American Rescue Plan leaves local officials speculating about funds By Mary Weber the U.S. House Committee on be expended by December 31,

Local government officials for Alcona County, the City of Harrisville, Alcona Community Schools and on township boards are taking a wait-andsee approach to the funds they may acquire through the American Rescue Plan Act that the U.S. Congress and President Biden signed on March 11.

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARP act) was constructed to speed the United States' recovery from the economic and health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and ongoing recession. According to the National Association of Counties, Alcona County could receive up to \$2,017,986. A staggering amount considering it is more than half of the county's 2021 general fund budget.

On top of what the county could receive, each township and the City of Harrisville will also be receiving sizeable sums of money according to

Oversight and Reform. Villages were not included in the APR act, but funding will be given to the village population's respective township.

Funding is also available through the act to kindergarten through grade 12 public schools and will prioritize schools with high percentages of students from low-income families such as Alcona Community Schools. The aid is intended to ease the financial burden on the state, which funds the bulk of K-12 education and local districts, which may have incurred additional expenses to implement safety measures at schools.

In all, Alcona County, the City of Harrisville, townships and the school district may see an influx totaling more than \$5 million.

"That's a huge amount of money," said commissioner Terry Small said during the March 17 Alcona County Board of Commission meeting. Commissioner Carolyn Brummund cautioned the board on the strings funding like that will have.

Brummund referred to the COVID-19 grant funds received by the county last year, explaining that many applications they pursued to use the grant monies were turned down by the grant manager because they were not COVID-19 related under the guidelines to qualify.

Commission Chairperson Adam Brege said he read the ARP funds might be used by the county for Internet infrastructure, something the Alcona County Economic Development Committee (EDC) has been working on, but said it was just too soon to discuss

"Before we can start conversations on who needs the money, we first have to identify what we can spend the money on," Brege said.

According to the Center for Community Progress (CCP), townships and cities with populations below 50,000 would see funds allocated proportionately to the population. The funds will be limited to 75 percent of the locality's most recent annual budget as of January 27, 2020, and the ARP funds must

2024. The CCP is a national, nonprofit resource for urban, suburban, and rural communities seeking to address the full cycle of property revitalization, townships and cit-

Speculation is that funds will be released in two equal amounts with the first half coming by May 10. The second half would be released 12 months later.

According to the U.S. Department of the Treasury American Rescue Plan fact sheet, the rescue plan will enable state, local and tribal governments to continue supporting public health response and lay the foundation for a strong and equitable economic recovery.

In addition to helping governments address revenue losses they experienced as a result of the pandemic, it will help cover costs incurred while responding to the public health emergency and provide recovery support -- including assistance to households, small business and nonprofits, aid to impacted industries and support for essential workers. It will also provide resources for governments to invest in infrastructure, including water, sewer and broadband services.

Alcona Township Supervisor Marlena MacNeill saw an article in the Bridge Michigan Newspaper stating what each Alcona County township is expected to get, but doesn't know how the township will get the money or how they are supposed to spend it. The news article she referred to was written on March 15 which stated Alcona Township could receive nearly \$90,000 in ARP fund-

"I haven't heard anything (official) on it or what we are supposed to do with it, I just heard about it this past week. Nobody expects to get a free handout without there being some catch," MacNeill said.

Alcona Community School is speculating \$2,133,051 from ARP funds, but superintendent Dan O'Connor said the funds are still tied up in a legislative battle.

"We have not received con-

Alcona student athletes will be tested weekly for COVID-19

Alcona Community Schools will begin testing its athletes for COVID-19 beginning Monday, April 5.

The mandate to test Michigan students age 13 and up who participate in school sports was officially announced on March 19 by Gov. Gretchen Whitmer and state health officials. Testing will begin statewide on April 2 however, Alcona schools will not begin testing until students return from spring

According to Chad Cole, school district athletic director, students participating in sports will be tested once a week at the school by either the District Health Department No. 2 (DHD2) or a qualified third party using minimally invasive rapid antigen tests. The testing will be done free of charge.

Cole said the Michigan High School Athletic Association initially thought athletes would have to get tested every day before playing sports but has changed that to testing once a week.

'It will affect about 150 athletes at the school and is mandatory to participate in sporting activity at the school. There is no opting out. If the student or their parent decides they don't want to be tested, then they will not be allowed to practice or be a part of the team. Testing is a must to be able to participate," Cole said.

If an athlete tests positive for COVID-19, it will be up to DHD2 to administer contact tracing to determine how the school and team should proceed. Cole explained whether just the student is quarantined or the entire team will be determined by the health department who has guidelines in place. "We will follow the health department's directives. Circumstances will vary with every positive case,"

According to Cole, athletes have been informed and there have been many questions from both students and parents. "They want to know if they get tested will the masking policies still be in place as we proceed. The school will still take every precaution necessary to keep students safe and masks will be worn until we are directed it is safe

"The community has varying degrees of acceptance (of COVID-19 protocols) and is probably less receptive to testing, but everyone understands we want to keep the kids safe. We have had a lot of positive engagement from the families wanting to do the right thing and participate in the programs. We are doing everything we can to give the kids a chance to play," he

Cole was unsure at what time of day the athletes will

Gerald C. Gibbs Sr.


