Junior Livestock Club to have market sale

Despite dozens of event cancellations, including the Alcona County Fair this summer due to ČOVID-19, one traditional fair event, the Alcona Junior Livestock Club Market Sale, will still take place.

The format, however, will be slightly different -- there will be no live animals at the event which will take place in the Alcona Fair Grounds horse arena on Wednesday, Aug. 22 at 5 p.m.

Kevin Boyat, a fair volunteer and 4-H leader for over 30 years, explained there will be an auction with photo displays of the animals. "The kids will have the animal's photos and will be talking up their animals to prospective buyers by phone, social media and in-person before the event," Boyat said.

According to Boyat everyone's main concern when the fair was canceled was how the youth that had already started raising animals for the market sale would recoup their efforts. "As soon as it was decided that the fair would have to be canceled

this year, we called sponsors to find out if they wanted their money back or if they wanted it carried forward to next year. All but one said to carry it forward, but all the sponsors wanted to know the same thing -- if the kids would still be able to sell their animals," he said.

Boyat explained that youth will be standing inside the arena and buyers will be socially distanced around it to bid on the animals. Masks will be required.

"We think it will work, that is if nothing changes in the state with executive orders, Boyat said.

One big concern was how the animals purchased will be butchered, since that has been a major hurdle with farmers across the state since the pandemic began, but Boyat said they already had butchers lined up to take care of the animals and even had one local butcher, Shannon Rifenbark, offering to butcher turkey, ducks and chickens for the youth club free of charge.

Alcona library loosens restrictions, enters Phase 3

The Alcona County Library has reopened at all branches as of Monday Aug. 3 for 50 percent building capacity.

According to Alcona County Library Director Denise Bearre, all branches will be open -- Caledonia Township, Harrisville, Lincoln and Mikado.

- Harrisville hours are Monday-Friday 10 a.m. to 6
- · Lincoln hours are Monday-Friday noon to 6 p.m.
- Caledonia hours are Monday-Thursday noon to -5:30 p.m., with touchless pickup
- · Mikado hours are Monday-Thursday 2 to 6 p.m., with touchless pickup only.

According to Bearre Phase 3 of the reopening has limited in-person patronage. Patrons will be limited to 25 at Harrisville and 10 at Lin-

She also explained what Phase 3 includes:

- Soft seating will remain reduced/eliminated. Every other computer will be marked out of service to increase physical distance between patrons.
- Face masks must be used in buildings per Michigan Executive order 2020-147. Patrons will be asked to don face masks, and face masks will be made available to pa-
- Internet will remain on 24/7 at all branches.
- Tables will have only one chair each, some tables will be moved to increase space
- Toys, puzzles, games, and headphones will remain put away. Earbuds will be available for purchase at desk for

Sisters to auction swine at market sale

Youth across the county are looking forward to the Alcona County Junior Livestock Club Market Sale this year, probably more so than any other year in the past due to so many summer event cancellations.

Many, like Savannah and Sierra Wright, ages 14 and 12 respectively, had already started raising their market projects before the Alcona County Fair cancellation and weren't quite sure what to do with their investment.

The Wright sisters will be auctioning their swine at the market and they are so relieved the sale will still take place, even if they can't bring their 180 plus-pound pigs for actual auction, due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Savannah will be selling her gilt pig, "Ninny" a black and tan speckled beauty and Sierra will be selling "Ruby Rose" a reddish pig.

Savannah explained people should be interested in purchasing Ninny because she is nice and fat with a lot of meat to her. "I feed her a lot of Chippewa pig and sow feed and she likes snacks like apples and bread," she said. Sierra grinned and said

her Ruby Rose has nice ham. "I can tell just by looking at her. She's special because we both have the same middle name, Rose. She likes to splash in the water a lot and whenever I give her water, she will spill it and lay in it," she said.

Both sisters said raising pigs was hard work and involved scooping up a lot of poop and lifting 50-pound bags of feed. The girls are also helping to raise a third pig for their parents, Melvin and Casie Phinney, and eightyear-old brother, Nelson Phinney.

The Phinney farm also has turkey, guinea hens, ducks, rabbits and lots of chickens

in which the girls work hard to help care for. They explained all the animals need a lot of fresh water daily.

Casie Phinney, who was raised in Alcona County and was in Kevin and Debbie Boyat's 4-H Club when she was young, was pleased that at least the girls will be able to market their animals.

Because there will be no fair to show animals at Nelson, who is a year too young to market animals, will have to wait for his turn to show and market next year.

"It's the girl's first year marketing animals. It's a shame they won't be able to bring the animals with them, but they will have their pictures there. They learned a lot this year about raising swine," Časie said.

Savannah and Sierra belong to three 4-H groups, Rabbits Are Us, Bird Brains and Swine Steins, but have not





equipment. Crews check for damaged or worn equipment and vegetation hazards. The inspection flights are often conducted at low altitudes to allow accurate visual inspection of equipment for lightning damage, wear or other potential problems. SENIOR ZIFESTYLES How to keep a watchful eye on an aging parent

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you recommend any services or technology that will help me monitor my elderly mother who lives alone? Since the coronavirus pandemic started last March, my sister and I have noticed that my mom's health has slipped a bit, so we would like to find something that helps us keep tabs on her when we're not around.

Concerned Daughter

Dear Concerned

Depending on how closely you want to monitor your mother, and what she's comfortable with as well, there are check-in call services along with some new monitoring technology devices you can turn to for help. Here are several to consider.

Check-In Calls

If you just want a simple check to make sure your mom is okay every day, consider signing her up with a daily check-in call service program. These are telephone reassurance programs run by police or sheriff's departments in hundreds of counties across the country and are usually provided free of charge.

