Paying tribute to Krejcarek - long-time coach and mentor

The 500 plus attendees of last Friday's girls varsity basketball game witnessed a special halftime tribute for the individual who took the initiative and had the vision, drive and dedication to bring sports programs for girls to Alcona High School.

The evening was home-coming for Alcona, which featured back-to-back varsity games for the girls and boys teams, crowning of the Winterfest king and queen, and welcomed countless former student athletes who played for Joell (Johnson) Krejcarek.

Krejcarek began her teaching career at Alcona High School in the fall of 1966 after graduating from Northern Michigan University with a bachelor's degree in physical education and science the previous spring. One year later she organized the first girls basketball team at Alcona High School, and began a 31-year coaching career.

An 8 foot by 12-foot banner with all the accomplishments of Krejcarek's coaching career was presented at the beginning of the ceremony and will hang on the east wall

of the new gym. In addition to starting the girls basketball team, she also started girls softball, volleyball and track teams during her career. Every young woman who has played, or will play, sports at Alcona High School has Krejcarek to thank.

Several former players were seated on the court with Krejcarek and family members including her husband, Don Krejcarek, brothers, Ardy Johnson and Dan (Kathy) Johnson and several others. The players included, KiAnn Kruttlin, Roxanne (Sterling) Hanner, Cindy Derocher, Traci Apsey, Lynn (Langenburg) Gibson, Mendy (Matuzak) Romero, Vicki (Franklin) Kersten, Alicia (Kilbourn) Kozak and Ashley

Speakers for the tribute included Hanner, Derocher, former girls basketball coach John Katona and superintendent Dan O'Connor who presented Krejcarek with a plaque. Don Franklin was the emcee for the tribute.

During her coaching career at Alcona High School Krejcarek coached basketball teams that won eight district titles, two regional titles and one quarter-final title, plus and an undefeated team (20-0) in 1991 and an almost undefeated team in 1979 – lost the first game of the season by one point and then won 19-0 for the season.

Krejcarek retired from Alcona Community Schools in 1998 with 32 years as a teacher and 31 years as a coach where she coached and mentored 192 young women.

According to tribute committee member Patti Byce, approximately 50 to 75 former players attended Friday evening's tribute and an open house for Krejcarek the next afternoon. "The tribute was very touching," Byce said. "The gym was very full and the cheers from the crowd on Friday night were very loud. Everyone stood throughout the tribute. It was wonderful."

While many people were involved with the tribute and contacting former players, committee members who planned the events included Don Franklin, Vicki (Franklin) Kersten, Byce, Dan Mullen and Dan O'Connor.

Addiction recovery experience benefits others

Overcoming a drug or alcohol addiction can be a long, grueling process, but with a lot of hard work, taking the proper steps, it can be done.

Often, it takes someone who has been at the bottom themselves to understand how to help other addicts recover

Jessica Hope knows how hard the process is. She has been there. She has turned her life around and is helping other addicts get their lives back.

After her third driving under the influence (DUI) offense, Hope entered the Drug/Sobriety Court (drug court) program for the 23rd Circuit and 81st District court.

She participated in drug court in 2014 and graduated from the program in December of 2015 and marked her fourth year of sobriety recently. Hope is now the case manager coordinator for the same program which covers Alcona, Iosco and Oscoda counties.

Hope explained that the drug court program helped to change her life by giving her the tools she needed and she is passionate about the program.

She owes a lot of her success to Cheryl Malette, a retired state trooper working for Northern Michigan Drug Screening and Judge Laura Frawley for having faith in her abilities. "They rooted for me, advocated for me and are the ones who gave me a chance to do what I'm doing today. They changed my life immensely," Hope said.

It is Hope's job as case manager coordinator to monitor drug testing results, verify participants' attendance in substance abuse treatments, check compliance logs, get participants into inpatient rehabilitation, find the funding for rehabilitation, log all data collected and generally make sure all 17 of the active drug court participants are doing what they are supposed to be doing.

