A unique event to celebrate a Christian Halloween and help needy children in developing countries with a memorable Christmas gift will take place Sunday, Oct. 31 from 12:30 to 3 p.m. at St. Anne parish's Maria Hall in Harrisville.

The Boxes of Joy Spooktacular is open to the public and will include lunch, games, children's crafts, trunk or treat, a pumpkin story and an All-Saints Daythemed costume contest for \$5 per person.

The event is an opportunity for the local parishes of the Resurrection of the Lord which includes St. Anne, St. Catherine, St. Gabriel and St. Raphael Catholic churches to come together with the community to fill shoe boxes with necessary and fun items for poverty-stricken children who do not typically get anything for Christmas.

Jaci Fitzgerald, program coordinator for the event, explained this is the second year the four parishes have combined to participate in Boxes of Joy, which is part of the international relief and development ministry of Cross Catholic Outreach.

MSP arrest barricaded gunman

A call that began as an alleged domestic disturbance turned into a barricaded gunman standoff last Thursday.

According to the Michigan State Police, on October 21 at approximately 4 p.m., troopers from the Alpena post dispatched to a possible domestic assault at an address on US-23 in Ossineke. The first call came from a man at the residence and, later, a woman called. The man called to say his wife was intoxicated, on drugs and that she had been abusive in the past. When the woman called, she said her husband had choked and pointed a gun at her. She was being held hostage.

Troopers set up a perimeter and attempted to talk to the husband, who refused to come out. The state police Emergency Support Team (EST) was activated.

Negotiators talked to the husband while the wife was upstairs communicating with 911 dispatchers. The husband, Mark Dwayne Deckard, 53, eventually surrendered and was placed under arrest. His wife was transported to MidMichigan Medical Center where she was treated and released for non-life-threat-

and biodiversity.

Luce tries to implement a research-based learning environment and students have sampled and analyzed soil around school grounds and determined its significance for natural resource use.

"Currently, we are working on a multi-week project in which we used the quadrat sampling technique to determine the frequency of living organisms on school property trails. We have also created a biota library in which students identify local plant and animal life from which we will draw some conclusions about the ecosystem and biodiversity close to home. So far, everyone likes the project-based scientific experiences they are making in my class, and I am hoping I can uphold this curiosity throughout the year," she said.

Benjamin Erickson is the high school's new English teacher who is also teaching elective classes such as drama and the new mythology/science fiction/fantasy and pop vulture classes.

"The two classes together are part of our alternate English credit path, so we offer one each semester. For this year, it's pop culture in the fall and myth in the spring.

"In pop culture literacy and analytics, which the students and I all use 'Nerd Culture' as the name, is pretty interchangeable. We just finished breaking down some aspects of the British science fiction show, "Doctor Who" and are writing responses based on the multiple facets of the show. We are also starting a section on Dungeons and Dragons, using the popular alignment charts to understand motivations for pop culture characters," Erickson said.

He explained during the course students will be studying comic books and other TV shows such as "Star Trek." He feels a student can learn just as much from a Justice League comic book as they can from Shakespeare if analyzed properly. "They both have the same ideas and themes; they are just written with a different mindset for a different type of person. I'm looking forward to seeing where that goes from here,' Erickson said.

The mythology/science fiction/fantasy class scheduled for next semester will first go through multiple cultures' mythology and lore, according to Erickson, and then analyze several different science fiction short stories, along with multiple opportunities for students to write their own. The class will finish by studying a famous, short fantasy book and will look at several tropes and major ideas presented in fantasy literature, while students work on a foundational writing piece based on either of the three genres.

Thomas said she was excited to be able to offer new courses to students. "We hope that by providing a wider variety of subjects students will have an opportunity to explore future career options and be more engaged in school."

Simple and inexpensive final farewells

Dear Savvy Senior,

My husband and I are looking for the simplest and least expensive way to dispose of our bodies when we die. We hate the idea of wasting a lot of money on high-priced funerals and would like some advice on some simple and cheap send-offs.

Simple Seniors

Dear Simple,

With the average cost of a full-service funeral running around \$11,000 today, many people are seeking simple ways to make their final farewell more affordable. Depending on how you want to go, here are several low-cost options to consider.

Direct Cremation


If you and your husband are interested in cremation, a direct cremation is the simplest and least expensive way to go. It includes picking up the body, completing and filing the necessary paperwork, the cremation itself and returning the cremated remains to the family. There's no embalming, formal viewing or casket. A simple cardboard box called an "alternative container" is used to hold the body.

Depending on where you live and the funeral home you choose, the average cost for a direct cremation runs between \$1,000 and \$3,000. If you want additional services beyond what a direct cremation offers, ask the funeral home for an itemized price list that covers the other services cost, so you know exactly what you're getting. All providers are required by law to provide this.

To locate nearby funeral homes, look in your local yellow pages, or Google "cremation" or "funeral" followed by your city and state. You can also get good information online at Parting.com, which lets you compare prices from funeral providers in your area based on what you want.

