Walk-about horse finally returns to his family

After a 15-day walk-about, a missing horse has returned to his owners on London Road in Mikado.

Oliver, a 23-year-old gelding Tennessee Walking Horse, lived up to his breed's name on August 11 when he broke out of his stall sometime during the early morning hours while his owner/ family, Tim and Jaymie Sutton and their daughter, Revlynn, were still asleep.

"Tim left for work and didn't notice that Oliver wasn't in his stall. He got down near the end of the road and saw fresh manure on the side of the road. No one else has a horse by us so he came back to check and Oliver was gone," Jaymie said.

The Suttons alerted friends and neighbors and a county-wide search was conducted via social media. All

available began looking for Oliver.

Jaymie explained she also alerted the Alcona and Iosco Sheriff's Offices and notified some horse auctions in case someone found him and tried to sell him. "With a horse missing for two weeks you began to think all kinds of things could have happened, she said.

The hardest part of the horse's disappearance was trying to explain it to Revlynn who is only a year old but truly loves Oliver. "A big part of every day since she was born was going out to say hello to Oliver. She missed seeing him and would ask every morning if he had come back home yet," Jaymie said.

Relatives, friends and community members searched acres of fields, woods and along the Pine River by foot and all-terrain vehicles look-

Schools was awarded an \$80,000 grant to support efforts to build a hoop house at the middle/high school to support the growing of local food directly to school meals for just over \$80,000.

"Alcona is grateful to continue to add opportunities for hands-on learning and direct application to life skills for all of our students. The new hoop house will only enhance our community garden and hoop house located at Alcona Elementary," said Superintendent Dan O'Connor.

O'Connor explained that as part of the Healthy Meals Incentives grant program, Action for Healthy Kids and its partners will provide indepth individualized technical assistance to support and guide the implementation of key strategies to improve school meal quality, as well as help to develop creative solutions to provide nutritious foods for the children we serve.

"Offering healthier school meals is key to helping our nation's kids get the nutrients they need today and for their long-term development," said Rob Bisceglie, CEO of Action for Healthy Kids. "Through this historic investment in school nutrition, we will help school districts across the country overcome challenges and develop solutions to provide nutritious foods for the children they



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
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

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Tips and tools for coping with vision loss, best reacher-grabber tools of 2023

Can you recommend some good resources for seniors with vision loss? My husband was recently diagnosed with macular degeneration, which has deteriorated his central vision, and he's become very discouraged.

Worried Wife

Dear Worried,

I'm very sorry to hear about your husband's eye condition. Unfortunately, there are about 20 million Americans living with macular degeneration today. Over time, this progressive disease can rob people of their central vision, making everyday tasks like driving a car, reading a magazine or watching television extremely challenging. Here are some tips and resources that can help.

Low Vision Help

If your husband hasn't already done so, he needs to see a low-vision specialist for a comprehensive examination. Low-vision specialists are ophthalmologist or optometrist with additional credentials or specialization in low vision testing, diagnosis, and treatment

A low vision exam, which is much different from a typical eye exam, will explore how your husband's eye condition is affecting his day-today life, how he's adapting

emotionally and prescribe solutions to help him regain as much day-to-day functioning as possible.

Your next step is to get your husband to a nearby vision rehabilitation service. These services, which are run by state or nonprofit organizations, or private eye care clinics, help people with all types of uncorrectable vision impairments. Most state and nonprofit services are free or low-cost, while private clinics typically charge a fee or may accept Medicare.

While vision rehabilitation does not restore lost sight, it does help people maximize their existing sight, or, if they have no vision, it can equip them with techniques and tools to help them maintain an independent lifestyle.

Services include counseling, along with training on how to perform daily living tasks with low vision, and how to use visual and adaptive devices and assistive technologies that can help

improve quality of life.

They also offer guidance for adapting your home that will make it safer and easier for your husband to maneuver and can help him locate low-vision support groups. Some agencies will even send their specialist out to work with him in the comfort of your own home.

To find a vision rehabilitation service near you ask your husband's eye doctor for a referral, or you can locate services yourself by calling the American Printing House (APH) Connect Center at (800) 232-5463.

Online Tools

Another convenient place to get help for your husband is online at VisionAware (VisionAware.org). This free website that's part of the APH Connect Center is specifically designed for older adults new to vision loss.

It provides information on

VisionAware also provides a comprehensive list of more than 2,000 low vision agencies and organizations across the country that's searchable by state or category.

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Another terrific low vision resource that's available to your husband is Hadley (Hadley.edu), which is a nonprofit organization and partner of the National Eye Institute and the National Eye Health Education Program.

Hadley offers online discussion groups, audio podcasts and dozens of free online workshop videos to help empower the blind and visually impaired. With Hadley, your husband will learn new ways to do things that have become more difficult due to his vision loss and connect him with a network of peers who understand what he's going through.

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you recommend some good reacher-grabber tools for seniors with back or hip problems who need help picking things up off the ground? I bought a cheap one a few months ago that doesn't work very well but would like to find one that does.

Bad Back Betty

Dear Bad,

A good "reacher-grabber" is a very practical and popular tool for anyone who struggles with injuries, arthritis or loss of mobility. It works like an extension of your arm allowing you to reach down and pick things up off the ground without bending or stooping over. It can also help with reaching and grabbing things in high overhead places, as well as areas that are difficult to get

But with so many different types of reacher-grabbers on the market today, finding a good one that works well for you is not always easy. Depending on your needs, here are some top-rated products to consider.