Gerald C. Gibbs Sr., 73, of Lincoln, died on Friday, March 19, 2021 at home.

Cremation arrangements were made through Gillies Funeral Home, Lincoln. Memorial services will be private.



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Keeping your balance as you age

Dear Savvy Senior,

What can you tell me about balance exercises? I've fallen a few times over the past year and have read that balance exercises can help me regain my steadiness, but I'm not exactly sure what to do.

Unsteady at 70

Dear Unsteady,

Most people don't think much about practicing their balance, but they need to. As we age, our balance declines if it isn't practiced, which can lead to falls that often result in a broken bone.

Every year more than one in four people age 65 and older fall, and the risk increases with age. Here's what you should know about balance problems, along with some different exercises that can help you improve it.

Aging Affects Balance

Balance is something most people take for granted until it's challenged by a medical condition, medication or advanced age, which dulls our balance senses and causes most seniors to gradually become less stable on their feet over time.

Poor balance can also lead to a vicious cycle of inactivity. You feel a little unsteady, so you curtail certain activities. If you're inactive, you're not challenging your balance systems or using your muscles. As a result, both balance and strength suffer. Simple acts like strolling through a grocery store or getting up from a chair become trickier. That shakes your confidence, so you become even less active.

Balance Exercises

If you have a balance problem that is not tied to illness, medication or some other specific cause, simple exercises can help preserve and improve your balance. Here are four exercises you can do that will help:

• One-legged stands: Stand on one foot for 30 seconds, or longer, then switch to the other foot. In the beginning, you might want to have a wall or chair to hold on to. Or, for an extra challenge try closing your eyes, or standing on a throw pillow or Bosu ball (an inflated rubber disc on a stable platform).

• Heel-to-toe walking: Take 20 steps while looking straight

ahead. Think of a sobriety

• Standing up: Without using your hands, get up from a straight-backed chair and sit back down 10 to 20 times. This improves balance and leg strength.

• Tai chi: Research has shown that the Asian practice of tai chi – which uses a combination of slow, graceful movements, meditation and deep breathing – can help reduce the risk of falls.

For more information on different balance exercises you can do at home, there are a variety of balance and strength exercises and beginner Tai Chi DVDs you can purchase at Amazon.com or through Amazon Prime video.

There are also senior fitness programs, like Silver-Sneakers (silversneakers.com) and Silver&Fit (silver-

andfit.com), that offer online classes that can guide you through a series of exercises you can do at home during the pandemic.

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See a Doctor

I do, however, want to emphasize that if you've already fallen, are noticeably dizzy or unsteady, or have a medical condition affecting your balance, you need to see a doctor. They might refer you to a physical therapist or to an appropriate balance-training class in your community. It's also important to know that many medicines and medical conditions—from Parkinson's disease to diabetes to innerear disorders—can affect balance

HDH2 COVID-19 vaccine update

Registration for residents eligible for the COVID-19 vaccination administered by District Health Department No. 2 (DHD2) include individuals 50 and older as well as individuals 16 and older who have disabilities and/or medical conditions, as well as their caregiver family members and guardians.

Beginning April 5 anyone 16 and older is eligible to receive a vaccination.

A total of 6,778 first doses have been administered by DHD2, with 4,529 second doses being administered. Additionally, DHD2 has distributed 5,788 doses to community partners.

As DHD2 continues to move forward with the vaccination process, additional clinics are being planned as vaccine becomes available. District Health Department No. 2 (DHD2), serving Alcona, Iosco, Ogemaw and Oscoda counties.

To pre-register for an upcoming clinic, visit the DHD2 website at www.dhd2.org and click on the red banner, and complete the form in its entirety. Once the form is complete and submitted, a "Thank You" message will be sent. Note: Completing the form is a pre-registration and is not registration for a clinic. DHD2 will reach out when an appointment date and time become available. It is important for anyone who pre-registers to check their e-mail that was utilized on their preregistration form. DHD2 now has the capability to send a link for individuals to schedule their appointment.

For some clinics, phone calls are still being made for scheduling and DHD2 is encouraging residents to answer their phones. For those who are elderly and cannot preregister online, call the Region 9 Area Agency on Aging for assistance at (989) 358-4899. Note: these services are for those 65 and up and this is only to pre-register, not schedule an appointment.

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
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Defense leads the way for Lady Tigers in district title win over W-P

Did district week play out how the Alcona girls basketball team had envisioned? Not exactly.

Will they take the 49-23 victory over Whittemore-Prescott in last Friday's division three district championship game at Tawas? Absolutely.

