In what might seem like a long process for those involved, improvements at the Alcona Township Park in Black River, are slated to be complete by mid-June

"Maybe that's just because we are excited to be able to add these amenities at our park," said Marlena MacNeill, Alcona Township Supervisor, about the installation of a barrier-free kayak and canoe launch and fishing deck along the Black River.

"Meridian Construction of Alpena had been poised and ready to do the work last year, but a delay in the permitting process forced work to be postponed. The bright side of that delay was that Meridian crews were waiting at the gate to begin work early this spring. Work began as soon as the seasonal weight restrictions were lifted and equipment and materials could be moved to the site," MacNeill said.

She explained that both the kayak/canoe launch and the fishing deck are barrier-free and allow persons with or without physical limitations better access to the water's edge. The kayak/canoe launch is designed for wheelchair-bound boaters to get in and out of their boat and onto the river via the barrier-free deck. This set up also provides much more efficient access for kayakers and canoeists of all abilities.

"The Alcona Township Board is hopeful these improvements will open up usage of the park to a broader population. We know by the current usage the park is a valuable asset offering boating, swimming, picnicking, and fishing access to or along both Lake Huron and the Black River," MacNeill said.

Alcona Township owns the picnic and beach area of the park, and under a long-term lease with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR), is responsible for the area along the river and the launch area.

Eric Ostrander, DNR Parks and Recreation Unit Supervisor for Harrisville said, "The improvements are welcome additions and will enhance the recreational opportunities available along the Lake Huron shore area. Backcountry campsites at Negwegon State Park are accessible on foot or by water. The new launch offers campers the option to get to the sites via the lakeshore in canoes or kayaks."

The improvements also provide access to another project Alcona Township has been working on with the Thunder Bay Marine Sanctuary to highlight the five shallow-water shipwrecks off the Black River coast area. The wrecks are identified by white buoy markers in the waters near the shore of the park area. Informational signage is being installed in conjunction with the other park improvements to aid shipwreck enthusiasts in learning about and/or exploring the wreck sites.

The fishing deck and kayak/canoe launch are funded by a \$108,700 grant from a Michigan Department of Natural Resources Trust Fund and matched by \$46,700 from the town-ship's recreation budget.

There will be a celebration to officially open the two new access points at the park on June 30 at 3 p.m.

The park can be found by following Black River Road approximately 2.5 miles east of U.S. 23. For information about the park, contact Supervisor MacNeill at (989) 727 3788.

# Students fly to learn about physics

Taking to the sky to learn about gravity and physics might seem a little out of range for local high school students. However, a program sponsored by Harvard University and the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) is in the second year of hands-on instruction to do just that.

Students from Alcona and Oscoda high schools' introduction to physic classes have gotten first hand experience in the pilot's seat in order to see the possibility of a career in science.

Elizabeth Himwich, a graduate student in physics at Harvard University, and Pete Mapes, a pilot who resides in Oscoda, designed the course to get students thinking outside of their northeast Michigan location and to look at world possibilities using math and science.

The goal was to expose students to what is being studied and what types of careers are available such as re-

searcher, technician and programmer as well as introduce them to advanced topics of physics including quantum mechanics, special relativity and general relativity.

Mapes explained he and Himwich, who he met when she was in high school taking a Young Eagle Scout flight, began thinking about how math and science achievements of youth in northeastern Michigan were behind the rest of the state and how most students attending Alcona and Oscoda high schools either go to college in-state or do not attend college at all.

They designed the program to entice students to enjoy math and science by handson experiments which include lessons on flying a small airplane. While doing so, they conduct experiments of super and microgravity.

When students arrive at the airplane hangar in Oscoda, they are given a brief description of the forces of flight and how a plane is controlled. "We expect them to fly

the airplane for the entire soar with just verbal instructions from me. Most kids can do this, nearly 90 percent can fly the first time out, including making the takeoff and landing the plane," Mapes said.

Mapes takes two students at a time in the small Cessna plane. Each student gets a turn at flying the plane which includes practicing acceleration and turns on the ground prior to takeoff and landing.

Students practice the four basics of flying; climbing, descending, turning and flying straight and level. "Once at 3,000 feet, we put the air-

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



# Government pension might reduce Social Security benefits

Dear Savvy Senior,

As a teacher for 20 years, I receive a pension from a school system that did not withhold Social Security taxes from my pay. After teaching, I've been working for a small company where I do pay Social Security taxes. Now, approaching age 65, I would like to retire and apply for my Social Security benefits. But I've been told that my teacher's pension may cause me to lose some of my Social Security. Is that true? Ready to Retire

Dear Ready,

Yes, it's true. It's very likely that your Social Security retirement benefits will be reduced under the terms of a government rule called the Windfall Elimination Provision (or WEP).

