# Residents take cover and dig out as winter blusters on

# Spring, where art thou?

Mother Nature decided to play a late April Fool's trick by sending a blizzard across the northern mid-West including the northern Lower Peninsula and the Upper Peninsula.

During the last four days a winter storm has dumped multiple inches of snow, sleet and rain along with 50 mile an hour winds to compound matters.

Beginning last Friday af-

ternoon when the storm hit northeastern Michigan, safety warnings urged motorists to stay home due to hazardous travel conditions and by Sunday the list of closings – schools, public buildings, private businesses, churches, etc. continued to grow.

Most people took the warnings seriously. According to Jeff Brackett, director of 911 Alcona County Central Dispatch, first responders dealt with very few situations due

to the weather. From Friday afternoon (April 13) to the end of Monday (April 16), first responders handled seven single vehicle accidents, 11 people who became stuck while traveling, seven electrical wires down, two trees down across roadways and nine medical runs.

"We didn't have very many accidents due to the winter weather," Brackett said. "We don't have large intersections like you see in other places, so our accidents are usually one vehicle situations where people slide off the road, or the ambulance needs help because it has gotten stuck in the wet, heavy snow. The road commission was great with quick responses in those situations. There were minimal accidents and it seems like most people stayed off the roads on Sunday and Monday."

Alcona County Road Commission employees have been working a lot of overtime during the last several days and will likely continue to rack up time on the 800 miles of county roads during the rest of the week.

According to Marlena Mac-Neill, a representative of the road commission, long days and nights have been made longer because of the need to go slow for many reasons – slick road surfaces, wet, heavy snow accumulation and soft gravel roads and shoulders.

"They have to go slow because its soft underneath the snow and they can get stuck and they don't want to gouge the roadways or shoulders, plus, equipment can be damaged. We've had to use every one of our spare trucks... we let Lincoln use our last spare because their truck broke down. Fortunately, the spirit of cooperation is good even though everyone is dealing with the same problems,"

MacNeill said. She explained there are 20 truck drivers who have been working pretty much around the clock since Friday afternoon in an effort to keep the state highways (five trucks for 40 miles of continual clearing, which is high priority) US-23, M-72 and M-65 open to traffic and county roads as open as possible. High winds and blowing snow did not make that job easier; neither did the rain, sleet, snow mixture that fell steadily for three

"We are trying to use graders more than trucks because they are better at clearing this type of snow. But, we only have two graders, so that makes it slow going," MacNeill said. "We are encouraging people to be patient. We know everyone is frustrated with this and there is a feeling of isolation that can come from being in a storm like

"But, please keep in mind, human beings are driving those trucks and they are doing the best they can. They can only do so much. They are trying to keep up. More snow today didn't help at all. We have dedicated employees who are doing a great job. Remember, this is only temporary. In a week you won't be able to see what we've done," she said.

## Therapy dog to aid elementary students

Alcona Community Schools administration is always looking for new and innovative ideas and tools to help its students achieve academic success. Sometimes out-of-box thinking turns up unconventional approaches.

One approach is a school facility/therapy dog. The dog in mind for the task is a male golden retriever which was born earlier this month. He will be named Cona and once he is fully certified, which takes about a year, he will be attending school daily to help elementary students increase reading skills, improve student interaction, increase productivity, boost self-esteem, and foster critical thinking skills while reducing stress, anxiety and depression in students.

Mael Fritz-Wilson, the school's success liaison, who brought up the idea of having a therapy dog, said programs like this have had enormous success. She hopes to model a program being used in Brighton, Mich. Brighton Area Schools was so pleased with the benefits its students received they expanded the program from one dog to having a dog in every one of their eight schools.

As school success liaison, Fritz-Wilson sees students every day who are struggling through anxiety or stress. She said it doesn't take much to stress students, especially in a school where the majority of students are from low-income households and are considered high risk.

She explained even kids from well off families feel stress and it doesn't take much to stress an elementary student. The stressors can be anything from having a bad morning, misplacing a shoe or book, to big issues like family struggles or bullying issues. "Once stressed, it consumes their whole day," Fritz-Wilson said.