- All-purpose: For retrieving small and medium-sized items, the "Ettore Grip'n Grab," is a top option that can handle most chores. This 34inch-long tool has a soft comfortable trigger handgrip and a rubberized jaw that's strong enough to lift objects up to five pounds and up to four inches wide, yet sensitive enough to pick up something as small as a dime. The jaw also rotates and locks at 90 degrees for vertical or horizontal use to help you reach things in awkward spaces.
- Lightweight: If you want a reacher primarily for retrieving small lightweight

items around the house, the "RMS Featherweight the Original Reacher" is a top pick. Available in 32 and 26inch lengths, it's made from ultra-lightweight aluminum and has a trigger-style handgrip with a serrated jaw that provides a secure grip when lifting objects.

It also has a magnet built into the tip for picking up light-weight metal objects like a paperclip, and a small hook (or horn) that aids in retrieving things like clothes, shoes or keys. It even has a built-in clip on the arm so you can attach it to canes, walkers and wheelchairs. But, because of its superlightweight design, it doesn't work well at retrieving heaver items like canned goods from shelves.

- Foldable: For easier storage, the top selling folding grabber is the "Zayad Reacher Grabber Tool," which is 32inches long and has a slipjoint in the arm that allows it to easily fold in half. It also has a soft ergonomic grip with a rubberized, rotating jaw that can lift objects up to three pounds and up to four inches wide.
- Heavy-duty: For heaverlifting jobs or for outdoor use, the "Unger Nifty Nabber" is a top choice. Available in 36 and 48-inch lengths, this sturdy tool has a rubbercoated heavy-duty claw that grips small, large, and oddshaped items with ease. It also has a built-in magnet for picking up small metal objects, an ergonomic squeezegrip handle and can lift 8 pounds.

Where to Buy

You can buy reacher-grabbers at many pharmacies, retail, medical equipment and home improvement stores. But, because it's a specialty item, the selection is very limited. Your best bet is to buy one online at Amazon.com, which sells all of the top reacher-grabbers at prices ranging from around \$10 to \$20. Just type the product name in the search bar to find it.

The other members of the crew escaped with comparatively minor injuries. Reuben Simon's right arm was badly bruised. Eli Shinevar had his foot and leg bruised and another man (name not given) was severely cut about the head and face. The accident happened when the river was at high tide and that there were not more fatalities is considered miraculous.

Funeral services for Mr. Curley were held Monday afternoon at the home, with interment in the Curtisville cemetery.

The deceased is survived by the widow and one child, with whom a host of friends mourn his untimely and tragic end.

September 6, 1923 ~ An aged woman, a youth and a babe in arms had a narrow escape from permanent injury or worse Sunday evening when the buggy in which they were riding was struck and demolished by a fast moving automobile on M-72 opposite Duncan Campbell's farm a mile and a quarter west of Harrisville.

The machine, a Ford touring car, was badly damaged, the radiator being the ruined fan spindle, axle, fender, wheel and lights in bad shape. The horse suffered a gash in the shoulder.

Both parties were going west. The occupants of the buggy were Mrs. J. M. Fettes of Haynes, and her greatgrandchild, the seven month old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Heiweyer, and Will E. Anderson, son of J. Wm. Anderson. Harold Conklin, owner and driver of the auto, was accompanied by Bert Swales. Both were shaken up and bruised somewhat.

Mrs. Fettes was going to have charge of the J. W. Anderson household for a short time and the boy was sent with the horse to bring her over from Campbells where she was visiting her daughter. Mrs. Fettes held the babe in her lap. They drove out of the Campbell lane, crossed M-72 to the north side and had proceeded west but a short distance when the crash came. All three were rendered unconscious. Mrs. Fettes and the baby were taken to the Campbell home and the injured boy to his home and a physician summoned. Mrs. Fettes, who is 72, is severely bruised about the head and shoulders and is suffering from shock. The baby was cut on the head. Will Anderson has a sprained ankle and bruises on the head, shoulder and arm, and suffered severely.

The accident occurred just at dusk. The driver of the car says the lights of an on-coming auto blinded him and he did not see the buggy until it was too late to avoid striking

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Moments In Time By The History Channel



- On Sept. 18, 1769, John Harris, a spinet and harpsichord maker from Boston, completed the first spinet piano to be made in America. Upon its debut, the Boston Gazette averred that the instrument "in every respect does honour to that artist."
- On Sept. 19, 1676, Nathaniel Bacon and an army of rebel followers made up of farmers, slaves and indentured servants, set fire to Jamestown, the capital of the Virginia colony, in what came to be known as Bacon's Rebellion, a civil war that pitted Bacon against Virginia governor Sir William Berkeley.
- On Sept. 20, 1942, as part of the British war effort to conserve fuel, citizens were requested to bathe in no more than 5 inches of water. The royal family even painted black lines on all the household bathtubs at said depth, and put up posters around the palace with reminders of the need to conserve energy.
- On Sept. 21, 2012, David Villalobos jumped from the Wild Asia monorail train into a tiger den at the Bronx Zoo and was mauled by a 400-pound Siberian tiger named Bachuta. Quick-thinking employees chased the animal away using a fire extinguisher, and Villalobos, though injured, was able to roll under a wire to safety and survived.
- On Sept. 22, 1999, Saudi Arabia joined other Arab countries in a threat to boycott the Walt Disney entertainment company as a protest against the Israeli exhibit at the millennium show in Florida, which portrayed Jerusalem as the capital of Israel.
- On Sept. 23, 1989, foggy conditions led to one of the worst days for accidents on the German Autobahn, with five vehicular pileups involving 256 cars and a large number of serious injuries. The Autobahns in Germany have no speed limits, and cars sometimes travel as fast as 140 mph.
- On Sept. 24, 1906, Devil's Tower (also called Grizzly Bear Lodge) in northeastern Wyoming was named America's first national monument. The tower is a sacred site for many Plains Indians, and also a popular site for rock climbing.
