## Human remains date back to 1800s

Nine months after the discovery of human remains on property in Harrisville Township, there are some answers to the anthropological mystery.

The remains, which were bones, were found approximately four to five feet deep in sandy soil on Saturday, Sept. 9 during an excavation project on private property owned by John and Cheryl Holmes of Harrisville.

Alcona County Sheriff Sgt. Keith Myers, who conducted the investigation, said at the time of discovery. "There is no indication of other remains in the area," Myers said. "This is not a burial site."

After an initial investigation and documentation of the discovery, Myers sent the remains to the Michigan State University forensic anthropology laboratory. A report was recently issued by Todd W. Fenton, Ph.D., forensic anthropologist.

Myers explained the report was "very technical" and detailed. However, after going over the report and speaking with Fenton, no signs of trauma were found, and a cause of death was not determined.

The remains are from a

Native American male with the median age of 53. He was between five feet, five inches to six feet tall. Myers said Fenton determined they were "prehistoric," which means "any time before modern forensics" or in the early to mid-1800s.

"The teeth showed an incredible amount of wear, which is not uncommon for that time," Myers said. "According to Dr. Fenton, it is not uncommon for people to come across human remains of this time period... he said, 'you'd be surprised what is under your feet.'"

Cheryl Holmes said since the remains were found, she's been concerned about the fact that they were disturbed from their resting place and wanted to make sure they have a proper re-burial. "Dr. Fenton is supposed to be making those arrangements," Holmes said.

Holmes was raised on that 80-acre piece of property (40 acres in Harrisville and 40 acres in Haynes Township) and it's been in her family for almost 100 years. Her grandparents, Emmett and Cora Wanzer, purchased it on September 3, 1924. Her parents, Eldon and Rena Wanzer took it over in the late 1940s and she and her husband, John, purchased it in 1996.

## Kindergarten teacher retiring after 22 years

Teaching more than two dozen five and six-year-old students isn't for everyone. It takes patience, skill, a kind smile, energy, and a lot of hugs. Despite many challenges over the years, it has been a career filled with many happy memories for a retiring kindergarten teacher.

Marylynn Mullen wasn't quite sure what she wanted

to do with her life while studying for her bachelor's degree at Central Michigan University nearly 30 years ago. Mullen grew up in Flint, Mich., and thought she'd like to work outdoors.

She got a degree in biology and began working in nature centers. "It was there I realized I enjoyed teaching young children, so I went back to school and got my teaching certificate," Marylynn said.

While Marylynn did work a few substitute teaching jobs at other schools in Michigan, her teaching career really began, and now is ending, at Alcona Community Schools. Most of her career was spent teaching kindergarten, except for about six years when she worked with small groups of elementary at-risk students to strengthen their reading skills.

"When I started teaching school I didn't have an age group in mind to teach, but my first year in kindergarten, I knew that was exactly where I belonged," Marylynn said. She explained kindergarten doesn't only teach a child literacy but guides young students on how to get along with others, how to share, it teaches fine motor skills like how to hold a pencil or paint and gross motor skills like jumping, skipping and balance.

"They are learning about the world around them. People say young children are like sponges and they really are. They soak up everything. I have been amazed at their constant wonder and desire to learn at such a young age.

They also give a lot of hugs. We spend a lot of time with these children and it feels good to know you are such an important part of their life," Marylynn said.

Even when she would go into town for shopping and errands, if one of her students saw her she would get a big hug and quite a few times the hugs would continue as she saw the same child, isle after isle.

Part of teaching is to meet the student at a certain level and help guide them to the next level. A difficult task when some kindergarten students come into the classroom knowing their letters, letter sounds, being able to write letters and even read some words while others come to the classroom knowing very little about letters at all.

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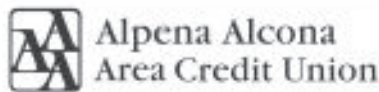

In addition, some students learn completely differently than others. Finding the right balance in the lesson to get some students up to grade level while keeping those who have surpassed that level still engaged can be a challenge, according to Marylynn.