Fritz-Wilson has done a lot of research on the subject and said stress raises cortisol levels making it nearly impossible for a student to think, learn, or sometimes to even sit still. (Cortisol is a stress hormone released by the adrenal glands.)


"Studies on raised cortisol levels show they are measurable even the next day, they stay in the human body that long, but by simply petting a dog, cortisol levels reduce rapidly," Fritz-Wilson said.

"When you pet a dog and you get that warm fuzzy feeling in the center of your chest, that's a physical response to stress leaving your body. The less stress the better the attention span. Petting a dog can even lower the risk of childhood obesity, something we are fighting on a national level that we can make a difference right here in Alcona County," she said.

Another measurable benefit for having a therapy dog is increased reading scores. Fritz-Wilson said reading to a dog, 20 minutes a day for 10 weeks can increase a student's fluency by eight to 10 words per minute.

Fritz-Wilson is also hoping the dog may help with truancy issues, which is a major problem across northern Michigan schools. To get students to want to go to school each morning Fritz-Wilson will have a name of one or two students announced over the loud speaker congratulating them on being able to get the dog's water and give him

# School therapy dog program needs funding

It's not uncommon for teachers and staff to reach out to the community for funds to help with such things as field trips or computers. However, a new request is being made this year for a very special educational tool -- one that's furry, has four legs and a wagging tail.

Alcona Elementary School is making plans to receive its first service/facility dog. The dog, a male golden retriever named Cona, will be owned by the school and will be available to students and teach-

ers in order to reduce stress and anxiety while increasing a child's learning success. (See related article.)

Mael Fritz-Wilson, Alcona Elementary School success liaison, has spent a lot of personal time researching the benefits of having a therapy dog. The school's administration is fully behind getting one, however, her biggest hurdle is finding the funding to cover the first year's expenses. She is currently seeking about \$8,000.

used to the sights, sounds and smells of the school when children are not there and gradually increase the amount of time spent and the amount of interaction with students. Even though Cona will belong to the school, Fritz-Wil-

son will be taking him home with her when she leaves for the day and during school breaks and summer vacation.

During his first year he will go through a series of indepth training and obedience sessions by professional trainers and will not be in the school full time until it receives its K-9 Companion Certification. Staff will also be trained with the dog and even students will have training sessions on how to handle

Fritz-Wilson said every situation which could cause an undesired effect by having a therapy dog in the school, has been researched, including any liability issue. "The dog will be very well trained and will never be roaming the halls unattended. There will be an adult supervising at all times. The school's liability insurance already covers the dog.

"Protocol will be in place such as only a certain number of students can greet the dog and students must ask

the scene of a rollover accident on Wednesday, April 11. According to a report from the Alcona County Sheriff's Department, deputies were dispatched at approximately 5 a.m. They found a silver Mitsubishi Eclipse amidst headstones in the cemetery.

According to the report, it was determined the vehicle left the roadway on the west side of the highway and struck several trees and multiple headstones before coming to a rest. There was heavy damage to the vehicle, but no driver was found at the scene.

The driver, Zachary Williams, 38, of Oscoda was later found outside a nearby residence nearly one quarter of a mile away from the accident scene. He was transported by Alcona County EMS to Mid-Michigan Medical Center in Alpena to be treated for severe injuries.

The accident remains under investigation. The sheriff's department was assisted by Oscoda Township Police, Harrisville fire department first responders and Alcona County EMS.

Alpena Alcona Area Credit Union (AAACU) was recently announced as an Exceptional Member Initiative award winner in the Illumination Community Leadership category. ### **US-23 Reconstruction**

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) is investing \$10 million to reconstruct 5.7 miles of US-23 from north of Tawas Beach Road to south of Kirkland Drive in East Tawas, Iosco County. The project also features new curb and gutter, new storm sewer, and safety improvements, including extension of the center left-turn lane to Aulerich Road. It will also include installing new rumble strips and pavement markings. The estimated starting date is Monday, April 23 and estimated completion date is October 31. ### Quit Smoking via Quitline