When a person enters the drug court program, Hope is one of the first people they speak with and she begins every conversation by telling them about her, where she started and how hard she worked to be able to do the job she does.

"I let them know I have first-hand experience when it comes to addiction. I think they appreciate that I've been where they are now. It helps them to relate better to me. I know everything they are going through. I went through it. We have that in common," Hope said.

Hope, a mother of two sons ages 20 and two, said her success came through drug court because people like Malette, Frawley and family members who believed in her and saw a potential in her which she didn't see. They had faith in her abilities and she didn't want to disappoint them, which helped her find her own self-worth. She strives to give that same faith and compassion to others.

"I remember being in the program and Judge Frawley made us watch this national drug court convention video. There was a man on stage who went through a drug court program himself and now he was running a highlevel drug court program in Washington D.C. I thought to myself, 'someday I'd like to run this drug court program.' I was so adamant about it that I told my family I was going to run the Alcona County Drug Court. Family who believed in me said I could do anything I put my

mind to," Hope said.

It was Malette who called Hope the day after her drug court graduation to offer her a job with Northern Michigan Drug Screening. Hope did a lot of her drug screens at the facility while she was a participant and they knew how serious she was about changing her life for the better.

After several months of drug testing people, Northern Michigan Drug Screening received the contract for a drug compliance officer and Hope was hired for that position before accepting the position as case manager coordinator last June.

She said watching others

Charles R. Williams

Charles Robert Williams, 91, of Lincoln and Traverse City, Mich. died on Sunday, Feb. 18, 2018 in Juno Beach, Fla. at home.

He was born April 17, 1926 in Detroit, Mich. to Charles and Dorothy (Adams) Williams. He was a state champion swimmer in high school and enlisted in the U.S. Air Force as soon as he was eligible.

He attended University of Michigan for undergraduate school and Wayne State Medical School. He was initially interested in becoming a surgeon, but switched to radiology; he was trained in both diagnostic and therapeutic techniques.

On February 20, 1954 he married Mary Anne (Peta) Foster. They relocated to Traverse City, Mich. in 1960. Dr. Williams and his partners incorporated their radiology practice, which is still operating with a staff of 20 radiologists. He retired in 1988.

The Williams family took advantage of a sabbatical in 1972 and while living in London, England, they traveled through eastern and southern Africa, and trekked in a camper van throughout Europe.

The Williams were among the founding members of the Traverse City Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. They donated the property where the congregation building is located and matched all donations for its construction.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Peta, in 1997.

Dr. Williams married Linda Masser in August, 1999. They traveled to the Gala-pagos



Islands, Antarctica, South Africa, Costa Rica and other locations. They explored Southwest U.S. and gathered geology specimens wherever they went. He was an avid wildlife photographer.

They split their time between Traverse City, Mich., Lincoln and Juno Beach, Fla.

Dr. Williams is survived by his wife, Linda; one son, C. Paul (Sheryl Hayward) Williams of Traverse City, Mich.; one daughter, Susan (Scott) Ueland of Arizona; five grandchildren, Andy (Nisa Penland) Williams, Colin Williams, Cameron Williams, Taylor (Cesar) Favela, and Erin Hayward; and three great-grand-

Annual Backyard Bird Count brings surprises

Backyard Bird Count, which was held February 16-19, got off to a flying start in both Alcona and Iosco counties.

Fifty-two participants tallied a total of 59 species throughout the two counties. "That's a pretty good bird total considering there were 125 species recorded in all of Michigan," said Peggy Ridgway, local count ambassador. "All those keen observers helped our counties rank in the top 14 of 83 across the state and that's pretty remarkable."

"Moreover, four of Iosco's observers had the state highs for seeing the most of one species at a time. Those highs included rock pigeons (150), trumpeter swans (27), purple finch (9), and red headed woodpeckers (3)," Ridgway said.

