# Hubbard Lake to build new community center

After collecting funds for nearly two decades, a new Hubbard Lake Community Center has come one step closer to reality with the final site plan approval of the Caledonia Township Planning Commission last week.

Julie Mathewson, president of the Hubbard Lake Community Association (HLCA), said they are ecstatic. "It has been a long process to get to this point. In 2007 a fund was started with the Community Foundation of Northeast Michigan to raise monies to construct a new community center and library," Mathewson said.

She explained for 17 years the HLCA has worked hard operating fundraisers and raising awareness in the community for the needed 6,500-square-foot building which, when finished, will cost somewhere close to \$1 million.

HLCA treasurer, Joe Rhyne, said they have \$700,000, which mostly came from personal and business donations, including a \$244,000 donation from Hubbard Lake residents Al and Leonore Gonsler.

They have also received some smaller grant funding through Consumers Energy and were awarded \$20,000 of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds.

Raising funds through annual golf tournaments, a dock raffle and selling \$5 firework bracelets has helped them slowly move closer to their goal. "Most of the big funding came from people who live or summer here. We've got this beautiful lake and area. They want a nice-looking community center where they can hold events such as graduations, wedding showers and retirement parties. They want a relaxing place for organizations and groups to meet or play cards.

"They also want a nicer library, which is one of our main focuses -- to build a 1,500 square foot library within the building," Mathewson said. Currently, the Caledonia branch of the Alcona County Library is housed in a much smaller building located down the street from the community center.

The plan is to build in two phases with the first phase

being the exterior shell and finishing the library and restrooms. The new community center will be built on the back portion of land the current

building is on and once it is built the old building will be leveled to expand the parking lot.

The current community center is a 2,700 square foot

refurbished fire station built in the early 1950s. "Despite volunteer efforts to keep the current building looking its best, it is extremely outdated and inefficient to maintain and heat. It housed fire trucks and was never meant to be a community center," Mathewson said.

Rhyne explained in 2020 the current building had a flood and they used insurance monies to put in a new tile floor. "Volunteers bought paint and rolled up their sleeves to brighten the interior. "We bought the cheapest tiles we could find to put in a new floor. We didn't want to put much money into it, but we still wanted it as inviting as possible for our community to use until we could get the new building constructed," Rhyne said.

According to Rhyne, to find the remaining funds needed to finish and furnish the new community center they will be looking at possibly obtaining grants along with additional public donations.

"We've had to ramp up our

# Harrisville State Park opens season with new amenity

The Harrisville State Park officially opened for the 2024 season and a new Action Trackchair has been added this year.

The unit supervisor for the Harrisville and Negwegon State Parks, Eric Ostrander, said the chair will give easier access for visitors who may have difficulty walking the park trails. "It has rubber tracks like a tank and can go through a little water, mud, snow, sand and rough terrain," Ostrander said.

Also new this year is the park's official opening day of camping. The park opened to campers on April 15 and will close on October 22. Ostrander said the park will be keeping the April 15 opening day for a while, no matter which day of the week it falls on.

"We think it will be easier for campers to remember our opening day," he said.

"Another thing to note is the Harrisville Haunted Halloween will be held a week earlier this year, October 4 through 6, instead of our traditional second weekend in

October," Ostrander said.

"Booking for that weekend started April 4 and by that afternoon most of the sites had been reserved. A lot of state parks will be closed after Labor Day because many of them will be going through some major renovations. As a result, there will be less holding a Halloween-themed weekend, which is probably why ours filled up so fast," Ostrander said.

He explained the change of weekends came about because last year the state changed the dates of when summer staff can work until the second Saturday in October. That left a skeleton crew cleaning up after the Haunted Halloween weekend which is one of the busiest weekends at the park.

Ostrander was happy to show off the new Action Trackchair the park received through Kali's Cure, a non-



fundraising. A \$5 firework bracelet wasn't going to put us where we needed to be to build and furnish," Mathewson said.

"We are asking people to write gift donations so their names will be put on our donor wall. People are giving generous checks. They understand it is a tax-exempt donation and their name will be a part of the center," Rhyne said.

