## Utilizing local foods priority of cooking demo and dinner

fermenter followed by a gourmet meal featuring foods grown in Alcona County is the first Farm to Fork Alcona event, with plans for many more to come.

The demonstration and locally grown "Taste the Local Difference" dinner, which is the first of its kind in the county, will be held Saturday, Sept. 30.

David Klingenberger, chief financial officer and owner of The Brinery in Ann Arbor, Mich., will be demonstrating the ancient art of fermentation for kimchi, sauerkraut and pickles during the natural fermentation workshop portion of the event at 2 p.m.

According to Judy Mac-Neill, chairperson for the event, Klingenberger is revolutionizing the art of Lacto-

fermentation by taking it back at 5:30 p.m. It will be made to its roots, which predates by The Brinery's chef and A kitchen demonstration refrigeration. He uses salt, head of production in rewith a renowned Michigan not vinegar, for fermenting search, Andrew Stevick. The vegetables and lets them sit in a chilly spot until they are pickled.

"David is a really fun person. The beauty of eating the types of foods he makes is they provide a high amount of probiotics which helps aid digestion. It's a healthy thing," MacNeill said. She also sits on board of directors for Inspiration Alcona -- the sponsor of the event -- and is a nutrition consultant and registered dietitian.

Klingenberger attended the ARA Farmers Market over the weekend and said he was looking forward to the demonstration and dinner.

Following the demonstration, at 4 p.m. there will be appetizers, a cash bar and a mini-farmers market.

Fire fighters were called to an early morning fire on Lake Street in Lincoln Sunday where they found smoke coming from the Iron Skillet Family Restaurant.

First responders were called out at approximately 2:40 a.m. on August 27. First to arrive on the scene were fire fighters from the Lincoln Fire Department and deputies from the Alcona County Sheriff's Office. Mutual aid assistance was requested and received from the Mikado, Harrisville, Barton City and South Shore fire depart-

According to Billy Cordes, assistant fire chief for Lincoln, flames appeared when fire fighters entered the building. He explained the building was large and has many "add ons, which made fighting the fire difficult... we had good water supply - Viking Energy provided water - we had about two tankers per pumper," Cordes said.

The business was closed and no one was in the building, according to the sheriff's office. No one was injured while fighting the fire, Cordes said of the approximately 20 fire fighters who responded.

"I think it's a total loss," Cordes said. "The roof is pretty much gone, the kitchen is destroyed and there is smoke and water damage in the dining area... The fire was mainly contained to the kitchen area and upstairs which was an old apartment that hasn't been used in a long time... mainly used now for storage.'

Fire fighters cleared the scene at approximately 7 a.m. and that is when the investigation by Deputy Robert Clink, fire investigator for the sheriff's office, began. According to Clink, the fire may have started in the kitchen. He is being assisted by Sgt. Dan Drew of the Michigan State Police (MSP) Fire Marshal's office in Traverse City, Mich., MSP trooper Ryan Aper, a K9 handler from St. Ignace, Mich., and MSP trooper Jeff Mercer, an unmanned aircraft operator from Gaylord, Mich., who were on the scene with Clink on Monday afternoon.

The business has been owned by Julie Lecuyer and Heidi Morang since 2003. The






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### Alcona steamrolls Tawas in football

Il was close early. It was a blowout by the end. The Alcona varsity football team, playing at Tawas in both team's football season openers Thursday night, picked up steam as the game went on and rolled to a 46-13 win.

"Anytime you can get a win it's nice, but going on the road and beating a tough Tawas team is really nice and it sets the tone for the rest of the season," said head coach Jason Somers. "(Tawas beating us last year) served as motivation for the off-season work outs, but once we got into the season it was all about us and our ability to get better each week."

The Braves stunned the Tigers with a win in week one last year. The Tigers looked up to the task early, as they scored two of the games' touchdowns to give them a 13-6 lead. Tim Hutchinson scored on a short run for the Tigers.

Alcona took its first lead on a tough, two-yard run by Jack Hutchinson. The twopoint conversion by T. Hutchinson made it 14-13 midway through the second quarter.

From there it was all Alcona

Kyle Haeger scored a touchdown before the half to make it 22-13 at the break and the Tigers punched in a score on their first possession of the second half, with T. Hutchinson finding the end-zone on a seven yard run for a 30-13 lead.