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) is expanding its telephone coaching and nicotine replacement therapy program to all Michigan residents through May 31. During this time, the Michigan Tobacco Quitline will offer a free, two-week supply of nicotine gum, patches or lozenges for all new enrollees who want to quit smoking or chewing tobacco. Tobacco users who would like to quit may call the Quitline phone at 800-QUIT-NOW (800-784-8669). Enrollment is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The Quitline serves all ages, however, callers seeking NRT must be over 18 and meet basic health requirements. Enrollees will receive a coach who will assist them in setting a quit date, choosing a nicotine replacement product that is right for them and making an individualized quit plan. The coach will provide support with up to four telephone coaching sessions scheduled around the caller's quit date.

### Health Care Scholarships

permission to pet the dog. This will give students responsibility and awareness on how to conduct themselves. Every time a student touches the dog they will have to wash their hands afterwards. This may have dual application, the increased hand washing might cut down on cold, flu and strep germs in the school," Fritz-Wilson said.

She also considered any allergies a student might have with the dog and protocols will be in place for that as well. She explained one of once he is fully trained and once the staff and students are trained, will out way the risk substantially.

'We all saw the news of the therapy dogs waiting in line to greet the students at Parkland, Florida, after their trauma. Dogs can have a pronounced healing effect on humans after a tragedy, but what if we brought that dog to school before the tragedy happened? Could it have been avoided? Many times, children can work through their problems and struggles just by talking to a dog.

the benefits of choosing a water dog, such as a golden retriever is they don't produce as much dander as other dogs because they have an oilier coat. "People often misunderstand allergies to animals. Humans are not allergic to fur, they are allergic to proteins in animal saliva and dander. If a child was so allergic to a dog they couldn't be in the building with it, they would have the same reaction if they were sitting next to a student with a dog at home." Fritz-Wilson said

According to Fritz-Wilson the odds of allergies being a serious risk are very low and said that in Brighton Schools, where they have 7,500 students, compared to the 300 students at Alcona Elementary, they only had one student who was allergic to the dog and it was remedied simply by not allowing the dog in that student's classroom.

Protocols will be in place for monthly bathing and grooming of Cona, brushing him and using dander wipes him daily. Cona will have regular wellness visits with Alcona Animal Clinic to keep him in the best physical condition.

Fritz-Wilson feels confident that although she cannot eliminate risk from anything, the dog benefit, especially



the first year in getting the infrastructure started. Once we get the program going, the basic costs will drop significantly," Fritz-Wilson said. She hopes in a year or two, when the elementary school program is seeing success, a similar program will be used at the high school with an additional dog.

In the first month of fundraising Fritz-Wilson has acquired about \$1,300 but will need an additional \$800 by the end of this week to purchase the dog in mind for the task.

While \$8,000 seems like a large amount of money for a dog, Fritz-Wilson wants the community to understand this is no ordinary dog. The cost of just getting the puppy is \$2,000, which is a discounted price from the

According to Fritz-Wilson, the puppy has already been born under the guiding eye of Karen Vandenberg of Vangohlden Retrievers in Grand Rapids, Mich. Vandenberg is a specialty breeder with 21 years of experience in breeding service dogs for post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) patients and Paws with a Cause dogs, which help handicapped people with tasks they can no longer do themselves such as turning on lights and opening doors, drawers and much more.

Vangohlden breeding stock dogs have good health certifications, go through genetic testing and temperament testing. Her breeding stock dogs all have good hips, elbows, eyes and heart certifications. "She also tests the

parent dog's DNA to make sure it doesn't have a cancer gene which is common among American lines from overbreeding," Fritz-Wilson said.

The puppy will come with copies of its parent's health clearances and Vandenberg guarantees her puppies to be in good health. Before leaving the breeder, the puppy will be vet checked, have its first shots, is de-wormed, microchipped and given lots of love and attention.

According to the Vangohlden website, Vandenberg has a degree in animal behaviorism and temperament is of paramount importance to her. Any dog that is food aggressive, overly shy, or any extreme from the breed standard is not used in her breeding program. She does not kennel her dogs so all Vangohlden dogs are family pets and live in her home with her four young daughters and some cats. "When you get a puppy from us you can be assured that it is very well socialized with kids, cats, and dogs," Vandenberg said.