The HLCA is waiting for final plans to come in the next few weeks from Bruce Dietz, a commercial developer in Alpena, before starting the bidding process for builders.

"Once that is done, we break ground. It's happening soon and we are so excited. When we say it is a community center, we mean it. This would not be possible without the community's help and donations," Mathewson said.

"When you drive through our town, there hasn't been a lot of revitalization. If we don't do this now, who will step up? We need to rejuvenate our resort-type community town. We want this town to be vibrant and welcoming.

Beatty had a double and a single. Borchardt had two singles. Jena Wambold and Sage Gauthier both doubled, and Baylee Goddard singled.



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

profit organization that assists in the financial support of spinal cord research and the cure for paralysis while helping individuals who are afflicted with the disability.

"Kali's Cure has supplied quite a few chairs to state parks, typically the larger parks that attract the most visitors receive them, but because we had done some fundraising for a chair, we caught their attention and they gave us one," Ostrander said.

He owed the arrival of the chair to one man who began collecting funds for one a few years ago, David Hompstead. Ostrander explained Hompstead, who was born and raised in the area, contacted the park wanting to start fundraising for the chair.

"He said he had family in the area and saw a track chair at the park where he lives now in Bay City, Mich. We worked together through the state DNR website for fundraising and got about \$2,000 in a relatively short time. Kali's Cure came up with a large amount of additional funds for chairs but wanted to give the chairs strictly to parks that had already started some fund-rais-

"That would not have been us if Mr. Hompstead had not reached out and helped to start the process," Ostrander

The chair has multiple features for the user and can be operated by either the person sitting in the chair or by someone walking alongside the chair. "It's pretty cool," Ostrander said as he zipped around in the chair through a wooded portion of the park, "It's got a little kick to it, but there are wheely bars to prevent it from tipping backward.'

He said the action track chair, which will be free to users, will probably be available on a reservation basis for four hours. The chair will need to charge in between uses. To reserve the chair for a certain date and time, call (989) 724-5126.

Ostrander said a new electric car charging station will be available at the park. He was also pleased that Pat Esmond, the park's explorer guide, is scheduled to hold weekly programs throughout the summer.

In addition to a full program this summer, the weekend after Labor Day, September 6-8, the Harrisville State Park will host another Hunter Safety Education Camp.

According to Ostrander, the new Nature Awaits program available to fourth-

grade teachers and their students this spring and again in the fall.

The Nature Awaits program allows students a chance to visit a state park that may not necessarily be close to where they live, but still close enough to get to tour the park and experience an educational activity and then arrive back home before the end of the school day.

According to Ostrander, in addition to the experience and education with grants available for the round-trip transportation costs, each student receives a free oneday vehicle pass to the park so they can visit it again with their family.

Additionally, Ostrander put to rest the question of whether or not Michiganders will have the first right to Michigan state park campsites. "This has gone around for a few times now but it has not been passed. The mindset is Michigan residents would have a two-week jump on nonresidents for campsites.

"This has worked in other states, but I'm not sure the state representatives and senators understand the size of Michigan's park system. I think we have like the second or third-largest camping system in the whole country. Things for other states probably won't work for us because of the size of the system," Ostrander said.

# Glennie man hurt in automobile wreck

Hit by D. & M. Train on Main Street of Omer

**April 17, 1924** ~ Jos. Tyson of Glennie, who was dangerously injured last week in a collision at Omer, is still confined in a hospital at Bay City, where he was taken following the accident.

Mrs. Tyson and Miss Helen Coleman, who were also in the wreck, were only slightly injured. Miss Coleman, whose home is at Hubbard Lake but who is teaching school at Glennie, has returned to her school and Mrs. Tyson is at Bay City with her husband.

Tyson, with his wife and Miss Coleman, were returning from Bay City with a new Ford truck. At Omer Tyson apparently drove directly in

front of D. & M. train No. 4 southbound from Alpena, without noticing its approach. Tyson was driving east and the train struck the car on the side of the cab where Tyson was riding.

