## Alcona schools adopts budget, fund balance better than anticipated

Despite Alcona Community Schools' bleak budget outlook in June of 2020, the school managed to thrive, and this school year looks even better than ever.

Superintendent Dan O'Connor said the improvement was thanks to some state legislative and additional funding through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Funds, part of the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act congress signed into law last December.

"June of 2020 the state was amid a shutdown and projections were bleak for schools. We had to adopt a \$500,000 budget deficit and

expected to have a 2.4 percent fund balance at the end of the year because of the deductions of state aid they were talking about.

"Obviously, the year didn't go as the state expected because of the surplus revenue the state was able to receive, so those cuts never happened," O'Connor said.

He explained the budget improved from the two percent figure back to where the school is usually between 7.5 to 9.5 percent. The school district ended the 2020/2021 school year with an 8.24 percent fund balance and paid cash for a used school bus to compensate for two older buses phased out at the end of 2021.

"If you were to ask auditors, they would prefer a 15

percent fund balance for safety, but I would say only half the schools in the state have that. We are above where the state considers a warning, but we need to continue to trend towards a higher fund balance.

"All in all, from where we were last summer to where we are now, we feel stable," O'Connor said.

For the 2021/2022 year, the district has increased its budget from \$8.1 million to an \$8.39 million budget.

"That leaves us a deficit heading into the school year, but that was adopted in early June. We budgeted conservatively because the state hadn't made up their mind on a final state budget," O'Connor said.

Since then, the state agreed on a school aid budget raising the foundation allowance per student to \$600 for all school districts in the state, funding schools at the same level per student. Something O'Connor said hasn't happened since 1994.

"That was very welcome news and we can't thank the legislature and our governor enough for leveling the playing field in school aid funding and for getting it done by July 1, which helps us as we head into the summer trying to hire new employees and set up the school year the best we can for the students," O'Connor said.

He explained before this year some schools were funded at a higher level per pupil than base-level schools such as Alcona Community Schools.

According to O'Connor, the district expects a balanced budget at the end of the 2022 school year with no deficits - depending on enrollment and any unforeseen circumstances.

Another change for students and staff this fall is that they will not be required to wear masks. In a recent letter to parents, O'Connor said masks are not required for students or staff at this time regardless of vaccination status, but may choose to do so if they want to. The wearing of masks while on school buses has not been decided yet.

## School district improvements underway

Installation of new, energy efficient windows is just one project Alcona Community Schools is tackling this summer.

Removal of carpet in approximately six elementary classrooms and replacing it with polished concrete; adding sound fields in elementary classrooms; installing interactive classroom projectors throughout the district; replacing old student and staff technology devices; installing new lockers, including the elementary school; district key card replacement; new water filling stations; and continued ionization and air quality improvements are also on the improvement slate.

Alcona Community Schools Superintendent Dan O'Connor said the purple hue on windows people have been seeing while driving by is just insulation which is protecting the classroom from the outside elements until the windows, many of which were original when the school was built and have long outlived their function, can be installed.

"All the purple will be removed once the installation is complete," O'Connor said. He explained the projects are

being funded by a combination of funds including Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Funds and sinking fund millage.

According to O'Connor, the

district expects around \$3 million in ESSER funds, even though the district has only been allocated around \$400,000, so far.

"The state agreed to allocate the rest of the funding to

the schools about two weeks ago, but they haven't told us how to get the funds, what the application process will be, how it can be spent or

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# Golf gadgets that can help older golfers

Dear Savvy Senior,

Do you know of any golfing equipment that can help older golfers? My dad, who's 76, loves to play golf, but arthritis in his hands has made gripping the club challenging, and his fragile lower back makes stooping over to tee-up or retrieve the ball a problem too. Is there anything out there that can help?

Golfing Buddy

Dear Golfing,

There are actually a wide variety of adaptive golf equipment that can help older golfers who struggle with injuries, arthritis or loss of mobility. Here are several golfing products that may help with different needs.

## Gripping Solutions

Gripping a golf club is a very common problem for seniors with hand arthritis or those who have hand or elbow injuries. To help alleviate this problem there are specially designed golf gloves and grips that can make a big difference.

Two of my favorite gloves are the Bionic Golf Gloves (BionicGloves.com) that have extra padding in the palm and finger joints to improve grip. And the Power Glove (PowerGlove.com) that has a small strap attached to the glove that loops around the club grip to secure it in your hand. These run between \$20 and \$30.

Another option is to get oversized grips installed on your dad's clubs. These can make gripping the club easier and more comfortable and are also very good at absorbing shock. Oversized grips are usually either one-sixteenth-inch or one-eighth-inch larger in diameter than a standard grip, and cost around \$10 per grip. You can find these grips and have them installed at your local golf store or pro shop.

Or, for a grip-and-glove combination fix, check out Quantum Grip (QuantumGrip.com), which incorporates Velcro material recessed in the golf club grip and a companion golf glove that has mating Velcro material in the palm. Cost: \$25 per grip, and \$40 a glove.

