechanical or human errors occur. That's why all astronauts must sweat the small stuff, be on top of every detail, and understand all of the components of a mission to insure its success. They are smart, practical, adaptable, and driven, but most of all, they are heroic. Going into space is not like going to work. January 28 marks the 30th anniversary of the Challenger tragedy. www.astronomy.org