All three occupants were thrown aside, and the truck was demolished. Tyson was terribly cut about the head and neck, his face being literally covered with gashes that reached to the bone and were from three to five inches in length.

He was placed in the baggage car for the trip to Bay City, and the two women were taken into the parlor car. Mrs. Tyson suffered from shock but no bones were broken. Miss Coleman was uninjured except for slight abrasions on one hand and shock.

According to members of the train crew, the truck was so badly smashed that none of the pieces remaining strewn along the track was larger than a man's head, and they cannot understand why all three were not killed.

The train was in charge of engineer C. McDonald, fireman C. C. Fleeger, conductor Wm. Bean, brakeman Mel Emerson, and baggageman Geo. Boddy.

According to the crew, the

train was not traveling over 15 miles an hour, as it was just pulling into the Omer station, and had slowed down considerably, the station being but a very short distance from the crossing.

Engineer McDonald brought the train to a stop in less than its own length. The crossing is clear on both sides, and a train can be seen from half a mile away, it is said. Miss Coleman said she did not notice the approach of the train at all until it struck them.

Railway, as proposed by the railroad officials in their petition to the interstate commerce commission. They also instructed the prosecuting attorney to represent the board at the proceedings to be taken before the commission.

A delegation of business men headed by president Chas. Mills of the Village of Lincoln, went to Lansing and appeared before the public utilities commission, making arrangements to be heard should the proceedings be conducted before that body.

Protests are coming from the proposed discontinuance many sources, and if the petition of the railroad officials is granted, it will be in the face of strenuous opposition put forth by a community of interests embracing all sections of the county.

# One-day blizzard ties up traffic throughout county

**April 18, 1974** ~ The Alcona County area apparently received the brunt of the oneday northeast blizzard that hit this section Friday. The storm started in the early morning and gained momentum as the hours passed. By noon cars were stranded on streets and highways.

Later in the day, holiday weekend motorist from the south were having difficulty getting through although the county plows were working diligently to try to keep the main through highways open.

By nightfall traffic was at a standstill in Harrisville. Hotel and overnight accommodations were taxed to capacity. Many private homes were opened to strangers who spent the night here. The storm subsided a few hours after midnight Saturday and the road was cleared through to Alpena. A cavalcade of cars, trucks and buses followed the snow plow through.

All areas in Alcona County were without electricity for about eight hours during the

The power failed about 5:00 o'clock p. m. and it was near 1:00 a.m. before the damage could be located and repaired. A main line south of Mikado had been broken and could not be reached by the maintenance crew truck.

A crew from Tawas and local man, W. Fogelsinger, were on duty and are to be commended for their work.

The State Police of Alpena, on the job directing the tie-up of cars, and the County Road Commission crews also deserve commendable credit for their efforts. This was the only severe storm to hit this area this season.



# Moments In Time By The History Channel



- On April 29, 2004, the World War II Memorial opened in Washington, D.C. The granite and bronze monument stands on 7.4 acres on the former site of the Rainbow Pool at the National Mall, between the Washington Monument and the Lincoln Memorial.
- On April 30, 1993, tennis player Monica Seles was stabbed between the shoulder blades by Gunter Parche during a match in Hamburg. Parche, a fan of German tennis star Steffi Graf, apparently hoped that by injuring Seles, his idol would be able to regain her No. 1 ranking.
- On May 1, 1963, Gloria Steinem published the first half of "A Bunny's Tale" in SHOW magazine, recounting her brief stint as a Bunny in Manhattan's Playboy Club. Steinem's undercover reporting revealed a culture of misogyny and exploitation behind the glamorous facade of Hugh Hefner's empire.
- On May 2, 1924, Patrick Mahon was arrested at London's Waterloo train station on suspicion of murder. He was executed later that year for killing his pregnant mistress, but an important innovation resulted from the crime scene: The officers, who had no gloves, were forced to handle the victim's remains with their bare hands. After the investigation, rubber gloves became standard equipment at murder scenes.
- On May 3, 1980, 13-year-old Cari Lightner of Fair Oaks, California, was walking to a church carnival when she was struck and killed by an out-of-control car driven by an intoxicated Clarence Busch. Her death led her mother, Candy Lightner, to found the organization Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), which would grow into one of the country's most influential nonprofit organizations.
- On May 4, 1776, Rhode Island, which was founded by the most radical religious dissenters from the Puritans of Massachusetts Bay Colony, became the first North American colony to renounce its allegiance to King George III. It would also be the last state to ratify the new American Constitution more than 14 years later.
- On May 5, 1816, the first published poem by John Keats, the sonnet "To Solitude", appeared in the London journal The Examiner. Keats' sadly brief but overall brilliant span of work includes "Ode on a Grecian Urn," "La Belle Dame Sans Merci" and "Ode to a Nightingale."

