Alcona group to distribute school supplies to youth

Helping Hands, a volunteer organization that works to make life easier for families with children attending Alcona Community Schools and teachers, will be distributing backpacks filled with school supplies to students in need this fall.

Their goal is to help as many students as possible by bringing the necessary school supplies that elementary teachers are asking students to bring to class.

"Teachers can be very particular about what students will need in the classroom. Spiral notebooks are requested by some, but teach-

nate whatever they wanted to fill it. I wondered how much of those supplies would reach Alcona County and was told they hoped to fill 12 backpacks.

"I thought about how 12 was nothing compared to how many children attend Alcona Elementary who are in need at the school. I also thought the supplies given wouldn't necessarily be what the child needed for their teacher's specific request," Eddinger said.

Eddinger has a large shopping list of specific items needed per grade from kindergarten through fifth grade. Unfortunately, the organization's shopping dollars are

ers want them in specific colors for different subjects. We're trying hard to make sure all students are as successful as possible in their new grade," said Ann Eddinger, spokesperson and a founder of Helping Hands, Inc.

Recently, she heard that United Way was trying to fill a school bus with necessary school supplies children would need for going back to school. "The bus was to be parked in front of Walmart in Alpena and people could do-

at an all-time low due to recently applying for its 501C3 nonprofit status.

Helping Hands, Inc., is a relatively new organization formed a year ago to help students, their parents and teachers. Eddinger wanted to make sure the organization got its nonprofit status, which cost the organization \$600, as soon as possible so it could begin to apply for grants rather than consistently ask the community and local businesses to give.

Motorcycle driver sustains serious injuries in two-vehicle accident

A Lincoln man remains in critical condition following a two-vehicle accident in Mikado Township last week.

According to the Alcona County Sheriff's Department, Jesse Gordy, 42, is in St. Mary's Hospital in Saginaw, Mich. for treatment of his injuries after his motorcycle collided with a pickup truck at the intersection of King's

Corner Road and F-41 at 6:40 a.m. on Tuesday, July 23.

Gordy was traveling south on F-41 and collided with a pickup truck driven by Phillip Zarachowicz, 57, of Oscoda who allegedly failed to stop at the Kings Corner Road intersection. Responding deputies provided medical assistance to Gordy until Alcona EMS arrived and then transported

him to St. Joseph Hospital in Tawas. He was later air-lifted to St. Mary's Hospital.

Zarachowicz was not injured in the incident. Members of the Mikado Fire Department and Oscoda Township Police officers assisted at the scene. Alpena and Arenac county sheriff's de-

Raising awareness, funds for suicide prevention with cornhole tournament

The effects of suicide last long after the act has been committed. It affects the lives of parents, siblings, and friends of the deceased with a heart-wrenching grief.

That is why the community of Barton City will be holding the second Dana Marie Suicide Awareness Cornhole Tournament this Saturday.

"I needed to do something so no one else has to go what we went through," Julie Cole said. She explained the tournament is a way to honor her daughter's life and to help others to be suicide aware and begin opening conversations about suicide.

Julie's daughter, Dana,

was a happy 12-year-old in 2002 when she took her own life. "She did well in sports, did well in school. She was happy and smiled a lot. You would never know something else was going on. It's been 17 years. It was very unexpected. There weren't any signs. You just never know," Cole said.

The tournament will begin at 9 a.m. at the Barton City Park and offers not only cornhole competitions but something for just about everyone in the family.

There will be vendors and crafters selling wares, a bake sale, 50/50 and other raffles including the raffle of many gift baskets, gift certificates, cornhole boards and a gas grill package. For a \$3 entry fee, kids can enter field day

events with prizes given and Dan the Smokin Man will be on hand with barbecue food. A candlelight vigil will be held at sunset.

The deadline to sign up two-person teams is Thursday, Aug. 1. Cost to enter is \$50 per team. Cole said game times will be posted on Friday, Aug. 2. Payment can be given to Julie Cole or Melissa Duff on the morning of the tournament before the first bags are thrown and credit

“Until the nonprofit status comes in and grants are given, we have no choice but to ask the community for help,” Eddinger said. The organization is mostly looking for cash/check donations so its members can purchase specific items needed, but will also accept items such as backpacks, pencils, notebook paper, three-ring note-books, spiral notebooks, high-lighters, crayons, fine point Expo dry erase markers, Kleenex, and Clorox sanitizer wipes, which almost every teacher asks for.

It is also seeking hygiene items such as shampoo, conditioner, body wash, deodorant, toothbrushes and toothpaste which the organization will give to the high school students’ free store.