"We have to find open-ended ways to teach and give children choices to ensure they are learning the best way for them all while teaching the same concept to the class.

"It can be a challenge to find activities to meet the needs of different abilities, and that goes on all year long. They are individuals, and all have different strengths and weaknesses. They blossom at different times. Kindergarten teachers take them as far as we can on their journey, so they are ready for the challenges of first grade," Marylynn said.

She moved to Alcona County 26 years ago when her husband, Dan, was offered a job as the manager of the Harrisville State Park. She was pregnant with twins at the time, which she said, brought along challenges of its own. "We didn't know anyone here. We had no family here. We thought we'd just stay here a few years because, typically, in the state park system, you move around a lot, but we made friends so quickly and so easily. We marveled at the community here, so we stayed," Marylynn said.

She is grateful for all the wonderful years spent at Alcona Elementary School. "We are like family. We are there to support each other and when someone has a crisis in their life, a challenging student or just a bad day, we go to each other for support and ideas. We worry about each other and take care of each other. I'm not sure I would have gotten to experience this working anywhere else," Marylynn said.

Although Marylynn enjoyed teaching, there are a

few things she will not miss about the job besides getting up at 6 a.m. Most importantly, she will not miss trying to teach children with behavior problems, because is very difficult to teach a student who is having problems and disrupting the class.

Also, she will not miss the worries that go along with teaching. She explained there was a lot of stress with the job because of the enormous responsibility teachers have. Marylynn said she worried constantly about whether she was doing enough to reach her students and if they were listening to her while she tried to prepare them for the first grade.

## How to find retiree travel perks

Dear Savvy Senior,  
What types of travel discounts are available to older travelers? I just retired and am interested in learning about travel deals for people over 60.

Ready To Go

Dear Ready,  
There are literally thousands of different travel-related discounts available to retirees that usually start anywhere between the ages 50 and 65. These discounts – typically ranging between five and 25 percent off – can add up to save hundreds of dollars on your next trip.

The first thing to know is that most businesses don't advertise them, but many give senior discounts just for the asking, so don't be shy.

You also need to be aware that when it comes to senior travel bargains, the "senior discount," if available, may not always be the best deal. Hotels, resorts, airlines and cruise lines, for example, offer advanced bookings along

with special deals and promotions from time to time that may be a lower rate than what the senior discount is. Before you book, always ask about the lowest possible rate and the best deal available.

Another way retirees with flexible schedules can save is to be flexible when traveling. Last minute travel deals can offer huge savings, as well as traveling during off-season or off-peak times, and avoiding holidays.

Club memberships can also garner a wide variety of travel bargains. AARP, for example, has dozens of travel discounts available on hotels, rental cars, cruises and vacation packages – see AARPadvantages.com. Annual AARP membership fees are \$16 or less if you join for multiple years.

Or, if you don't agree with AARP, there are alternative organizations you can join like the Seniors Coalition or the American Seniors Association that offer discounts on hotels and rental cars.

Here's an abbreviated run-down of some of the different travel discounts you can expect to find.

- **Transportation:** For airline travel, Southwest has fully refundable senior fares to passengers 65 and older, and British Airways offers AARP members \$65 off economy travel and \$200 off business club travel. American, United and Delta also offer senior fares in certain markets but are extremely limited.

- **For traveling by train,** Amtrak provides a 10 percent discount to travelers 65-plus, and a 10 percent discount to passengers over age 60 on cross-border services operated jointly by Amtrak and VIA Rail Canada.

- **Greyhound bus lines** also offer a five percent discount to passengers 62 and older. And most car rental companies offer 10 to 25 percent discounts to customers who belong to membership organizations like AARP or AAA.

- **Hotels:** Many U.S. hotels

offer senior discounts (at varying ages) usually ranging between five and 15 percent off. For example, Marriott offers a 15 percent discount to travelers 62 and older at over 4,000 locations worldwide. And Wyndham hotel group offers 60-plus guests best available rate discounts.

