ACCOA board approves upgrades to senior center

With funding to begin building a new senior/community center on hold indefinitely, the Alcona County Commission on Aging (ACCOA) realized it may be in the current location for another eight to 10 years, prompting the need to take steps to keep up on the building's maintenance.

ACCOA Director Lenny Avery explained governmental funding delays have put the new building project on hold. "It was never going to be a quick project. When working with the government there is a lot of hurry up and wait," Avery said.

He explained to the ACCOA board during the first meeting of the year that maintenance on the current building, which was built in 1945, needed to continue in the meantime. "Just because we don't want to invest in this building is not a good enough excuse not to do anything," Avery said.

Topics of discussion included purchasing a generator, which the ACCOA does not have, creating a handicap accessible second floor, fixing a septic line, installing new shelving in the food pantry and remodeling a supply place for janitorial equipment.

He told the board that the ACCOA was recently approached by community partners to consider becoming a warming site in the community. That, coupled with extended power outages this winter in the Lincoln area, prompted him to get two quotes on a GenerX generator.

"We were very lucky not to have our power knocked out when a lot of others lost theirs in Lincoln," Avery said.

He explained both generators would run on gas and operate immediately should there be a loss of power. They would also have the capability to be moved to the new building when it is finished.

He presented a quote for \$16,000 for a 22-watt generator which would be enough to power the freezers and refrigeration units in the building, but that would be its limit. The other quote was for \$30,000 for a 44-watt commercial-grade generator which would operate the en-

tire building in a power loss.

"The 44-watt would allow us to become a warming center and conduct business as usual. In either case, we need something. If our power went out, we have a lot of food in our refrigerators and freezers that would be wasted. As it is, it may still take nine months or more to get the generator due to a supply shortage. Doing nothing is not an option," Avery said.

The board felt it would be shortsighted to go with the smaller generator and voted unanimously to purchase the 44-watt for \$30,000. It also agreed to consider becoming a warming station once the generator is installed.

The discussion on a chair lift purchase to move handicapped patrons from the back entrance (ground level) up four steps to the second-floor gymnasium level was a bit more detailed.

Avery explained he had sought many options to make the building accessible including an elevator which would cost about \$150,000, a ramp, which would encompass most of the back parking lot and cost upwards of \$75,000 and chair lifts.

He told the board the only option he thought feasible would be to install the chair lift at the back entrance because it would not be safe to have a lift from the first floor, front entrance to the second due to limited head clearance.

"If a handicapped person wants to utilize the second level and then the first level, they will have to exit the building and wheel to the first-floor entrance. It's not ideal, but it's something," Avery said.

Avery had two lift chair quotes to offer the board, one was for \$28,000 for a deluxe lift, the other was for \$7,500 for a lift similar to the ones they use to assist handicapped patrons onto the bus.

He explained before a chair lift could be put in, a 220 line/40-amp electrical circuit would need to be installed to operate it for \$1,554.

The board asked Avery if a building permit would be necessary for the lesser expensive lift and what the consequences would be for the upgrade since the building was grandfathered under outdated codes. Avery said he

would investigate the matter further.

He explained there was a freezing issue with a septic line which has caused backups in the restrooms. Staff members are currently try-

ing to keep the line open by running hot water into the plumbing and calling in a septic company. He said a better solution would be to repair the problem at a cost between \$5,000 and \$7,500.

The board approved the repair.

The ACCOA recently secured an \$8,500 grant through the Food Bank of

New senior housing and community center on hold, funding search ongoing

Although the Alcona County Commission on Aging (ACCOA) purchased land for a new building, it doesn't look like any construction will begin soon due to governmental delays in getting funding.

The land, 13.69 acres just south of the Dollar General in Lincoln was purchased in June 2021 for \$40,000. The land purchase was needed so the ACCOA board could go after grants, and federal and state money to build an estimated \$5.5 million facility.

The facility, which would include a 45-unit housing structure and a senior/community center with additional business offices, is still the plan according to ACCOA Director Lenny Avery.

