## Firework bracelets support proposed Hubbard Lake community center

The Hubbard Lake Community Association is nearing its tenth year of trying to raise funds for a new community center/library, a project which it estimates will cost nearly half a million dollars. The group has raised close to \$150,000 and, although the goal is a long way off, they are not giving up the

To raise much needed funds and awareness to the cause, glow in the dark bracelets are being sold for \$5. The fundraiser began as a way people could donate to the Fourth of July fireworks show which an individual family puts on each year at the lake.

"The owners of the Hardwoods rekindled a firework show their father used to put on each year. The show lasts about a half hour and can be seen from anywhere around the lake," said Jeff Johnston, president of the Hubbard Lake Community Association (HLCA).

The fireworks show will begin at dark on Sunday, July 2 with a rain date of July 3.

According to Johnston, the Butler/Vanerlinden family, owners of The Hardwoods, an expansive area of Hubbard Lakefront property, put on the fireworks show.

"Lots of people reached out to them to say the fireworks were great and wanted to contribute to help support their continuance. They are a very private family and wanted nothing in return, but have graciously suggested if people

enjoy the fireworks they consider making a monetary gift to the HLCA library building fund. They felt if the community association could benefit from the fireworks, then they would like to see that happen," Johnston said.

The proposed community center/library would be about a 5,000-square foot facility with the library on one side of the building and the community center on the other. This would double the square footage of the current community center building.

The building was originally used by the Hubbard Lake Fire Department and was adapted into a community center many years ago. According to Jonnston, the building is in disrepair and lacks sufficient handicap restroom facilities and other amenities which would make it an attractive place for families to hold functions.

The space planned for the library would double the current Caledonia Library, a branch of the Alcona County Library system. Johnston explained it would provide a computer lab with access to wireless Internet and other resources, tutorial rooms, and a children's reading/play area. It would provide a comfortable place to read, study

For an 11-year-old Spruce girl, viewing Alcona County life through the lens of a camera is a natural everyday occurrence, even though she has dealt with vision challenges throughout her life.

Liberty Kimball, an Alcona Elementary student, began wearing glasses when she was three years old. Her mother, Bessie Schlehr, said she is nearly blind in her left eye, is far sighted and has astigmatism.

However, being visually challenged hasn't slowed Liberty down one bit. According to her family, including her grandma, Cyndi Apsey, nothing holds her back from enjoying life.

Recently, Liberty had the pleasure of uncovering a large photo she took of her Clydes-

dale horse, Trout, which was put on the window of a vacant storefront in Spruce. The window clings were the idea of the Loyal Ladies, a small band of women trying to make blighted rural areas around Alcona County more appealing. Cyndi and Bessie are members and Liberty is a junior member.

It was Cyndi who first introduced her granddaughter to photography and noticed her talent. "I was finding pictures that she took with my camera of me. I don't usually like pictures of myself, but these were good. They were candid shots of me doing what I enjoy doing around the farm. She's very good at capturing the right moment," Cyndi said.

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



# How to fight dry eyes and protect your vision

Dear Savvy Senior

What all can be done to combat dry eyes? Since I turned 50, my eyes have become increasingly dry and irritated.

**Constantly Blinking** 

Dear Constantly,

Dry eyes is a common problem that affects more than one-third of middle-aged and older Americans. But you don't have to just put up with it. There are lifestyle adjustments and multiple treatment options available today to keep your eyes moist and healthy.

Dry, red, irritated eyes are one of the most common reasons for visits to the eye doctor, but discomfort isn't the only problem of dry eyes. Light sensitivity and blurred or fluctuating vision are common problems too, and worse yet, dry eyes are more likely to get scratched or infected, which could damage your vision permanently.

The reason people get dry eyes are because they either

don't produce enough tears to keep their eyes properly lubricated, or because they produce poor quality tears.

In some cases dry eyes can be triggered by medical conditions such as diabetes, thyroid diseases, allergies, rheumatoid arthritis, lupus and Sjogren's syndrome. It can also be brought on by age (tear production tends to diminish as we get older), eye conditions, eyelid problems, certain medications, environmental factors and even LASIK and cataract surgery. Dry eyes are also more common in women, especially after menopause.

The first step experts recommend in dealing with dry eyes is to check your lifestyle and surroundings for factors that might be contributing to the problem and make adjustments:

- Avoid blowing air: Keep your eyes away from air vents, hair dryers, oscillating and ceiling fans and consider buying a home humidifier.
  - Blink more: When you're

reading, watching television, or using a smartphone, tablet or computer, take frequent breaks because these activities cause you blink less of-

- Avoid irritants: Avoid smoke-filled places and if you swim, wear goggles to cut down exposure to chemicals.
- Use protection outside: When you go outdoors, use sunglasses that wrap around the sides of your face to protect yourself from sun, glare, wind, and dust.
- · Check your meds: Dozens of prescription and overthe-counter (OTC) drugs like antihistamines, decongestants, diuretics, betablockers, antidepressants, tranquilizers, and Parkinson's medications can all cause dry eyes. If you're taking any of these, ask your doctor about alternatives.
- Get more omega-3s: Studies show that eating more fish and other foods rich in omega-3 fatty acids (or take a supplement) helps some people.

