ew, full-time music program engages Alcona students

"Music gives a soul to the universe, wings to the mind, flight to the imagination and life to everything."

~ Plato Once again Alcona Community Schools has a fulltime and fully invested music teacher who is excited about the possibilities of growing the music program.

Emma Pendergrass said she was intrigued about filling the position of music instructor when she heard the current program was still in its infancy with only a parttime teacher instructing just a few days a week.

Music was something the school district did not offer for several years and just got back after student, Ben Thomas, rallied hard three years ago to get donations of over \$10,000 in just a few months to bring the program back. His efforts caught the attention of the school board which decided two years ago to hire part-time retired music teacher, Ray Reynolds, to teach beginning band to sixth grade students.

"When I interviewed for the position, the school wanted to add high school choir, high school band and fifth grade general music. As a new teacher just beginning my career I saw this as a great opportunity for me to produce and develop a program, rather than walk into an already built program. I'm excited to see what I can do for the school and the students here," Pendergrass said.

Pendergrass is instructing fifth grade general music at the elementary school, high school choir, high school band, sixth grade beginning band and seventh and eighth grade combined band classes.

Pendergrass began work in the summer to get started. Even though there were classes taught in the main band room, many of the ad-

joining practice rooms and supply cupboards were still being used as storage dumping sites. Pendergrass said she probably filled two dumpsters with junk found in those

"The floors were covered in dirt, dead bugs, rat poop, you name it. I vacuumed and washed out every corner and

then got started vacuuming out all the instrument cases. Even though the school year has already started, there is still a lot more to be done,"

Pendergrass explained that to ensure school instruments loaned to students remain in good condition, she had to initiate a fee of \$25 per semester to students wanting to use school loaned instruments. The fee will help pay for repairs at the end of the

She said many instruments cost \$100 or more to repair and because of the amount of use, it would take over half of her budget just to get them repaired -- funds which she will need to purchase music and other necessary items for her student's education.

According to Pendergrass mostly sixth graders are using the school loaned instruments. Many of the seventh and eighth grade students either rent their instruments through music stores or own their own instrument. She feels the fee will also remind students to take very good care of their instrument. After she sees what the repair costs will be at the end of this school year, she may tweak the fee accordingly next year.

Pendergrass grew up in Lake Orion, Mich., and obtained a bachelor's degree in music education from Central Michigan University (CMU). She said both of her parents are artistic, her father played piano and was in band, her mother was an art-

Pettalia served three terms in the Michigan House of Representatives from 2011 until his death in September 2016 in an accident on his way down to the Capitol for ses-

"As I travel northeastern Michigan and carry out my duties in Lansing, I continue to hear stories about the work that Representative Pettalia did on our behalf during his time in the legislature," said Allor, R-Wolverine. "He paved the way for future public servants from our area to continue on a road of success, fighting for the people of the 106th House District."

Pettalia's wife, Karen, spoke at the dedication, which was attended by many of Pettalia's family, friends and former colleagues.

Prior to serving in the Legislature, Pettalia served as Presque Isle Township supervisor for 16 years and as a volunteer fire fighter for the East Grand Lake Fire Department for 15 years. Pettalia was a member of several Presque Isle and Alpena area organizations and enjoyed spending time with his wife, children and granddaugh-

The memorial will have no fiscal impact on the state or local government. State law requires private contributions cover all the costs of erecting and maintaining the memorial highway signs.

Music program allows student to benefit from his effort

It was almost three years ago when an Alcona Middle School student rallied his eighth grade Make a Difference (MAD) project around obtaining enough donations to hire a music instructor for the school. Today he is enrolled in the school district's new full-time band program.

Ben Thomas, a junior, set his sights high in order to collect enough funds to hire a music teacher, something the school district had not had in several years. He fell far short of the \$60,000 dollars he would need to fulfill his wish, but did collect over \$10,000 in just a few months.

His drive and ambition caught the attention of the Alcona Community Schools Board of Education which realized, through the young man's efforts, how badly a music program was needed.

A newly retired music instructor from Alpena School District offered to help. Ray Reynolds was hired in 2016 to teach beginning band twice a week to sixth grade students. Reynolds said at the time he was hired he would only work part-time and for just a few years until they could hire a full-time instruc-

Thomas explained he knew from the very beginning of his MAD project he would never be able to take advantage of his hard-earned effort. He understood since the music program was gone from the school district for such a long time, it would have to be

reintroduced to younger students and its growth would

He didn't care. He knew how music would touch younger Alcona students' lives, "It didn't bother me that I wouldn't get any instruction from my effort. I knew that was the right thing for the program. I just wanted music to come back to the school. I wanted the kids coming up to have that," Thomas said.