Helping Hands, Inc. assisted Alcona Elementary students last year by providing \$400 worth of reading planners and envelopes students needed to take home their weekly reading assignments. Eddinger said this year the school paid for those items.

Helping Hands also gave each student in the elementary school a Christmas stocking filled with fun and useful items such as pencils, lanyards, erasers, small toys, stickers, and a chocolate Santa. “For some kids, that was their only Christmas gift. It didn’t feel right giving to some children in need and not to others, so we gave one to every child,” Eddinger said.

This year, Eddinger is hoping each Christmas stocking will be handmade, either sewn, crocheted or knitted, offering an additional something to bring joy to each child’s heart.

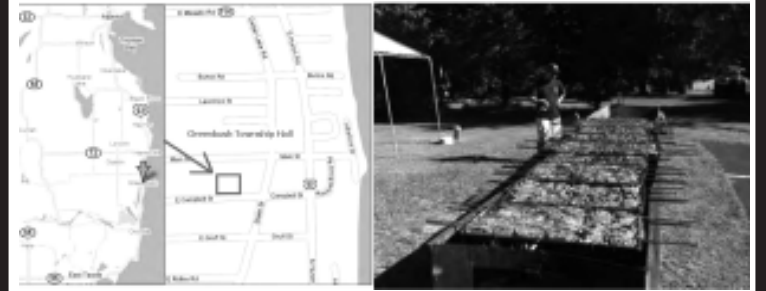

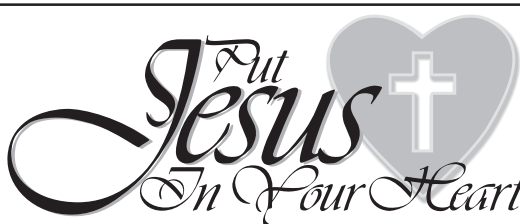

How Medicare covers ambulance services

Dear Savvy Senior,
How does Medicare cover ambulance services? About three months ago, I took an ambulance to the hospital emergency room because I rarely drive anymore, and I just received a \$1,100 bill from the ambulance company.

Surprised Senior

Dear Surprised,

This is a Medicare issue that confuses many seniors. Yes, Medicare does covers emergency ambulance services and, in limited cases, non-emergency ambulance services too, but only when they're deemed medically necessary and reasonable. So, what does that means?

First, it means that your medical condition must be serious enough that you need an ambulance to transport you safely to a hospital or other facility where you receive care that Medicare covers.

If a car or taxi could transport you without endangering your health, Medicare

won't pay. For example, Medicare probably won't pay for an ambulance to take someone with a simple arm fracture to a hospital. But if he or she goes into shock, or is prone to internal bleeding, ambulance transport may be medically necessary to ensure the patient's safety on the way. The details make a difference.

Second, the ambulance must take you to the nearest appropriate facility, meaning the closest hospital, critical access hospital, skilled nursing facility or dialysis facility generally equipped to provide the services your illness or injury requires.

It also means that the facility must have a physician or physician specialist available to treat your condition. Thus, Medicare may pay for an ambulance to take you to a more distant hospital if, for example, you are seriously burned, and the nearest hospital doesn't have burn unit.

Similarly, if you live in a rural area where the nearest hospital equipped to treat you

is a two-hour drive away, Medicare will pay. But if you want an ambulance to take you to a more distant hospital because the doctor you prefer has staff privileges there, expect to pay a greater share of the bill. Medicare will cover the cost of ambulance transport to the nearest appropriate facility and no more.

In limited cases, Medicare will also cover non-emergency ambulance services if such transportation is needed to treat or diagnose your health condition and the use of any other transportation method could endanger your health. Not having another means of transportation is not sufficient for Medicare to pay for services.

Some examples here are if you need transportation to get dialysis or if you are staying in a skilled nursing facility and require medical care. In these cases, a doctor's order may be required to prove that use of an ambulance is medically necessary.

The cost for ambulance

services can vary from several hundred to several thousand dollars depending on where you live and how far you're transported.

Under original Medicare, Part B pays 80 percent of the Medicare-approved amounts for ambulance rides. You, or your Medicare supplemental policy (if you have one), will need to pay the remaining 20 percent.

If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, it must cover the same services as original Medicare, and may offer some additional transportation services. You'll need to check with your plan for details.

If an ambulance company bills you for services after

Medicare denies payment, but you think the ride was medically necessary, you can appeal (see Medicare.gov/claims-appeals). Often, a lack of information about a person's condition or need for services leads to denials.

If you need some help contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP), which has counselors that can help you file an appeal for free. To locate your local SHIP, visit ShiptaCenter.org or call (877) 839-2675.

card donations are accepted.