He explained the project

was never expected to be built overnight. "Realistically, it may take eight to 10 years to get this built, mostly because of the political climate and waiting for funds to be released," Avery said.

According to Avery, the project will first need to go through a preliminary period, which generally takes six months to a year.

"They (the governmental funders) will do research, look at surveys and assessments to see if the project is feasible. Then it goes to the next round which determines funding. That takes additional time.

"A perfect project would take 18 months at a minimum, but things have been delayed. A lot of the monies we expected to be disbursed under the first round of the Biden stimulus plan have not been given. Our state has yet

to approve one of our governor's budgets. A lot of the money that should have been allocated under COVID relief is still being held up," Avery said.

He explained, once the funds are allocated, guidelines for the funds will be posted. The ACCOA can then put in a request for its preliminary review.

In the interim, Avery has met with representatives from Senator Gary Peters and Governor Gretchen Whitmer's offices and other legislative and grant funding entities.

"I will continue to advocate for our project, but it's going to take a while. It could take until 2024 or 2025 to fund it.

"We are doing something that has never been done in Alcona County. We are convincing federal and state governments to invest in our county," Avery said.

Backyard Bird Count

Between Friday, Feb. 18, and Monday, Feb. 21, citizens all over the world will have the opportunity to submit their area bird observations online to birdcount.org. This citizen science project affords researchers a global glimpse of bird locations and individual species numbers just prior to the massive spring migrations throughout the world.

Many of Michigan's summer resident avians, such as purple martins, hummingbirds and orioles begin their long flights back from wintering tropical regions to North America in early March. For some, it is a long month or two journey to local breeding grounds.

Participants are asked to watch at backyard feeders,

around neighborhoods, in forest areas, and along river corridors and then record both the various species and the highest numbers of each observed. Participants may count one or all four days for at least 15 minutes each day. The results for each new day are then submitted online to birdcount.org.

Restoration of federal gray wolf protections suspends two state laws

An order on February 10 from a federal court in California returns gray wolves, including those in Michigan, to the federal list of endangered species.

The ruling means that two state laws governing the ability to kill wolves preying on livestock, pets and hunting dogs have been immediately suspended.

The ruling from U.S. District Judge Jeffrey S. White in the Northern District of California vacated a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service order from November 3, 2020, which removed gray wolves from the List of Endangered and Threatened Wildlife in the lower 48 states, beginning January 4, 2021. That original U.S. Fish and Wild-

completion of that process expected later this year."

The now-suspended state laws are Public Act 318 of 2008, which allows hunting dog owners to remove, capture or use lethal means to destroy a wolf in the act of preying on the owner's dog, and Public Act 290 of 2008, which offers the same provisions to livestock owners.

Wolves in Michigan are classified as a protected game species. It remains illegal to kill a wolf, except in defense of human life. Livestock owners will continue to be compensated for wolf depredation losses. Hunting of wolves while they are on the endangered species list is not permitted.

The DNR had supported

The DNR had said that before a wolf hunt should be considered, several things should take place, including updating the Michigan Wolf Management Plan, consulting with Native American tribes and that the legal status of wolves should be more permanently settled given a

life Service ruling did not include wolves in the northern Rockies, nor the Mexican wolf subspecies.

"The changes on wolf protections took effect immediately Thursday with the judge's signing of the U.S. District Court order," said Michigan Department of Natural Resources Public Information Officer Ed Golder. "Ongoing work to update the 2015 Michigan Wolf Management Plan will continue, with

the federal rule to delist wolves because the state's wolf population has long surpassed federal and state goals for recovery.

The restoration of wolf protections comes as many wolf-hunt proponents have been advocating for a hunt across the Upper Peninsula. Decisions to implement and regulate hunts of state game animals reside with the Michigan Natural Resources Commission.

long history of legal challenges to delisting decisions resulting in a frequently shifting status of wolves.

The DNR had begun work to update the wolf management plan in 2021 and had met with tribal governments as the federal court challenges continued.