Quarterback Alex Stephenson broke free for a big 55-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter, with Haeger following that with another score for the 46-13 final.

"I believe the success in running the ball comes from the experience on the offensive line," Somers said. "It took them a series to get things figured out, but they were able to adapt and create some running lanes for the running backs who ran with good patience and aggression," Somers said. "The defensive line played well as a unit too, making it difficult for Tawas to run the ball."

T. Hutchinson led the way on offense with 173 yards and two touchdowns on 21 carries. J. Hutchinson ran 12 times for 71 yards and a score. Stephenson had six carries for 66 yards and a score; and Haeger finished with two touchdown runs.

On the defense, Devon Mills and Cody Schram had nine tackles apiece. Stephenson had seven tackles and one interception.

"I thought overall this was a great way to start," Somers said. "I think that the team, who got down early, was able to believe in themselves, not flinch and get the job done. This is a testament to who they are becoming as a football team."

Alcona (1-0 overall) hosts Hillman (0-1) in a rare Wednesday game this week. Hillman is coming off a 35-6 loss to Gaylord St. Mary in its opener. Alcona topped Hillman 46-0 last year.

"I think the keys to winning will be to contain their offense and then execute on offense and be better than week one," Somers said.

cured foods. "This will eventually grow the economy because we are helping each other," Thompson said.

Farm to Fork Alcona is also looking for certification by Taste the Local Difference (TLD), a full-service local food marketing communications firm which offers a broad range of services including website designs and development, logo designs, media buying and planning, search engine marketing, social media management, video production, photography and more.

Approximately 100,000 copies of the TLD annual guide to local food in northern Michigan is distributed across Michigan to draw attention to locally grown products from locations like Leeseberg Farms, Cedarbrook Trout Farm and the ARA Farmers Market, according to Thompson.

"If you are certified by TLD it means 20 percent of the food at your event is locally obtained. At this event, 86 percent of the food will be obtained locally. Our goal is 100 percent, but some things are tricky to obtain here, such as lemons," MacNeill said.

The Farm to Fork Alcona event is sponsored by Inspiration Alcona, a nonprofit organization formed to make Alcona County a destination spot for artists of all kinds to learn, be inspired and unleash their creativity, and hopes its events will build a new economic base for Alcona County through cultural tourism.

The event is a fundraiser for other endeavors of Inspiration Alcona and the Farm to Fork Alcona movement, specifically the upcoming Al-

cona Regional Farm Conference which is scheduled for February 10, 2018.

# Free book program for local children

### Scientists team up to track fish

Biologists and scientists have teamed up to track fish across the Great Lakes using sound—a literal Great Lakes

It's like the world's biggest game of Marco Polo, but with

The Great Lakes Acoustic Telemetry Observation Systems (GLATOS) is a network of researchers sharing fishtracking data from across the Great Lakes basin.

Acoustic telemetry tracks fish by surgically inserting a tracker into them before releasing them back into the water. As the fish travels, it emits an audible ping that can be picked up by markers placed in bodies of water across the region.

The problem for some researchers is that tracking a fish relies upon the placement of their markers, according to Chris Holbrook, GLATOS technical coordinator. He's based at the U.S. Geological Service's Hammond Bay Biological Station in Millersburg, Mich., near Lake Huron.

The most general and popular method: you put out an individual receiver and tracker and you determine what fish were present at that point," Holbrook said.

The GLATOS system is different because of its range. In most cases, if a researcher releases a tagged fish that finds its way out of the range of that researcher's own receivers, that information would be lost. GLATOS has hundreds of stationary receivers placed throughout the Great Lakes. A researcher who is a member of GLATOS has access to data picked up by all receivers across the Great Lakes.

Tracking can be imprecise and affected by many variables, said Carl Ruetz, a researcher from Grand Valley State University's Annis Water Resources Institute who tracks lake sturgeon with sound. Ruetz is not a member of GLATOS.

"With our array, the only thing we can tell you is whether or not (a sturgeon) was picked up by a particu-

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# Forest tent caterpillar feeding is over, follow step to keep trees healthy

made life miserable for homeowners and woodlot owners across much of Michigan's northern Lower Peninsula this spring as it fed on oak, aspen and sugar maple trees. The good news is that caterpillar feeding has come to an end for this season.