The first Dana Marie Cornhole Tournament and subsequent fundraisers held last year had about 25 teams participating and raised about \$8,000 for suicide and mental health awareness. The funds were turned over to the Alcona County Sheriff's Department to be used locally to promote and educate people about suicide and mental health issues.

In a letter from Sheriff Scott Stephenson, he explained the funds were used to train police officers, corrections officers, and emergency dispatchers on how to respond and assist people having mental health issues and emergencies.

"The appropriate response by first responders to people in mental health crises could mean the difference between life and death. It is important first responders have the most up-to-date training so their response and assistance can be the best it can be," Stephenson said.

More training has been planned and will include training emergency workers and volunteer firefighters in the Alcona County area.

Stephenson explained much of the training was provided by Northeast Michigan Community Mental Health Authority (NeMCMHA) free of charge and the Alcona County Sheriff's Department, acting as fiduciary for the charity funds, will be donating to NeMCMHA so it can continue providing mental health services to the area and train first responders.

The funds also brought in Jeff Olson to speak to sixth through 12th-grade students about suicide and show a documentary about Jeff's son, Daniel, who suffered most of his young life with depres-

sion and anxiety before taking his life at age 19.

"It was very profound. His son attempted suicide several times from the age of 12. From the outside, no one knew he was suffering. He was an all-state quarterback for his football team, had a great family and friends," Cole said.

Cole wants to bring Olson back to Alcona County with funds earned from this year's Cornhole Tournament, but this time, have him speak to parents and the community at large.

On the Facebook page, Do It for Daniel, Olson explained he made the documentary to educate people about depression, a disease that people suffering from hide well from others.

"We want the world to be more aware of this disease and make it easier to talk about. The stigma of depression, or any type of mental illness, will only be broken down by educating and getting people to talk openly about the fact that it is a medical disease. Our goal is to spread the word and, hopefully, this movie will touch many lives. We want people to know they are not alone, one in four people suffer from some form of mental illness

in their lifetime.

"Our wish is to show the power of love, strength, and determination. A community that rallied behind a dark situation and banded together to overcome the odds and grow together. If we all believe and work hard enough, anything is possible. We want everyone to understand there is always hope," Olson said.

Cole is hoping everyone can see the film and talk with Olson. She is also hoping everyone comes to the event.

There is still room for vendor/crafters to show and sell their wares for a \$30 fee. Volunteers are also appreciated, and all help is welcomed. Cole asked that people keep in mind this is a fundraising charity event for suicide awareness, "Although there is a competition, this will ultimately be a family atmosphere and a day for fun."

State park guide brings new ideas to Harrisville

In a world filled with electronic gadgets, it seems families are drifting further away from quality time spent together outdoors.

To bring families back to appreciating nature and each other, a breath of fresh air has swept through Harrisville and Negwegon State Parks in the form of explorer guide Pat Esmond.

Esmond, a high energy, seasoned and knowledgeable guide is new to the position at Harrisville, but not new to bringing excitement to outdoor recreation, education, and conservation.

Since coming to Harrisville, she has suggested some new ideas, renewed old favorites and is committed to engaging people of all ages in the natural beauty of northeast Michigan.

Esmond is very aware of how children are getting away from outdoor activities and is fearful activities like fly fishing and fly tying will be lost if children are not exposed to them. She would like to see a fly tying program at the park in the near future.

Other innovations she would like to see at the park is swimming, or possibly sailing lessons, and water safety classes with kayaks, canoes, paddle boards, and paddle boats.

Neither Harrisville or Negwegon State parks offer those services or have the equipment, so Esmond is looking for grants and sponsors to donate goods or funds. "I used to teach these classes and could do it again if the park had the equipment. I'm very interested in water safety," she said. "If we had the equipment, it would be a good opportunity to teach how to use it and provide a way to see if it is enjoyable before someone invests their own money on something they may not like to do."

"I want to give the kids and adults fun things to do outdoors. We have a lot of senior citizens here who would really enjoy these activities and would have fun doing it with their friends. This would entice the community as well as visitors to northeast Michi-

gan to get outdoors," Esmond said.

Esmond would also like to see permanent display signs at the Harrisville State Park, like the ones Alcona High School students worked on for Negwegon, saying it would help to enhance what the park was about.

Weekly programs Esmond helps with at the park include informative seminars on boating laws, invasive species and explaining the state park recreational passport. Additionally, family-friendly conversations and activities invite families each week to interact with nature by taking trail and beach hikes, hunt for Petoskey stones, go bat or bird watching, learn how camping was done in the "olden days," and learn to camp safely.

