Republicans host forum for 106th District candidates

With the August 2 primary election less than two months away, the Alcona County Republican Party is providing an opportunity for voters to hear candidates for the 106th District state legislative seat discuss issues relevant to the region in a candidate forum on Saturday, June 11.


This multi-county event, which will be held at the Alcona High School auditorium, will have the following Republican candidates in attendance: Sue Allor, David Ladd Chandler, Jackie Krawczak and Jesse Osmer. Board of commission chairmen from Alcona, Cheboygan, Iosco and Presque Isle counties will take turns asking questions of the candidates.

According to Larry Brozowski, chairman of the Alcona Republican Party, each county comprised of the 106th Legislative District -Alcona, Alpena, Cheboygan, Iosco and Presque Isle - have participated in the process of developing questions for the forum, however, Alpena County opted not to have its commission board chairman participate in the question process. "We've been working on selecting questions for the last six weeks," Brozowski said. "There will be 15 questions asked and each candidate will take turns answering with a specified time allotment for each question."

He explained the forum is a joint effort with the intention of "driving party unity." "We, as a party, stand united for the values that the country believes in," Brozowski said.

The event is free and doors open at 6 p.m. The forum will be held from 7 to 9 p.m. Brozowski said the lobby outside the auditorium will have Republican candidates for the 1st Congressional District -Jack Bergman, Jason Allen and Tom Casperson - in the lobby during the hour prior to the forum. "Every Republican that is running in the county, for any seat, is welcome to participate in the lobby area prior to the forum," Brozowski said. However, the forum is for the candidates running for the 106th District seat currently held by Peter Pettalia, who is not eligible for re-election due to term limits.

Black River Road reconstruction begins

waiting for funding and other factors to fall into place, reconstruction of Black River Road between F-41 and US-23 began Thursday, June 2 with installation of detour signage and mobilization of equipment.

Originally, construction was not slated to begin until the end of July, but Elmer's Construction, the successful bidder on the job, found the timing was right in their work schedule to start the project immediately.

"While we were surprised to hear the project would begin way ahead of schedule, we are pleased to finally have this project underway," said Alcona County Road Commission Managing Director Jesse Campbell. "Road crews had cut the trees earlier in the spring in anticipation of the project being worked on this year, so we were ready and waiting."

The road commission is using about \$173,000 of its allocation of Surface Transportation Program funding and Alcona Township is contributing \$588,000 from its voter-approved road millage

After three years of delays to upgrade the road. This portion of road not only connects two major roads, it is especially important to Alcona Township as it links the east and west sides of the township.

> Work will include placing gravel over the existing surface, crushing the old surface and mixing it with the new gravel, and shaping it to become the new road bed. Other upgrades include replacing a cross-culvert at Sayers Road, cutting the hill east of Sayers down about three feet, widening the paved surface of the road to 28 feet with new asphalt, restoring ditches and shoulders, and finishing the project with pavement markings and new

> According to the construction schedule, the road will be closed to all but local traffic beginning June 6. The strategy is to allow road crews to work without interference with the goal to complete the job as expeditiously as possible. Traffic will be rerouted via a signed detour route on F-41 and US-23. The estimated completion date is July

Lincoln resident new director of Habitat for Humanity

An Alcona County resident has been named the new executive director for Habitat for Humanity of Northeast Michigan (HHNEMI) which serves Alcona, Alpena and Presque Isle counties.

Ted Fines comes to the position after serving on the HHNEMI board for the last two years, most recently serving as the vice president. He also has many years of expe-

rience owning a mechanical contracting business and serving on many other charitable and civic boards. He and his wife, Chris, live in

The executive director position had been held by Wade Yocum who recently resigned to move to the Gaylord, Mich. area to open a counseling center with his wife.

As the executive director, Fines will oversee many aspects of HHNEMI, including staff. He has already reached out to have one-on-one consultations with each of his staff members to better understand their needs and concerns. His next step will be to do the same with board members. "I don't want to push new ideas too fast too often,' Fines said.

He explained a lot of his job includes being the face of Habitat and to unravel myths and misconceptions the public may have about Habitat for Humanity. "We don't give Habitat Fines explained. 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



If I recall, Mikado Township has an ordinance stating your lawn can be no longer



Bob places a top priority on each person being able to afford the highest level of education which he/she desires. In that vein he supports the governor's 2017 budget proposal of the state spending an additional \$61 million on our 15 state universities. This would finally bring funding back to the level it was in 2011 and help make tuition more reasonable for our students who choose to attend one of our existing state funded universities.

Now, even this priority looks like it is in jeopardy as the recent revenue estimating conference shows about a \$200 million shortfall in

our current year and this proposed \$61 million may be on the chopping block.

Additionally, our general fund, which is the main funding mechanism for higher education, is going to be stretched to the max for the next few years. Remember the road package of 2015 is funded by taking at least \$500 million per year out of the general fund.

With the Flint water crisis, the Detroit Public School crisis, and recent news in Oscoda about polluted drinking wells we also need to plan for replacing our crumbling infrastructure statewide to protect the health and welfare of our citizens. When the previously mentioned priorities are achieved I know Mr. Kennedy will support the concept of a four year university in northeast Michigan.

Simple smartphones for seniors

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you recommend some smartphones that are specifically designed for seniors? My 75-year-old mother is interested in upgrading from a basic cell phone to a smartphone, but will need one that's very easy to operate.

Inquiring Daughter

I wrote about this topic just last year, but in the fast changing world of personal technology devices, there's a new crop of simplified smartphones that have recently hit the market that are better than ever for tech-shy seniors. Here are my three top options.