## Kovels: Antiques and Collecting By Terry and Kim Kovel

### Embroidered textiles


Textiles are fragile and need special care. Dust, light, insects and moisture can damage them. Antique textiles in good condition are rare and often sell for high prices.

This needlepoint casket was made about 1660 in England and sold for \$17,920, nearly three times its low estimate, at Morphy Auctions. A closer look shows that the colorful people, plants and animals stitched onto the fabric are three-dimensional, making the stitching even more complex. This tricky technique, called stumpwork, required padding the stitches to make the designs stand

All forms of embroidery, including stumpwork, were popular in England throughout the 1600s. Richly embroidered textiles and the items made from them grew more popular as more people could afford them. Many surviving examples of embroidery, including some museum-quality pieces, were made by amateurs, probably girls or young women. Girls would learn embroidery at a young age and practice their stitches with samplers, another popular collectible. Elaborately embroidered boxes like these may have been projects for girls learning embroidery to show their mastery of the skill.

Q: You had an article about a "Back to the Future" VHS tape selling for thousands of dollars. What auction houses or other outlets might be interested in buying or selling VHS tapes or LPs?

A: The VHS tape that sold for a record \$75,000 was a sealed copy of the original 1985 film from a collection owned by Tom Wilson, who played "Biff" in the film. Factors contributing to the high price include the popularity of the film and the actor who owned the tape. Desirability, rarity and condition determine price. An unopened or sealed copy is more valuable than a used copy. Most VHS tapes sell for less than \$10.

Vinyl records have become popular again. Many are worth less than a dollar, but sought-after albums, including those from the 1960s and '70s, are worth more. You can find prices online for both VHS tapes and LPs by searching sites like valueyourmusic.com or discogs.com. Look for "sold" prices on eBay. There are stores that buy and sell old VHS tapes and LPs. They can tell you which ones are worth more than a few dollars. They'll give you about half what they expect to sell them for.

TIP: The best way to store plates is vertically in a rack. If you don't have space, store

them with pads between the dishes.

# Compensation for service-related conditions

and conditions for which you can receive compensation can be either physical or mental. But there's no one-size-fitsall when it comes to how much compensation you can receive. Whether it's hearing loss or depression, or cancer or PTSD, each one has a different rating, which results in a different level of compen-

The Department of Veterans Affairs disability rating you are assigned after being approved is based on the severity of your condition. Your compensation will be based partially on that and partially on whatever else might increase that compensation, such as having a family or a disabled spouse, or if you've suffered severe disability or loss of limbs.

And from there it gets even more complicated.

It's possible for your rating to change over time if your condition worsens, but even when combining multiple ratings (conditions) it's nearly impossible to reach 100% dis-

Increasing your final rating by combining smaller ratings (for multiple conditions) is difficult because there are rules, charts and math to consider. There is combining the numbers, converting,

Service-connected injuries rounding up or down to the nearest 10. For example, you can't take a 20% rating and a 60% rating and come up with an 80% rating. In this case, the actual combined rating equates to 68%, but it's rounded up to 70% ... because the chart says so.

Combining three or more disabilities is even more complicated. And nowhere on that chart is a rating of 100% disability.

A 100 percent disability rating, if given, can be temporary (until your condition clears up or gets better) or permanent if given for severe conditions such as blindness or loss of limb. But reaching that level without those severe conditions is difficult enough that whole legal websites across the internet are devoted to that one effort: getting a 100% disability rating.