A few other surprises included observations of red crossbills, common redpolls, a common white fronted goose, horned larks, a redwinged blackbird, plus over 300 Canada geese, which have usually departed the region for the winter.

Living in the northern re-

The 21st annual Great gions of Canada and beyond, vrossbills use their crossed bills to easily extract seeds from pine cones. The wet summer and fall produced favorable conditions for numerous cones on conifers this year. "The crossbills migrated south and took advantage of the surplus," Ridgway said. Several robins were also sighted in both counties.

In Alcona County, a total of 50 species were observed with the top six single counts including Canada geese (300), mallard duck (211), pine siskin (89) American goldfinch (68), European starling (60) and wild turkey (58).

In Iosco County, 51 species were tallied with the top six single sightings including pine siskin (200), rock pigeon (150), common goldeneye (58), European starling (50), and mourning dove (38).

Over all, there seemed to be a definite decline in the number of black-capped chickadees and blue jays," said Ridgway.

"However, we continue to put Alcona and Iosco counties on the map during this

How to get cash for your life insurance policy

Dear Savvy Senior,

I have a life insurance policy that I've been paying on for years that I really don't need any longer. I've been thinking about letting it lapse, but I've heard that I can actually sell it for a nice payout. What can you tell me about this?

Interested In Selling

Dear Interested,

Selling a life insurance policy, even a term life policy that you don't want or need any longer – a transaction known as a "life settlement" – has become a popular option among retirees in recent years that could use some extra cash.

A life settlement is the sale of an existing life insurance policy to a third party company for cash. Life settlements are typically best suited for people over age 65 who own a policy with a face value of \$100,000 or more or someone younger who has experienced a significant change in health.

Historically, if an owner of a life insurance policy decided

they no longer needed it, they would either let the policy lapse or turn it in for a meager cash surrender value. But now, with the life settlement option, you can actually sell your policy for more than the cash surrender value would be, but less than its net death benefit.

Once you sell it, the life settlement company then becomes the new owner of the policy, pays the future premiums and collects the death

How much money you can expect to get with a life settlement will depend on your age, health and life expectancy, the type of insurance policy, the premium costs and the cash value of your policy. You may be able to receive four to eight times more than the policy cash surrender value.

If you're interested in a life settlement here are some things you should know:

• Shop around: Because payout can vary, to ensure you get the best price for your policy get quotes from several companies.

Also, find out what broker and transaction fees you'll be required to pay. Coventry, the nation's first and largest provider of life settlements, offers some of the highest cash payouts for life insurance policies.

To get started, visit CoventryDirect.com or call (888-) 858-9344. To search for other providers or brokers, the Life Insurance Settlement Association provides a directory at LISA.org.

• Be prudent: Life settlements are regulated in most states. Find out from your state insurance commissioner (see NAIC.org for contact information) if the life settlement company you're interested in is properly licensed.

• Protect your privacy: When you sell your life insurance policy, you will have to sign a waiver authorizing the release of medical and other personal information so that the buyer can determine how much to offer for your policy. Before accepting any offer, make sure that the company has proce-



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dures in place to protect the confidentiality of your information.

• Understand the tax implications: The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act recently updated the tax treatment of a life settlement to be treated the same as the surrender of a policy back to the insurance company. This can be complicated, so be sure to consult a tax advisor.

If you want to keep your life insurance policy but could use some extra cash, you may have some other options. For example, some life settlement companies may allow you to keep part of the policy's death benefit while eliminating your premium obligations. You can

also ask your life insurer if you can borrow against your policy, or if you're in poor health, see if you're eligible for accelerated death benefits. You should also find out if you're able to convert the cash value of your policy into an immediate annuity (through a 1035 Exchange), which would make regular payments to you for a set number of years or for the rest of your life.

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

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

succeed is one of the best parts about her job. "Watching the change. The difference from when they first walk into my office to when they graduate. It's mind blowing and unbelievable. It is the best feeling in the world," Hope said.

She explained the process of recovery is always on-going and an addict has a lifetime of work to be completely successful at it.