Fritz-Wilson said Vandenberg used to work in a school, so she understands the need and the duties the dog will perform and is excited to be a part of the program at Alcona Community Schools. She plans to stay involved throughout the seven or eight years Cona will be working with the school.

The bulk of the funding, about \$6,000, will be for specialized and obedience training for Cona so that he can receive a K-9 Companion Certification after he is a year old. It will also go towards training and educational materials for staff and students, habitat improvements, such as dog beds in every classroom the dog will be visiting and a special doggy reading area in a section of the school called the four corners, complete with picket fence, dog house, and comfy bean bag chairs for the students to sit in and have quiet one-on-one

time with Cona.

Funds will also go to care for him including, food, shots, annual preventative supplies (heartworm, flee and tick, etc.), any medication it may need, daily dander wipes, monthly grooming expenses and whatever else the dog may need including chew toys, leashes, collars, water bowls and a vest for the dog to wear when he's on duty.

Fritz-Wilson said the school's insurance rider already covers any liability insurance necessary at no extra expense.

"This is a community outreach project. We are hoping to have Cona participate in this summer's Fourth of July Children's parade. The dog will be owned by the school, but it's not just the school's dog, it's the community's dog," Fritz-Wilson said.

She will be fostering Cona and taking him home with her at the end of the school day and during school breaks and vacations. However, she wanted to make it clear to everyone that Cona is not her dog. She explained the project has many teachers backing it and several have stepped

forward to aid in caring for him when school in not in session, should Fritz-Wilson need the help.

"I plan to make Cona a tangible part of the community. He will be a common sight around town, he will go to the library, the state park, be at parades and events, or just out and about for an ice cream cone. Cona will be very tech savvy for a dog and will have his own Facebook page, Twitter account and be on Instagram, where I will announce events and places he will be attending so the community can meet him and ask any questions they have about him," Fritz-Wilson said.

Cona's specialized training will be done locally and in Grand Rapids, Mich. with professional dog trainers who have had success in training K-9 Companion Certified dogs. During his first year, Cona's time spent at the school will be gradually increased, so he is fully comfortable with the setting and being around students.

"We might be able to get grants in the future, but that's not what I really want to do. I think it's important to have the community feel involved in this project. If we could get 800 people to donate \$10, everybody would get to say they helped with it.

"It's civic pride and when the community is proud of something like this, the students feel it too. The more pride the student has, the more likely they are to achieve success in school and become an asset to their community. We frequently wring our hands and say, 'What can I do?' after a tragedy, but this is something we can do to possibly prevent a tragedy. That's worth every penny of \$8,000," Fritz-Wilson said.

Sponsors and businesses will be asked to help fulfill the bulk of the expenses and will be publicly recognized in some way. "We will be thanking the business/sponsor on Facebook and possibly radio. For certain larger donations, the business name will probably be embroidered on the dog's vest or Cona will make a special visit to the business to get a picture with the owner or employees to be sent out on social media. I haven't quite figured out all the particulars of sponsorship yet," Fritz-Wilson said.

A "Go Fund Me" campaign page has been opened for Cona's expenses and bake sales, including one at the Huron Community Bank, Harrisville branch, June 1 are being put into place.

## Is your blood pressure too high?

Dear Savvy Senior,

What numbers constitute high blood pressure? I use to be pre-hypertensive, but they keep changing the guidelines, so I'm not sure where I fit in

Approaching 60

Dear Approaching,

If you're unsure what your blood pressure levels should be, you're not alone. Recent changes in the hypertension guidelines made by the American Heart Association and the American College Cardiology mean that roughly 30 million more Americans than previously thought are now considered to have high blood pressure (hypertension).

According to the new guidelines, anyone with a blood pressure reading above 130/80 is considered to have high blood pressure.

Previously, those with a blood pressure reading between 120/80 and 139/89 would have been put in the prehypertension category and wouldn't have been con-

sidered hypertensive until they got to 140/90.