The court's order resolved cross motions for summary judgment in three related cases.

Plaintiffs included Defenders of Wildlife, WildEarth Guardians and the Natural Resources Defense Council, Inc., while the defendants included the U.S. Department of the Interior and its Fish and Wildlife Service. Eastern Michigan to remodel the food pantry storage closet with deeper shelving and a new tough book tablet computer.

Avery explained that since the shelving project is small, most contractors were not interested, but he received a bid for \$4,471 from a local carpenter to remodel the pantry as well as a janitorial supply space under the stairs, since that equipment will no longer be stored in the food pantry closet.

Avery explained the reason for the tough book tablet was to streamline the process with food pantry clients to make sure patrons who need other services that the ACCOA offers or can refer them to, would receive the help quickly. "This is something the state of Michigan has been pushing so people in need don't fall through the cracks.

"All of the repairs we are making is like putting a band-aid on a gaping wound, we do need a new building, but this is an attempt to try. I would much rather do something than nothing," Avery said.

The ACCOA board meets on the fourth Tuesday of the month at 10 a.m. in the second level. ACCOA is located at 207 Church Street in Lincoln. For more information call (989) 736-0634.

Do I have to file income tax returns this year?

Dear Savvy Senior,
What is the IRS standard tax deduction for 2021? I didn't file a tax return last tax year (2020) because I lost my job and my income in March due to COVID-19. But I got a part-time job in 2021 and am wondering if I made enough money that requires me to file this year.

Part-Time Retiree

Dear Retiree,
Whether or not you are required to file a federal income tax return this year depends not only on how much you earned last year (in 2021), but also the source of that income, as well as your age and your filing status.

Here's a rundown of this tax season's IRS tax filing requirement thresholds. For most people, this is pretty straightforward. If your 2021 gross income—which includes all taxable income, not counting your Social Security benefits, unless you are married and filing separately – was below the threshold for your filing status and age, you may not have to file. But if it's over, you will.

- Single: \$12,550 (\$14,250 if you're 65 or older by January 1, 2022).

- Married filing jointly: \$25,100 (\$26,450 if you or your spouse is 65 or older; or \$27,800 if you're both over 65).

- Married filing separately: \$5 at any age.

- Head of household: \$18,800 (\$20,500 if 65 or older).

- Qualifying widow(er) with dependent child: \$25,100 (\$26,450 if 65 or older).

To get a detailed breakdown on federal filing requirements, along with information on taxable and nontaxable income, call the IRS at (800) 829-3676 and ask them to mail a free copy of the "1040 and 1040-SR Instructions for Tax Year 2021," or you can get it online at IRS.gov.

Check Here Too

You also need to be aware that there are other financial situations that can require you to file a tax return, even if your gross income falls below the IRS filing requirements. For example, if you earned more than \$400 from self-employment in 2021, owe any special taxes like an alternative minimum tax, or get premium tax credits be-

cause you, your spouse or a dependent is enrolled in a Health Insurance Marketplace plan, you'll need to file.

You'll also need to file if you're receiving Social Security benefits, and one-half of your benefits plus your other gross income and any tax-exempt interest exceeds \$25,000, or \$32,000 if you're married and filing jointly.

To figure all this out, the IRS offers an online tax tool that asks a series of questions that will help you determine if you're required to file, or if you should file because you're due a refund. It takes approximately 12 minutes to complete.

You can access this tool at IRS.gov/Help/ITA – click on "Do I Need to File a Tax Return?" Or you can get assistance over the phone by calling the IRS helpline at (800) 829-1040.

Check Your State

Even if you're not required to file a federal tax return this year, don't assume that you're also excused from filing state income taxes. The rules for your state might be very dif-

ferent. Check with your state tax agency before concluding that you're entirely in the clear. For links to state tax agencies see Taxadmin.org/state-tax-agencies.

Tax Prep Assistance

If you find that you do need to file a tax return this year, you can free file through the IRS at IRS.gov/FreeFile if your 2021 adjusted gross income was below \$73,000.