The WEP affects people who receive pensions from jobs in which they were not required to pay Social Security taxes - for example, police officers, fire fighters, teachers and state and local government workers whose employers were not part of the national Social Security system. People who worked for nonprofit or religious organizations before 1984 may also be outside the system.

Many of these people, like you, are also eligible for Social Security retirement or disability benefits based on other work they did over the course of their career for which Social Security taxes were paid.

Because of your teacher's pension, Social Security will use a special formula to calculate your retirement benefits, reducing them compared to what you'd other-

How much they'll be reduced depends on your work history. But one rule that generally applies is that your Social Security retirement benefits cannot be cut by more than half the size of your pension. And the WEP does not apply to survivor benefits. If you're married and die, your dependents can get a full Social Security payment, unless your spouse has earned his or her own government pension for which they didn't pay Social Security taxes. If that's the case, Social Security has another rule known as the Government Pension Offset (or GPO) that affects spouses or widows/widowers benefits.

Under the GPO, spousal and survivor benefits will be cut by two-thirds of the amount of their pension. And if their pension is large enough, their Social Security spousal or survivor benefits will be zero.

There are a few exceptions to these rules most of which are based on when you entered the Social Security workforce.

Why Do These Rules Exist? According to the Social Security Administration, the reason Congress created the WEP (in 1983) and GPO (in 1977) was to create a more equitable system. People who get both a pension from non-Social Security work and benefits from Social Security-covered work get an unfair windfall due to the formula of how benefit amounts are calcu-

These rules ensure that government employees who don't pay Social Security taxes would end up with roughly the same income as people who work in the pri-

vate sector and do pay them.

plane into a 60-degree bank dent of Krentz) landed so softly turn. A very steep turn and we pull the nose across the horizon. The accelerative force felt in the plane at 60-degree bank is twice gravity.

"I have the students hold their arms out, they feel very heavy because they now weigh twice as much. A kid who weighs 125 pounds now weighs 250. They sense the effect of supergravity," Mapes said.

The students then experience micro-gravity by lowering the nose of the plane and accelerating to 140 miles per hour. "I have them gradually raise the nose up above the horizon and hold it there. The

we didn't even know we were on the ground. There were some others who did beautiful landings too. Women seem to have a good sense of height looking out into the distance. I don't know why that is, but my wife always makes gorgeous landings," Mapes said.

He explained how the program makes gravity real for the student. "They start to understand gravity is all about acceleration and weight is about acceleration. Weight is independent of mass. Weight is a function of gravity; mass is a function of

plane goes up at a steep angle. As they start running out of air speed, they push forward on the yoke. While doing this, I'm holding a pen. As they push forward, we go into slight negative gravity," Mapes said.

While at slight negative gravity, Mapes' hand falls away from the pen which allows the pen to float. As the flight student maintains a forward push, the plane pushes away from the pen which appears to float midair backward where the student sitting in the back seat grabs it. "While we do this exercise, we are weightless. They get to experience what an astronaut feels for about four seconds," Mapes said.

After the experiments are conducted in the plane, the student flying performs a noflap landing. Once landed and stopped it is the next student's turn. Mapes said the Alcona students he had flying last week performed some beautiful landings, especially from female students.

"Karen Sharboneau (a stu-

kids get airsick on the flight, but that doesn't deter their excitement. We give them peppermints before the flight and that helps. We have gallon freezer zip-lock bags in the plane just in case," Mapes said.

Krentz explained Himwich not only teaches the students about physics but sets an example for the students to open their eyes about possibilities for their future. "Just because they are from a small town, doesn't mean they cannot attend an ivy league university. There are opportunities available, including scholarships. This is the second year for the program. The kids can't quit talking about it," Krentz said.

"Math is important and being able to think logically, scientifically and do calculations is an important skill, not only for physics but for any career," Himwich said. She explained Harvard University, like many other universities, is interested in bringing educational out-

reach programs to students.

Mapes volunteers his time to assist with the program and said it wouldn't be possible if it were not for the EAA, which provides insurance for youth programs like this.

According to Mapes, flying lessons are expensive, but it is cheaper than horses and there are program scholarships available to youth 16 and older to take lessons locally each year.

Taylor Clark, a 16-yearold Alcona High School student, said she had never been in a plane before taking her first flight with Mapes last week.

"It was a fun experience. I loved it. At first, it was a little scary, but after a few minutes, I was fine. I could see all the way to Alpena. It showed me how small our world is and it's good to try new things," Clark said. "It was a little like riding a roller coaster, only we were in control. It was very cool to watch the pen float. The instructor was great and only helped if we needed it. It was a once in a lifetime opportunity that everyone should try if they have a chance."