But the new guidelines eliminate the prehypertension category, putting everyone with systolic pressure readings (top number) between 120 and 129 and a diastolic reading (bottom number) below 80 in a new "elevated" category. And those with a reading of 130/ 80 or higher fall in some stage of hypertension.

Here's a complete rundown of the new five category blood pressure ranges:

- Normal: A top number less than 120 and a bottom number less than 80.
- Elevated: A top number between 120 and 129, and a bottom number less than 80.
- Stage 1: A top number between 130 and 139, or a bottom number between 80
- Stage 2: A top number of 140 or higher, or a bottom number of 90 or higher.
- Hypertensive crisis: A top number over 180 or a bottom number over 120.

high blood pressure don't know they have it because it usually has no outward signs or symptoms. But high blood pressure, over time, can damage your arteries and increase your risk for heart disease, stroke, kidney damage and even dementia. To guard against this, everyone over the age of 40, as well as those younger with risk factors for hypertension should get their blood pressure checked at least once a year.

If you find that your blood pressure numbers fall in the 'elevated" category, you should take steps now to get it under control. Lifestyle changes like eating a healthy diet, losing weight, exercising, watching your salt intake, quitting smoking, and cutting back on alcohol is often all you need to get it back to normal.

Even if your blood pressure numbers are in the "stage 1" category, lifestyle changes are recommended first, unless you've had a heart attack or stroke, or you're at high risk for cardio-

vascular problems because you smoke, have high cholesterol or type 2 diabetes. Then medications may be prescribed.

But if your blood pressure falls in the "stage 2" or higher category, the new guidelines suggest medication, regardless of age, plus lifestyle changes.

There are several different kinds of drugs used to lower blood pressure. It usually makes sense to start with the oldest, safest, and least expensive drug: diuretics, or water pills, such as chlorthalidone or hydrochlorothiazide. But these meds can drive up blood sugar levels, so if you have type 2 diabetes or

are at risk of it, your doctor may prescribe another drug, such as an ACE inhibitor, ARB or calcium channel blocker.

You should also be aware that blood pressure drugs could cause side effects including dizziness, gastrointestinal problems, fatigue and headaches. They can also cause a decline in kidney function so make sure your doctor periodically monitors your potassium lev-



## Where to find smallmouth bass this spring

catch-and-immediate-release fishing on bass on all year in Michigan, many are having fun targeting this species. There are plenty of locations throughout the state that offer exceptional smallmouth bass fishing, but the list below is a good way to find trophy-sized fish.

• Lake St. Clair: Make sure to cover lots of ground when visiting this water body and cast to the edges of weed patches.

· Lake Erie: The shallow areas of this lake are good places to start, after the water warms up head to deeper

· Saginaw Bay: Target around the Charity Islands which separate Lake Huron's deep water from Saginaw Bay's shallow depths.

 Grand Traverse Bays: Look for structure such as drop-offs, sand points, rocks or weed beds at this spot.

Don't forget -- the catchand-keep season on all waters, including the Great

Since anglers can practice Lakes, doesn't open until May 26 while the catch-and-keep season on Lake St. Clair, the St. Clair River and the Detroit River doesn't open until June 16.

### Northeast **Lower Peninsula** April 12

• Cheboygan River - Anglers caught steelhead at the dam with spawn, beads, spinners, worms and minnows. Conditions were a bit difficult because of high currents from overflow.

• Ocqueoc River - Fishing pressure was slow at times, but anglers have caught steelhead averaging 15 inches. Try spawn and spinners.

 Rogers City - Had a good 13 inches of snow. Nothing is open yet, and no docks were in because of ice.

• Alpena - No boats were out, but the launch next to the Alpena Fish Station is open and has a dock in. The city ramp was still iced up.

• Thunder Bay River - Fishing was slow, but anglers were getting a couple of steelhead

and Atlantic salmon when drifting flies or spawn bags with bobbers. The water is low, clear and very cold.