If adjusting your environment and habits doesn't do the trick, there are a variety of OTC artificial tears that can help. If you experience a lot of burning, try another product or opt for a preservative-free formula. If your dryeye is persistent, use gel-containing drops like Refresh, Systane and GenTeal. The gel will keep your eyes lubricated for longer periods. If you need a product that's even longer lasting, consider OTC lubricating ointments like Refresh

If the lifestyle and OTC treatments don't help, see an ophthalmologist. He or she can offer additional advice

and may prescribe a medication. There are several FDA approved medications for dry eye including Xiidra and Restasis, and one in development called Lacripep.

If your dry eye is severe and does not improve, you doctor might recommend a simple office procedure that plugs the small openings (tear ducts) that drain tears away from the eyes. Blocking these openings with punctual plugs keeps tears in place longer.

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
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

and relax, while helping students in the area and others that need tutorial help.

"We want activities there for the kids. The Harrisville library is a magnificent facility, it's beautiful and has a lot of programs going on there. We would like this library to be a mini-version of what Harrisville is. The library doesn't want to own the building, they only want to rent, so we would provide them with a long-term rental agreement," Johnston said.

He explained the community center would benefit by having the library there to split utility costs which would include air conditioning.

According to Johnston, the new community building would be, at the least, audio visually prepared to keep current with what the public wants in such a facility. "Audio visual is a big thing; many parties and events require it. We want a facility we could offer to the public on a rental basis for family gatherings, reunions, baby showers, Christmas parties, funerals, wedding receptions or rehearsal dinners. We'd like to offer a setting which is inviting, clean and comfortable," he said.

At this time, the community center is used in the fall and winter for an exercise/ workout class and is occasionally rented for birthday parties, but since bingo is no longer lucrative and had been discontinued, the building this would be to our commurelatively goes unused, Johnston explained.

The parking lot is used during the spring and summer months for a farmer's market. The Internet is available at the community center and it's common to see four or five cars parked outside the center as folks are accessing the Internet yearround.

Johnston was recently was approached by a yoga and a dance instructor interested in using the community center to give lessons, "We are nity. It's hard to reach out to them. They come for a weekend and they are focused on their family and summertime enjoyment and I don't know if they pick up what's really going on around the lake. We put up posters and stuff, but it's tough to get the word out

to everyone," Johnston said. An annual golf outing sponsored by the HLCA raises \$5,000 to \$8,000 a year. It will be held on August 13 at White Pine National. Another fundraiser the group has had in the past, and hope

constantly trying to find new and creative uses for the building. Having a community center and not having it used is not very functional. It's like building a resume in that the more activity you can put in the building the easier it is to justify, whether for grants or whatever," Johnston said.

The HLCA has applied for grants for the building, but Johnston said it was difficult to find them. He explained the group wants to raise the necessary funds prior to building. The HLCA does not want to ask for a millage of any type because it would be a privately-owned building. They also don't want a mortgage on the property because they are unsure if they would be able to make a monthly payment.

He explained one of the difficulties in obtaining local funds is trying to reach the seasonal residents around the lake. "I don't know if they understand what we are trying to do. What a great asset to have again, is a dock raffle which has been donated by Hickory Dickory Docks, owned by Dennis and Sue Richardson.

The bracelets and addressed donation envelopes are available at Q & C Marathon Gas Station and other places in and around Hubbard Lake.

All funds are being collected by the Community Foundation for Northeast Michigan (CFNEM). Johnston said they were chosen because they can collect the funds, either in cash, check, credit card or pledge or by cash equivalent donations such as real estate or stocks which they can liquefy, keep them separate, accounted for, and anonymous, if requested.

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

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



## George L. Colwell passed away

Former Alcona County Lumberman was 90 Years of Age

**June 28, 1917** ~ The following is taken form the Portland (Oreg.) Oregonian of June 17:

'George L. Colwell, pioneer lumberman, born in New York in 1827, died Friday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. M. L. Gram, 401 Twelfth Street, after a lingering illness. The funeral will be held from the Finley chapel Monday, June 18, at 2:30 p. m.