- **Restaurants:** Some restaurant chains offer senior discounts, ranging from free drinks, to senior menus, to discounts off your total order. National chains that offer these deals include Burger King, Chili's, Chick-fil-A, Dunkin' Donuts, Golden Corral, IHOP and Wendy's. Of-

fers can vary by location.

- **Cruises:** Royal Caribbean and Carnival Cruise lines offer discount rates to cruisers 55 and over.

- **Entertainment and Attractions:** Most movie theaters, museums, zoos, aquariums, public golf courses and even ski slopes provide reduced admission to seniors over 60 or 65. If you're 62-plus, you're also eligible for the "Senior Pass," which provides a lifetime entry to 2,000 national parks and recreation sites. You can obtain this pass in person at one of the federal recreation

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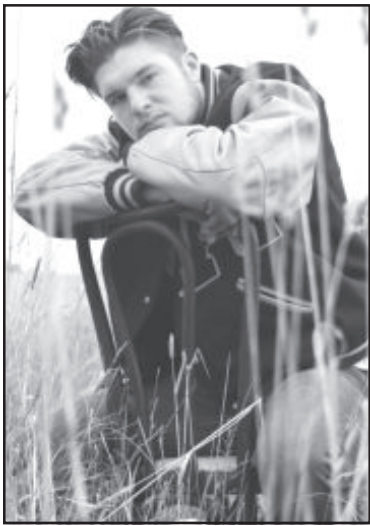

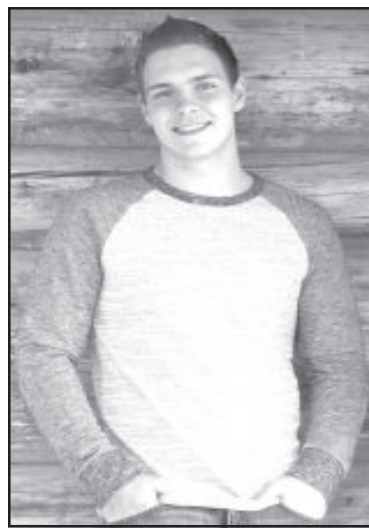

**Growing catnip** Cats love to paw, chew on, and roll around in this perennial herb. Catnip is related to other mint plants, like spearmint, basil and oregano. Its stems and leaves store oils, and its blossoms display white, pink or purple petals. It is easily propagated by seed, stem cuttings, or rootball division. You can sow seeds outside early in the spring with a light cover of hay, or start them indoors in trays and transplant them outside after the last chance of frost. It likes either sun or shade, and can grow 2 to 3 feet.

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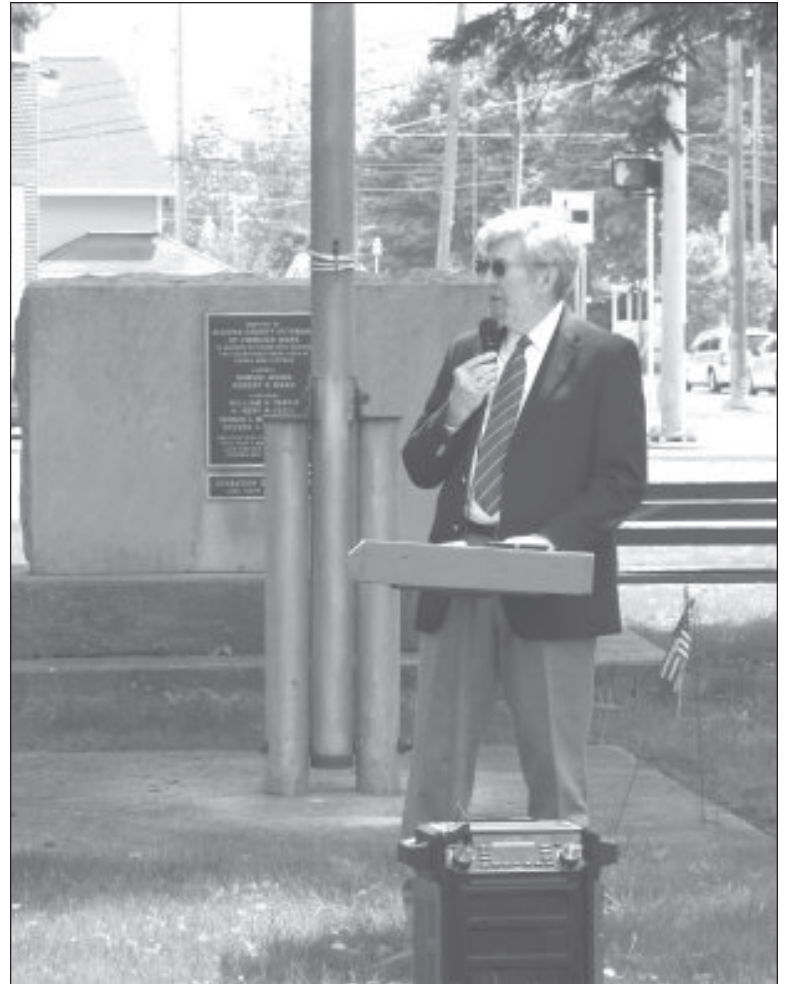