## Upright Tools

For golfers with back, hip or knee problems, there are a number of different tools that can eliminate the repetitive bending and stooping that comes with playing golf. For example, for teeing up the ball without bending over, consider the Tee-Up Foldaway by Zero Bend Golf. This is a 34-inch long-handled tool that has a trigger-style handgrip and a jaw that holds the ball and tee for easy placement. It costs \$70 at ZeroBendGolf.com.

For other stoop-proof tee-up solutions, see the Tee Pal Pro (\$70, TeePalLLC.com) and Joe's Original Backtee (\$25, UprightGolf.com).

ZeroBendGolf.com and UprightGolf.com also offer ball pickup tools and magnetic ball marker products that cost under \$15.

Or, if you just want a great all-around golf picker-upper, consider the Graball GrabAll Jaw – sold through Amazon-

.com for \$10 for a package of two. It attaches to the handle end of your putter and chipper and is designed to pick up golf balls, flagsticks, putters and green side chippers.

## Reflective Golf Balls

If diminished vision makes locating the ball challenging, Chromax golf balls (Chromax-Golf.com) can help. These are reflective colored golf balls that make them appear larger and brighter. Cost: \$10 for a three-pack.

## Easy Carts

There are also ergonomically designed golf carts that can help older golfers tote their clubs around the course. If you like to walk, CaddyTek (CaddyTek.com) and Clicgear (Clicgearusa.com) has a vari-

ety of three and four-wheeled push/pull carts that are highly rated for function and foldability. Costs typically range between \$150 and \$300.

Or, for severe mobility loss, the SoloRider specialized electric golf cart (SoloRider.com) provides the ability to play from a seated or standing-but-supported position. Retailing for \$10,500, plus a \$600 shipping fee, this cart is lightweight and precisely balanced so it can be driven on tee boxes and greens without causing any damage. Federal ADA laws require that all public golf courses allow them.

The school is looking to fill 12 to 15 employee positions this year, which includes educators, staff, bus drivers, kitchen staff and custodians.

"We've added staff this summer to up services for our students. We are hoping the coming year will be a normal school year, unlike the choppy past few we've had. Supplying students with an additional level of support right now is important," O'Connor said.

The additional support, which will be funded by ESSER monies include a full time Title 1 interventionist

teacher and math coach for elementary students; a kindergarten through eighth-grade summer school jump start program for struggling students and those who wish to participate with transportation; expanding the science and physical education programs; investigating the reinstatement of a school success worker for the elementary level; additional math and reading interventionist through AmeriCorps; adding a third section of kindergarten to keep class size low; and the reinstatement of a dean of students.

O'Connor said with the addition of a new math curriculum this school year, which will be a hands-on project-based curriculum with high engagement for students, it is critical to have additional support staff. The school is seeking applicants for the AmeriCorp position, for more information, call Alcona Elementary Principal Tim Lee at (989) 736-8146.

The district is also looking into after school tutoring support during the school year and is investigating an evening bus run for students taking tutoring or involved in after school sports.

what the reimbursement process will look like. We expect more details to be released in the next two to three weeks," O'Connor said.

New window and some door replacements are the biggest of all projects planned with an estimated cost of \$700,000. A security film will also be added to the windows adding another \$90,000 to the cost. O'Connor explained the film allows windows to be even more energy-efficient, protects from anyone easily looking into classrooms and also aids in keeping the glass together should it break and shatter.

Removal of the elementary classroom carpet, which was installed around 1989 and has long outlived its functional lifespan, is an ongoing project in its third-year phase. The polished concrete is a better choice, according to O'Connor, because it holds fewer germs and dirt than the carpet and is easier to maintain. The cost of removing the carpet and polishing concrete floors is about \$2,400.

He explained sound fields, which will cost around \$33,000, for the elementary school are devices that act as microphones tied into the sound system, something first installed at the school in the 90s.

"Technology has improved a lot since then and we only had a few left working. The teacher will be able to wear a pin on their collar and students throughout the classroom will be able to hear them better through amplified sound. A positive thing for our little students," O'Connor said.

Currently only a third of the district's classrooms have interactive smartboard projectors, where students can go up to the board and interact with what is on the screen. The district is planning on spending \$37,000 from ESSER funds to install the projectors in every classroom district-wide.

They also plan to replace all student and staff Chromebook devices, which are out of date, at a cost of approximately \$70,000 using ESSER funds.

"Last year, we reused and deployed every Chromebook we possibly had to allow students to distance learn. We had a lot of Chromebooks that were near the end of their life, but we nursed them through knowing we would have to invest in new. The ESSER funds will help us do that," O'Connor said.

New, greatly needed lockers will be installed in the elementary school, something the younger students have never had and had to use coat racks which left a mess of coats, backpacks and boots lining the hall. The lack of lockers not only made the hallway look unsightly but was also a slip and fall concern.

Some original school lockers in the high school and middle school will also be replaced. The total cost of all new lockers, allowing every student to have their own, will be about \$50,000 in ESSER funds.