Mr. Colwell was for many years, prior to his retirement one of the best known figures in the lumbering business of Washington and Oregon, he had extensive interests in llwaco, Wash., at the mouth of the Columbia. Mr. Colwell was a Mason since 1852. Besides his daughter, he is survived by two grandchildren, Mrs. F. H. Morris and Mrs. W. L. Kirkpatrick, and two great-grandchildren, all of Pomona, Cal."

Geo. L. Colwell was a prominent figure in Alcona County back in the early days, being a member of the lumbering firm of Weston, Colwell & Co., which in 1866 bought out the Harris Bros. He remained an active partner in this firm until its dissolution in 1875, when they sold their large pine interests back of Harrisville to R. A. Alger & Co. The firm of Colwell Bros. & Co. was organized shortly after this and did an extensive lumbering business. The mercantile firm of Colwell,

McGregor & Co. came into existence about this time, also, and with all of these Mr. Geo. L. Colwell was prominently connected. In 1876 he bought the mill site and rebuilt the mill which has been destroyed in 1873, and manufactured the lumber for the firm. He also engaged extensively in lake transportation, owning and operating two lines of steam barges doing a general freighting business. Mr. Colwell retained his

interest here until in 1888, when the saw mill burned and the decreasing supply of timber did not warrant its rebuilding. Soon after this he became interested in the west and moved there to engage in lumbering.

Mr. Colwell was married on May 18, 1847, to Margaret A. Weldon, who passed away many years ago.

### WM. R. Cumming

Pioneer Citizen Succumbs to Ravages of Age and Disease

June 28, 1917 ~ William R. Cumming, an old and respected citizen of Harrisville Township, passed away Saturday morning at his farm home after an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Cumming was born May 6,1838, in Ganada and came to Alcona County 46 years ago. Very soon after coming here he settled on the farm where he died and resided there continuously thereafter. The story of his life differs only in minor details from that of scores of other old pioneers who started in the wilderness to make a home for self and family, and his demise removes one more of those citizens whose true worth and value to this community will perhaps never be fully known or appreciated.

Mr. Cumming is survived by his widow, two sons and a daughter. The latter are Wm. H. of Alberta, George R. and Miss Jennie, at home.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday morning at 10:30 at the home, by the Rev. G. M. Byce, and burial took place in the family lot at South Harrisville.

#### StarWatch By Gary Becker - Learning to Love the Moon



. I used to hate the moon. It was the ultimate star destroyer for deep sky objects like nebulae and galaxies, and especially for meteor observing, causing an ultra-clear night in the country to look more like a sky lit by a large metropolitan area. And then one day, when I was older, probably in my forties, I decided to examine the moon more closely through a telescope. I discovered a wondrous landscape that Ill spend some time discussing next week. I also enjoy watching its rapid motion across the sky from night to night. Luna travels about 26 of its diameters each day (13 degrees), catching up to and passing bright stars and planets along its celestial path. All this happens during a period of a little less than a month, 27.3 days, the orbital period of Luna around the Earth. This week, the moon treks towards brilliant Jupiter, just to its right by five degrees on Friday and

today through Friday, with the highest temperature of 110 in Bullhead City, Ariz.

eight degrees to Jupiters left on Saturday, July 1. Then slogging eastward, Luna heads towards Saturn during the next three days, approaching the Harvest God by July 5. The following evening, the 96 percent lit moon passes over Saturn by less than three degrees low in the SE. On July 9 just after midnight, the full moon lights up rural landscapes bright enough to perceive colors and hike trails exposed to the sky without flashlights as I have done numerous times during vacations in the Southwest. In national parks like Bryce Canyon, moonlit hiking is encouraged by the Park staff. I volunteered at Bryce for two years and was given the assignment of imaging its hoodoo-laced landscape by moonlight. That was a wonderful experience with Luna following me everywhere that I went as my trail companion. I have also enjoyed observing the moon in a more subdued form when it is a thin crescent and embraced in earthshine, the old moon in the arms of the new. Earthshine is caused by the reflected sunlight of our planet mirroring from the portions of the moon that are not sunlit. You can only catch earthshine when the moon is a thin crescent as the light of the old day fades into deep darkness. Tonight, and Monday evenings, June 25/26 are this months opportunities. Binoculars will help reveal more distinctly this ghostly sight. Finally, do not forget the opportunity of seeing a new moon when it hides the sun on August 21. 



Liberty picked up her grandma's Cannon camera when she was about five years old and often goes on photo shoot expeditions around the county with Cyndi, who also lives in Spruce. "We get up early. Sometimes an hour before the sun comes up and Grandma will drive to Black River or someplace to take pictures," Liberty said.

Occasionally Liberty will go with her grandmother to help on photo assignments such as weddings or family photograph sessions, but mostly they enjoy taking pictures of animals, lakes, sunrises, sunsets, nature and wildlife year-round.