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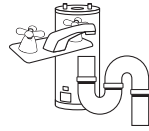
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## Caution can help prevent human-caused wildfires

It was a snowy day near Grayling, Mich. in March, 1990. A homeowner had recently cleared a section of land and planned to burn the resulting brush piles.

Logs and branches were piled high, ignited and monitored. The large piles smoked and smoldered for a few weeks before putting themselves out. All seemed well.

A month later, the fires rekindled and, again, seemed to burn themselves out. Three weeks later, a neighbor noticed the stubborn piles were burning again. In less than 20 minutes, the fire escaped into the surrounding forest.

As it turns out, the fire had never gone out. It had been burning deep in the middle of the pile from mid-

Fire fighting equipment and techniques have continually evolved since that Stephan Bridge Road fire nearly 30 years ago, but one thing stubbornly remains the same: nine out of 10 wildfires are caused by people.

"Almost all wildfires in Michigan start by accident," said Jim Fisher, Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) fire program manager. "The wind picks up and a brush fire gets away or a campfire smolders and comes back to life."

Approximately 600 wildfires are reported in Michigan each year, and out-of-control debris burning is the top cause.

The Stephan Bridge Road fire was a tough lesson to learn: even when precautions

"In Michigan, the soils are sandy and don't hold moisture. We usually get rain and then a low relative humidity when a weather front moves through. We can get a couple inches of rain and, in two days, have a 5,000-acre fire," said Chris Peterson, fire and aviation staff officer for the Huron-Manistee National Forests.

Fire activity also peaks on weekends. Last year, 48 percent of wildfires occurred between Saturday and Monday.

"Folks come up for the weekend and they burn and don't put out their fire. Then it comes back to life on Monday," Peterson said.

So far, 140 fires have burned 826 acres in Michigan this year.

March to early May.

On May 8, the wind picked up, bringing a new air supply to the pile's interior, helping the fire grow. Crews contained the fire in less than two days. But, by the time it was all said and done - almost seven weeks after the first flame was sparked - nearly 6,000 acres had burned, \$5.5 million in property had been lost and \$700,000 in timber had been destroyed.

are taken, fires can still escape.

It's especially important to use caution with fire in the spring. March, April, May and June are Michigan's busiest months for wildfires, claiming 83 percent of fires in 2017.

The dead grass and leaves from the previous year dry very quickly as days become longer, temperatures begin to rise and humidity levels are often at their lowest points.

Prevention of wildfires starts by always checking for a burn permit at [www.michigan.gov/burnpermit](http://www.michigan.gov/burnpermit) before burning yard debris and brush piles.

Burning conditions can change very quickly, especially this time of year. The wind can switch suddenly, and the fire can get away from you," Fisher said. "Never leave a fire unattended and always keep water nearby."

Steps can also be taken to protect homes from wildfires - especially important since 63 percent of fires start on private property.