• Oscoda - Pier anglers caught a couple of walleye and the occasional Atlantic salmon, steelhead or lake trout when still-fishing with minnows and spawn bags or when casting deep diving or sinking crank baits.

• AuSable River - Steelhead were caught by anglers drifting or floating wax worms, flies and spawn bags through the holes. River temperatures were hovering around 39 degrees, and the water is very clear, so winter tactics continue to produce best. Some fresh fish entered the river, and a fair amount of black stone flies were

• Black River - Despite on and off skim ice, anglers found a couple of steelhead at the mouth of the river when floating spawn bags.

• Harrisville - Had no angling activity. Skim ice continues to form overnight in Mortheast Michigan

the harbor, disappearing in the afternoon. The skid piers were not in the water yet.

• Higgins Lake - Those fishing in the shallows near Big Creek and the Conference Center were still getting some rainbow trout.

• Tawas - Pier fishing was slow, with only one Atlantic and a couple lake trout or walleye caught.

 AuGres - Only a couple boats ventured out, and they caught a fairly good number of post-spawn northern pike and a couple walleye out from the river mouth. They also took some walleye and lake trout between Point Lookout and Pointe AuGres. Perch fishing was slow at the mouth

of the Pine River.

• AuGres River - Down at Singing Bridge (Whitney Drain), steelhead anglers were doing well in both the lower river and in the surf. They were either drifting spawn or wax worms down the river or still-fishing with floating spawn sacks in the surf. A few anglers dragging small boats across the beach and launching to fish just off the river mouth were getting some steelhead, lake trout and coho close to shore.

• Rifle River - Sucker fishing is ongoing at Omer, but the run slowed with the colder weather. Warmer weather later this week might get something going.

Art criticism is notoriously fickle. Today's celebrated artist gets to be nobody soon. After suffering years of denigration, Norman Rockwell is now valued as a far more important artist than the critics had thought him only a few years ago. This poem by Terri Kirby Erickson, a North Carolinian, could have appeared on the cover of The Saturday Evening Post, and I mean that as a high compliment. It's from Erickson's book, Becoming the Blue Heron, from Press 53.

### **Fund Drive**

She could be a Norman Rockwell painting, the small girl on my front porch with her eager face, her wind-burned cheeks red as cherries.

Her father waits by the curb, ready to rescue his child should danger threaten, his shadow reaching halfway across the yard. I take the booklet from the girl's outstretched hand, peruse the color photos of candy bars and caramel-coated popcorn, pretend to read it.

I have no use for what she's selling, but I can count the freckles on her nose, the scars like fat worms on knobby knees that ought to be covered on a cold day like this, when the wind is blowing and the trees are losing their grip on the last of their leaves. I'll take two of these and one of those, I say, pointing, thinking I won't eat them, but I probably will.

It's worth the coming calories to see her joy, how hard she works to spell my name right, taking down my information. Then she turns and gives a thumbs-up sign to her father, who grins like an outfielder to whom the ball has finally come—his heart like a glove, opening.



## Army pets and K. P. job keeps Lloyd busy

**April 18, 1918** ~ April,

Friend Walter:

Letter No. 2: Moved from Kelly Field March 29th and I left Bob and McDougall behind.. I was sorry to do it but couldn't help it.

Well, now for my new location: I am at Camp John Wise; this is a balloon camp and they have some balloons here-they are 92 feet long, 27 feet wide and sausage type, called captive balloons and used for observation; they have a lifting power of 2,767 pounds and it takes 44 men to handle one. A Balloon Company has 200 men in it. I think I'll send Dad Beever one to use next fall hunting deer. We are also learning the wigwag and we have our orders to learn, and then comes our drilling, 8 hours a day. So you see we are kept busy all the time.

It is sure warm here, about 80 in the shade, but the nights are nice and cool. We have lots of rattle snakes,

one fellow killed one 4 feet long with 12 rattles on; we also have lizzards and we have to put our shoes up high at night because a scropion or tarantula might get into them and they are deadly poison. So you see we have lots of pets here and what seems queer to me is that I have been in service a month and I haven't been in the guard house yet-but I have had the K. P. twice (kitchen police) sure is some job.