Esmond brings multiple items for program attendees to feel and look at such as pelts, paintings, and antiques which furthers her educational message and makes it interesting for everyone.

"We talk about pesky animals, about bear and porcupines," Esmond said as she stroked a bear pelt, "Most people understand not to put food in their tents as it can attract a bear, but if they cook outside, and then wear those clothes into the tent, the smell of food is still on them. The bear doesn't understand the difference."

Esmond is pleased to bring the State Park Junior Ranger program back to the forefront at the park and said any child from four years up to a teenager can engage and complete the program, but the younger ones may need mom and dad's assistance.

The beauty of the Junior

Ranger program is it can be done anytime, no matter what the weather. Those entering the program this year receive a colorful fact and fun folder explaining endangered species. The folder contains interactive games like code deciphering, matching and word search puzzles, mazes, and instructions on how to make animal shadow puppets, all while engaging young minds to think about animal extinction.

"The folder isn't as park specific as I would like it (to be). Next year it will be specific to Harrisville and instead of receiving a lanyard like they get this year, I'm hoping the kids who complete it will get a Harrisville Park Junior Ranger patch," Esmond said.

She is excited about the rest of the summer and is looking forward to special programs the park will be offering such as Outdoor Recreation Skills on August 3 from 3 to 5 p.m., Stargazing

Glass prisms provide light below deck in sailing vessels

A 4 1/2-inch-high heavy glass pyramid was in a recent house sale. It was inexpensive, but no one knew what it was used for. It was almost too heavy to lift, so it wouldn't be a practical paperweight, but we bought it to display on a table with our obelisks. A long search of pictures online revealed what it is ... a "deck prism." It was used to give extra light to parts of an antique sailing ship that were below the waterline. The first deck prisms were used about 1840. Fire was the best source of light, but it was also very dangerous on a wooden ship, so oil, kerosene lamps and candles were avoided.

My prism was inserted upside down into a hole on the main deck. The glass pyramid point hung down and shed some light into the room below. The base of the prism, now at the top, was set flush into the wooden deck. After a while, the caulking that held the glass would leak and the glass could chip, so the prism was carefully remounted and caulked. In 1861 a patented threaded light that could be screwed into a metal frame was invented, so prisms lost favor. But reproductions in colored glass are still are made and used, and old ones are collected. They usually sell for less than \$50.

Will the instrument be pictured in a catalog? What is the cost of shipping it to the auction? Insurance? Do you want a minimum bid? What are costs to you if it doesn't sell? You also can try a music store in your area. They may know someone who collects vintage instruments.

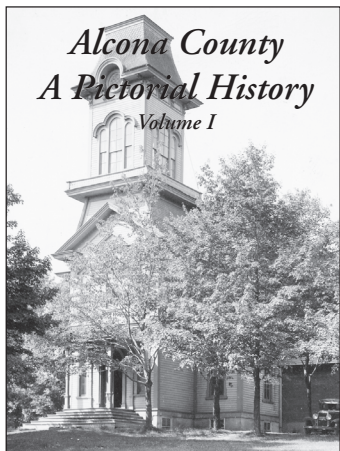

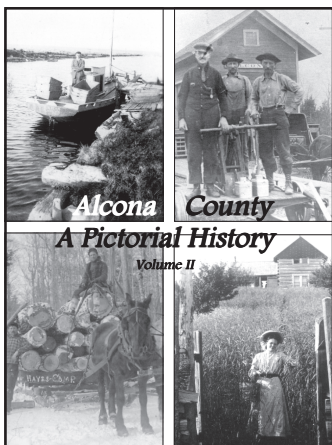

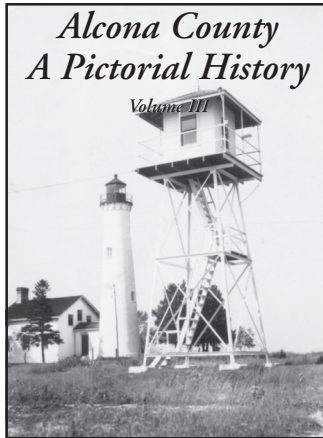

Esmond grew up in Flint, Mich., and fell in love with the outdoors when she was young while being a camp counselor at Timbers Recreation Area in Traverse City, Mich.

She became a teacher and taught at Genesee Intermediate and Caro Regional Center before spending over 12 years teaching outdoor recreation at Delta College.

"I took students rafting in West Virginia on the new river gorge. It was a physical education credit. The people there asked me if I would like to come and work for them. It was a four-year temporary position and I decided to take it. When the temp time was up, I moved to Washington D.C. and worked at Rock Creek Park," Esmond said. From that job, she went to
