County to study new Lincoln site for Alcona VA office

The voices of veterans were heard at last week's Alcona County Board of Commission meeting and a new site will be investigated for the proposed county Veterans Affairs (VA) office.

A handful of veterans attended the meeting and explained that a new office is desperately needed to accommodate services and they deserve better than the storage closet the VA office is located in at the county building.

The Alcona County Commissioners listened and addressed their concerns during the meeting.

The commissioners had been looking into the matter for a while and discussed looking at the possibility of building next to the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) building on M-72 or on a piece of property located near the jail building in Harrisville. Both properties had enough room for the building and already owned by the county.

Representatives of the VA understood the property would have to be owned by the county, however, Alcona County VA Chairperson Patrick Smylie said neither of those locations offered what they were looking for -- to be centrally located in the county with walkable services that veterans could take advantage of.

"We looked at those sites and feel we would be lost there. We don't want to be put in a corner somewhere or lost in the woods. We want to be visible to our community. We want to do more to help veterans than just be an office location. We want to be part of a community, an office in downtown Lincoln would do that," Smylie said.

The veterans had originally chosen land the Village of Lincoln was offering to donate to the county for veteran's services near the corner of Second Street and Traverse Bay Road. But the site was turned down by county commissioners due to possible contamination and a high aquifer (water level).

Instead of trying to persuade commissioners to change their minds about that site, the VA representa-

tives took it upon themselves to find another, more suitable site, on Second Street.

The new four-lot site is on the northwest corner of Hawley and Second Street across the street from the Village of Lincoln Post Office.

"This new location is ideal," Smylie said. "It is on high enough ground we would not

have to worry about flooding. We can see the Veteran's Park and the tank they have on display in back of it. There are plenty of services available within walking distance.

"We had no idea this land would be an option, but when we talked with Dennis Kruttlin of the Lincoln Downtown Development Associa-

tion (DDA) after the commissioners said no to the first option, he suggested it and the Village of Lincoln is willing to donate this new site to the county for the veterans service building use," Smylie said.

Alcona County VA Counselor Tony Atkinson said he was happy with the first property option. "As far as we know there is no contamination or cleanup needed on that (first) property, but this new piece of land is higher up the hill with land sloping away from where the building would sit."

Commissioner Carolyn Brummund said the new Lincoln location looked ideal and asked Atkinson about whether a well could be installed on the site. Atkinson said he would call and get estimates on what a well study or drill would cost. He also told commissioners that he has received documents showing where the building will be able to hook up to village sewer lines.

During the meeting, commissioners unanimously approved exploring the new property site in Lincoln. They would like a committee made up of two commissioners, two

VA board members and a few Lincoln DDA members to meet soon, hopefully before the end of the month.

Since 2018 VA services in the county have been in four different locations with two different phone numbers and Atkinson felt it has been difficult to serve Alcona County veterans with so many changes.

After the meeting when Smylie and Atkinson met on the proposed new site Smylie was very pleased. "To have the Village of Lincoln donate this property and all the help we have received from Dennis Kruttlin, we just can't thank them enough. It's not a done deal yet, but we aren't backing down from this. This will be a good thing for the Village of Lincoln and Alcona County veterans," he said.

Atkinson nodded in agreement with Smylie and said the military always taught him to make things better than the way they found them. "That's what we are trying to do here -- to make a place for veterans to be proud of and want to come and get services. The way things are

Alcona dismantles Charlton Heston, secures winning season

The Alcona varsity football team's season just keeps getting better and better.

On Friday, Sept. 23, the Tigers played on the home field of the Charlton Heston Academy for a North Star League Big Dipper game.

The Tigers, as they have in every game this season, dominated their way to a convincing victory, 72-14.

"This was a good win as it ensured a winning season," head coach Jason Somers said of the team's first 5-0 start since 2013. "This was a goal that the players had set, so to reach that goal feels good. In this performance, many people added to the scoring column and many saw the field, adding to the great team effort."

Alcona racked up a 36-6 lead after the first quarter and rolled to a 60-12 lead by the half.

"The passing game saw some early success and was able to maintain throughout

the game," Somers said. "I thought the line played well at times, still plenty of improvement to be done there, but on the overall we played well in both the run and pass game."

Alcona's first quarter touchdowns came in the form of a 54-yard pass from Garrett Somers to Jeremiah Bullis; Collin Walker touchdown runs of nine and 44 yards; William Liebler had a 35-yard touchdown reception from Somers; and Somers also had a nine-yard touchdown run.

In the second quarter, Walker tracked down a 47-yard touchdown pass from Somers and Walker added a 37-yard scoring run. Bullis finished the half with a 15-yard touchdown reception from Somers.

Somers finished 10-of-11 passing for 302 yards and five touchdowns. Bullis had seven receptions for 176 yards and two touchdowns. Walker had two grabs for 91 yards and two

Make the little things count during preparation for deer season

Hunters start preparing for hunting season shortly after the summer solstice. It's about the time when you start seeing nice bucks in velvet. It's time to start planting fields and building blinds.