I received a letter from Clyde Potts the 7th; he likes the army fine. Oh say, how about the O. M. A.? The army is equal to the 32nd degree. Ha! Ha! It sure did rain here the 5th—hail and rain, the hail stones were as large as a base ball and we had to keep to our tents because a man would get badly bruised up if he ventured out. Some hail. In this Lone Star State the ground is equal to cement.

Well, news is scarce here for all the boys are strangers to me, so I think I'll lay low for

awhile. Best regards to all my friends and enemies, I am as B-4, Lloyd M. Carriveau. 35th Balloon Co., Camp John Wise, San Antonio, Texas.



### StarWatch By Gary Becker - Robotic Observatory Becoming a Reality

Moravian College Astronomy's buy-in for a 25 percent usage of a new robotic observatory being constructed at the Mars Desert Research Station near Hanksville, Utah is becoming a reality. The bulk of the facility was made possible through a \$50,000 gift to the Mars Society, but funding was insufficient to make the observatory fully robotic or capable of conducting research unless onsite. As a member of the astronomy team of MDRS, I was participating in the planning of this sky watching station, and I had an idea. During late spring of 2014, I was beginning to refurbish the Sky Deck on the rooftop of the Collier Hall of Science. New instrumentation was part of that goal, and a steady flow of money into the MoCo astronomy program

was being accumulated through public donations. Enter Boyertown astronomy enthusiast, David Fisherowski, who began gifting quality used telescopes and mounting systems to our astronomy program, and it became obvious to me that Moravian had within its grasp, the ability of promoting a robotic astronomical research facility in one of the darkest regions of the US as well as accomplishing with a small delay, the goals of revamping the Sky Deck. MoCo Astronomy will remit a check to the Mars Society for \$20,000 in the next several weeks to make the MDRS Observatory robotic and research capable. The final piece of the puzzle has been my recent acquaintance with John Higbee, a resident of northern Virginia, who restores older astronomical instrumentation. Our existing cadre of telescopes will not be "junked," but hopefully sold to other enthusiasts who are interested in refurbishment. That should be sufficient to supply the additional capital to spur the modernization of the Sky Deck in a timelier manner. If someone would have told me that this is where we would be when Dave Fisherowski made his first donation to Moravian in early June of 2014, I would have laughed. Not so anymore. A great summer of discovery and observing lies ahead! www.astronomy.org

### Moments In Time By The History Channel



- On April 25, 1859, at Port Said, Egypt, ground is broken for the Suez Canal, an artificial waterway intended to stretch 101 miles across the Isthmus of Suez. Labor disputes and a cholera epidemic slowed construction, and the Suez Canal was not completed until 1869 -- four years behind schedule.
- On April 27, 1865, boiler explosions on the Mississippi River steamboat Sultana kill an estimated 1,547 people, mostly Union soldiers returning home after the Civil War. The passengers were killed by flying metal, scalding water and collapsing decks.
- On April 28, 1897, the Chickasaw and Choctaw, two of the Five Civilized Tribes, agree to abolish tribal government and communal ownership of land, following the goals of the Dawes Severalty Act. The other tribes soon followed, throwing open all of Indian Territory to white settlement.
- On April 29, 1945, the U.S. Seventh Army's 45th Infantry Division liberates Dachau, the first concentration camp established by Germany's Nazi regime. In the course of Dachau's history, at least 160,000 prisoners passed through the camp.
- On April 23, 1969, Sirhan Sirhan, a Palestinian immigrant, is sentenced to death after being convicted in the assassination of politician Robert F. Kennedy. In 1972, Sirhan's sentence was commuted to life in prison after California abolished the death penalty.
- On April 26, 1977, the world-famous Studio 54, in New York City, opens its doors for the first time. Actors, models, musicians and athletes, as well as political figures came out to be seen during the disco club's brief heyday, which lasted less than three years.
- On April 24, 1980, an ill-fated military operation to rescue the 52 American hostages held in Tehran, Iran, ends with eight U.S. servicemen dead and no hostages rescued. The hostages would not be released for another 270 days.