Immediate or Direct Burial

If you're interested in being buried, an immediate/ direct burial is the most basic and low-cost option. With an immediate burial, your body would be buried in a simple container shortly after death, skipping the embalming, viewing and use of the fu-

Anatomical Donation

If you'd like to eliminate your cremation/burial costs all together, as well as help advance medical research, you and your husband should consider donating your bodies to science. This option won't cost you a cent, however, some programs may charge a small fee to transport your body to their facility.

After using your body for

medical research projects, anatomy lessons and surgical practice, your remains will be cremated and your ashes will be buried or scattered in a local cemetery or returned to your family, usually within a year.

To locate accredited university medical school body donation programs in your state, see the University of Florida's U.S. program directory at Anatbd.acb.med.ufl.edu/usprograms, or call the whole-body donation referral service during business hours at (800) 727-0700.

neral facilities.

If your family wants a memorial service, they can have it at the graveside, at your place of worship or at home without the body.

These services usually cost between \$1,800 and \$3,500, not counting cemetery charges, which can run you an additional \$1,000 to \$3,000. All funeral homes offer direct burial.

Green Burial

An eco-friendly green burial is another affordable way to go that costs anywhere from \$1,000 to \$4,000 depending on the provider. With a green cemetery burial, the body is buried in a biodegradable coffin or just wrapped in a shroud, without embalming chemicals or a burial vault.



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Convict breaks out Alcona County Jail

Chas. Easterling was being held for Jackson Prison authorities

October 27, 1921 ~ Cutting his way through the thin plaster ceiling over the upper story cells at the county jail, and letting himself down into the hall from the attic by means of a rope made from his bedding, Chas. Easterling, paroled convict being held for the Jackson prison authorities-walked out of the door and is a free man.

Acting on a wire from the Jackson state prison, Undersheriff Charles Conklin and Deputies Jos. Sovey and Frank Walker went to the Lemon farm in Haynes one night last week and arrested Easterling, Sheriff Freer being away from home.

Easterling was sent up for fifteen years for theft some years ago from Onaway, by Judge Frank Emerick of the Alpena circuit, and had been paroled upon condition that he remain out of Michigan until the time of his sentence had expired. Easterling had been at the Lemon farm for some time before someone reported him.

Easterling used a case knife served with his food to cut the hole in the ceiling and remained in jail but one night before making his escape.

While the prisoner's bed was in the steel cage, there are no locks provided for any of the cages and he had free access to the corridor. It required but little effort to affect his escape.

The Jackson officials show but lukewarm interest in Easterling, and if he gets out of the state it is probable that no effort will be made to recapture him. Mail carrier killed, three children injured Sunday Morning Tragedy at Ossineke

Railroad Crossing.

October 27, 1921 ~ Ira Blair, 38, rural mail carrier out of Ossineke, was instantly killed and his three children, a boy and two girls, seriously hurt, when a D. & M. freight train struck their automobile at the main crossing in Ossineke at 10:00 Sunday morning.

All were riding in the front seat of the automobile, which was closed in by curtains, the father driving.

Blair was thrown beneath the train and his body was badly mangled. All of the children were seriously though not fatally hurt.

The train was an extra freight. It is said that it was moving at the customary rate of speed and that the regular warning signals were given.

It is thought that the occupants of the auto did not hear or see the train owing to being closed in and to the further fact that some empty boxes in the rear part of the car were rattling noisily.

Heterans Host By Greddy Groves

Punishment doesn't fit the crime

One year ago, a federal grand jury indicted a Virginia woman for a whole raft of scams and fraud against veterans. Most disheartening is the fact that she was a former veteran.

There was a long laundry list (nine counts) of things she did. She had veterans apply for HISA grants (Home Improvements and Structural Alterations), which are for doing work on their homes and making improvements. Not only did she not complete the work, she pocketed the money.

Then she managed to have the income and retirement benefits of a veteran diverted into her own account. She took out loans in the elderly

money going into her pocket, and used the veteran's credit and debit cards.

But she didn't stop there. In another scheme, she linked veterans with landlords, but kept the money they paid for security deposits and rent.

The legal names for these are wire fraud and aggravated identity theft and involved 27 victims.

While a Department of Justice press release stated that "elder abuse and financial fraud targeted at seniors is a key priority," nowhere in the sentencing does it call out the specific punishment for that. They carefully listed the types of elder abuse (physical abuse, financial fraud, scams and exploitation, caregiver neglect and abandonment, psycho-

veteran's name, with the logical abuse and sexual abuse), but don't seem to have made it specifically part of this case.

> At the time of the indictment, this miserable excuse for a human faced a possible 20 years in prison, plus two years after pleading guilty to one count of wire fraud and one count of aggravated identity theft. In the recent sentencing, she got a mere 9.5 years.

> Why is that? Why do the powers-that-be think it's OK to give much shorter prison sentences to these people? Where is the deterrent in talking about the "serious nature of these fraud schemes" when you don't follow it up with serious jail time?