Or, if you need some help, contact the Tax Counseling for the Elderly (or TCE) program. Sponsored by the IRS, TCE provides free tax preparation and counseling to middle and low-income taxpayers, age 60 and older. Call (800) 906-9887 or visit IRS.treasury.gov/freetaxprep to locate services near you.

You can also get tax preparation assistance through the AARP Foundation Tax-Aide service. Call 888-227-7669 or visit AARP.org/findtaxhelp for more information.

Black Lake sturgeon season wraps within 36 minutes

After only 36 minutes of fishing, this year's sturgeon season on Black Lake (in Cheboygan and Presque Isle counties) ended at 8:36 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 5. The season, which included spearing and hook-and-line fishing, was scheduled to run February 5-9, or until the harvest limit quota of six lake sturgeon had been reached.

Anglers were initially allocated a season quota of seven sturgeon, but the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) set the harvest limit at six fish. This action helps accommodate the expected number of anglers and anticipate the possibility of near-simultaneous harvest of more than one fish.

There were 565 registered anglers, including a good number of supervised youths. According to the DNR, five sturgeon harvested were male and one was a female, ranging from 46 to 62 inches long and 23 to 67 pounds in weight.

- The first fish was a 59.5-inch female that weighed 48 pounds.

- Fish number two, the largest fish, was a 62-inch male that weighed 67 pounds.

- Fish three was a 47-inch male that checked in at 25 pounds.

- Fish four was a 57-inch male that weighed 45 pounds.

- The fifth fish was a 46-inch male that weighed 23 pounds.

- The sixth fish was a 56-inch male that weighed 35 pounds.

All six harvested fish taken had been captured before by Michigan State University and the DNR during spring spawning runs in the Black River or from past surveys of Black Lake.

Rehabilitation of lake sturgeon in the Cheboygan River watershed is a cooperative effort involving the DNR, the Black Lake Chapter of Sturgeon For Tomorrow, Michigan State University, Tower-Kleber Limited Partnership, the Bay Mills Indian Community, the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Band of Odawa Indians and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians.

The snack-room was much in demand throughout the evening, where excellent refreshments, coffee, milk and soft drinks were served by Mrs. Horace Johnston.