Widespread outbreaks occur in Michigan every 10 to 15 years. Past outbreaks peaked in 1922, 1937, 1952, 1967, 1978, 1990, 2002 and 2010. While caterpillar activity statewide can remain high for up to five years, outbreaks in any one locale normally last for two or three years. Outbreaks decline suddenly once parasites and other natural enemies become ac-

"Trees rarely die from forest tent caterpillar defoliation unless they've been seriously weakened by drought, late spring frost or other stressors," said Roger Mech, a forest health specialist with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR). "Heavily defoliated trees will develop a second set of leaves a few weeks after being stripped. These new leaves are often smaller than normal."

Once caterpillar feeding stops, mass flights of forest tent caterpillar moths can occur in late June and early July. Adult moths do not feed. They will mate and die over the course of a few weeks.

Adult moths have a wingspan of around an inch, are buff-colored and have a broad brown band across the front wings. They are night fliers and often attracted to lights in large numbers.

The forest tent caterpillar is native to Michigan, where it has evolved with the state's forests over the centuries. Fortunately, natural controls also have evolved, helping to prevent widespread damage following outbreaks.

One insect in particular, commonly known as the 'friendly fly,' is an effective parasite that lays its eggs on forest tent caterpillar cocoons, preventing them from developing into adult moths.

"These large, slow-moving flies do not bite, although they can be a nuisance for a few weeks when their numbers are high," said Mech.

Homeowners with trees that have been heavily defoliated should make sure those trees receive at least one inch of water per week during the growing season. Applying a slow-release tree fertilizer in the fall also will help trees recover quickly and prepare them for any defoliation that might occur next summer.


Now that caterpillar feeding is over, spraying insecticides is not an effective method of control. When caterpillars are small, spraying Bt - a biological insecticide on the leaves can help protect foliage without affecting natural enemies of the forest

tent caterpillar.


Woodlot owners should focus on keeping their forest healthy by periodically removing trees that are dead or in poor condition. This increases the amount of sunlight available to remaining trees and reduces competition for water and nutrients.

A professional forester or consultant can help develop a management plan that will ensure your woodlot is healthy and thriving. Contact your local conservation district or extension office for a list of area foresters.

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

# How to stop unwanted junk mail and guard against mail fraud

Dear Savvy Senior, My elderly father gets over 100 pieces of junk mail every week, and I just discovered that he's given away nearly \$5,000 over the past few months to many of the solicitors that mail him this junk. Can you offer any tips on how can I stop this?

**Irritated Son** 

Dear Irritated,

Millions of older Americans get bombarded with unwanted junk mail these days, including "mail fraud" schemes that you and your dad need to be particularly careful of. Here's are some tips that may help.

While junk mail comes in many different forms - credit card applications, sweepstakes entries, magazine offers, coupon mailers, donation requests, political fliers, catalogs and more - the most troublesome type is mail fraud, which comes from con artists who are only trying to take your money.

Mail fraud can be tricky to detect because there are schemes out there that may seem legitimate. Some of the most common mail scams targeting seniors today are phony sweepstakes, foreign lotteries, free prize or vacation scams, fake checks (see FakeChecks.org), donation requests from charities or government agencies that don't exist, get-rich chain letters, work-at-home schemes, inheritance and investment scams, and many more.

If your dad is getting any type of junk mail that is asking for money in exchange for free gifts or winnings, or if he's receiving checks that require him to wire money, you need to call the U.S. Postal Inspector Service at (877) 876-2455 and report it, and then throw it away.

Unfortunately, once a person gets on these mail fraud lists, also known as "suckers lists," it's very difficult to get off. That's because these criminals regularly trade and sell mailing lists of people who they believe to be susceptible to fraud, and they

many different types of won't remove a name when you request it.

Knowing this, a good first step to help protect your dad is to alert him to the different kinds of mail fraud and what to watch for. The U.S. Postal Inspection Service can help you with this. They offer a list of the different mail fraud schemes at PostalInspectors.uspis.gov.

Another option is to see if your dad would be willing to let you sort through his mail before he opens it so you can weed out the junk. You may want to have the post office forward his mail directly to you to ensure this.

If your dad feels compelled to donate to certain charities, ask him to let you check them out first to make sure they're legitimate. You can do this at charity watchdog sites like CharityNavigator.-org and

While scam artists aren't likely to take your dad's name off their mailing lists, most legitimate mail-order businesses will. To do this, start with the Direct Marketing



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Association, which offers a consumer opt-out service at DMAchoice.org. This won't eliminate all his junk mail, but it will reduce it. The optout service is \$2 for 10 years if you register online, or \$3 by mail.