"Fireproof your property. Cut back trees and brush and plant vegetation that does not carry fire. Don't park equipment, boats or trailers up next to burn piles or in thick vegetation," Peterson said.

Examples of plants that are resistant to fire include those that retain moisture, like hostas and succulents.

Make sure the house number is easily visible and leave room for emergency responders to work in the event a fire does occur.

Bill Forbush, City of Alpena Fire Department chief, urged people not to be complacent about fire safety. It's just as important to have working smoke detectors in

vacation residences, cabins and campers as it is to have them in your permanent home.

“Some people say, ‘it can’t happen to me.’ People don’t anticipate that there will be a problem. That’s not always the case,” Forbush said.

Whether burning brush or lighting a campfire, individuals should be absolutely sure their fire is out before leaving it unattended.

“One bucket (of water) isn’t going to do it. Turn the coals over and wet it down thoroughly,” Forbush said.

In the event that a fire does escape, call 9-1-1, and don’t try to put it out without help.

## St. Anne's parish marks centennial

**May 30, 1968** ~ Joyful reunions, happy memories laughter and tears were noted when several hundred parishioners and guests gathered for the centennial celebration May 26 at St. Anne's church in Harrisville.

The event was opened with a concelebrated mass by Pastor Fr. Vernon Sierminski, Fr. Raymond Mulka and Fr. John Rushman. Bishop Stephen S. Woznicki was assisted by Fr. George Klimas and Fr. Adalbert Narloch. Fr.

Joseph Adamec was master of ceremonies.

Judge Herman Dehnke was guest speaker at the banquet at Alcona High school. He recalled his teaching days at the country schools in the area where he met St. Anne's parishioners. He knew several of St. Anne's pastors well, having been "back fence neighbors" with them for many years. He related many humorous incidents of those years.

John McMaster brought

back amusing and interesting memories and closed with a poem.

## Black River Harbor a step closer

**May 30, 1968** ~ Washington, D. C.—Construction of a \$1 million refuge harbor and docking area for small boats at the village of Black River; south of Alpena, was a step closer to reality this week.

The Army Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors has advised Senator Robert P. Griffin (R-Mich.) that it has approved plans for building a 1,780-foot breakwater and for dredging the necessary navigation channels.

"The project is over an important hurdle," Griffin said. "There is even the slim possibility that it may be included in this year's Rivers and Harbors Bill."

Following approval by the Army's Chief of Engineers, the project will be sent to Governor Romney's office and to interested federal agencies for comment.

Next step is the Secretary of the Army, then the Budget Bureau, and finally to Congress. "As a general rule, these steps are fairly routine, but time-consuming," Griffin said.

In addition to the breakwater, which will have recreational fishing facilities built on one side, the harbor development will include public docking and service facilities, boat ramps and parking lots.

The state and local share of the project is estimated at \$485,000, including \$200,000 for construction of the harbor improvements.

A public board also will be established to regulate the use, grow the and future development of the harbor area.

**StarWatch By Gary Becker - Green Clouds Mean Hail?**

On Tuesday, May 15 the National Weather Service predicted severe afternoon storms for southeastern PA. As the rain and lightning approached with an ominous ding of continuous thunder, certain areas of the cloud base appeared greenish. I had only seen this one time before, when friend, Elizabeth Churchill, made me aware of this phenomenon as a large storm approached Chaco Culture National Historical Park near Nageezi, New Mexico. In both instances the storm associated with it produced hail. The greenish color is not due to the hail itself, but rather the conditions that were conducive to producing it, towering roiling clouds like those which are found in a severe thunderstorm and a low sun. The droplets of water which produce the cloud are very small, causing entering sunlight passing through its tall vertical structure to be scattered. Small bodies scatter blue light (shorter wavelengths) more effectively than larger bodies "ricocheting" the blue light around in the cloud, causing the light from the cloud to be biased toward the blue. In addition, the longer wavelengths of visible light, such as oranges or reds, are more readily absorbed by these same small droplets and larger ones enhancing the blue bias. That is why if you are photographing under cloudy conditions, you must change your sensor settings in order to compensate for this excess of blue light, although in most cameras this is achieved automatically. Sunlight traveling through a longer cylinder of air when Sol is low in the sky is so effectively scattered by even smaller air molecules that virtually no blue light is present. If yellow light from the low sun mixes with the blue light being scattered by the clouds, the greenish hues seen in certain parts of the cloud can be produced. The vertical updrafts and downdrafts associated with these clouds lifts and freezes water around an initial droplet coating it with numerous layers of ice until it is too heavy to be lifted again, and it falls to Earth as hail. Green clouds and hail are not a "done deal" according to meteorological studies, but they do seem to have a better fit with high altitude, convective turbulence which is associated with thunderstorms bathed in the warmer light of a late day sun. ## MILLEN TOWNSHIP PROPOSED ORDINANCE

