Local road projects on tap for late summer

The Alcona County Road Commission has three road construction projects on tap for this season that will not begin until August and September.

This could be good news for two of the projects, which are in resort areas where traffic numbers are typically higher in summer, according to Jesse Campbell, managing director of the Alcona County Road Commission.

Originally scheduled to start July 31, reconstruction of a section of Cedar Lake Road in Greenbush Township has been changed to start on September 5. Likewise, a portion of Mt. Maria Road at the south shore of Hubbard Lake is slated to begin on September 5. The

third project, which is on F-41, is scheduled for August

According to Campbell, work on Cedar Lake Road from Thayer Road to Cedar Lake Drive on the west side of Cedar Lake will include clearing of the right of way, replacing culverts, crushing the existing surface, adding gravel, reshaping the road bed, and repaving, along with drainage improvements and road shoulder and ditch restoration. Team Elmer's is the primary contractor and work is expected to be complete by the end of October.

Mt. Maria Road from Hill Street to Hilltop Parkway in Hawes Township will see culvert replacement and crushing the existing surface, adding gravel, reshaping the road bed, repaving, and new signage. This work will be done by Bolen Asphalt Paving Inc. Campbell explained this project should be wrapped up by mid-October.

The work planned for F-41 will be on the section from just south of Goddard Road to Andrews Road in Mikado Township. On this project, the top of the existing surface will be milled off and an overlay of new asphalt will be added. The project will also include guardrail improvements and new signage. Bolen Asphalt will be the contractor on this job, as well, and should be complete by September 1.

Campbell explained that these projects are continuations of previous projects and all are part two of three-part projects. "We would rather be able to do longer sections of road at a time, but the funding process and the availability of funds limit what we are able to do," Campbell said. "At least we are making progress on some sections of road that are in real need of improvement."

Campbell explained that Cedar Lake Road was last resurfaced in 1983; Mt. Maria Road in 1997; and F-41 in

The final section of Cedar Lake Road from Cedar Lake Drive to F-30 is on the docket for 2021. On Mt. Maria Road from Hilltop Parkway to Ann Street in 2018 and on F-41 to F-30 in 2018.

"None of these projects would be possible without contributions from the respective townships that supplement funding using voter-approved road millages," Campbell said. "We work closely with townships in setting road improvement priorities. A good road system benefits the entire county in one way or another, so we are always mindful of matching funding with projects that improve and keep the road network in Alcona County in the best condition possible."

mphony orchestra to perform in I

Combining the classical music of Dragonetti, Beethoven and Rossini with the backdrop of a sun setting behind a picturesque lake is sure to be a sensory delight.

It's exactly the experience the Alpena Symphony Orchestra (ASO) was looking for when planning its first outreach concert which will be held at the Lost Lake Woods Club on Saturday, July 29.

The 38-piece orchestra, conducted by Jim Van-Eizenga, will feature string bass soloist Kyle Pitcher who will perform "The Concerto for String Bass and Orchestra in G Major." The ASO will also be performing Beethoven's "Symphony No. 5 in C Minor" and the "Sinfonia" from Rossini's "The Barber of Seville.'

MaryAnn Hubbard, an Alcona County resident and ASO principal flutist, explained that for a long time she had the desire to share the orchestra's music with her neighbors and friends of Alcona County. "The last time I was at a function at Lost Lake Woods, I thought of what a beautiful venue the clubhouse would be for a classical music concert. My colleagues on the ASO board were more than happy to consider it. We are anxious to expose a new audience to or performance of great music played well," she said.

Hubbard hopes the young people the area, especially those interested in playing a musical instrument, will be able to attend the performance. Students and children are admitted free of charge.

Hubbard, who is a former public-school music educator for both Alcona and Alpena, said one of her goals in teaching is to convince young musicians to continue playing music as an adult. "Almost everyone in our orchestra is employed, or has been employed in other areas, but carries the love of music and performance with them forever. Music is a discipline of the arts that speaks to all ages, cultures and interests,"

Hubbard said.