The hardest part about her job is not letting the failures affect her. "I've learned I cannot take someone's relapse personally. I was blaming myself and thinking I failed them or there was something

missing from the program. Something I, or we, weren't providing them. I'm still working on not letting it affect me. I have to learn to not take someone's fumbles personally. It is their choice to stay clean and they are the only ones who can make that choice. It's a hard struggle. We are dealing with a lot of people who have a lot of problems.'

"I've had people tell me drug court just sets (participants) up for failure. I tell them no, because if I'm what failure looks like, then I'll take that any day of the week. You may set yourself up for failure, but drug court doesn't.

It gives all the tools needed. They just need to learn how to use them," Hope said.

She explained if anyone even suspects they have an addiction problem, then they probably do, and they should call her. Anyone, even people who are not in drug court, can call and reach out to her for help, as Hope is willing to try and assist anyone in getting the necessary resources they need. She said there is a lot of help available in this area, but the help is not going to show up. People needing help must reach out for it.

Help is also available by contacting community services, mental health services,

substance abuse treatment just and in-patient facilities or even reaching out to a church pastor to begin the process.

Family members of addicts should also seek assistance according to Hope. Those resources include Al-Anon which meets in Oscoda and open Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) and open Narcotic Anonymous (NA) meetings.

Hope explained that she has a mother who is going with her daughter, a drug court participant, to AA meetings. "The mother has never had an addiction and doesn't understand what her daughter is going through. This way the mother can see it's not

her daughter's problem....Family members need to see how an addictive person thinks, feels and possibly understand why and how they got to where they are," she said.

Another issue Hope discusses a lot with family members is enabling an addict and explained sometimes it is very hard for Mom, Grandma or other family members to say "no." Hope said it's a long and bumpy road dealing with an addicted loved one.

Although her job is demanding, Hope's inspiration, sincerity and caring attitude never wavers, according to Frawley, "She really has come so far. We are very lucky to have her. I think she does a great job because she knows all the games addicts play. No one can put anything over on her. After everything she has been through and the courage to make the changes she has made, she remains a very positive and encouraging person. She is living proof to drug court participants they can make it and live happy and productive lives."

Frawley said drug court was a tremendous amount of work and demands much more than any other court. Hope is a daily reminder for why she and others involved in operating drug court make the effort. "To see one life like hers so dramatically transformed makes it all worth it," Frawley said.



StarWatch By Gary Becker - Evening and Morning Planets



The evening sky is currently devoid of planets, but that is about to change this week as Mercury and Venus rapidly ascend into the western sky after sundown. The observations in early March will require an excellent western horizon and probably binoculars because both objects will still be seen with a substantial amount of twilight in the sky. By mid-March both planets will be observable in deeper twilight. On the 18th a thin waxing crescent moon joins the duo to form a upward tilted pointing line in the twilight sky - the moon, Venus, and Mercury; and on March 28 Venus and Uranus are only 1/10th of a degree apart in the deep twilight of early evening. Use binoculars to spot Uranus which will be just above and to Venus' right! The starlike object closest to Venus will be Uranus, but what about the superior planets that are visible to the unaided eye, the ones that are farther away from the sun than Earth - Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn? They also will be making appearances into the vernal and summer sky. Early October sees a virtual smorgasbord of all the naked eye planets visible