"We talked to the girls about it all week, you can't control the situation you're put in," said head coach Mark Feldhiser of the team's first district title since 2018. "Our goal at the beginning of this year was to win a district championship and we knew that one way or another, we would be playing for the district championship and the way it shook out is the way it shook out. You can't always control those things. We were fortunate enough to keep playing and keep winning and it went our way. We came down here and played some pretty good defense and won with a shorthanded team, so I think that's credit to us."

While Oscoda was the heavy tournament favorite coming in, the Lady Owls were forced to withdraw from the post-season due to COVID-19 complications on the team just days before the post-season started. The Lady Tigers, missing two key players, were glad to take the role of district favorites. After topping Tawas by double figures earlier in the week, they capped things off with Friday's win over the Lady Cardinals, where the Alcona defense caused havoc the entire con-

"When we could get our press working with our regulars in there, obviously some of our reserves haven't been on the team real long so they don't have the experience with that," Feldhiser said. "But yeah, the press worked really well and our ball pressure was good. Our defense was fantastic."

A pair of early baskets by Kelsey Hansen and a transition hoop by Lily Bilbey got

the Lady Tigers off on the right foot with a 6-0 lead. A second chance basket by Karen Sharboneau near the end of the frame increased that gap to 11-4 after the first quarter.

Hansen scored the first six points of the second quarter to push things to 17-4, though W-P pulled within 19-11 at the half

"Bilbey really stepped up when we needed her to. She played really hard the whole game," Feldhiser said. "Hansen got her offense going when we needed that as well. With Rachel Layton and Liz Henderson out, Kelsey knew she had to pick it up and she did exactly that."

The Lady Cardinals pulled within 21-14 early in the third, but Alcona closed the quarter on a 17-2 run to take control of things, with a 38-17 lead. The Lady Tigers

capped the run with a threepointer by Sharboneau and field goals by Carmen Dellar and Caroline Forsythe.

W-P was unable to make a serious run at the Alcona lead, as it played its way to the championship.

"Even though (Bilbey and Hansen) led us, we had really good balance again," Feldhiser said. "That has been the story for when we are successful this year and we had that again this game. We are tough to stop when we aren't one dimensional."

With Henderson and Layton unable to play due to injuries, Feldhiser also took note of other players that stepped up.

"Our bench players, they really came in and contributed," he said. "We didn't have much of a drop off when our four players came in off the bench. We made our minds

up before this game started that we were going to play more people because we got a little winded the other night. We went with a rotation and all four players stepped up and played really well."

Hansen led all scorers with 15 points. Bilbey added 10 points. Sharboneau finished with seven points. Anna Loyer netted five and Ashlyn Gordy put in four points. Forsythe had three points and Dellar and Emma Travis had two points apiece. Chipping in with one point was Sage Gauthier

The Lady Tigers reached the finals, thanks to a 45-33 win over tournament host Tawas on Wednesday, March 24.

"The four three-pointers from Anna were really key for us, we were struggling to get our offense going," Feldhiser said. "Had no practice and had to play with different rotations. Also, the rebounding of Lily and Kelsey helped tremendously."

Two of Loyer's threes came in the opening quarter, as Alcona took a 17-6 lead after one. The Lady Braves never quite went away though, as the lead was 25-15 at the half and 38-23 entering the fourth.

Loyer finished with 16 points. Hansen netted 10. Sharboneau put in seven. Bilbey finished with six points and 18 rebounds. Rachel Layton had four and Gauthier added two.

Alcona (12-4 overall) played at St. Ignace, Mich. on Monday, March 29 in the regional semi-finals. The regional final was played on Wednesday in Sault Ste Marie, Mich. with the regional winner advancing to quarterfinals on Monday, April 5 in Houghton Lake, Mich.

School district receives \$10,000 grant

Alcona Community Schools was one of 44 schools in Michigan to receive a grant to educate students interested in exploring the teaching profession as a career.

The \$10,000 grant award from the Michigan Department of Education (MDE) is intended to help students actively participate in the Future Proud Michigan Explore Program, a continuation of Michigan's efforts to grow and diversify the education workforce. The Explore program is a companion to existing career and technical education of high school students.

"The grant will allow teachers to develop and refine the curriculum and create a plan on how to execute the program for ninth through 12th graders to begin teaching experiences," said Alcona Community Schools Superintendent Dan O'Connor.

Danielle Jirasek, first grade teacher at Alcona Elementary helped to write the grant because she was in a similar program when she was in high school and found it interesting and beneficial in choosing her career path.

"The program had a huge impact on me. I knew I wanted to be a teacher, but not exactly what age group or subiect I would like to teach. I considered secondary foreign language, elementary, preschool and Montessori education.


"Because of the program I was in, I had an opportunity to do a placement in many of the options I was considering. Ultimately, I decided on elementary and early childhood education," Jirasek said.

She explained the program changed her teaching route and gave her hands-on experience in classrooms before attending college.

According to O'Connor, if all goes well, the school will have the program up and running next September for the 2021/2022 school year.





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



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