Pre-season preparation can go a long way toward increasing success. Part of preparation is investing a lot of time getting everything in order. It's the little things that make all the difference. While doing everything right will improve one's odds of success, as a business owner knows, location is very important.

So, for most of us, the area we hunt is generally set as a result of belonging to a hunting camp. Where we hunt on that property is often already decided as well. At this point all we can do is prepare a food plot -- if applicable, set up your blind to position yourself downwind of where the deer bed and travel in proximity to where you're hunting.

I know of one hunter who had the foresight to plant spruce and pine trees on either side of the trail he used to walk to his blind. Because he walked across a field this made it tough to approach or depart unobserved. In time the trees grew up so now the deer can't see him come or go. Keeping the limbs on the inside trimmed and the ground cleared and raked also prevents deer from hearing him. It's the little things that make a difference. This is one of them.

Setting up your stand so it's downwind of the area the deer travel is very important. While wind directions vary, setting up for the prevailing wind and only hunting your stand when the wind is right is another detail that will go a long way in increasing the likelihood of punching out a tag.

Too many windows can hurt if you're silhouetted. You need a dark corner within

your deer blind; otherwise any deer looking at the blind will see your silhouette and catch any movement. You have to be conscious that many a deer will be stand back in the brush and watch your blind prior to showing themselves. All it takes is for a deer to see movement to cause it to circle downwind and blow alerting other nearby deer of danger. Even if it doesn't snort, it will be wise to your presence and this will have a profound effect on the number of deer you're seeing.

Stealth is important. Carpet on the floor of your blind helps with that. Shelves should have something on them to keep things quiet when moving stuff about. Window and door hinges need to be oiled so they don't squeak when opening and closing windows.

Half the fun is preparation. About a month back we had a work bee at my place to build a couple of deer blinds for my brother-in-law and nephews. The Friday before the materials were dropped off. On Saturday morning Norm Apsey, Terry, Cody, and Brock Franklin came over and we all pitched in and were

able to get two blinds mostly completed in three days.

In that time they were completely assembled, roofed, and painted. The finer things are what you do to customize them for your own particular style of hunting. These finer details were completed after they were hauled away.

Work bees are part of camp life and as a group a lot more can be accomplished than one person working by themselves. Clearing shooting lanes of blow-downs, trimming back new growth, and weed-whacking the weeds and grasses growing up are of the utmost importance to insure when the moment of truth presents itself, you can make the shot.

Some hunters are fortunate to have high quality land that holds nice bucks year in and year out. Other hunters aren't so fortunate and can do all the right things, but as a result of the location they hunt, the opportunities don't materialize. Some parcels are better for archery season, some for the gun season. Again, we are dealt the hand we have and make the most of it.

Patience and perseverance are two qualities that can

make all the difference. Few hunters have the drive to hang in there and hunt hard throughout the season. Dad always told us that if you hunted your spot hard

throughout the season, a buck would eventually show itself. Proof of his wisdom is a story I've told many times

Shannon and I have taken several drives around the neighborhood bean fields prior to them turning yellow and saw a surprising number of very nice whitetail bucks. As the opener approaches, don't forget to get your licenses and spend plenty of time practicing shooting your bow and rifle. The more time spent doing this will make

the moment of truth much more likely to have a happy ending as a result of confidence in yourself using your bow or gun.

Practice makes the act of shooting something natural. Natural as a result of the familiarity with it makes the act more instinctive. When it's instinctive there's no thinking, it just happens, no looking for the safety, or fumbling to draw, it just happens.

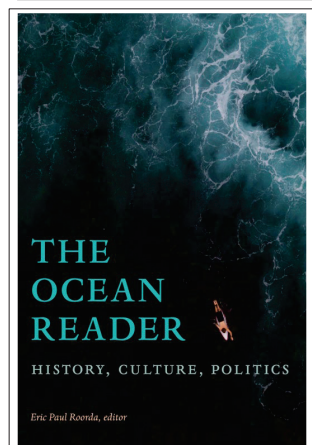

entered into private practice until his retirement in 2018. He practiced law for a total of 61 years.

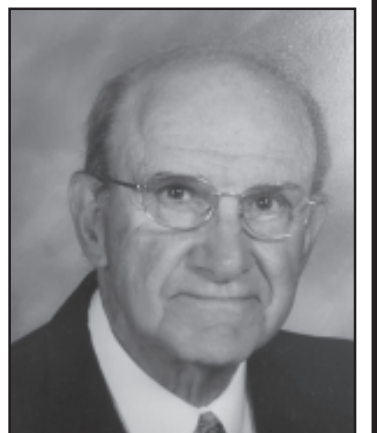

- On Sept. 30, 1868, the first volume of Louisa May Alcott's beloved coming-of-age book "Little Women" is published. Alcott dedicated most of her life and writing to supporting her family after her father's failure at running a school.
 - On Sept. 28, 1901, Ed Sullivan, who will become the host of the long-running TV variety program "The Ed Sullivan Show," is born in New York City. During the peak of its popularity in the 1950s and 1960s, Sullivan's program showcased a wide range of entertainers.