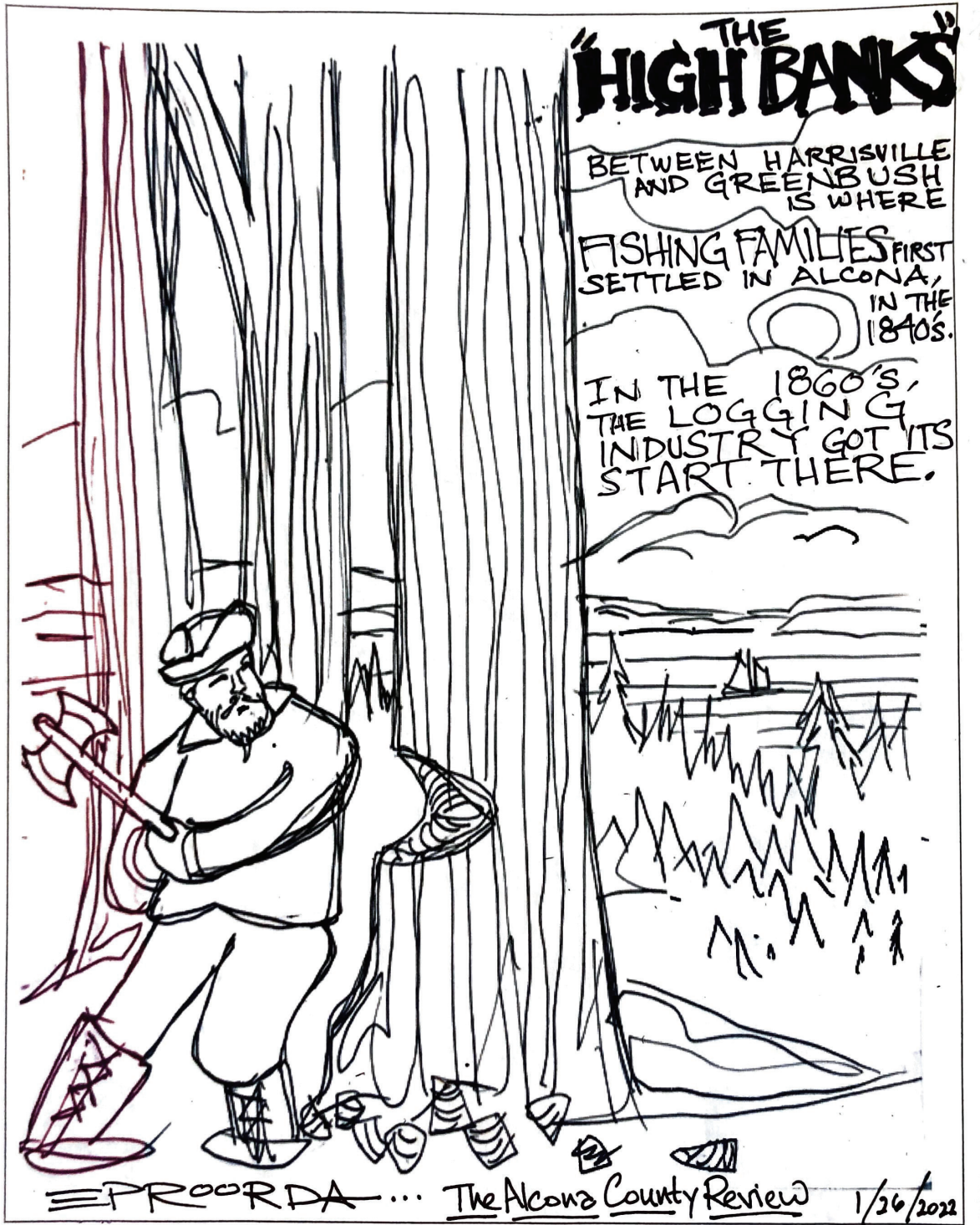

- On Feb. 13, 1633, Italian philosopher, astronomer and mathematician Galileo Galilei arrives in Rome to face charges of heresy for advocating Copernican theory, which holds that the Earth revolves around the Sun. The Copernican theory conflicted with the teachings of the powerful Roman Catholic Church.
 - On Feb. 8, 1936, University of Chicago halfback Jay Berwanger, the first Heisman Trophy winner, is picked No. 1 overall in the NFL draft. However, Berwanger never played for any NFL team because he had too many demands, which teams refused to meet. Instead the college star became a foam rubber salesman.
 - On Feb. 9, 1942, the largest and most luxurious ocean liner on the seas at that time, France's Normandie, catches fire while in the process of being converted for military use by the United States. It was to become a troop transport but ended up at the bottom of New York Harbor.
 - On Feb. 7, 1962, President John F. Kennedy issues an executive order broadening the United States' restrictions on trade with Cuba. The embargo, which effectively restricts all trade between Cuba and the United States, has lapsed several times, notably under Presidents Jimmy Carter and Barack Obama.
 - On Feb. 11, 1970, at the Kagoshima Space Center in Japan, the Ohsumi, Japan's first satellite, is successfully launched into an orbit around Earth. The achievement made Japan the world's fourth space power, after the Soviet Union in 1957, the United States in 1958, and France in 1965.
 - On Feb. 10, 1996, after three hours, world chess champion Garry Kasparov loses the first game of a six-game match against Deep Blue, an IBM computer. Kasparov was ultimately victorious when he bested Deep Blue with three wins and two ties and took home the \$400,000 prize.
 - On Feb. 12, 2002, former Yugoslav president Slobodan Milosevic goes on trial at The Hague, Netherlands, on charges of genocide and war crimes in Bosnia, Croatia and Kosovo. The trial ended without a verdict when Milosevic was found dead from an apparent heart attack in his prison cell.