Then, to put a stop to the credit card and insurance offers he gets, call the consumer credit reporting industry opt-out service at (888) 567-8688, and follow the au-

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
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

tomated prompts to opt him out for either five years or permanently. Be prepared to give his Social Security number and date of birth. You can also do this online at OptOutPrescreen.com. If you choose the permanent opt-out, you'll have to send a form in the mail.

You should also make sure your dad's home and cell phone numbers are registered with the National Do Not Call Registry (DoNot-Call.gov, (888) 382-1222), to help cut down on telemarketing calls.

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

lar receiver," Ruetz said. Detection "also depends on if it's a windy day. Is it stormy? Is there a lot of boat traffic? There are lots of things to consider.'

If a signal from a tracked fish is picked up, the GLATOS database can provide specific information, like a timestamp on a fish's arrival and departure, that researchers couldn't get otherwise, said GLATOS Director Charles Krueger.

"They're able to get that date, the time and place, so it expands their receiver coverage well beyond the few receivers they might be able to purchase," said Krueger, a professor of aquatic ecology and conservation at Michigan State University.

Holbrook said that what distinguishes GLATOS are its resources and dense network of receivers.

'We're essentially using the receivers in a way that's analogous to GPS satellites," Holbrook said. "If you have a grid of receivers that are close together enough that one signal is detected on multiple receivers, you can use the timing of that detection to get a precise position on that

The idea of a data network for tracking fish stemmed from a 2001 project tracking walleye in Lake Erie, Krueger explained. He and his team had difficulty tracking walleye that move long distances across multiple research jurisdictions. They brainstormed a way to track fish across the Great Lakes.

We actually envisioned we could wire Lake Erie and find out where the walleyes went." Krueger said. "We had never conceived of being able to do something like that. Now we have the technology to do it."

Membership to GLATOS is free and open to anyone working on an acoustic telemetry

project in the Great Lakes. In return, GLATOS asks members to upload their tag detection data to the database on its website for other researchers to track their own fish, Holbrook said.

The database really just streamlines that whole process," Holbrook said.

While static trackers are in use now, Holbrook said GLATOS is trying to develop mobile methods of tracking.

The biggest development in mobile tracking has been the "robofish" Gliding Robot ACE, or GRACE, developed by Xiaobo Tan, director of the smart microsystems lab at Michigan State.

The robofish is an abouta-yard long, green fish lookalike outfitted with fins and a tail. An operator pumps water in and out of GRACE to ascend and descend, while shifting water around the hull to glide through water. GRACE is essentially a mobile receiver and the goal is to have a "sea" of robofish to track fish in and across any body of water, Tan said.

"It will allow robots to do underwater communication, between each other or between the robot and the base station," Tan said.

Holbrook said GRACE is the future of fish tracking. "The first big goal for GRACE is to put the receiver on and make it a mobile platform," Holbrook said. "That is advancing the field as a whole because now we don't have to guess where a fish could be.'

August 30, 1917 ~ Washington, D. C., AUP. 29-Wild blackberries picked by children will help the Army and Navy to get the eleven million pounds of blackberry jam they must have. In view of the shortage of cultivated blackherries, the United States Department of Agriculture urges the women and girls and boys to gather all the wild blackberries they can find, to supply commercial canning establishments.

Blackberry jam is particularly desirable because it has medicinal qualities which coun-teract certain intestinal troubles, in addition to its welcome place in the diet as a sweet.

The wild fruit is not as pulpy and is likely to be more seedy than the cultivated varieties, but there is an abundance in many of the Northern States. The difficulty of getting help on a commercial scale has prevented the gathering of the wild berries, but if the children can be enlisted to do their patriotic part, it will give the packers a chance to supply what the military authorities need. It is also pointed out that at the prevailing prices they may get good money return for their time and labor.