Instead of using the funds Thomas collected to pay a teacher, the school paid for the instructor and Thomas' funds were used to repair and purchase new instruments.

Seeing the impact music had on students and the number of students interested in the program, the school district hired a new, full-time instructor and an opportunity to take a high school band class opened.

Thomas jumped at the chance. "I was going to take a college class in welding and technical math, but when I heard I could take band I dropped the college class. I couldn't fit both in my schedule," Thomas said.

Music means a lot to Thomas who gets more than just entertainment from it, "When

She also volunteered for local events like the Sunrise Side Wine and Food Festival in Harrisville. She was on the committe that organized and completed the bike path that



goes along the "Sunrise Side" coast in Harrisville. Mrs. Sanderson was also very involved in the "Pure Michigan" tourism campaign.

The Sandersons enjoyed spending several winter weeks in Florida and would frequently visit the east coast to see her brother in Connecticut. She thoroughly enjoyed spending quality time with her sons and her grandchildren.

Mrs. Sanderson is survived by her husband. Robert: two sons Robert III (Amy) Sanderson and Marc M. (Chrissy) Sanderson: seven grandchildren: Benjamin Sanderson, Robert Sanderson IV, Jake Sanderson, Hannah Sanderson, Jackson Sanderson, Charles Sanderson and Connor Sanderson; and one brother, Doug Powell (Jo) Hagen of Connecticut.

Thomas began playing the guitar when he was about 13 years old, explaining that was when guitar lessons started as an after-school enrichment class taught by volunteers. path, now he has visions of some day becoming a music producer or sound specialist. "That's really a passion I have and one I think I'd like to follow," Thomas said.

In addition to his music passion, Thomas has been heavily involved for a few years in the robotics club, he is playing soccer this year and is on the Northeastern Youth Advisory Council. He said when the after-school guitar lessons start back up, he would like to take part in

Thomas has eclectic taste in music. He said there are so many different genres of music which appeal to him it is hard to just choose one type of music. Like many musicians, Thomas is disciplined about practicing and tries to practice three to four hours every day.

He would very much like to see a pep band at the school and hopes the new teacher, Emma Pendergrass, can make that happen in time for him to enjoy being in it during his senior year.


that again explaining the class is popular with students but they are always looking for more who would like to join.

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


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Tigers drop battle of F-41 to Oscoda

Which flu shot is right for you?

Dear Savvy Senior,

I've been reading that there are a bunch of different flu vaccines for seniors this flu season. Which flu shot is right for me?

Flu-Conscious Carol

Dear Flu-Conscious,

It wasn't that long ago that if you wanted to get protected from the flu, you simply got a flu shot. But now days, there are so many flu vaccine options you might feel like you are ordering off a menu. To help you decide which flu shot is right for you, you need to consider your health, age and personal preferences.

Just as they do every year, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends a seasonal flu shot to everyone six months of age and older, but it's especially important for seniors who are at higher risk of developing serious flu-related complications. The flu puts more than 200,000 people in the hospital each year and kills an average of 24,000 - 80 to 90 percent of whom are seniors.

Here's the rundown of the different vaccine options (you only need to get one of these):

• Standard flu vaccines: If you want to keep things basic, you can't go wrong with a "standard (trivalent) flu shot," which has been around for more than 40 years and protects against three different strains of flu viruses.

This year's version protects against two A strains (H1N1 and H3N2), and one influenza B virus.

- Or, for additional protection, you should consider the "quadrivalent flu vaccine" that protects against four types of influenza – the same three strains as the standard trivalent flu shot, plus an additional B-strain virus.
- Senior specific vaccines: If you're age 65 or older and want some extra protection, you should consider the "Fluzone High-Dose" or "FLUAD."

The Fluzone High-Dose has four times the amount of an-

does, while the FLUAD contains an added ingredient called adjuvant MF59. Both vaccines provide a stronger immune response for better

- Egg allergy vaccines: If you're allergic to eggs, your flu shot options are "Flucelvax" or "FluBlok." Neither of these vaccines uses chicken eggs in their manufacturing process.
- Fear of needle vaccines: If you don't like needles, and you're between the ages of 18 and 64, your options are the "Fluzone Intradermal" or "AFLURIA" vaccine.

The Fluzone intradermal flu shot uses a 1/16-inch long micro-needle to inject the vaccine just under the skin, rather than deeper in the muscle like standard flu shot. While the AFLURIA vaccine is administered by a jet injector, which is a medical device that uses a high-pressure, narrow stream of fluid to penetrate the skin instead of a needle.



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You should also know that if you're a Medicare beneficiary, Part B covers all flu vaccinations, but if you have private health insurance, you'll need to check with your plan to see which vaccines they do or don't cover.