after the sun retreats in the west. Jupiter reaches opposition on May 9 and is opposite to the sun with the Earth between the two, meaning that Jove is visible all night. You will need to give Jupiter a couple of hours to gain altitude after sundown before it becomes easily visible in the southeast around 10 p.m. But let's say that you wanted to view Jupiter this week. It can be done, but you'll need to wait until the Earth's rotation has taken it into a high enough position so that buildings and trees will not interfere. Consider 2 a.m. to be a good target time to see Jove low in the SE. That shifts to midnight by early April and 10 p.m. by early May. Saturn is a little sneakier, first rising at sundown on June 27, only 1.5 degrees away from the nearly full moon. If you want to see Saturn now, and get Mars thrown in as an extra treat, I would wait for the morning alarm; 5:30 a.m. to 6 a.m. is a good time. From left to right straddling the south, it will be Saturn, Mars, and Jupiter. After March 1 the moon enters the picture. On March 7 it is above Jupiter; March 9 the moon is approaching Mars; March 10, Luna lurks between Mars and Saturn, and on March 11 it is just to the left of Saturn. On the 12th, the waning crescent moon is close to the dwarf planet Pluto, although trying to see Pluto even with a large telescope can be a challenge. Still you will know in what part of the sky Pluto is located. All the best for a few clear evenings and mornings. Ad astra! www.astronomy.org



Washington Doll

While Valentine's Day the 1889 centennial celis always Feb. 14, President's Day can be any one of seven dates, the third Monday in February closest to the 20th. 1885 George Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, was made a national holiday. But in 1971, Congress decided that instead of celebrating the real birthdays of President Washington and President Abraham Lincoln (Feb. 12), there would a Monday celebration for both. Why Monday? To give everyone a three-day weekend away from work. Feb. 20 was chosen because it was between the two real birthdays.

President Washington lived in the days before cameras, so he was remembered in designs for silhouettes, paintings, prints, medals, cameos, glass patterns, toys, Staffordshire figures to keep on the mantel and even drapery fabrics. Most of the memorabilia was copied from the few famous paintings of the president, images that still are used. A President Washington doll made after 1880 looks like Washington in his presidential years. The doll is made of cloth with pressed and oil-painted features, and gray hair worn in a ponytail. His eyes are blue. The doll is dressed in a silk suit with a lace jabot and wears a tri-corn hat, black stockings and shoes with buckles. The costume is a familiar

The doll probably was not made for a young child, but as a part of

ebration Washington's inauguration. It was made by Martha Jenks Chase, who started making portrait dolls in her backyard about 1880. A 25-inch tall Chase Washington doll sold in 2016 at a Theriault's auction in Las Vegas for \$3,080.

A: This mark was used about 1895 to 1917 by Lewis Straus & Sons, importers located in New York City. Carlsbad was part of Austria until after World War I, when it became part of Czechoslovakia. Today the town is called Karlovy Vary and is part of the Czech Republic. Several factories in Austria, Bavaria and Germany used "Carlsbad" in their mark. Many pieces were exported to the United States in the late 1800s and early 1900s. Sets of china are hard to sell, but you can enjoy the dishes for their sentimental value.

Crooks plead guilty in rent-a-vet scheme

ing money from the government in a set-aside program for veteran-owned businesses. Specifically, these two got nearly \$14 million in construction contracts (20 of them) spread out in 11 states over nine years. Both were veterans.

In 2004, Jeffrey Wilson and Paul Salavitch set up the Patriot Company. Wilson ran the whole thing as a front for his own construction company. Salavitch, the service-disabled veteran, didn't run the company, make day-to-day decisions, had never managed a construction company and didn't have much government contracting experience -- all requirements for the program. He was president on paper only. His pal Wilson said they needed stuff from Salavitch (plaques, Army items, anything personal) that would make one of the offices look like it actually belonged to Salavitch.

What, then, did Salavitch do? He was a full-time employee of the De-

Two crooks pleaded guilty to steal-partment of Defense in Leavenworth, Kansas.

Wilson, meanwhile, had fun with some of the money. He put down nearly half a million dollars on a house he bought, and a quarter of a million to pay off his previous house. Not only that, but he used company money to buy another house out of state and paid \$400,000 for life insurance premiums.

Inquiring minds want to know: If the duo was hit with four counts each, why were they allowed to plead it down? And if the government grabbed \$2.1 million in repayment, what happens to the rest of that \$14 million?

Then there's the prison time ... minimal. A possible year for one, a year and a half for the other. Seems like the sentence would at least equal the length of time the duo was in business, which was nine years.