• Doro 824 SmartEasy: Offered by Consumer Cellular, the new Doro 824 SmartEasy is one of the best, simplified smartphones available today. It starts with a bright, 5-inch high-resolution touch screen display that offers large icons and text, and customizable volume settings. Its simpli-

fied design pairs down the options, providing uncluttered, easy access to key contacts and frequently used features - such as the phone, text messages, the camera email and the Internet - right from the home screen. And, it provides help as you go along from the built-in coach.

It also offers a unique preinstalled My Doro Manager app that can also be downloaded by family or friends. This app provides a number of tutorials showing your mom how to enjoy her phone, and gives her trusted contacts the remote ability to help manage and adjust her Doro smartphone from their smartphone no matter where they are.

And for added convenience and safety, the Doro 824 provides three physical buttons on the front of the phone for quick, one-touch access to the home screen, recently used applications, and a back button that returns to the previous screen. It also provides convenient voice typing for e-mails and

texts, and offers a variety of optional health and safety features, like MedCoach, that sends medication and prescription refill reminders. Urgent Care, which provides unlimited access to registered nurses and doctors to answer health questions. And a 5Star medical-alert service that lets you speak to a live emergency-alert agent around the clock. These trained agents will confirm your mom's location via GPS tracking technology and dispatch help as needed.

Available online at Great-Call.com, or at Best Buy, Rite Aid, Sears and Wal-Mart stores for \$150 with a onetime \$35 activation fee and no contract.

• Samsung Galaxy Note5: While this smartphone isn't designed specifically for seniors, its large size (5.7-inch screen) and unique "Easy" mode setting that boosts the icon and font sizes and simplifies the home-screen layout, makes it a good option.

With the Easy mode turned on, the Note5's home screen will display only the time, date and local weather, and six frequently used functions. To access your 12 most important contacts, you would simply swipe the home screen

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

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
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

There is a difference," Fines said.

Volunteerism is the heart of the organization, according to Fines. He explained that is how the organization can keep the homes inexpensive. He said many corporations will send volunteers out to work on a home, but they are always in need of more volunteers.

Habitat families do pay less than renting, typically 24 percent of their income goes to their total housing costs. Fines explained this benefit monetarily changes their quality of life and offers them cleaner and safer homes. It also changes their perspective, as they can no longer expect their landlord to fix things when their home needs repair.

Part of Fines' agenda will be to let the public know the HHNEMI Re-Store offers free pickup of household appliances, furniture, home accessories, and building materials anywhere in Alcona, Alpena and Presque Isle counties. Habitat does not accept old televisions or clothing, but will take just about anything else, including tools.

The Habitat Re-Store, located in Alpena, not only provides materials for HHNEMI to use in building homes, but also has a huge draw in which many local do-it-yourselfers and contractors will visit to purchase supplies at bargain prices. The Home Depot sends many overstock items and things they cannot sell to the Re-Store. Money the store earns goes back into providing safe, affordable homes.

Fines is deeply faithful and is a session member at Spruce Presbyterian Church, He said Habitat for Humanity is a Christian organization, but doesn't discriminate against anyone, no matter what their religion, race, age, gender, political views or any other distinction which often divides people.

In part of his agreement to take the position, Fines offered to take less money as he didn't take the job to earn

it's a home to these people. a big paycheck from the organization. He is also tithing some of the funds he earns back to HHNEMI.



StarWatch By Gary Becker - Living in the Matrix

🔾 · Isaac Asimov's short story, The Last Question, poses the query whether entropy, the wearing down of a system, in this case the universe, could be reversed. The story begins in 2061, but spans trillions of years as humanity expands into the cosmos, eventually populating it in its entirety. During the seven segments of the story, an "automatic computer" continues to reinvent itself assuming more responsibility for the regions of space into which humankind has advanced. With each reinvention, the computer grows smaller and more powerful until in the end, it becomes the consciousness of the universe, joining as one the minds of all humanity stretched across the vastness of space and time. During each segment in the narrative the computer is asked, "Can entropy be reversed?" After trillions of years of analysis, the computer finalizes an answer which is both shocking and yet benign in every aspect. Read The Last Question at http://www.physics.princeton. edu/ph115/LQ.pdf to find out. Related to Asimov's story is the query of whether our universe is, in reality, a computer simulation. It was the topic of the 17th Annual Isaac Asimov Panel Debate (Google this) held on April 5 at the American Museum of Natural History in NYC. The group included three theoretical physicists, a cosmologist, a philosopher, and host, Neil deGrasse Tyson. During the discussions, members described the successes that we have achieved in our attempts to model quarks, the building blocks of matter/energy in the universe, and cosmic rays. If the universe is completely quantifiable, then with a computer large enough, we should be able to simulate it. Like computer programs, glitches occur; and the universe is no stranger to these. It defied the laws of nature just after its creation, allowing for the formation of hydrogen and helium that eventually evolved into sentient beings as well as its brief expansion faster than the speed of light. However, in the end the panel, except for Tyson, felt strongly about the premise that the matrix was not for us. www.astronomy.org



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

Kick off home improvement season with easy maintenance projects

As the days get longer and the weather improves, this is the time to make sure that our homes or rental properties are well maintained. Here are a few do-it-yourself projects to keep your home in tip-top shape:

· Top up your attic insulation. Many older homes have inadequate levels of insulation in the attic that wouldn't meet today's building code. Topping it up will help reduce energy consumption and keep your house cooler in the summer months. A great product for this task is Roxul ComfortBatt insulation. It's easy to install, cuts simply with a serrated blade or bread knife and protects against fire, moisture and mold. Aim for a depth of 16 inches or an R-value of 50.