Approximately \$40,000 will be spent from ESSER funds to increase key card access into the school. "Right now, we only have three access points for key-card entry into

the building. This will add access points and update the software, which is about 20 years old. This will also assist in spreading students out, not being clustered together through one access point. We still want to maximize distancing as much as we can," O'Connor said.

He said the district has been slowly picking away at putting water filling stations throughout the district. "COVID-19 or not, it's not healthy to put your mouth on a drinking fountain. Refilling a bottle is green and reduces waste," O'Connor said.

The district will continue making air quality improvements using ionization, something it thought about and started doing before the pandemic hit. O'Connor said about \$125,000 of ESSER funds will be used toward air quality improvement, making the entire district ionized.

Future projects the district is pursuing include community access to the school's forest trail, something it hopes to have a ribbon-cutting ceremony for in August.

The district is also planning elementary playground improvements. According to O'Connor, the elementary school playground equipment hasn't been touched for 20 years except for removal of some outdated and unsafe equipment. It is hopeful that work will be started on two playground areas, one for preschool through second-grade students and another for third through fifth-grade students yet this summer.

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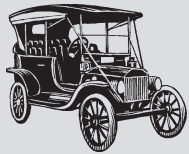
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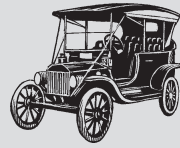

### Percy Clemens badly hurt in a peculiar accident

**July 14, 1921** ~ Percy Clemens was painfully hurt and had a very narrow escape Monday from a terrible death, when his Ford tractor reared up and fell over backward, pinning the driver underneath.

Percy and his father, James Clemens, were plowing a field on W. L. Chapelle's land, Mr. Clemens using horses. The tractor "buried" itself in a soft spot of ground and Percy put some poles under the wheels, unhooked from the plows and started up. In some way the wheels became locked and the machine reared straight up and toppled over backward.

When Mr. Clemens reached the scene from across the field he found his son pinned underneath the tractor and the machine gradually settling down further. The hot oil from the base was pouring on the young man's face and it looked as if he was doomed. Mr. Clemens called for help and in the meantime placed a board to keep the oil away from Percy's face and also put, chunks of wood to keep the tractor from settling down any further.

It was some time before men arrived from the road job and the gravel pits and lifted the tractor off the imprisoned man.

At the hospital it was found that the small bone of one arm was broken and there were painful bruises on various parts of his body. Percy was taken home the same evening, but is suffering much pain and it will be many days before he is himself again.

### Safe stolen from Noyes' gas station Sunday night

**July 11, 1946** ~ The Noyes' Shell Service Station on US-23 in Harrisville, was entered early Sunday evening, and the thieves walked away with a small safe. Entrance was made through a small window in the rest room.

Several cartons of cigarettes were removed from a file cabinet. The culprits overlooked a small amount of cash. Daniel Noyes, manager of the station, stated that no money was in the safe, but it contained valuable papers and account books.

Mr. Noyes feels that these would be of no value to anyone, and states that he would be willing to forget the other stolen articles for their return.

Sheriff Adair and the Alpena State Police are investigating the burglary.

**July 11, 1946** ~ A record crowd of county residents, home-comers, and visitors gathered at Lincoln July 4th to observe the first post-war Independence Day.

One of the best parades ever staged in the county in recent years formed at 9:30 a.m. Judges were Dr. T. R. It portrayed the historic raising of the American Flag on the rocky hill on Iwo Jima. Second honor went to the Smith Funeral Home. Their float was a beautiful creation of red and white crepe paper with "Liberty" dressed in flowing robes, carrying the torch. Third prize was awarded to Laverne Medore. This float represented a model kitchen. Honorable mention was given to the South Shore, Hubbard Lake, Mrs. W. LeCuyer, The American Legion, The American Legion Auxiliary and the Alcona V. F. W. Post.

- On July 18, 1940, Franklin Roosevelt, who first took office in 1933 as America's 32nd president, is nominated for an unprecedented third term. He would eventually be elected to a record four terms.
- On July 12, 1979, disco music died at Chicago's Comiskey Park when a "Disco Demolition" night is held. Organizers grossly underestimated the number of fans who would want to blow up their disco records: a sellout crowd inside the stadium and 40,000 outside who stormed the field and lit bonfires on the diamond.

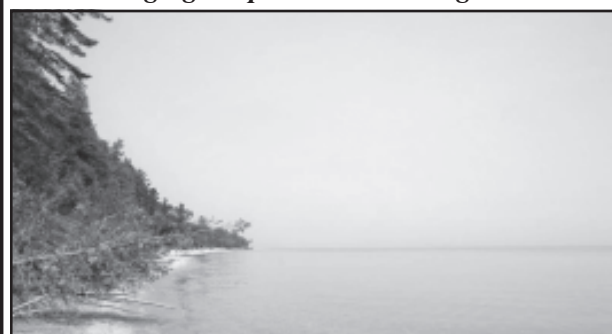