Two other important vaccinations the CDC recommends to seniors, especially this time of year, are the pneumococcal vaccines for pneumonia. Around one million Americans are hospitalized with pneumonia each year, and about 50,000 people die

The CDC recommends that all seniors, 65 or older, get two vaccinations - Prevnar 13

and Pneumovax 23. Both vaccines, which are administered just once at different times, work in different ways to provide maximum protection.

If you haven't yet received any pneumococcal vaccine you should get the Prevnar 13 first, followed by Pneumovax 23 six to 12 months later. Medicare Part B covers both shots, if they are taken at least one year apart. To locate a vaccination site that offers both flu and pneumonia shots, visit Vaccines-.gov and type in your ZIP code.

Horace Jack tells of his trip to France and England

September 12, 1918 ~ Somewhere in France, Aug.

Friend Editor:-

I will write you now as we were told tonight of what we could write.

No doubt you will or would like to something of our trip overseas-which isn't finished yet but has been very pleasant so far. We left Custer some time ago, took a route via N. Y. to England and the trip on water was sure great. Some of the boys had as many as six meals in a day-three down and three up-but that is all in one's lifetime when in the army. After we left the boat, we went to a rest camp at (deleted) England. That town is one of the oldest there and was once the capital. It sure looked odd to me as all buildings are built of brick or stone, and the streets are so narrow we had to march in a column of twos. About all one sees there in the line of autos is two-wheeled carts; but nevertheless, the sights one sees are great; .very pretty scenery, such as gardens and flower beds, etc. Well, we stayed at that camp about 48 hrs., so you see there wasn't much "rest" to it. From there we went to another camp of "rest" at (deleted)—another picturesque spot of "the old country" as some people call it. That is a very pleasant place too and I must say I would like to have stayed there for a little while to look things over, but I am in the army and that prevents me

from doing so. Well, we only stayed there a short time when we crossed the channel and landed in France. You will note I've told you the places where I have been, but I can't tell you where I now am or any dates such as when we sailed or when we landed, or in fact anything about military matters. Well, the sights here in France, what I've seen of it, is better still. Everything interests the eye. Since we came here we have been in

another place of "rest", but that suits my eye. I just heard we don't stay long enough to get very much of that stuff, so I've begun to think that there is no such thing as rest for one while in the army.. However, everything is fine and dandy and if everyone is like me they are sure enjoying it.

I've often heard the girls of the U.S. say that when a soldier gets over here they forget the home girls and think more of those here in France and England; but I fail to see any

one of the other boys say: "None of those girls for me; I say American girls first, now and forever. Amen." The girls in the U.S. don't need to be afraid of us sticking here after the war is over.

We are getting good eats and lots of it so I guess Uncle Sam will care for us alright He has so far anyway.

Tobacco is cheaper here than in the States, so we can smoke yet awhile at cost.

Well, may be I'd better close for now as it is getting dark and I guess I've written about enough-and will say good night.

Don't let anyone worry as we Yanks will sure help finish this war and we will come marching home. Ill try and write again soon. Remaining as ever your friend and wellwisher,







StarWatch By Gary Becker - Record Misery for Late Summer



* Relative humidity, expressed as a percentage, is the ratio of the amount of moisture in the air compared to the maximum amount of moisture that can be present in the atmosphere at that temperature. The dew point is the temperature at which a given parcel of air will achieve a relative humidity of 100 percent. Expressed in another way, the dew point is the temperature to which the air needs to be cooled in order to become completely saturated with moisture. If the air were cooled even more, water vapor would condense out of the atmosphere, generally as fog or precipitation. The highest dew point recorded was 95 degrees F. at Dhahran in eastern Saudi Arabia on July 8, 2003. With an air temperature of 108 degrees F., it felt like the temperature (heat index) was 178 degrees F. (World Meteorological Organization). Last month when I was at the Mars Desert Research Station near Hanksville, UT where Moravian has its timeshare in the MDRS Robotic Observatory, the

temperature climbed to nearly 105 degrees F., on one day but with a relative humidity of only 15 percent. The dew point was a mere 45 degrees F. If consideration is given to the heat index which factors humidity into the equation to gain a better approximation of how the air temperature feels, it was still 105 degrees F. at MDRS; however, the heat index on the near 95-degree days back East was also about 105 degrees F. A low humidity environment is also much more conducive for making good astronomical observations. Weather conditions are generally clearer and the sky more transparent because it is more difficult to attain the dew point to form clouds. It is even more difficult to reach the dew point near the surface where the ground has been warmed greatly by the sun during the daytime. Thus worrying about moisture collecting on the optics of a telescope and other equipment exposed to the nighttime air becomes a nonissue. That is not the case in the eastern half of the country where dew shields and heaters on telescopes have to be employed to prevent condensation from occurring on the instrumentation. www.astronomy.org