**Purpose:** The purpose of this ordinance is to address the permitting of solar-collector panels (Utility Scale) in the Millen Township Agriculture District (AG) as it relates to the Millen Township Zoning Ordinance.

**Definition:** A utility-scale solar facility is one which generates solar power and feeds it into the grid, supplying a utility (power or energy company) with energy. Millen Township, Alcona County, Michigan Ordains:

Section 34: Additions to the Millen Township Zoning Ordinance.

That the Millen Township Zoning ordinance is hereby amended to add to Section 2.1, Definitions Solar Collector Panels (Definition of Solar Energy Facilities-Utility Scale):

**Solar Energy Facilities** (Utility Scale): A facility designed to capture and utilize the energy of the sun to generate electrical power to meet utility-scale needs. A solar energy collection facility consists of solar collection devices used to collect solar rays and all associated ancillary and structural devices needed to support and to convert/transmit the energy collected. These devices may be either freestanding or attached to a structure and are sized to meet the various user needs and/or requirements.

That the Millen Township Zoning Ordinance Section 3.5-AG-3.53 (Agricultural District) is hereby amended to add the following as a special exception use:

16. Solar Energy Facilities (Utility Scale)  
 That the Millen Township Ordinance Article 4.0 is hereby amended to add 40-4.5 Solar Energy Facility (Utility Scale):

A. Reflection/Glare: Attached, building-integrated or freestanding solar collection devices or combination of devices, shall be designed and located to avoid glare or reflection onto adjacent properties and adjacent roadways and shall not interfere with traffic or create a traffic hazard. This may be accomplished by

both the placement and the angle of the collection devices as well as human-made or environmental barriers. Glare intensity is considered an issue if it measures more than 20 percent of the incident sun intensity. Plans to reduce glare may be required in the initial materials submitted.

B. Impervious Surface/Stormwater: If more than 8,000 square feet of impervious surface will be located on the site, the application shall include a drainage plan prepared by a registered civil engineer showing how storm-water runoff will be managed. If detergents will be used to clean solar panels, details on the type of detergent, frequency and quantity of use, and storm-water quality protection measures shall be provided.

C. Screening: Solar devices shall be screened from view from any public street or residential district by use of a masonry screen wall, evergreen vegetation or other screening of a similar effectiveness of quality, as determined by the Millen Township Zoning Board.

D. Setbacks: The setbacks of all solar collection devices and ancillary equipment shall be at least 50 feet from all property lines.

E. Abandonment: Any freestanding solar collection site or device which is not used for six (6) months shall be deemed to be abandoned. The applicant/permit holder will be so notified in writing by Millen Township and requested to dismantle the site and return it to its original state. If there are mitigating circumstances as to why the site has not been used, the applicant/permit holder may contact Millen Township and request a three-month extension. If a site has been deemed abandoned and no request for an extension is received, the applicant/permit holder will again be notified and dismantle the site and return it to its original state. If the applicant/permit holder does not do this, Millen Township will have the removal and restoration done at the applicant/permit holders expense. Removal shall include removing posts, equipment, panels, foundations and other items so the is restored to its preconstruction state and is ready for development as another land use.