In each community some local grocer should be able to learn the name of a manufacturer who may be willing to buy the berries. In New York, for example, the canneries are so numerous throughout the State that little trouble should be experienced in finding a market

#### StarWatch By Gary Becker - The Other Einstein: Too Much Speculation

Reading the jacket reviews for Marie Benedicts, The Other Einstein, Sourcebooks Landmarks, 2016, you get the impression that this work may be truly a significant contribution to the history of science. Its not! Benedict traces the university life of Mileva Maric and her romantic relationship with classmate, Albert Einstein, in a mainly fictional account. Maric was a mathematics and physics major attending Zrich's (Switzerland) Polytechnic, who finished her coursework, but failed to pass one of the mathematics components of her exams. Sadly, she never graduated. I think Benedict provides an excellent portrayal of the mental turbulence surrounding an intelligent and

I think Benedict provides an excellent portrayal of the mental turbulence surrounding an intelligent and forward-thinking woman during the early 20th century, who is cloistered by a male-dominated discipline and society. Maric was against marriage, knowing full well that it would ruin her scientific aspirations and relegate her to being caretaker of her husband and their children. As the narrative proceeds, the stalwart Maric slowly succumbs to the amorous attentions that Albert is displaying. They eventually consummate their relationship, with Mileva becoming pregnant as a result. Retreating to her family in Serbia, she gives birth to Lieserl in early 1902, but Albert seems to be indifferent to Milevas suffering. The infant dies, possibly of scarlet fever, in September of 1903, but before that, she returns without Lieserl to Bern where Albert is working in the Swiss patent office. He and Mileva marry in January 1903. As the book continues, it becomes more fantasy than historical fiction. Benedict allows Albert to take the rap for Mileva not graduating from the Polytechnic. Later, in an aha moment, Mileva, not Albert, is responsible for conceiving some of the major concepts of special relativity, such as time dilation. Benedict also has Mileva playing a pivotal role in Einsteins annus mirabilis (miracle year1905) where Albert publishes four groundbreaking papers, including his treatise on special relativity of cities ber as contributor in the other menuscripts because she had not contributed from the Polytechnic. Here relativity. Albert fails to include Milevas name as a co-author of special relativity or cite her as a contributor in the other manuscripts because she had not graduated from the Polytechnic. Here the facts are simply lacking. As time passes, Albert becomes more distant and is distracted by other women (true), but he also becomes physically abusive toward Mileva. Her only recourse is separation (1914) and divorce (1919). 

# Trying to fire bad VA employees

The Department of Veterans Affairs doesn't typically air its dirty laundry in public, but a recent press release included the headline "MSPB forces VA to take back fired official" -- just when we thought they were able to unload bad employees.

In April 2017, the director of a VA medical center was demoted. The center kept running out of critical supplies because it had no inventory system, and the surgical supplies they did have were frequently kept in dirty storage areas. The VA Office of the Inspector General report used the phrase "the highest level of chaos." In three years there had been over 190 reports of compromised patient safety. Multiple serious surgeries had to be canceled due to lack of equipment. In short, the place was a mess. The VA demoted the medical director within hours.

In June, President Donald Trump signed the VA Accountability Act, which speeds the process of getting rid of rotten employees.

Enter the VAOIG, which found another reason to fire the guy: As part of yet another investigation of this employee, it discovered he had been sending VA emails to his personal accounts as well as to his wife, emails that contained sensitive personnel info as far back as 2012. He refused to give her email address, claiming spousal privilege (which didn't stop the VAOIG from finding it, of course). The guy was fired.

One day later, the Merit Systems Protection Board issued a stay order: The VA couldn't fire the guy until the MSPB waded through his claim of a wrongful termination. The former director is back at work, on the payroll, but in a role that keeps him away from patient care. The Office of Special Counsel will assess the information in light of the act the president signed in June.

# Did you know?

Of the 29 projects it studied for its 2017 "Cost vs. Value Report," Remodeling magazine found that the average payback in resale value was 64.3 cents. The lone project in the 2017 report to return a higher value than its cost was the installation of loosefill insulation in an attic, which provided a return of 107.7 percent. Homeowners who replaced an existing entry door with a 20-gauge steel unit recouped 90.7 percent of their investment at resale, placing that project second on the list. What helps homeowners who finance such projects recoup their associated costs is the relatively low sticker price of the projects, which both rank among the five least expensive projects examined in the 2017 report. But a recovering real estate market has helped homeowners recoup more of their investments on some expen-

sive projects as well. For installations, and famexample, the 2017 report saw the biggest year-over-year percentage increases in value on expensive projects like upscale bathroom remodels, upscale master suites, two-story additions, grand entrance

ily room additions. The increase in value on those projects ranged from 5.6 percent to 7.4 percent from a year earlier. FH178235