Cynthia Atkinson, cellist for the ASO, agreed with Hubbard and said the outreach was not only intended to spark interest in potential musicians and audience members, but will educate and entertain artists of all music levels.

"I believe having the ASO perform in Alcona County will provide the community with a wonderful opportunity to experience classical music. Geographical borders should not hinder anyone's access to different forms of art and by performing in a region outside of usual, we are reaching out to those who

Mr. Cushion is survived by his wife, Lela; one daughter, Christine (Dale) Smith; one



To the Editor,

My mother-in-law had two bouts with cancer, a disease that eventually took her life. But because my father-inlaw's union worked diligently to negotiate better benefits for his family, they had adequate health insurance.

They did not go bankrupt, as many people with serious diseases have. And when my mother-in-law needed a \$5,000-a-dose drug, our family didn't have to hold a spaghetti dinner to afford it.

But we all know there are bad insurance policies. We pay our premiums faithfully, only to find, when we need the coverage, our policy doesn't meet our needs.

Obamacare has a provision to fix this unconscionable problem. The 10 most important health concerns must be covered in each policy. One, maternity care, is often targeted as an example of something people should not be forced to buy. Men, especially, feel that way. But if only policies for women

have to contain maternity care, employers that are required to provide insurance would just hire men to avoid having to pay for higher cost insurance.

And think about it — shouldn't we all want to invest in healthier children?

But since people cried "government over reach" the new Senate Trumpcare bill allows states to get a waiver to strip out the 10 mandatory coverages. And, if you work for a company that has plants in multiple states, they can pick which state's rules they want to follow.

People will be back to paying for insurance that doesn't cover their needs when they most need it. We will be back to trying to keep people alive by holding bake sales to cover their bills.

Obamacare does need some tweaks. But it took months to craft because it is a sound bill that moved us in the right direction.



The hidden dangers of heartburn

Dear Savvy Senior,

Is regular heartburn or indigestion anything to worry about? My 60-year-old husband eats a lot of Tums or Rolaids throughout the day to help him manage it, but it keeps him up at night too. What can you tell us?

Inquiring Spouse

Dear Inquiring,

Almost everyone experiences heartburn or acid indigestion from time to time, but frequent episodes can signal a much more serious problem. Here's what you should know, along with some tips and treatments to help relieve your husband's symptoms.

It's estimated that more than 60 million Americans experience heartburn at least once a month, with around 15 million people who suffer from it daily. If your husband is plagued by heartburn two or more times a week, and it's not responding well to overthe-counter antacids, he needs to see a doctor. Frequent bouts may mean he has gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), which can severely irritate and damage the lining of his esophagus, putting him at risk of Barrett's esophagus and esophageal cancer if it's not treated.

Depending on the frequency and severity of his heartburn, there are a number of lifestyle adjustments he can make that can help provide relief and avoid a more serious problem down the road. Consider these tips:

 Avoid problem foods: Certain foods can trigger heartburn symptoms like citrus fruits, tomatoes, fatty foods, chocolate, garlic, onions, spicy foods, mints, alcohol, coffee and sodas. Your husband should keep a food diary to track which foods cause him the most problems and avoid them.

• Eat smaller, slower and earlier: Smaller portions at mealtime and eating slower can help reduce heartburn symptoms. He should also wait at least three hours after

eating before lying down or going to bed.

• Lose weight: Having excess weight around the midsection puts pressure on the abdomen, pushing up the stomach and causing acid to back up into the esophagus.

 Quit smoking: Smoking can increase stomach acid and weaken the valve that prevents acid from entering the esophagus. If your husband smokes, the National Cancer Institute offers a number of smoking cessation resources at SmokeFree.gov or call (800)QUIT-NOW.

 Sleep elevated: To help keep the acid down while sleeping, get your husband a wedge-shaped pillow to prop him up a few inches. If that's not enough, try elevating the head of his bed six to eight inches by placing blocks under the bed posts or insert a wedge between his mattress and box spring. Wedges are available at drugstores and medical supply stores. Sleeping on his left side may also help keep the acid down.