Clark explained the experience taught her about new possibilities available to her and is seriously considering applying for a Jon Scheer Memorial Flight Training Scholarship to, hopefully, attain a pilot's license next year.

# State struggles with eldercare worker shortage

Michigan doesn't have enough personal care workers for the growing population of elderly residents and more aren't coming, according to industry experts.

The state will need 32,000 more elder care aides next year, said Clare Luz, an assistant professor at Michigan State University's College of Osteopathic Medicine who has studied the need for the past 10 years.

The study said that personal care workers help reduce falls by 76 percent and the number of emergency hospital visits by 56 percent. They can improve emotional health by 79 percent and overall physical health by 77 percent.

The shortage is at a critical level, Luz said. "Most older people want to stay home and families need help caring for them," she said. "Inhome personal care assistants are important because they can pay close attention to people's medical needs."

Numerous factors contribute to the shortage, Luz explained. Workers consider their wages low for the amount of work they do. They're referred to as lowskilled and they receive few benefits and little respect.

"The job is extremely trying mentally and physically," said Erin Swadley, the owner of Marquette Home Care, which provides assisted living for the elderly. "A lot of times care workers are dealing with people who have dementia so you're always repeating yourself, and that can be emotionally draining. On a physical level, people need assistance being helped in and out of their cars or out of the shower and that can cause physical strain."

And while workers start at about \$11 an hour, they can start at more at Meijer and Target. "Wouldn't you want to get \$12 an hour for working there rather than helping people in and out of showers?" she said, "For this line of work you've really gotta have the heart for it.

A training program allowing workers to advance from private duty aide to caregiver aide to skilled nursing would appeal to many workers, she said. Luz leads the IMPART Alliance, an organization of elder care workers, researchers and agencies that's trying to fill the need for more workers.

Their efforts include creating a standard training program and increasing awareness of the need. IMPART Alliance has created a traveling exhibition that displays the stories of care workers, in addition to meeting with legislators to alert them to the problem, Luz said.

There is a definite need to enhance training and certification for eldercare, said Bob Stein, the general counsel for the Michigan Assisted Living Association. "We need to professionalize the field and to do public awareness campaigns to make the job more desirable by showing how self-satisfying it can be."

Personal care workers in the mental health field of not having and attracting enough people into the field, he said.

"The economy's gotten better than it once was, and when that happens, people have more options of other entry-level jobs to go into, and this is not one of their choices," he said. "In Traverse City, for instance, places like Walmart, McDonald's or Target raise their minimum wage to \$11 because you can pass

struggle with the same issue the cost to the customers, but with this job, it's difficult because you can't just pass the cost to the families."

> The worker shortage is a problem in a lot of industries, Luz said, but this issue is different because it's a matter of life or death for many. "I've been struggling to hire more workers for a while now and the best thing we can do is to provide a more livable wage," Swadley said. "That's the best way to attract more skilled workers."

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## Moments In Time By The History Channel



- On June 9, 1772, colonists, angered by the British Parliament's passing of the Townshend Acts restricting colonial trade, board and set ablaze the HMS Gaspee, an armed British customs schooner that had run aground. British officials found no one willing to identify those involved, and the inquiry closed without result.
- On June 4, 1919, the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, guaranteeing women the right to vote, is passed by Congress and sent to the states for ratification. On Aug. 18, 1920, Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the amendment, giving it the two-thirds majority necessary to make it the law of the land.
- On June 3, 1937, the duke of Windsor -- formerly King Edward VIII -marries Wallis Warfield Simpson, the American divorcee for whom he abdicated the British throne in 1936.
- On June 5, 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt issues a stern statement warning Japan to stop using poison gas in its war on China. Japan continued its use of these weapons until the end of the war, managing to keep its activities secret.
- On June 8, 1966, the rival National Football League (NFL) and American Football League (AFL) announce that they will merge. The first Super Bowl between the two leagues took place at the end of the 1966 season.

## Mental health care 24/7

Veterans Affairs is serious about providing mental health care for veterans, especially in light of the ongoing, unchanging statistics for veteran suicides. A recent press release serves as a reminder that mental health resources and crisis intervention are available 24/7 at any VA health care facility.

In 2018, 1.7 million veterans received mental health services at the VA. That includes 84,000 psychiatric stays, 41,700 residential stays and 21 million outpatient visits. For that year, 48 percent of in-person mental health visits were held on the same day as the veteran's primary care

percent of in-person visits were held on the same day as the primary care

What happened, one wonders, to the remaining 49 percent? The 24/ 7 mental health coverage includes other services: a telehealth or video visit, scheduling an appointment, talking on the phone to a nurse or getting a prescription filled. Is that how the others received same-day services?

Still, all it takes, per the VA website, is to walk into any VA medical center, day or night, or into a Vet Center during operating hours and you'll get help.