Here's how they work. A computer automated phone system would call your mom at a designated time each day to check-in. If she answers, the system would assume everything is okay. But if she doesn't pick up, or if the call goes to voice mail after repeated tries, you (or her other designee) would get a notification call. If you are not reachable, calls are then made to backup people who've also agreed to check on your mom if necessary.

The fall back is if no one can be reached, the police or other emergency services personnel will be dispatched to her home.

To find out if this service is available in your mom's community, call her local police department's nonemergency number. If it's not offered, there are other organizations or companies you can turn to that provide similar services.

One that I love that's completely free to use is Mon Ani (monami.io, 650-267-2474), which offers a volunteer phone bank that provides phone or video calls daily, weekly or anything in between. The volunteer will connect with your mom, provide companionship and make sure everything is okay. And, they'll let you know if they detect a problem.

Monitoring Technology

Technology also offers a variety of new ways to help you keep an eye on your mom when you can't be there.

One nifty new option is the Electronic Caregiver's (electroniccaregiver.com) "Premier" product, which is a wearable wrist device that provides activity monitoring, a 24/7 emergency help button, medication reminders and a GPS locator so you can determine your mom's where $abouts\, wh en\, she's\, away\, from$

It's also linked to a family caregiver app to keep you and

other loved ones in the loop. The device is free with a monthly subscription that costs \$40 to \$60 a month, depending on the level of monitoring.

If your mom is primarily homebound, another option to consider is a sensor-monitoring system like Caregiver Smart Solutions (caregiversmartsolutions.com). This uses small sensors (not cameras) placed in key areas of your mom's home to track her activities - everything from whether she used the coffee pot to how much she's watching TV - and will let you know if something out of the ordinary is happening. For

instance, if she went to the bathroom and didn't leave, it could indicate a fall or other emergency.

You can also check up on her patterns anytime you want through the system's website or app. And for additional protection, it offers emergency call buttons that can be placed around the house. Caregiver Smart Solutions starts at \$99 for their activity sensors, plus a \$29 monthly service fee.





Nature photographer Maggie Berch found not one, but two walking sticks in her garage recently. This one (above) is eight inches long and could grow to thirteen inches. According to the National Wildlife Federation, walking sticks, or stick insects, are a group of highly camouflaged insects. They escape predation by blending into plant material. As their name suggests, they look just like sticks, and may even sway back and forth to more closely resemble a twig moving in the wind. Depending on the species, walking sticks can grow from 1 to 12 inches (2.5 to 30 centimeters) long, with females usually growing bigger than the males. Stick insects are the biggest insects in the world—one species measures over 20 inches (51 centimeters) long with its legs outstretched. All walking sticks are herbivores. They use their strong mandibles to consume leaves, the primary food in their diet. Walking sticks are found on every continent except Antarctica. They mostly live in temperate and tropical regions. - Plexiglas shields at service desks will remain in use. Staff should use book carts to block open desk entrances from patrons. Office doors between public and staff spaces will remain closed when not in use. Doors between lobby and main floor will be propped open to reduce touchpoints.
- Laminated signs will remain on the floor at service desks showing six-foot distances. Stack aisles will be one-way and tape arrows will be placed on the floor indicating direction.
- Only one checkout station will be used at Harrisville.

- rials by placing holds in BiblioCommons (the online catalog of materials) or calling on the phone. Each patron is limited to five DVDs and 25 books/magazines/audiobooks per transaction.

- Staff will be provided with masks and required to wear them at all times if medically tolerated.
- In addition to the cleaning by the cleaning company, staff will sanitize touch points within the building at least twice daily.

Community foundation awards over \$463,000 in scholarships

Guard room table

Everything has a name, but in the antiques world, many things have more than one name. This table was offered for sale as a "guard room table." That is a made-up name for a table that looks like it might have been used by guards for eating, drinking and gambling in a castle a few hundred years ago. It is a table in the Elizabethan style (1553-1603, named for Queen Elizabeth I). Tables from that era are made of wood, usually walnut or oak. They are large, about 30 by 83 inches, and heavy with thick, strong legs, often heavily carved. Today, they are usually used in a large paneled room in a men's club or hotel. Some of the tables, like this one, have iron trestles used for strength between the end pairs of legs. They sell for surprisingly low prices for furniture that looks like it was made at least 400 years ago. They list for \$800 to \$4,000, depending on condition and proportions. This table was estimated at \$700 to \$1,000.

Q. I have a figurine that looks exactly like the Hummel figurine of St. Jude, but it's white. I can only find ones that are colored. Do I have a fake or a real one?

A: Hummel figurines are based on drawings by Sister Maria Innocentia Hummel, a nun in Germany. The figurines were first produced in 1935 by



Look for unusual styles of furniture to get a bargain. The heavy, old timbers and craftsmanship of an antique is why it is still in good condition and can take hard use. This table is in the Elizabethan style, 400 years old, and still going strong.

W. Goebel Porcelain Factory of Oeslau (now Rodental), Germany. They were extremely popular after WWII, and hundreds of figurines were made and collected. They made other figurines, but only those that are the children drawn by Sister Maria can be called Hummels. There have been changes in company name and ownership,

but Hummel figurines are still being produced in Rodental, now by Hummel Manufaktur.

The Hummel figure of St. Jude has him holding a staff in one hand and a holy relic in the other. This is a common image that has been made by other manufacturers. If your figurine is real, it will have a Hummel mark on the bottom. If it's not marked, it's a fake. All Hummels are now very low priced, and religious figures are not popular. Your figure is probably Goebel but not Hummel. It is worth about \$50.