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If the lifestyle adjustments don't solve the problem, or if antacids (Tums, Rolaids, Maalox, Mylanta or Alka-Seltzer) aren't doing the trick there are a variety of overthe-counter and prescription medications that can help, along with surgery. His doctor can help him determine which one is best for him. Treatment options include:

 H-2 Blockers: Available as both over-the-counter and prescription strength, these drugs (Pepcid, Tagamet, Axid and Zantac) reduce how much acid your stomach makes but may not be strong enough for serious symptoms.

• Proton-Pump Inhibitors (PPI): If you have frequent and severe heartburn symptoms, PPIs are long-acting prescription medications that block acid production and allow time for damaged esophageal tissue to heal. They include Nexium, Prevacid, Prilosec, Zegerid, Protonix, Aciphex and Dexilant. Prevacid 24 HR, Prilosec and Zegerid OTC are also available over-the-counter. But be aware that long-term use of PPIs can increase your risk for osteoporosis and chronic kidney disease.

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





July 19, 1917 ~ In the passing of Mrs. D. E. Storms from our midst last Saturday morning the community has suffered a distinct loss which it keenly realizes universally mourns.

the Presbyterian church, being conducted by Rev. C. M. Boyce, assisted by Rev. F. A. Andrews. Burial took place in the Storms family lot in the West cemetery.



StarWatch By Gary Becker - Ripples in Time

. SUSAN: In soft summer evenings of long ago, pale twilight deepens as the streetlights bloom with yellow halos. The heat of the day dissipates, and on one such occasion, the neighborhood kids get a chance to see far beyond the lights of their city to an alien world. Behind the sleepy street where lights in houses shine warmly, a man sets up a telescope. He was an anomaly. No one I knew had a telescope much less looked through one, but there he was in the alley with this scope. What was singular was that he allowed us all to have a peek. To me that was exiting to see a planet, Saturn no less, and it wasnt in a book or on TV. It was like a tiny detailed toy hanging by an invisible string in the blackness of space. From this urban locale, it was difficult to see anything noteworthy, but with his expertise, he had found Saturn to the delight of us all. Sometimes small events can cause ripples, and as such, they can carry their motions and effects forward, long after their creation has passed. I found myself getting interested in astronomy which led me to tell a high school friend who was also involved in sky watching, about my experience much later. That led to our going to a local astronomy club, the Lehigh Valley Amateur Astronomical Society, where I heard another student speak on meteor showers and how to observe them. Years later at the same club, I saw the same person, now a man, giving a lecture on the moon. I ended up marrying him nearly four years later. So that anonymous neighborhood man began something in my life that influenced it ever after, in a sense like a ripple in time seeking its shore. GARY: I remember that night well, in July of 1969 a skinny, rising sophomore at Kutztown University, interested in becoming an educator, director of the junior contingency of LVAAS, giving his first formal presentation to senior members of the club. I was dressed in a coat and tienervous, but the talk went well, and afterwards a group of individuals gathered around me to ask more questions. My future wife was in that small audience. Years later, when I arrived for my presentation on the moon, unknowingly, she was the woman that I chose to sit behind before being introduced to speak, and she was also in the small group of people that gathered to query me afterwards. In a very serendipitous way, our ripples in time connected and amplified on that evening of October 3, 1978, and nearly four decades later, now married to my Susan for 35 years, I can honestly say that it was the best moment of my life. www.astronomy.org

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Aloments In Time By The History Channel



• On Aug. 4, 1753, George Washington, a 21-year-old Virginia planter, becomes a Master Mason, the highest rank in the secret fraternity of Freemasonry. Washington soon would command his first military operation as a major in the Virginia colonial militia.

• On Aug. 5, 1858, after several unsuccessful attempts, the first telegraph line across the 2,000-mile Atlantic Ocean is completed, often at a depth of more than 2 miles. It ceased functioning a month later. In 1866, a British ship succeeded in laying the first permanent telegraph line.


